

PASTORS' GREETINGS.

To the Members, Adherents and Friends of Grace Church :

Having been requested in conjunction with the Executive Committee, by the Quarterly Official and Trustee Boards, to prepare a report for Grace Church, permit us to address to you a few words. This being the twenty-fifth year of our history as a church, it is fitting that the report be extended beyond the bounds of a financial statement, so as to give you an intelligent conception of the various departments of Christian work, and the sums contributed for local and connexional interests.

Looking back over the quarter of a century of the history of Grace Church now closing, one passage of Scripture seems most appropriate: "What hath God wrought." We are reaping, because of the faithful sowing of other hands, and whether in the church militant, or having passed to the church triumphant, both sowers and reapers may rejoice over the results.

One year ago we came to you strangers, but your un-failing kindness has made the year one of unmingled comfort. The regular services of the Sabbath, with the large and steadily increasing congregations, have been to us an inspiration. The attendance upon the prayer-meetings and classes has cheered us, while the response to the appeals for funds has evidenced an intelligent, generous type of Christianity. We cannot too often, nor with too great emphasis, remind you that Grace Church holds strategic ground in this rapidly growing city. The flow of emigration towards this western land continues. Permit us to urge you to continue to give all strangers a hearty welcome. Remember that first impressions are

lasting. Many of these who are coming to us have left behind them Methodist homes, and are followed by a father's and mother's prayers. A warm hand-shake, a few cheering words, an invitation to our homes, may save them to Christ and the church; and bring down upon us the blessing of parents or friends far away. Many who have lately come among us were active workers in other places, but are not now thus engaged. There is work for all to do. If such will make themselves known, we will undertake to set before them an open door of usefulness.

The Sunday School of Grace Church has during the past year surpassed all former years in attendance and spiritual interest, while the school at Young Church is a marked illustration of the rapid development of our work in this city and country. Our Young people have taken a step forward. In Grace Church, not only have the regular meetings of The Young People's Association been sustained, but the members have gone outside and taken up aggressive mission work in the city. At Young Church, a branch of the Epworth League of Christian Endeavor has been formed, which is a centre of spiritual power. It is not necessary to refer here to the work of different organizations in our church, such as the Ladies' Aid Society and the Women's Missionary Society. A full statement will be found in the body of this report.

We could wish that all our people might attend the Wednesday night prayer services and the class meetings, believing as we do that thereby the spirituality of the church would be greatly increased. We would specially commend to your attention the Union Class-Meeting, which meets in the lecture room of Grace Church, on the first Sunday of each month, at ten o'clock.

Then shall the prophecy of olden time be fulfilled,—"Thy light shall break forth as the morning, and thy health shall spring forth speedily; and thy righteousness shall go before thee; and the glory of the Lord shall be thy reward." Strengthened by the thought of your confidence and co-operation, we turn to the future with larger hope and firmer faith.

HISTORICAL SKETCH.

In the month of May, 1868, the Rev. George Young left Toronto to inaugurate Methodist Mission Work in Winnipeg, the capital of the newly formed Province of Manitoba. Mr. Young arrived July 4th, and at once began work. At that time there were but four persons in the whole settlement who had been members of the Methodist Church elsewhere. The first class in Manitoba was formed at High Bluff in September, '68, and consisted of 12 persons.

For several months, Rev. Mr. Young held service at Winnipeg in the little log. court house, which stood to the north-west of the Hudson's Bay Co.'s Fort.

After great difficulty a building was secured, situated where the Merchant's hotel now stands, corner of Main Street and Portage Avenue. A large front room was used as a chapel. This was opened for worship December 20th, 1868, and a class of six persons was formed. The congregation continued to occupy this building till July 1869, when they moved into the new Mission House situated where the first Grace Church afterwards stood, on Main Street, near the present site of the Manitoba hotel. The lower flat of the Mission was used as a church, while the Missionary and his family lived upstairs. The first Grace Church was dedicated by Rev. George Young in September, 1871. During the famous "Boom" of 1880 and 1881, a block of stores was built on Main Street enclosing the church. The congregation worshipped in a spacious building upstairs, called Wesley Hall, and while this hall was being fitted up worship was conducted in the skating rink. The present Grace

THE QUARTERLY OFFICIAL BOARD.

In the economy of Methodism, the representative form of government is found. Our laws are framed by the General Conference which meets every four years, and is composed of equal numbers of ministers and laymen. The Annual Conference also is made up of ministers and laymen in equal numbers; while in the local church the Quarterly Official Board is the highest court. It directs all other organizations, and to it they are responsible. It forms a court of appeal in the trial of members and supervises all local operations of the church within the limits prescribed by Discipline. It sends its representatives to the District Meeting, from which delegates are appointed to the Annual Conference, and from among these delegates, laymen are elected to attend the General Conference. These arrangements give to the Methodist Church a character commonly known as Connexionalism, by which a common interest extends to the utmost bounds of the church. 

