Drinking Before Breakfast.

Professor Leuf says: In the morning the stomach contains a considerable quantity of mucus spread over and adherent to its walls. If food enters at this time, the tenacious mucus will interfere to some extent with the direct contact between the food and the stomach necessary to provoke the secretion of the gastric juice. A glass of water taken before breakfast passes through the stomach into the small intestines in a continuous and uninterrupted flow; it partly distends the stomach, stretching and to some extent obliterating the ruge; it thins and washes out most of the tenacious mucus; it increases the fullness of the capillaries of the stomach, directly if the water is warm, and indirectly in a reactionary way if it is cold; it causes peristalsis of the alimentary tract, wakes it up (so to speak), and gives it a morning exercise and washing. Care must be taken not to give cold water when the circulation, either local or general, is so feeble as to make reaction improbable. We should not risk it in advanced age, nor in the feeble, whether old or young, nor in local troubles like chronic gastric catarrh. In these cases it is best to give warm or hot water. The addition of salt is very beneficial.—Herald of Health.

We cannot tell from the time tables how fast we travel. The schedule time does not indicate the delays that must be made up by spurts between stations. The traveler who is curious to know just how fast he is going, and likes the stimulus of thinking that he is in a little danger, may find amusement in taking the time between mile posts; and when these are not to be seen, he can often get the speed very accurately by counting the rails passed in a given time. seen, he can often get the speed very accurately by counting the rails passed in a given time. This may be done by listening attentively at an open window or door. The regular clicks of the wheels over the rail joints can usually soon be singled out from the other noises and counted. The number of rail lengths passed in twenty seconds is almost exactly the number of miles run in an hour. But if one wants to get a lively sense of what it means to rush through space at fifty or sixty miles an hour he must get on a locomotive. Then only does he realize what trifles stand between him and destruction.

A few weeks ago a lady sat an hour in the cab of a locomotive hauling a fast express train over a mountain road. She saw the narrow bright line of the rails and the slender points of the switches. She heard the thunder of the bridges, and saw the track shut in by rocky bluffs, and new perils suddenly revealed as the engine swept around sharp curves. The experience was to her magnificent, but the sense of danger was almost appalling. To have made her experience complete she should have taken one engine ride on a dark and rainy night. In a daylight ride on a locomotive we come to realize how slender is the rail and how fragile is its fastenings compared with the ponderous machines they carry.

We see what a trifling movement of a switch makes the difference between life and death. We learn how short the look ahead must often be and how close danger sits on either hand. But it is only in a night ride that we learn how dependent the engineer must be after all upon the faithful vigilance of others. The headlight reveals a few yards of glistening rail and the ghostly telegraph pole sand switch targets. Were a switch open, a rail taken up, or a pile of ties on the track we could not possibly see the danger in time to stop.—Scribner's Magazine.

warded to Garrick in a box made of the mulberry wood the freedom of the borough. From this tree also, it may be remarked in passing, Hogarth carved a bust of the poet for the back of the mehogany chair which he designed for Garrick as president of the Shakespeare club. To the complimentary address of the Stratford corporation are we indebted for the Shakespeare jubilee of September, 1769, on the very spot where first the poet learned to prattle of elves and fairies, of wisards and witches, and of the unseen wonders of nether and upper worlds. An amphitheatre in imitation of Ranelagh was erected on the banks of the river, and during three days amusements of every kind were provided for the crowds who assembled from all parts of the country, and from London. The proceedings were closed by an ode on Shakespeare, written and recited by Garrick. Oyster literature has been well worked, and it is not necessary in an apropos article like the present to rehearse all that has been said or could be told about the bivalve from the point of view a literary man takes.

When, from a naturalist's standpoint, the oyster is surveyed, there is something even yet to be said. The hot day—for it must be a hot day—when the mother oyster opens her shell and the young ones escape from it like a cloud or a puff of steam, would be a day to be remembered, could that opening be observed. He who saw it would also note that each of the infant mollusks is provided with swimming organs, and that they at once begin to play around the maternal groto. By and by he would note the tide gradually drift the little creatures away, and if not devoured by the enemies which swarm around them, they come to an anchorage at some suitable spot. He cannot stay to observe the commencement of their shell making, but that goes on from the moment they become attached to their selected home. Year by year they add a delicate rim of horn like elastic substance which gradually hardens. After five or six years of this patient building the bivalve is ready to be detached from his anchorage and served up with the inevitable slice of lemon, if raw, or go through the agonies of cooking.

That vigilant writer Shakespeare has, naturally, something to say about the oyster, as he has, indeed, about everything. In "Much Ado About Nothing" he thus introduces it between the lips of Benedick: "I will not be sworn, but love may transform me to an oyster; but I'll take my oath on it, till he have made an oyster of me he shall never make me such a fool." Sheridan, in "The Critic," says "an oyster may be crossed in love." But so many of the poets have evidently an admiration for the bivalve that it would be an endless task to quote them. Thackeray, when asked what he experienced after eating an East river oyster of enormous size, gravely declared that he felt as if he had swallowed a baby.

On this occasion the success achieved provoked the naturally bitter spirit of "one Foote, a player," as "Walpole designated the man otherwise known (however undeservedly) as the British Aristophanes. Walking with Murphy by the banks of the Avon, a well dressed man approached him anxious to converse with him on the recently concluded performance. "Has: the county of Warwick the honor of giving birth to you, sir, as well as to Shakespeare?" said he. "'No," replied the stranger, "I come out of Essex." "Ah, sir," said Foote, remembering how celebrated was that county for its calves, "and who drove you?" Meantime the old Puritanical hatred of the theatre, though abated, was still manifested; during the jubilee, when Garrick was acting at Stratford, the people of the place are said to have regarded him as a magician and to have attributed the heavy rains which fell during the festival to the vengeance of heaven.—Temple Bar.

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
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
