

AUGUSTA, Me., Jan. 24—An act to regulate and establish mileage rates for conveyance of passengers on the steam railroads of the State was pre-sented in the House today. It provides that mileage books shall be issued and kept for sale at all regular stations, of three denominations, 250, 500 and 1,000 miles, good for the bearer on any regmiles, good for the bearer on any reg-

miles, good for the beater on any res-ular passenger train. A bill providing for the sale of in-toxicating liquors by registered apoth-ccarles was introduced in the Senate. According to its provisions registered apothecarles may sell liquor on the prescriptions of reputable physicians.


PATCH ON FURNACE

(Special Correspondence of The Sun.) CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Jan. 23.—In considering conditions such as exist here at present it is only natural that extreme views should be present-ed by the opposing parties, and hence it happens that while the few who are so strongly agitating in favor of seces-sion are perhaps going too far, it is equally true that the stand-pat attitude adopt-ed by another class is still less justif-able. The situation in Prince Edward Island is most serious and cannot be regarded lightly. The whole future of the province depends upon improved facilities for winter communication and to bring about such improvements the people must take united action. Business is at a standstill, and the difficulties in the way of carrying on

is constantly changing and no one knows what difficulties may exist un-til they are actually encountered. There are obstacles other than ice, to be overcome. A sudden cold snap following mild weather, causes a rise of vapor as dense as fog and this is a hindrance to navigation. Although Summerside and Charlottetown loudly proclaim the advantages of their re-



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Dom-inion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatche-wan and Alberta, excepting § and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter sec-tion of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate. The homesteader is required to per-form the conditions connected there-with under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his perma (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said


A TRAGEDY