OUR FINANCIAL SYSTEM.

The usual method of raising the funds for carrying on the work of the church, is as follows: The Stewards meet early in each year and estimate the amounts necessary for the support of the ministers and for general expenses. These estimates are sent to the Quarterly Official Board, which meets once a quarter, where they are adopted or amended as the case may be. The Trustee Board manages all monies used for the improvement of church property or for building, also for running expenses, heating, lighting, etc. All receipts for ministers' salaries, local purposes, and for Connexional funds, are obtained from the FREE WILL OFFERINGS of our people by subscriptions through envelopes or otherwise, and collections.

In Grace Church the Quarterly Official and Trustee Boards have deemed it wise to manage all the financial business of the church through an Executive Committee composed of three members from each Board. This committee elects another member as chairman, appoints a secretary and treasurer, and reports every three months to the Quarterly Official Board. The results have been most satisfactory: By this method simplicity and accuracy are obtained, there being ONE TREASURER for the church. It is hoped that all our people will see from the above, how necessary it is for every member and adherent to subscribe a definite amount at the beginning of the year, and pay the same regularly through envelopes if possible each Sabbath. This suggestion, if complied with, will prevent deficiencies at the close of the year, and render special appeals unnecessary.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive, in presenting their Report of the financial standing, wishes to express its gratitude to God for the prosperity of the year closed, and its thankfulness to the people for their liberality; but in doing so would wish to call the attention of the Congregation to the overdraft of \$1,201.00 due the Imperial Bank. This overdraft was occasioned by the following facts: 1st. That the old parsonage was sold for \$4,000.00. A new one was built for \$5,600.00. 2nd. That at the time this building was in progress the Church was painted, papered and cleaned up generally at an expenditure of \$1,000.00. The undertaking of these matters involved a much larger expenditure than our ordinary income, and as no special effort was made to raise money for these purposes we are somewhat behind. Now in order to remove this overdraft there is need of an increased number of regular contributions; through the envelopes and otherwise. This being done, we hope from this out to be improving our position every month.

church everywhere. Besides giving to the General Fund, many of our people are aiding the students of Wesley College in supporting their missionary, the Rev. James Endicott, B. A., in China. The missions of the Methodist Church are Indian, French, Japanese, Chinese and Home.

THE EDUCATIONAL FUND assists in maintaining the universities of the church, and in educating young men for the ministry. In addition there is the amount for Wesley College, which is a fund for this conference only, and which is distributed equitably over the conference. The amount apportioned to Grace Church for last year was \$1100.

THE SUPERANNUATION FUND, for the help and support of aged and worn out ministers of the church, derives part of its revenue from assessments upon the local churches.

THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND, as its name signifies, aims to relieve trustee boards which were embarrassed as a result of the late union.

THE CONTINGENT FUND meets extraordinary expenses of ministers or circuits by reason of affliction or unforeseen causes.

THE GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND meets the expenses of the General Conference—the law-making body of our church—and its committees.

THE CHOIR.

REPORT OF GRACE CHURCH SUNDAY SCHOOL.

In presenting this Report, covering the 25th year's work of our School, we desire to acknowledge the goodness of God, made manifest in many ways, but especially in giving us a year of progress; for we know that Paul may plant and Appolos water, but God, alone, can give the increase.

We have now on our roll 650 officers, teachers and scholars, with an average attendance for the year of 458, being a gain of 27 over last year. The last quarter, especially, shows a very considerable increase over the same period last year—the attendance averaging 508 per Sabbath, a gain of 57. Of this number the Bible classes show an average increase of 20, and the other departments the balance. Our largest attendance was on the 30th of April (the closing day of our year) when we had 556 present.

During the extreme months of the winter there was a falling off as compared with last year, of about 20 per Sabbath in the primary classes. This number has been more than made up since, the attendance at present being very large. At the beginning of the calendar year Mr. Garratt, aided by Miss Morgan and Mr. Reed, instituted a new system of enrollment, and the distribution of illuminated lesson cards, in his class each Sabbath. The result has been steadier attendance and greater interest in the lessons. We would be glad of a volunteer to help Miss Benson with similar work in her class.

The intermediate classes were all graded in the month of January last, and made to conform, as nearly as possible, to the day school standards. The attendance has been uniformly good in this department throughout the year.

In the Bible classes we have witnessed marked growth and interest. This has been especially apparent in Mr. Aikins' class of adults, which meets for study in the church. The attendance is usually 125 to 150 and upon one Sabbath reached a total of 170. In connection with the work of this class we were called upon to mourn the loss of Mr. Lynden—one who only spent a few Sabbaths with us, but who gave a bright and cheering testimony to the power of Christ to save and keep in the supreme hour.

It is a cause of gratitude to know that in the intermediate and primary classes we have not had to record a single death, and this

in a year when there has been much sickness, especially among the little ones.

