# THE LONDON CONFERENCE

OF

# THE METHODIST CHURCH,

HELD IN THE TOWN OF CHATHAM, ONTARIO, 1890.

The Conference began its Sessions in the Park Street Church, at 9 a.m., Thursday, June 5th, 1890.

The President, Rev. Wm. McDonagh, conducting the usual Conference prayer-meeting, which closed at 10 a.m.

The roll of Conference was then called, 115 ministers and 15 laymen being present.

# REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

#### SUNDAY-SCHOOL REPORT.

Your Committee in presenting their report desire to express their appreciation of the splendid results that have been accomplished during the year in following out the suggestions and recommendation, of your last year's committee, viz., an increase of 1,378 who have taken the total abstinence pledge, 999 learning the catechism, and 2,845 copies of our own Book Room publications, with a corresponding decrease of 543 copies of foreign publications. Also, it is gratifying to report an increase of more than \$925 in money raised by the schools, notwithstanding the extraordinary financial stringency that has prevailed. Another feature of the report, and one which should indeed be appreciated by every Sundayschool worker, is that an increase of nearly 2,400 can be reported in the membership of our schools, which now has reached a total of over 32,200, with nearly 5,000 meeting in class.

Your Committee beg to recommend as follows:-

1. That while there has been an increase of over 100 in officers and teachers, who are members of the Methodist Church, still your Committee are of the opinion that more care should be exercised in the selection of persons for these important positions in Church work, and would recommend that every pastor and superintendent encourage, as far as possible, the employment of converted teachers in our Sunday-schools.

2. That one service each quarter be devoted to Temperance, and that the total abstinence pledge be introduced in all our schools, and would suggest the advantage to be gained by having these pledges placed in conspicuous places for public inspection, and that the full number of

signers be reported to the Conference.

3. Your Committee would call attention to the large number of schools which have no regular teachers' meetings for the study of the lessons, and would recommend that teachers, parents, and scholars endeavor to introduce and encourage the reading and study of the Sunday-school lessons in the home circle, during the week, so that all may be better able to teach and understand the Word of God.

4. We recommend that the attention of all Sunday-school Committees be called to the advantage gained by, and the importance of using, our Methodist Book Room publications and literature in all our Sunday-

schools in preference to foreign publications.

5. In response to certain memorials referred to us, we recommend Conference to cordially endorse the "Epworth League" movement, and also to memorialize the General Congerence to make the President of each League a member of the Official Board. We earnestly appeal for the hearty support of League work throughout the Conference.

6. We recommend that the Sunday-school report be read in each congregation and Sunday-school, and that each minister see that his Sun-

day-school superintendents are made aware of this request.

That the request of the parsonage Board of Trustees of the Morpeth Circuit, for permission to sell the present parsonage lot, and apply the proceeds to the purchase of a new parsonage lot, be granted.

# COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee recommend the continuation of petitions being signed in every constituency, and sent to the Dominion Parliament, asking for the abolition of the manufacture, importation and sale of alcoholic liquors; and, as a Conference, we are willing to co-operate with the Presbyterian and all other Churches in demanding by said petitions a prohibitory liquor-law. Therefore resolved,

1. That we keep the principle of total prohibition prominently before the Church and the public as the only right action of the State in reference to the liquor traffic.

2. We should also press upon our people the necessity of total abstinence as the only safe course for the individual.

3. We should especially advocate these views among our young people in the home, the day-school, the Sabbath-school and the church.

4. As an immediate line of practical work, we request our ministers to hold Gospel Temperance meetings in their several charges, seeking the reformation of the drunkard and the persuasion of the moderate drinker to total abstinence, and to follow these meetings up by all possible effort to secure a reduction of the licensed places in their localities, either through the Municipal Councils or of the License Commissioners.

5. And believing that no other public question of this age so intimately affects the vital interests of the people as the question of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic, and that this question calls with the voice of moral thunder for early and righteous adjustment, we would hereby express our unabated sympathy and earnest desire to assist in all efficient and proper methods for the accomplishing of the great and Christian work of the prohibition of the liquor traffic.

Your Committee would further recommend that we comply with the request of the Dominion Alliance, to send four delegates to the next Alliance meeting, to be held in Montreal, August the 14th, 1890; and, further, that the Revs. W. McDonagh, B. F. Austin, M.A., and John Humphries and Wm. Ward be said delegates.

