AGRICULTURE

Notes and Suggestions of Practical Utility FOR THE FARM, FIELD, GARDEN AND DAIRY. Cleanliness of Interest for Our Country Readers. Horses are fond of sugar. Half-dons work never pays. Hogs love purchase or "pansy."

Overlooking the Work. The farmer who turns over to his wife the management of the poultry because it is "wells" tells upon him an annual loss that he cannot afford. The fact is that women cannot attend to their domestic matters and also perform work necessary to keep the farm profitable.

Plenty of Sunlight. Sunlight is more agreeable to the hens than anything else. They shun darkness, and will not accept a dark poultry house, preferring exposure to cold and sunlight than to warmth and darkness.

Dust Powder. For the dust bath nothing is superior to coal ashes, but they must be sifted twice, first to remove the coarse portions, and next to get rid of the fine dust.

Hold on to the Good. If you find among your hens one that is an extra good layer and possesses many other qualities desired, keep her, no matter what breeding she may be.

Keep the Floor Covered. One who has not used leaves or dry dirt on the poultry house floor will know nothing of the enjoyment of the hens from the use of litter until he tries it.

Medicinal Food. Where wire is used for fences it will be an improvement to grow hedges on the outside of the wire, to serve as windbreaks in winter and shade in summer.

The idea among this class of people is that the Marquis should have had this particular address framed and glazed, and kept as an heirloom in his family for the information of his descendants; but unfortunately his lordship has not been blessed with a single hair, and therefore nobody is to inherit the distinguished words of flattery therein contained. One morning at breakfast the conversation turned upon as to the disposition to be made of the precious document, when Her Royal Highness suggested that it would suit nicely to light cigarettes, but His Excellency thought it better to place it in his scrap-book which contained a great many curious extracts cut from the Canadian papers, on both sides of politics, in which some of the best specimens of Canadian journalistic savagery appears—spiced with toad and fawns served up in the latest style of plush James, Lingoes and poodle dogs, known in all communities to be continually yelping at the heels of the sublime people of this world. ## TREE MEN.

As this is the season for visitations from perceptive tree vendors with specimens books of the plants and animals, we think it is also reasonable to give our readers a hint or two that may profit thereby. Several of our citizens complain that they are the victims of dead trees. ## THEY DREAD THE ELECTRIC LIGHT.

The simple people in some of the interior provinces of Germany and Austria are reported as making a stout fight against the electric light. The fearful thing seems to them uncanny, awful and ominous. They know what a penny dip means, and have lighted their way to the grave with it for many generations. But this carbon burner, with its bright, supernatural flash, its occasional crackling, as though there were imps in the air and they all had the colic, well, it is too much for their equanimity, and if a protest doesn't work it is possible that they may resort to violence.

Modern science and modern improvements are always in a fight of that kind. When steam was introduced there were a good many wisecracks who shivered at the screeches and predicted disaster. They had to surrender, however, and these good folk will do the same after a while and wonder why they were silly enough to oppose the innovation. The temperament of Americans is different. We don't like old things or old ways. On the contrary, we are eagerly interested in telephones, telegraphs, kinetographs, microphones, phonographs and all the other "ones" and "aplas" which are pecking their way through the shell. We are in an awful hurry for some one to invent a cheap way to store electricity which will drive us across the ocean in five days, and we don't want to die until we have made at least one trip to the clouds in a flying machine. Berlin has as many electrical institutions as there are in New York and London, and the march of science will soon ring out the old and ring in the new.

## THE SIZE OF AUSTRALIA.

New South Wales as Large as Our Original Province.

Among the tacit misconceptions into which distant critics are most likely to fall about anti-ocean affairs is that which is based upon ignorance of the enormous area and possibilities of the colonies, says Scribner's Magazine. Especially is this likely in the United States, where the assumption may be that, as the population of Australia is about the same as that of the thirteen original seaboard colonies of America, the surface over which they are distributed is also approximately the same. As a matter of fact there is no such proportion.

New South Wales alone is as large as they were; Tasmania, the Rhode Island of Australia, is as large as that state, with New Jersey, New Hampshire and Massachusetts added; Victoria, the smallest colony of the continent, is equal in size to Great Britain; Queensland surpasses the united areas of Austria, France and Germany; South Australia, one-third greater than Queensland, is nearly as large as Western Australia, which of itself has nearly four times the extent of Texas, while the two colonies together are larger than the whole of Europe without Russia.

The seven colonies between them occupy a territory greater than that of the United States, excluding Alaska. It is true that at present Australia has barely 4,000,000 inhabitants, but these immense areas represent a potential population to which it is impossible to set bounds.

No part of the continent is so hot and so unhealthy as to forbid white settlement, and if the strip of low lying coast lands in the north be omitted there is no part of it yet colonized in which Europeans cannot work.

Port Darwin, the country above the gulf of Carpentaria, and an indefinite belt toward the northwest lie within the tropics and are suitable for tropical production, but the high plateaus of Northern Queensland, which must close to the west, is found thoroughly healthy for English miners and graziers and enjoys a bracing winter. The back country, though winterless by comparison with the Mississippi valley, is able to carry stock well in most seasons, and with wells, tanks and dams may be made to do so in all years. The desert country of Eastern Australia has yet to be found.

#### AN OTTAWA.

#### Canadian Vessels at the Mercy of Newfoundland.

#### Headed by the *St. John's* and *the Ball* supply.

#### Interviewed the other afternoon regarding the refusal of Newfoundland to allow Canadian vessels to trade in the cargo, Minister Fuller stated that the law officers of the imperial government had expressed the opinion that Newfoundland had no constitutional power to enforce the ban against residents of other British colonies, and that the imperial government had asked that a joint case be prepared by the dominion and Newfoundland for submission to the imperial jury council, with a view of obtaining similar articles from the United States free, thus placing the whole trade of that colony in the hands of Newfoundland.

#### Some important evidence was given in the Connolly-McGreavy conspiracy before the police court today after which the case was adjourned for a postponement until Monday on account of the absence of Mr. Ouler. Defendants counsel protested against allowing the trial along indefinitely by repeated adjournments when witnesses were ready for examination. Judge Ross granted the adjournment. The position of Mr. Ouler is being discussed in legal circles. He cooperated with the lawyers for McGreavy and Connolly before the privileges and elections committee in relation to the charges, and presumably enjoyed the confidence of and obtained information from McGreavy and the Connollys, whom he is now engaged in prosecuting. Some lawyers say that on the surface Mr. Ouler appears to be acting unprofessionally.
