In Galicia the Russians are still actively in the quest of Lemberg, keeping up their pressure against the Austro-Germans westward from the regions of Brzezany and Halicz.

Nearby Brzezany the Russians have driven back the Teutons from fortified positions and advanced to the Naraiuvka river, a tributary of the Gafat Lipa, and at some points have crossed the stream. Near Halicz the railway line has been cut by the Russians, who are now heavily bombarding Halicz, which, although in fiames, the forces of the Central Powers are still stubbornly defending.

In Wednesday's fighting in the Halicz sector 5,645 officers and men of the Teutonic fillies were made prisoner. Both Berlin and Vienna, admit retreats between the Zlota Lipa and Dniester rivers.

The retret was made in the face of a threatened enveloping movement. To the southeast, in this same region, the Roumanians have occupied the Gyersyc-Ditro-Orsova Pass.

Reumanians Surrender Turtukal.

Berlin, Sept. 7, via London, (5.56 pp. m.)—More than 20,000 Roumanians were taken prisoners when Buigarian and German troops captured the Roumanian fortress of Turtukal, says the official statement issued today by the German army headquarters. The official statement says that in the capture of the Roumanian fortress more than 100 guns were taken.

Turtukal, which has been evacuated by Roumanian troops, in the face of German and Bulgarian attacks, is one of a series of fortresses defending the Roumanian capital from the south. It is situated on the southern bank of the River Danube, opposite Oltanits. From which town a railroad runs to Bucharest. The German army headquarters' staff announced on Wednesday that German and Bulgarian troops had stormed seven of the Turtukal works, including the armored batteries of the position.

Vienna, via London, Sept. 7—Austrian troops have withdrawn before a threatening Roumanian envelopment to the heights west of Olah Toplitza, south of Dorne Watra and twenty miles west of the Roumanian border, says-the official statement issued at Austro-Hungarian headquarters today. On the Russian front the Austrian troops, between the Ziota Lipa and the Dniester rivers, have also been withdrawn.