Notwithstanding the prevalence of la grippe, which, with the almost impassable condition of the roads, largely prevented the holding of special services, especially on country Circuits, yet we rejoice that through the divine blessing we were enabled to report a net increase of 552 souls.

While we record our thankfulness for the success of our regular Conference evangelists, yet as they cannot possibly reach but a few of our Circuits, we would express our conviction that it is necessary for us to emphasise the importance of the fact that each Methodist minister is not only expected to be a pastor and preacher, but also an evangelist; and the desirability of the people uniting with him to secure greater results in the conversion of souls, not only during the time when a special service is being held, but in the regular services, and in the Sunday-school.

We regret to report that there has not been a larger increase in our Connexional Funds, but we must take into consideration the fact that the

past year has been one of great financial stringency.

We are thankful for what God has done for us, for what He has wrought in us by His spirit, and for what He has accomplished through us; yet in order that greater results may be reached, we need to give the Holy Spirit full control of our hearts, and to more fully consecrate our talents to His service.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Believing that a proper observance of the Christian Sabbath lies at the foundation of true success, whether of the individual, Church, or nation, we recognize the great responsibility of the Church to do her utmost to secure universal recognition and obedience to God's great commandment, to "Remember the Sabbath-day to keep it holy," and to exercise great care that her own example be pure in this respect.

While we recognize with profound gratitude, that in perhaps no country in the world is the Lord's Day more honored than in our own fair Dominiou, we, nevertheless, view with concern the many forms of Sabbath desecration that are all too common in our midst, such as excursions, pleasure parties, general recreation, railway and steamboat traffic and other unnecessary labor, and we would urge upon all Christians to draw the line distinctly in these matters.

We are pained to observe the extent to which Sunday visiting is indulged in by our members and their families in many localities, and we fear this evil is growing, because the sin and evil results of the custom are not set before our people with sufficient force and frequency.

We would recommend that suitable reference be made to this evil in our Conference annual address.

Having observed that funerals are held on Sabbath more frequently than on other days, and believing that this causes much unnecessary labor, and also materially interferes with our Sabbath services and our Sundayschool work; we would recommend that our ministers, with the aid of the Quarterly Board, and in conjunction with the ministers of other denominations, exert their best influence to have all funerals on weekdays as far as possible.

We are glad to be able to report that some good has been accomplished by the memorials and petitions to corporations and governments, and we have especial pleasure in calling attention to Mr. Charlton's bill, entitled, "An Act to secure the better observance of the Lord's Day," which passed its second reading on the 6th of March last.

We recommend the Conference, by its endorsation of this report, to express its approval of the said bill, and to pledge itself to co-operate with it by circulating petitions, and by otherwise doing its utmost to stir up the people in its behalf.

Further, we would recommend that all our ministers preach at least once each year on Sabbath observance at each appointment on their Circuit.

5. Concerning the resolution of the Ridgetown District Meeting, asking that the General Conference be memorialized to regulate by law the permission to collect moneys for circuit purposes on adjacent Circuits or Districts, we recommend that no action be taken, as we deem the present

regulations quite sufficient to meet all cases likely to arise.

6. Concerning resolutions and memorials from the Ridgetown, Aylmer, Windsor, and St. Thomas District Meetings, and from the Windsor, Romney, and Learnington Official Boards, respecting the length of the pastoral term, we recommend that they be passed on to the General Conference, as desired.

7. Concerning resolutions of the Aylmer District Meeting, and the Official Board of the St. Thomas First Church, on the subject of quarterly tickets, we recommend that they be referred to the consideration of the

General Conference

8. Concerning the resolution of the Aylmer District Meeting, asking that a change be made in the Discipline as to the permissible modes of baptism, we recommend that no action be taken by this Conference.

9. Concerning the resolution of the Sarnia Quarterly Board, respecting the preparation and preservation of roll of members on each Circuit or Mission, we deem no action necessary as present regulations are sufficient.

10. Concerning resolutions of the Aylmer and Windsor District Meetings, asking for changes in the mode of administering the Superannuation Fund, we recommend that they be referred to the favorable consideration of the General Confe ence.

