## FATAL ACCIDENT AT STEEL PLANT.

William Robinson Run Over By Engine And Killed.

A very sad accident occurred at the steel plant in Newcastle, New Brunswick, on Tuesday afternoon. An 80-year-old man, named William Robinson, who was employed as fireman in this steel plant, was on his way to work, and being deaf, did not hear one of the engines which crashed into him and passed over him, fracturing his skull and severing his two feet. He was immediately carried to the hospital, but died before he could be taken to the hospital.

The late Mr. Robinson came here some years ago from Newcastle, New Brunswick, and with his wife resided on Beattick street. He had been in the employ of the steel plant continuously since the plant first went into operation. He had no family.

Mr. Robinson for years conducted a carriage factory and had many friends in the Miramichi. It is a great loss to the community.

The funeral will be held from his residence, 250 Beattick street, Sunday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, at Redwood Hill Cemetery in Sydney.

## TRAFFIC ALONG THE I. C. R.

Increases on the Fredericton and Loggieville Division.—Pulp Industry Furnishing a Good Deal of Business,—And Much More is Expected in the Future.

A new industry is being prosecuted along the line of the I. C. R. between here and Chatham Junction and therein Assistant Superintendent Hobbs sees the possibilities of working up more freight traffic on the road.

Between Blackville and Boiestown stations there are a good many men engaged in securing poplar pulp wood. This all has to be peeled before shipment and several thousand cords will be shipped to American points as soon as the snow comes to enable the operators to get it to the railway.

In speaking of freight business along the I. C. R. Mr. Hobbs said today that the shipments of pulp from the two Chatham mills was very great and that from two or four cars of pulp were daily exported. The I. C. R. gets a long haul with this pulp which is sent to American points via St. Rosalie

Junction. The two pulp mills going in Chatham also create a great amount of ingoing freight business for the I. C. R.

Out of Loggieville this year the shipments of salmon have been even larger than usual and the blueberry shipments have also been very large.

Of late a lot of ties have been placed along the line between here and Loggieville and the road bed is being generally improved.

'The increase in the passenger business since the I. C. R. took over the road,' said Mr. Hobbs, has been most noticeable.'

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Minister of Railways and Canals is at the present time endeavoring to stop the leak whereby a deficit of two million dollars was piled up by the I. C. R. last year. In this he should have the aid and assistance of every loyal Canadian. It seems unfortunate that the "People's Road," which of late years has become so popular is so unfortunate as a business enterprise and that large amounts of money have been lost each year by its operation. But is this railroad run as a business enterprise? This is the question and it is well known that it has not been so run. Instead for years it has been little else than a political machine to create fat jobs for political bosses and lean ones for an army of supporters. In his retrenchment scheme we think that Mr. Emmerson has commenced at the wrong end. He should start by dismissing some of the numerous "Inspectors" recently appointed and other officials which are mere figure heads, and then gradually work down the scale until the lower grades of employees are reached. At present Mr. Emmerson is hard at work welding the retrenchment axe among the lower employees and in some cases old men who have given the service their best days have been dismissed instead of more recent political appointees, men who are no more fit or needed than the ones dismissed.

No fault will be found with an honest economizing scheme being put in operation by the minister but it must be a just one, not one of making fish of one and fowl of another. It may be necessary to man the road with young men, but it must not be done in a heartless way. A fair-minded public will not stand for the turning down of old and faithful employees, men who have spent the greater part of their lives in the service of the road and whose wages have been such that they were unable to lay up something against old age. We trust to see a more just and honorable cause pursued by the Minister.

## WINTER RECREATION.

We believe that steps are being taken by a number of Newcastle gentlemen to establish a company to build a skating and curling rink here. This should be encouraged as at present Newcastle young people have no winter recreation and a rink properly conducted is one of the best institutions of our age for the development of our youth. It is also a pleasant recreation for the business men and many a pleasant hour of health giving recreation may be put in at curling.

Yes, gentlemen, let us have a rink, and let it be an up-to-date one, thus start right.

Harper's Weekly declares that it sees England slowly, but with genuine determination, preparing for war, not for any particular war but doing what history shows her to have done too rarely in the past—"looking ahead and making preparation." There is no enemy visible in sight; there is nothing in the present state of Europe, unsettled as it is, to make one think that England will shortly be engaged in hostilities. "Nevertheless, the nation is examining her armor. War may break out; England may be dragged into it; she means, if possible not to caught unprepared." Ex.

## THE RULER OF INDIA.

It is a interesting tribute to the habit of acquiescence, which becomes second nature among English-speaking people that so great a post as the viceroyalty of India should have changed hands with so little jar and such scant comment. Lord Curzon resigned his almost royal powers a few weeks ago, and his successor was appointed with scarcely more comment in England than a change of heads in Tammany Hall would have called out here.

There is general agreement that Lord Curzon has been one of the ablest rulers of that long line which began with the great Warren Hastings whose impeachment history and literature made famous. He gave up his great office because, by implication at least, the British government supported the contentions of Lord Kitchener, the commander-in-chief of the Indian army, rather than those of Lord Curzon.

What these contentions were is not of great importance to Americans, but it may be said that in a general way they had to do with reform in the Indian army, and with Lord Curzon's unwillingness to subordinate the powers of the military member of his council to the desires of Lord Kitchener.

The Earl of Minto, the new viceroy has been trained in military as well as in civil affairs. He acted as private secretary to Lord Roberts in South Africa in 1881, served in the Mounted Infantry during the Egyptian campaign of 1882, was secretary to Lord Lansdowne when he was the Indian viceroy, helped put down the Kiel rebellion, and has twice been Governor-General of Canada. From his second service in that position he retired less than a year ago, after an administration marked by acts which left the impress of his personality on the affairs of the Dominion. In India he will have a wider field for the exercise of his administrative powers.—Youths Companion.

#### FEEDING DAIRY COWS FOR PROFIT.

Successful dairying does not depend on amount a cow produces, but more particularly on what she produces over the expenditure of feed and labor.

It is true that a cow must be a great producer to give a large profit, but without economy in feed and care she may do so at a loss.
