NEW-BRUNSWICK.
PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
April 15, 1851.
The House at an early hour went into
Committee of the whole on the State of the
Province. The speakers were as follows:—
Mr. Gray for the resolutions: Mr. Barberie
against all but the first; Mr. Beardsley in
favor of the first and third, but against the
rest; Mr. Crane against all but first; Dr.
Thomson against the whole; Messrs. Tilley
and Hatheway in favour; Capt. Robinson
against the whole; and the Attorney General
in reply to some remarks of Mr. Hatheway's.
The debate continued five and a half hours
without intermission.
April 16.
The House threw out the Bill to-day, which
was sent down from the Legislative Council,
for incorporating a Library Committee.
The great debate on the State of the Pro-
vince was afterwards resumed. Mr. Cutler
took the floor and spoke in favour of all the
Resolutions. Mr. Johnson followed on the
same side. Both speakers exhibiting the
weakness of the Government, and the neces-
sity for immediate action on the part of the
House. Mr. Botsford supported the first Re-
solution, but opposed the others. Mr. Gray
then made a short speech in explanation.
He supported all the Resolutions except one.
The debate wound up by a very witty and
sarcastic speech from Mr. Needham, who
supported all the Resolutions, and by a few
words from Mr. Wilnot, who will take the
floor in the morning.

Arrival of the Steamship
AMERICA AT HALIFAX.
The Royal Mail Steamer America, from Liver-
pool with dates to the 5th inst., arrived at Halifax
at one o'clock, on Thursday morning. The Hon.
Mr. Howe came passenger on the steamer. The
following is the Telegraphic report of the news:
The steamer Pacific, from New York, arrived
at Liverpool on the 31st ult., at 1 o'clock p. m.
The City of Glasgow, from Philadelphia, arrived
at 2 o'clock the same day.
The steamer Atlantic had been repaired,
and minutely examined by scientific persons,
all of whom report her to be in a most perfect
and satisfactory state.
The commercial news presents no striking
feature. The Money market is unchanged.
Consols closed on Friday at 96½ to 97½.
Freights were dull. In passengers no
change.
Cotton, ordinary quality 11 lb. lower.
Other sorts a shade lower.
For Breadstuffs there was an increased de-
mand, and prices were rather higher.
The reasons assigned for the decline in the
Cotton market are, the uncertain nature of
the news received from the United States by
the Pacific, as respects the coming crop, and
the anxiety evinced by holders to effect sales.
The demand was quite as large as usual, and

the trade purchased freely to the extent of the
consumption, as the sales of the week (37,000
bales) will show. Of these, 20,670 bales
were taken by the trade, and only 7330
bales on speculation and for export.
The debates in Parliament during the
week have been devoid of interest. On the
31st, a motion was made in supply for a vote
of £3,321,070 for the charge of the land For-
ces at home and abroad, exclusive of India,
for the year ending 31st March, 1852. Mr.
Hume of course moved a reduction of this
amount.
The Russell Ministry still maintain their
position, and are getting through the business
of Parliament with tolerable success.—The
Budget was discussed on Friday evening
the 14th inst. Resolutions for the renewal
of the Income Tax were agreed to pro forma.
A powerful Anti-Papal League has been
formed in London.
Apprehensions exist that Foreigners in
England are connecting a Revolutionary
scheme, which is to develop itself during the
great Exhibition. The matter was brought
before Parliament, and in reply to enquiries
put to members of the Cabinet, assurances
were given that the Government was pre-
pared for any emergency.
France is quite, but anxiety amounting
to alarm prevailed, respecting the progress of
principles in the Capital and in the depart-
ments. The Receiver General's House in
Lyons had been burnt, and all documents de-
stroyed.
The German question remains in the same
state.
The insurrection in Bosnia has been effectually
suppressed.