11. Concerning resolutions of Aylmer District Meeting, the Windsor District Meeting and Kingsville Quarterly Board, respecting the constitution of the Stationing Committee, it is recommended that they be referred to the consideration of the General Conference.

12. Concerning various resolutions from the Aylmer and St. Thomas Districts, respecting sundry changes in the administration of the Missionary Fund of the Church, it is recommended that they be sent on to the Gen-

eral Conference, without comment.

13. Concerning resolutions from the Aylmer and St. Thomas District Meetings, seeking for a change in the regulations respecting the election of Chairmen of Districts, we recommend that the memorials be passed on to the General Conference, without a deliverance by this Conference.

14. As to the memorial of the Aylmer District, praying the General Conference to enact some law to regulate the invitation of pastors by Quarterly Boards, your Committee recommend that it be passed on to the General Conference, with an expression of opinion that a Quarterly Board shall have the right to appear by deputy before the Stationing Committee to present and press its claims.

15. Concerning the resolution of the Ridgetown District Meeting, and of the Kingsville Quarterly Board, endorsed by the Windsor District Meeting, asking this Conference to memorialize the Geneval Conferences, we recommend that this Conference give expression to its approbation

of the object of these memorials, and commend the General Conference to carefully reconsider the question of Conference boundaries.

16. Concerning the memorial of the Sarnia Quarterly Board, asking that probationers be required to obtain annual certificates of recommendation from the Quarterly Board of the Circuits upon which they have labored during the year, we recommend that it be laid upon the table.

17. Concerning the resolution of the Quarterly Board of St. Thomas First, respecting attendance at class as a condition of membership in the Methodist Church, we recommend that it be passed on to the General

Conference, as desired.

18. Concenning the resolution brought before the Conference and referred to your Committee, respecting the stablishment of sisterhoods in the Church, we deem the subject of sufficient importance to merit the attention of the General Conference.

19. As to the resolution asking the Conference to memorialize the General Conference to propose a course of reading for class-leaders and local preachers, we recommend it to the favorable consideration of the

Conference.

20. Concerning the document known as the Laymen's Platform, which was referred to us, the recommendation of your Committee is as follows: That inasmuch as the Laymen's Platform embodies the principles argued for in the other Conferences, as well as this; and that any amendment we may propose would not, probably, in any measure change the complexion of the platform as it may come before the General Conference, we simply recommend the reference of the memorial to the General Conference.

Your Committee, having fully considered the subject referred to it, recommend the Conference to present to the General Conference the following recommendations:—

This Conference is of opinion that it is not expedient during this year to project any celebration of the Centenary of Canadian Methodism, involving thankofferings for aiding various departments of our Church

work.

The financial strigency of the times, the various appeals recently made for special objects, the unfinished effort for our educational enterprises, and the existing necessity of making efforts for enterprises of a somewhat local or sectional character, all stand in the way of a successful effort for any great connexional enterprise at this time; but should the General Conference decide to proceed with a centenary celebration and arrange for thankofferings for specific purposes, then, in addition to other connexional objects, in the judgment of this Conference, the men who by their self-denial, endurance of untold, hardships and devotion to the spiritual interest of the people, regardless of remuneration, by which the development, prosperity and peace of this country have been so largely promoted, should receive very earnest consideration in the shape of very largely

That the course of study of certain colleges in the State of Illinois
have been before your Committee, together with some correspondence from
the Faculty.

While we cheerfully acknowledge that these colleges may encourage reading in well chosen courses, and thus foster wider scholarship, yet we find that the standard of scholarship on which degrees are granted is below the level of our own institutions, and therefore these colleges are not such as we can recommend to our young men, very much preferring that they should use our own and honor and be honored by them.

# GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND, 1890.

To the Members of the London Conference :-

Dear Brethren,—At a meeting of the Advisory Committee of the above Fund the Chairman and Treasurer were instructed to prepare a circular to be sent to the several Annual Conferences, setting forth the present state of the Fund, and the necessity for using prompt, general and vigorous measures, so to increase the income of the Fund as to enable the Treasurer to meet the necessary expenses.

The Committee also decided that accounts should be closed on the 15th day of August, in order to allow time for the audit, and preparation of the Report for the General Conference. All sums, therefore, intended to be embraced in our regular Quadrennial Report must be in the Trea-

surer's hands at that date.

