Italians On Way To Peace Conference; Belgium Agrees To Sign Peace Treaty

Paris, May 5.—The announcement that Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino, the leading Italian delegates to the Peace Conference, had left Rome for Paris, and the further news that the Belgian Crown Council had given its assent to the signing of the peace treaty by the Belgian delegates, regardless of the unsatisfactoryness to Belgium of the financial arrangements, have resulted in relieving the embarrassments of the Peace Conferees.

These developments had the sit ect of producing a call for a plensy session of the conference, to be held tomorrow for the purpose of laying the peace treaty before all the participating nations. The treaty may be presented to the Germans on Wednesday or Thursday of this week.

The time for handing over the peace treaty to the Germans was set today for 3.15 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

A Total of 6,598 Applied Under the Land Settlement Provisions—189 Applicants from New Brunswick.

Ottawa, May 5.-- Up to third day of May 6,598 applications for the bene-tits of the soldier land settlement provisions had been approved by the qualification committees in the whole of the Dominion. The greatest number is in Alberta, where 1,134 applications have been approved by the Edmonton office and 767 by the Calgary office. Saskatchewan shows 1,264, Manitoba 1,535, British Columbia 946. In the east the numbers approved in the various provinces are: Quebec 415; Ontario 466; New Brunswick 189; Nova Scotia 114; Prince Edward Island 104.

The total number of applications received in all the provinces is 9,849. Reports also show that 508 applicants have been recommended for agricultural training, and 143 have applied for and are actually taking training either at the training centres, or on farms of selected farmers.

Columbus, O., May 5.—Fire in a down town business and apartment building at midnight tonight unquestionably has trapped many persons, police say. Men, women and children jumped from upper floors into life nets. One baby was thrown from the third floor and caught in the arms of a youth alding the firemen. All fire apparatus has been summoned. Scores of women who jumped from upper apartments of the seven story building have been rushed to hospitals as seriously injured. "Without claiming that these methods and principles are either complete or final, the high contracting parties are of the opinion that they are well fitted to guide the policy of the League of Nations, and that, it adopted by the industrial communities who are members of League and safe-guarded in practice by an adequate system of such inspection they will confer lasting benefits of the wage earner of the world."

NO CHANGE IN THE HALIFAX STRIKE SITUATION MONDAY

Both Sides Stand Pat and Make No Overtures for a

First Complete Unit of Canadian Siberian **Expeditionary Forces Reaches Canada**

Victoria, B. C., May 5.—With the first complete unit of the Canadian Siberian expeditionary forces a board, repatriated from Vladivostok, the C. P. O. S. liner Monteagle reached this port this atternoon. She brought across the Packic 56 officers and 1,026 men of other ranks. In addition to her military complement, the liner carried 36 passengers in the saloon.

About noon time the Monteagle arrived at Williamhead and, owing to a case of scarlet fever on board, the ship was detained longer than usual by the quarantine officers.

The entire military force on board will go to Vancouver where the Canadian Siberian dispersal he adquarters are located, arriving there some time tonight.

It has already been announced that the detachment to Canada, today, will be followed by two others on the Empress of Japan and the Empress of Russia, the sailings being sufficient to transport the expeditionary forces.



criticism. The Young Men's Christian Association is no exception. The very magnitude of the Y.M.C.A's work for the soldiers brought it under the white light of criticism. But its record of four and a half years has not been successfully assailed.

For every dollar of gross profits made in Y.M.C.A. canteens it was necessary to raise a dollar and a half by public subscription to meet the total expenses of the Overseas services. It will be seen therefore, that absolutely all profits were absorbed in the cost of the service to the soldiers.

The policy of the Y.M.C.A. in its war work was primarily free service, not free supplies, but nevertheless, since December 31st, 1916, soldiers in the Canadian Corps area in France, Belgium and Germany were supplied tea, coffee, cocoa, orangeade and lemonade at the "Y" free. Also cigarettes, chocolate, bis-

cuits, etc. were given free to walking wounded, stretcher bearers, and working parties in cases of emergency. In addition 5% of the sales was distributed among units in the war zone to be spent on extra rations, comforts, etc. for the men. Supplies and cash given away during 1918 amounted to \$299,650.28.

The prices charged in the Y.M.C.A. canteens were fixed by the British War office and were the same as those charged throughout the British Army. These prices were fixed for the protection of the soldiers, and were from 50% to 100% lower than prevailing prices in overseas civilian stores. They were also as low or lower than prevail prices in Caraches were fixed to the control of the soldiers. lower than retail prices in Canada.