During the year 12 teachers and officers have left us—six to distant places, two to Young Church, and four for a time have dropped out of the work. We hope to have some of the latter with us again before long, and trust the blessing of the Great Head of the Church may accompany the labors of the others in their new fields of work.

While we are credited, as a school, with raising a very large amount of money the past year—about \$2,300—yet we have only spent a small proportion of it in carrying on our own regular work. An examination of the accounts shows the following expenditure :

Amounting in all to \$1694.82. Our own school expenditure for library books, periodicals and all other purposes has amounted to upwards of \$500 of which the Treasurer's report gives full details.

The orchestra, organized by Mr. Love in the early part of our school year, has been of great service, and created additional interest in the service of song and our work generally. We desire to acknowledge our debt of gratitude to all who have so gladly and regularly come forward to help in this department. Mr. Love, as leader of the singing, and Miss Robinson, as pianist, have continued to render faithful, talented service.

The blackboard work for the school has been most efficiently executed by Mr. Talbot, and heartily appreciated by the school.

The annual tea-meeting, during the holiday season, for which we were indebted to the ladies of the church, was a time of rich appreciation by the scholars, who did full justice to the occasion.

In July last the annual picnic was held at Elm Park, and proved a success financially and otherwise.

A Boys' meeting was organized last fall by Mr. Garratt, and has been the means of gathering into church fellowship a number of the larger lads in our school. We trust the parents will do all they can to help forward this very important work.

The Church classes, meeting at close of Sabbath School, have been well maintained and productive of excellent results.

Our returns from the different classes show a total of 43 who have professed conversion during the year, many of whom have united with the church. There are about 170 members of the church among our scholars. The Total Abstinence Pledge rolls show an enrollment of 370 names.

The missionary spirit has full play in the school, as evidenced by the liberal missionary givings and hearty sympathetic interest in all mission work. On the first Sunday in October last we asked for \$50 of an offering to pay the yearly instalment for the education of Sada Endo in Japan, and received in response \$72.90, much of the money being earned by the donors themselves. Letters from Miss Hargrave, in Japan, have been most gratefully received from time to time. We also received a letter from Sada Endo, written in Japanese, which was forwarded by Miss Hargrave, along with a translation of same. The reading of this letter in our school created intense interest and enthusiasm. The story of the entrance of the Gospel into her home seemed like a chapter of the history of Apostolic times.

We gladly acknowledge the valuable aid rendered by the students of Wesley College, who have so often acted in the capacity of auxiliary teachers. We also express our indebtedness to all the friends of the school who have assisted us in one direction or another.

It is a matter of thankfulness to be able to say that Young Church is proving a success in every way. The Sunday School there is doing excellent work and steadily increasing in numbers and interest. Rev. Mr. Riddell, who has charge of the Bible class, Mr. Fowler, the Superintendent, and those associated with him, are capable, consecrated, faithful workers. They have now a total membership of 83.

In closing this report the Superintendent desires to make mention of the earnest, loving, loyal service rendered by the teachers and officers of our school, who have stood like sentinels at their posts of duty, ready for any department of the work which needed them most.

We have *faith in our work ; it is important ; it is the Lord's*. We cannot measure its results by figures. Looking into the be-

ginning of another year, we rejoice because of the open door of opportunity that is before us, and entering in we sing :

“Lord of the living harvest
That whitens o'er the plain,
Where angels soon shall gather
Their sheaves of golden grain ;
Accept these hands to labour,
These hearts to trust and love,
And deign with them to hasten
Thy Kingdom from above.”

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Grace Church Auxiliary of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church was organized in March, 1885. It has carried on its work and increased in interest for the past eight years, during which time upwards of twelve hundred dollars has been raised and remitted to the General Treasurer. The aim of the Woman's Missionary Society is to aid in the grand work of sending the Gospel to the heathen, and especially the uplifting and amelioration of the condition of heathen women and children. By this effort schools and homes, numbering ten, have been established, embracing:

The "Girls' School" in Tokio, which is a large and flourishing institution; a school at Shidguoka; Kofu; and evangelistic work at Kanazawa, Japan.

In our own country are the "Crosby Girls' Home," at Port Simpson, B.C., the "Coquleetza Home" at Chilliwack, B.C., and the "Chinese Home" in Victoria, B.C. Assistance is also rendered towards the McDougall Orphanage and the French Meth Institute in Montreal.

When Grace Church Auxiliary was organized it embraced all the members of the City Churches who were interested in the work, but about four years ago Zion Church formed a separate Auxiliary, which is very zealous in the work. Two years ago an organizer went out to some of the larger towns and cities, and now there are six or more Auxiliaries in Manitoba and the West. The next work which should be accomplished is the formation of a branch in this country in which these Auxiliaries should affiliate, and thus form a centre for work.

There is a vigorous Mission Band of forty young people connected with the Auxiliary, called "Doers of the Word."
