INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

TWELFTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twelfth Annual Meeting of the Toronto Infants' Home, and Infirmary, was held at the Home, St. Mary street, on October 24th, 1887.

There were present a number of Ladies, and Gentlemen interested in the welfare of the Institution, amongst whom were Messrs. J. J. Maclaren, Q.C., Thomas Hodgins, Q.C., O. H. Howland, D. B. Duck, &c.

In the unavoidable absence of the Mayor, detained at the Council, Mr. Thomas Hodgins presided.

In moving the adoption of the Secretary's Report, Mr. Townsend referred to the fact, that the City By-law for the prevention of Baby Farming, was a dead letter.

In a letter from the City Solicitor on the subject, that official stated, that no license had been taken out for keeping children, as provided for by the statute and by-law, no action had been taken by the city, and no instructions had been given to the officials for the enforcement of the law.

After the moving and adoption of the various Reports of the Home, the election of Officers and Managers, &c., the meeting adjourned, to inspect the newly erected Cottage Hospital, visit the various wards or nurseries, and partake of refreshments provided by the Ladies of the Board.

TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT, 1886-1887.

In presenting our twelfth annual report, the managers of the Infant's Home and Infirmary, desire to express their gratitude to the Great Giver of every good, for the success which has attended their work, through the past year, it having been one of especial blessing.

In the last Annual Report, the Secretary laid before you an account of the serious epidemic with which the Home had been visited, showing the absolute incapacity of the Infirmary to deal with cases of infectious disease, and touching upon the proposed erection of a Cottage Hospital. To provide the sum necessary for such a building in addition to the grant of \$150 per annum, kindly voted by the City Council, pressed heavily upon the minds of the Board, and many plans were spoken of. To Mrs. Bendelari belongs the credit of devising the means of lifting this weight of anxiety. By her suggestion a grand "Kirmiss" was held, and by her talented management, and indefatigable exertions ably seconded by the managers, and many friends of this Institution, was carried to its successful termination.

The warmest thanks of the managers, are hereby tendered to her, and to the ladies and gentlemen, who worked so hard and so willingly to secure the success of the undertaking, more especially Mrs. Arthurs and Mrs. Harrison.

The proceeds, \$4,194 of the "Kirmiss" were appropriated as follows:

To the Cottage Hospital Fund.....	\$2,000 00
To Reduction of Debt on Main Building.....	1,000 00
To Providing Work-room Materials.....	100 00

and the balance \$1,094, placed to the general purpose account to be used in paying some of the heavy expenses caused by the epidemic of last year.

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The erection of the Hospital was immediately proceeded with, but owing to strikes through the summer it has not arrived at the state of completion we hoped for when we invited you to this, our Annual Public Meeting. Before the building can be used for the purpose intended it must be furnished, and donations towards that object, either in money or furniture, will be gratefully received.

In the early part of the year Morse's Soap Company, placed the sum of \$1,000 in the hands of the Mayor, to be divided among City charities, in proportion to the numbers of soap wrappers sent in by each; 1,735 wrappers secured to the Home, the sum of \$155.05.

As this money was quite unexpected, the Managers unanimously voted that it should be expended, in putting up what is really a necessity, and yet a luxury, viz., a Summer Shelter for the Nurses and Children. A lady visitor found one day a girl of sixteen in tears, and on asking the reason was answered with sobs, "Oh, I do so want to go out with my baby, and walk in the sunshine." This most natural feeling, we hope to be able to indulge by this proposed expenditure of the \$155, but a further sum of at least \$75 is needed, to enclose the grounds sufficiently and put up a suitable erection. We would like also to provide hammocks for the Infants, and seats for the Nurses, thus enabling them with comfort to care for the babies, and keep a watchful eye over the older children at play on the grass. We hope to have this shelter completed in the spring, and to shew in our next Report, that the health and happiness of those under our care has been much benefited by this appropriation, of the kind donation of Morse Soap Company.

It may not be understood by the general public that this Institution receives a yearly grant from the city, consequently any child sent to the Home on the Mayor's order, takes precedence of all other applications. We are often obliged, for want of Cot room, or a suitable nurse, to refuse admission to many applied for, thereby often giving offence to persons who desire to have a child or a wet nurse,

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or infant in whom they are interested, admitted to the Home.

The chief rule of the Infants' Home is, that when possible the mother must come in with her child, as our great aim is to preserve health in these poor babies, also to encourage love in the hearts of the young mothers for their infants, which can only be done by the mother taking charge of her baby in its first helplessness; each day of attention to its little wants awaken fresh interest, and develops the great virtue of love in the mother's heart. While an inmate of the Home, and able, without fear, to show her maternal affection it is a natural result, that as a rule women leave our Institution, benefited both morally and physically. We may here, I think, present to your notice the following example: An untutored girl, of a very low type, whose surroundings must have been such as we can hardly realize, was sent into the Home, with her drugged and dying baby, which she had been known to illtreat while in the Hospital. During her stay here, terminated by the death of her child, improvement was seen daily, not only in her own appearance and manners, but in the care, and gradually developed mother love, bestowed upon her own child and her little charge.

We may certainly attribute this result which we see in many women admitted, to the constant encouragement given by the officers of the Home, the sympathy and kindness of the ladies of the Board, and very greatly to the example of the better class of inmates with whom they are associated, we therefore feel that, although often discouraged, we have great incentives to remember the Divine precept, "Be not weary in well doing, for in due season ye shall reap, if ye faint not."

