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Shipping Notes. The bark Captain Dan, of Pictou, White master, from Brunswick, Ga., for Montserrat, was spoken on the 26th ult., in lat. 41, lon. 67, by the bark Lincoln which arrived at New York on the 4th inst., and reported having encountered a gale in which her bowsprit, forecastle just above the deck, and mainmast; also had her mizenmast head carried away, rudder sprung, and lost sails and yards. She was not leaking and would endeavor to get into Bermuda.

An Exciting Luncheon.—Last Saturday there was rather an exciting luncheon at Advocate Harbor, N. S. The bark Advocate, fully rigged for sea, while launching shifted slightly in her cradle, spread the ways, and landed in sand that had been spread over a flat ledge by the previous storm. This was without the harbor bar, directly exposed to the waves of the bay, and a storm would have been disastrous to the bark. The whole village turned out, to work or look on, some coming two or three miles to the scene. But the barking proved insufficient to hold her when the water began to lighten her stern, and she broke away and started off long before high water, causing great consternation and intense excitement. At the end of the ways, where there was not quite water enough to float her, she struck a rock that rose a few inches out of the sand and injured her keel and shoe considerably, but fortunately without any other damage. She went to Spencer's Island and is expected to come here for repairs. The Advocate registers over 600 tons, and has been built of the very best material, and is the most careful man in the city.

The bark Wallace, Thomas, master, which sailed from Charlottetown 20th inst., for this port, and put back 23d ult., is being dismantled, the voyage having been abandoned.

Portland Police Court. They had but one prisoner this morning—John McGuire—who was charged with drunkenness in Main street. While the beautiful snow was falling, and the wind was blowing, last evening, he was quietly lying in the gutter. Those who passed by the police he was charged with a combination of the beautiful and the fifth of the street. A fine of \$4 was imposed on him.

The Civil Court was in session and disposed of a few undefended cases.

A Terrible Tragedy at Sea. A sad event occurred on board the S. S. Polyanth, Capt. Brown, during her last trip from Liverpool to Quebec. When in mid ocean, one of the steerage passengers showed symptoms of nervous excitement, so much so that one night, during a stiff gale, physical force had to be used to get him below. The following day he was quiet, but it was deemed prudent to put him below as soon as it became dusk; for this purpose the hostess and second steward went to look for him, when they observed him sitting on the upper rail of the main deck, and in the act of jumping overboard. They immediately laid hold of him, but with a knife which he seemed to have open and ready in his hands he inflicted four or five deep and dangerous wounds in the hostess' face and body. The third officer also went to the rescue; but the unfortunate man, who was very powerful, shook himself from their grasp, leaving his coat in their hands, and falling into the sea. The engines were immediately stopped, and every effort was made to rescue the man, but without effect as he was never seen after. The deceased, whose name was James Lockard, was a native of Wigan, Scotland.

LOWELL, Dec. 7.—Michael Melan died last night in the City Hospital at the West Farm from the result of internal injuries received from jumping from a third-story window. He was intoxicated at the time, and was heading a woman, whose loud outcries caused a gentleman to break into the house for her relief. Melan thought the police were coming, and leaped through the mesh of a window, landing himself badly. He was formerly a member of Company G, Eleventh Massachusetts Regiment.
