Harris, of St. John, did make an excellent Plough, but it was not adapted to the work generally required in the country.

If they turned to other machinery in this Report they would find a good deal about Messrs. Cossitt's machines. He referred to the Reaper and Mower manufactured by them, and asked would any honorable gentleman be kind enough to give him information where a combined Reaper and Mower was manufactured in New Brunswick. He did not know it to this day, and was it a shame of the Government of the day to tell people where they could get a Reaper and Mower combined, of light draught and simple construction, and its mechanism easily understood?

He held that it was right and proper to disseminate information to the Farmers, for it was necessary that any person who hought machinery of any kind should be up to the times and buy the best.

Was there really a manufacturer in New Brunswick who manufacturer in New Brunswick who manufactures in iron combined and were not Farming Implements run as a side-show with some others, and could it be expected that they would do as well as establishments that had to compete against the world? The people should have the most reliable information. He took an interest in machinery; he was something of a machinist himself; he had the first Reaper and Mower on the Miramichi River; he had the first Thrasher, and anything he could do by machinery and not by hand, he did. He had had 27 years experience in machiner, and hachines in particular was this—that if he wanted to-day to purchase an Agricultural Machines in particular was this—that if the wanted to-day to purchase an Agricultural implement, he would want it first class, because if he did otherwise it might be superseded to-morrow, and if he wanted the best machine he should not go to Ontario or New Brunswick, but to the United States for it, because he believed they manufactured better there. Nothing was to good for the farmers of this country to enable them to make of it what ought to to be made of it, and for his part he did not care if machines were manufactured in Japan or China if they were first-class articles, and he thought the sons of New Brunswick should not be teid down to any market.


