A Wonderful Memory.

The Record of Two Political Parties.

Facts and Figures Taken From the Public Accounts and Not Altered in the Slightest Particular.

The Debt.

When did the liberals come in power?

In 1873.

What were the gross liabilities of the Dominion in that year?

\$130,178,000.

When did the liberals go out of power?

In 1878.

What were the gross liabilities of the Dominion in that year?

\$174,957,000.

What was the increase in the five years?

\$44,779,000.

How much of this was due to engagements entered into by the previous Tory government?

About \$32,000,000.

Have the Tories ever denied this?

No they have not.

For how much of this increase then was Mr. Mackenzie's government responsible?

About \$12,000,000.

Where are these figures taken from?

From the official reports of the Dominion government on public accounts published in 1880.

How much of a yearly increase then are the liberals responsible for?

One-fifth of \$12,000,000, or \$2,400,000.

What was the gross liability of the Dominion at the time of Confederation?

\$1,000,000.

Is it correct to say that the increase of \$1,000,000 in five years is a small increase?

What is it now?

In round numbers \$200,000,000.

How do you get that?

The government's estimate, \$73,000,000 added in March last and they admit that the deficit, less the assets, is \$230,000,000. The total debt therefore must be these two sums added together, or \$230,000,000.

What then is the increase in the gross debt since Confederation?

About \$200,000,000.

If the liberals are responsible for an increase of \$12,000,000, how much are the Tories responsible for?

That is a simple matter of subtraction. \$230,000,000 less \$12,000,000 leaves \$218,000,000.

Then the Tories are responsible for an increase of \$218,000,000 for the gross debt?

According to the public accounts they are.

How many years have the Tories been in power?

Twenty-seven.

How much increase per year are they responsible for?

\$8,000,000.

Give a brief statement comparing the records of the two parties as regards the debt?

The Liberals were in power five years and incurred liabilities for \$12,000,000, or \$2,400,000 a year.

The Tories were in power for quite fifteen years and incurred liabilities of \$218,000,000, or \$39,666,666 a year.

The Expenditure.

What was the total expenditure on account of the public debt in 1887?

\$13,480,000.

What is the ordinary spoken of as the "debt"?

Did this increase or decrease during the last year?

It increased, so rapidly that in the last year, for which they prepared estimates it amounted to \$23,016,000.

Who expended the revenue that year?

Mr. Mackenzie's administration.

What was the last year during which Mr. Mackenzie's administration was in power?

The year ending June 30th, 1878.

Did the expenditure increase or decrease during Mr. Mackenzie's five years?

It increased nearly \$500,000. The total expenditure in that year was \$23,000,000.

What was the expenditure in the fiscal year ending 30th June last?

\$30,000,000.

Give comparative statements of the three periods?

First year period, seven years, average increase nearly \$1,400,000 a year, liberal period four years, increase \$200,000, average \$50,000 a year.

Second year period, eight years, increase about \$16,000,000, average increase \$2,000,000 a year.

Why do you speak of the liberal period as four years only?

Because the Tories prepared the estimate for the first year of the liberal regime.

The Prospects of a Big Liberal Majority Along the River Plate.

BRAS LARUE, Feb. 4.—A splendid majority for the liberals will be rolled up in this parish on the 22nd. Mr. Gregory addressed a crowded meeting in Bras Larué hall on Monday night and was accorded a most enthusiastic reception. We count on a two-thirds vote here, and are working hard for a better showing than even this. In the back districts, the prospects for the liberals look brighter than they ever did before, in either a local or provincial contest. The sitting all along the river—down to the mouth of the St. Lawrence—on both sides is good, and it only requires united action and effort on the part of liberals, to give our candidate the biggest majority that ever was polled for a liberal in this part of the country. This is no hyperbole, and the promises of government patronage don't take a word of exaggeration. We expect to haul for Gregory and Blake when the result of election is announced.

Legislation.

ONTARIO FOR BLAKE.

The Liberal Leader's Grand March Through Ontario.

Liberal Candidates in Every Constituency in Quebec. While Sixteen are Without Tory Candidates.

OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—The reception accorded Hon. Edward Blake in eastern Ontario, and the grand political demonstrations ever witnessed in the province. His meeting in Brockville Thursday night was the largest and most enthusiastic ever held there. For fully an hour before the train bearing Mr. Blake reached Brockville, almost every approach to the station was packed with people on foot and in vehicles. The procession was composed of thousands of people. Old residents say that they have never before seen in Brockville since the occasion of the Prince of Wales' visit.

At Coburg, last night there was another grand demonstration and an immense torch-light procession composed of over a thousand electors, to greet the liberal leader on his arrival in that place.

Reports from all parts of Ontario and Quebec show that the liberals are thoroughly organized and determined to win, while the Tories are discouraged and dispirited. In every electoral division in Quebec province the liberals have now regularly nominated candidates in the field, while the Tories are without candidates in fourteen constituencies.

In the course of his speech in Montreal last night Mr. Leask said the Hon. Mr. Tupper had made corrupt efforts to retain his power.