As the month of July is the time for taking up the collection for this Fund, there will be ample time to forward the collections of July, 1890, before the 15th August of that year, if prompt measures are adopted for that purpose, but there will be no time to spare. Promptness and punctuality will be absolutely necessary.

The indebtedness of the Fund at the present date is about \$10,333.41, and there are still heavy claims to be met before the close of the year. If the money due be not paid before the close of the quadrennial term, the Treasurer will be unable to pay the expenses of the delegates to the General Conference.

The Advisory Committee of the Fund at its late meeting, in view of the doubts entertained as to the meaning of clause 127, page 50, in the Discipline, and for other reasons unanimously passed the following resolution, viz.: Resolved,—"That no delegate to the General Conference be paid any sum until the Conference itself give the meaning of the aforementioned clause, and direction as to the course to be pursued in relation to said payments.

The Treasurer has kept the several Conferences posted from year to year, both in the press and otherwise, as to the embarrassed condition of the Fund, and has urged the necessity of increased payments, but so far, apparently, without much effect. He can do no more, and now begs to notify all concerned that the Conference law will have to take its course. He can "disburse only the amount on hand for General Conference Expenses, leaving each delegate deficient in his expenses by an equal amount." The General Conference will have to explain what this clause means, and provide for its enforcement, and the Conferences will have themselves to blame if they have to pay in whole or in part for the expenses of their delegates.

#### SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Treasurer's Annual Report and Statement for the year ending July 31st, 1889.

I am happy to be able to report that the amount raised for the Fund on our Circuits during the past year has been greater than that of any preceding year; and that all expenses have been met, and all claimants paid in full.

I cannot, however, avoid expressing my continued regret that a few of our Circuits still fail to pay in full the amounts apportioned to them; thus placing a grievous burden on the ministers laboring on these fields, who pay the deficiency rather than allow the Funds to suffer. I hope the next General Conference will be able to provide some remedy for this acknowledged evil.

The assessable income (consisting of amounts raised for ministerial support and connexional collections) has been increased, enough, I trust, to enable the Fund to meet all claims, without increasing the percentage above former years. I therefore recommend that the percentage be the same as in former years—6 per cent. on assessable income.

The Capital account has been increased during the year, through subscriptions, legacies, and donations, \$6,352.59, and it now stands at \$174.648.26.

# ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

Assembled in our Annual Conference, our thoughts naturally turn towards our people, whose servants we are, in the bonds of love and truth in Jesus Christ our Lord, and whose best interests we delight to subserve. We hope that the sending forth of our annual pastoral may be more than a mere form on our part, and receive more than a cursory glance from you.

We assure the membership over whom the Master of the vineyard has appointed us as overseers, that we seek the good of the vineyard, and that its growth, vigor, and fruitfulness are to us matters of the vastest moment.

We would deplore the entrance among our people of any suspicions of unfaithfulness and self-seeking, or personal opposition, on the part of the ministry, and we invite you to join us in hearty, hopeful, trustful co-operation in carrying on the Master's work. Without such helpful co-operation, the ties which bind us together will be but as ropes of sand. We are called to be laborers together with God. Christ says, "Without Me ye can do nothing." The measure of our consecration and faith is the measure of our power. There is an intimate relationship between being and doing. We must be Christlike to do Christ's work. Let us give ourselves to service in a renewal of our consecration to God, and plead His promises until we can say, "I can do all things through Christ that strengtheneth me."

We join you in thanksgiving to God for the spirit of revival that has pervaded the Church. Many fields have borne abundant fruit. While sickness and unfavorable conditions have greatly hindered special services, we are encouraged by a net gain, over all losses by death and other causes, of 552 souls. These gracious results have been realized, not so much through special evangelists as by the hearty co-operation of ministerial brethren and the development of the working power of the Church.

We hail with delight the advent of the Epworth League, and expect from its inauguration the most desirable results. As in the best forms of family life we have the presence of all ages, from helpless infancy up to the man whose locks have been whitened by the snow of fourscore winters, so in our Churches we want all ages, grades, varieties, and shades of experience constantly blending, and would deprecate any tendency to extremeness, that would isolate the League from its place in the ordinary and regular work of the Church.