The subject of Baby Farming with its attendant evils, which was presented to your notice in so able, and exhaustive a manner at our last Annual Meeting by the lady then holding the position of Secretary, was followed by an application to the Local Legislature, resulting in the passing of an Act, obliging persons wishing to take charge of infants to apply for a special license to do so; thereby bringing the holders of such licenses under police supervision.

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A few facts as to the number of children and mothers cared for during the twelve years' work of this Home, may be of some interest. Since 1870 to the present date 1,679 infants have been sheltered. 820 mothers have come in with them. 78 children have been adopted, and about 400 have been taken home by friends. A large number of mothers who but for the protection, care, and rest, afforded to them by the Home, might and probably would have become outcasts of society, are married and in comfortable homes of their own; very often trying in their turn to comfort and help those who have erred in like manner; but here let it be distinctly understood that in no instance can an unmarried woman, except with her first-born, be received in the Home. Of deserted wives with infants, we have had unhappily a large number; and among the 122 children cared for during the year we have many motherless infants, also several whose mothers have been in the General Hospital for lengthened periods.

On September 30th, 1886, there were in the Home 27 Infants, 19 women. This small number was due to the fact that we had closed our doors against admission on account of the epidemic.

During the year ending September 30th, 1887, we have received into the Home 122 infants. Boys 56, girls 76, of those there have been—

At the end of this report will be found extracts from the letters of persons who have adopted children from this Home. This feature of our work has been most encouraging, some of our most friendless children having lately been taken to excellent homes.

We feel it is scarcely necessary to reiterate in our Yearly Report, that the greater number of deaths are those of foundlings and infants heavily drugged prior to admission.

From this class come the 24 children sent to the Home during the past year on the Mayor's order, with few exceptions they come to us requiring the most careful nursing and watchfulness. The money therefore given to the Home on account of these most pitiful little creatures, barely pays for the milk required by them. They must have a nurse, and must be clothed, facts many people are inclined to forget, not so, the ladies, who so kindly and steadily come each week to our work-room, to make the numerous garments needed by our large family.

The Work-room Report will show you the amount of sewing accomplished during the past year. We feel most grateful to those friends who assist the Managers of the Home in this most constant and ever needed department of our work.

Our Medical Staff have also proved themselves true friends to this institution. To their watchful care and attention is due the restored health of many who come to us enfeebled and apparently dying. The daily visit of a skilled physician is a great lightening of the burden of responsibility laid on the

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officers of the Home, who most carefully carry out the medical orders, and themselves, more particularly our able Lady Superintendent, Miss Boulton, never flag in the continuous care of those under their charge.

During the year the Sunday evening Bible class has been regularly kept up by Miss Jarvis, an ever faithful friend to the inmates. Bible classes are also conducted on Tuesday evening by the Rev. O. P. Ford, and on Thursday evening by Miss Saunders and Miss Donaldson. Divine service is held on Sunday morning by one of the Clergy of St. Luke's Church, Baptism is administered on the first Monday in each month, by the Rev. J. Pearson. The warmest thanks of the Managers are due to the Clergy, and the Ladies, who thus work for the religious and moral welfare of our Home. The visits of any minister of the Gospel are welcomed by the officers of the Institution.

In conclusion we would gratefully acknowledge the constant and kind assistance given to this Institution by our many friends. One favour we would earnestly ask, that any who feel a prejudice against the Infants' Home, from an idea that it is an Institution rather encouraging than lessening vice, will carefully read one of our yearly reports and then pay a visit to the Home in order to judge for themselves.

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The percentage of deaths to admission of Infants is 35.7, which may seem rather high, but when you take into consideration the miserable condition in which many of the infants have been admitted, the cause is easily seen. No

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infant is refused, even although it may be at the point of death, if good reasons for its admission are forthcoming, the Institution being an Infirmary as well as a Home.

It is proposed to construct an open shed for the purposes of a summer shelter and playhouse in the south-east angle of the lot, which will no doubt prove most beneficial to the health of both nurses and children. The new Hospital is approaching completion, and will be ready for occupation in a short time. Whenever the main building becomes overcrowded, or any other necessity arises for its use, it will prove a great boon apart from the special purpose for which it has been erected. It is subject of congratulation that we have not had any case of epidemic disease, or any unusual sickness during the past year, which leaves little for special mention in this report.

CONSTITUTION.

OF THE TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for destitute infants under two years of age.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money their babies shall be admitted free.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a committee of thirty-five ladies, assisted by an advisory committee of three gentlemen, and the committee shall elect annually their presiding officers and a treasurer and secretary out of their number.

V.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-laws of the Society, provided one month's notice shall be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the "Advisory Committee."

VI.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Committee. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance, especially the investment of funds.

VII.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, &c.

VIII.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October.

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I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the Children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the Matron and Nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an Annual Report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a Chartered Bank of the city, keep an accurate account of Receipts and Expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet nurse shall be received permanently without their examination and approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two Infants. The term to be at least six months.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home, to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Applications for admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary Street, every Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services for at least six months to the Institution in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and child.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the Lady Managers in obtaining when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the visiting physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Matron to have the name, age, condition, &c., of the applicant entered on the record and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her first-born.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES .

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying, and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection.