While we advocate the utmost freshness, vigor, and warmth on the part of the pulpit, we would advise, on behalf of the pew, a strong desire to keep close to the old landmarks and to avoid the tendency, seen in

some places, to make the public service an entertainment rather than a mighty effort to "rescue the perishing" who crowd our evening congregations. Let us honor the Word; it will accomplish its work when effec-

tively spoken. (Isaiah lv. 11.)

As we thank God for the loyalty of our Canadian people to our Sovereign Lady the Queen, and to the institutions of our country, we would lift up our voices, and, as with a trumpet-blast, ery, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." To keep it is to obey God, and to be true to the best interests of humanity. No people can oppose God and prosper. To be loyal to Him is to be blessed. Brethren, let not the hedge about the Lord's Day be broken down in any of its sections. Summer travel by land and water, some of the great engineering works of to-day, and the very spirit of this age in a thousand forms invade the sanctity of Sabbath rest, and make the poor man poorer, even though he earn a larger wage. In the keeping of the Sabbath there is great reward. Listen to the record, "If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day, and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable; and shalt honor Him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasures, nor speaking thine own words: then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord, and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father, for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it. (Isaiah lviii. 13, 14.)

We think a wider range of thought concerning, and a larger spiritual care for, our children would yield the richest revenues of moral, social and intellectual gain. We deplore the present usage of merely baptizing them, and then making no recognition of their Church relationship until they have declared themselves to be converted. We would urge upon all parents the duty of presenting their children to God by baptism in infancy, and of bringing them up in the nuture and admonition of the Lord, so that they may be converted in the Church, and remain within

her communion until called to their home in heaven.

We recognize the work done by the women of our Church as a most important factor in connection with its work. The highest encomium placed upon Christian service by Christ was given to a woman, "She hath done what she could." The record of the past has shown plainly that there are special lines of work for which woman has an especial adaptation and talent; we refer to the Woman's Missionary, Temperance and Dorcas Societies. The little leisure which our Christian women have should not be spent entirely in the arduous work of raising money for Church purposes, the getting up of entertainments, and working for bazaars, but in Sunday-school, missionary and temperance, work and in gentle ministries to physical and spiritual necessities.

Connexional loyalty was never more sorely needed than to-day. A great educational crisis is upon us, calamity from which can only be averted by a prompt, hearty and united action on the part of all our

people, lay and clerical.

Let us not allow the interests of total abstinence and prohibition to fall between inactivity on the one hand, and division and truckling to political party on the other. This should be a time of preparation for permanent victory, by educating, organizing and uniting of forces to move in solid entrenche terrible p victory s.

We have to report a slight abatement of interest in some of our Connexional funds during the past year. This is, no doubt, owing in some measure to commercial stringency and also to a failure on the part of many to realize their privilege to honor the Lord with their substance in systematic giving. Christ comes to us not to live upon our bounty, or to partake of our charity, but to furnish us with wisdom, skill and capital, and to give us His blessing that maketh rich and addeth no sorrow. Let us acknowledge our indebtedness to Him as an active partner in all our life and business, and systematically divide with Him its profits.

The copious streams of wholesome literature that issue from the tireless presses of our flourishing publishing house, filling the pages of our able weekly, our superb monthly, our growing quarterly, our exquisitely interesting Sunday-school papers and the large "winnowed list" of our libraries, are cause for devout thankfulness, and for growing interest in our youth, on the part of the entire Church.

The rich heritage of our doctrinal standard never appeared in more ample and generous fulness than in the light of the creed revisions of to-day; verily the lines have fallen unto us in pleasant places and we have a goodly heritage. Here we behold the wondrous vision of the bush, burning but not consumed; and with a speechless awe that dares not move, we hear a voice proclaim, "Put off thy shoes from off thy feet, for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground."

Standing upon this high vantage ground of the present, we look back over the successes and failures of the past, and also into the untried future, with earnest purpose of soul to be warned by our weaknesses, and encouraged by our achievements; we gird up the loins of our minds in sober earnestness to finish the race set before us, or to lay down our lives "in the high places of the field."

Let your motto be, "To do and dare for Jesus," "Quit you like men," "Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free." "Quench not the spirit." "Pray without ceasing." "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." "Brethren pray for us." "The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you. Amen."