REPORT OF THE FISHERY COMMIT-
TEE.
The Committee to whom was referred the
subject of the Fishery, beg to Report.—That
they have taken the same into consideration,
and in addition to the various Petitions and
documentary evidence brought before the
Committee, have examined several practical
men extensively engaged in the Fisheries:
That they are unanimously of opinion that
the Fisheries, which from the Geographical
position of the Province, ought to constitute
one of its most valuable resources, and which
at one time, formed an extensive article of ex-
port, have, during the last twenty years, fall-
en off at least forty per cent.: That this re-
mark is applicable both to the River and Har-
bour Fisheries, and to the Deep Sea Fisheries;
and for the better information of the Honora-
ble House, the Committee will separately as-
sign the reasons to which they attribute that
depreciation.
First, with regard to the River and Har-
bour Fisheries. The injury has resulted from
building dams and making other obstructions
across the streams and rivers to which the
Salmon and other Fish have been in the ha-
bit of resorting for spawning,—from throwing
Saw Dust and Mill rubbish into the streams
and Rivers,—and from spearing, catching or
destroying the Fish on the spawning grounds,
in those cases where the Rivers not being ob-
structed, the spawning grounds can be reach-
ed: These causes tend to divert the Fish from
their old haunts, to drive them away from the
Rivers and Harbours of the Province, and to
disturb and destroy them while spawning.
Secondly, as to the Deep Sea Fisheries:
The decrease, more especially as regards the
Herring Fishery, has resulted from the de-
struction of the Fish during the spawning sea-
son on the spawning grounds, particularly at
the Southern Head of Grand Manan,—from
throwing gurry or offal overboard on the fish-
ing grounds, from the improper mode in
which the fish for exportation, in many in-
stances, are cured,—from the Americans, in
direct violation of the Treaty between Great
Britain and the United States, resorting in
large numbers to our Fishing grounds, and
carrying on the Fisheries in our own waters,
under advantages (resulting from the high
protective Duties, and the Bounties given by
their Government, with which it is impossi-
ble for our fishermen to compete,—from the
want of proper Inspectors of the cured and
pickled Fish,—and from the insufficiency of
the existing laws in not providing for proper
officers to look after and enforce the pro-
visions made by Law respecting the Fisheries.
With regard to the River and Harbour
Fisheries, they would recommend that one or
more Wardens or Officers be appointed in
each County to look after and enforce the
provisions of the several Laws respecting the
Fisheries, and the Ordinance made by the
authorities of the respective Counties, by vir-
tue of any powers conferred upon them by
law; and particularly to see that in every
Dam or other obstruction now built, or here-
after to be built or placed across the various
Streams and Rivers of this Province, a proper
and suitable Fish-way shall be made and
kept: That no Saw Dust or Mill Rubbish
shall be allowed or put directly or indirectly
by any person or persons, in any of the rivers
or streams of the Province: That no
spearing or killing of the Fish be permitted
on the spawning grounds during the spawning
season. Such Wardens or Officers to be
paid or remunerated as provided by a law
hereafter to be submitted to this Honora-

ble by the Committee for that purpose.
With regard to the Deep Sea Fisheries,
they recommend that strong Legislative en-
actments should be made to prevent the de-
struction or catching of the Fish on the spawn-
ing grounds, during the spawning season, in
the Bay of Fundy and the Gulf of St. Law-
rence,—to prevent the throwing of gurry or
offal overboard on the Fishing grounds,—to es-
tablish a stringent system of inspection of all
cured and pickled Fish intended for sale,—
and that provisions should be made by law to
that effect, and Officers appointed thereunder
to enforce them.
But there are other important considera-
tions connected with the deep sea fisheries, to
which it is the duty of this Committee to call
the attention of the House. Whilst they are
of opinion that if placed upon an equal foot-
ing with others the Fishermen of this Pro-
vince would require no encouragement, save
the returns which always follow steady indus-
try and honorable competition, they do not
hesitate to state to this Honorable House, that
the advantages possessed by the American
Fishermen above set forth, are such as en-
tirely to prevent a fair or successful prosecu-
tion of the Fisheries by our own people and
one of three things is absolutely necessary;
either
1st. That the stipulations of the Treaty
between Great Britain and the United States,
as respects the Fisheries of this Province
should be rigidly enforced, or
2nd. That arrangements should be made
with the United States Government to admit
the productions of our Fisheries into their
Markets, free from the present protective
Duties; or
3rd. That arrangements should be given
by our local Government as would put our
Fishermen upon equal terms with the Ameri-
can Fishermen.
The practical men examined before the
Committee, all state, that with either of these
alternatives they would be content; that they
ask no favor, but simply fair and impartial
justice; and the Committee cannot hesitate
to coincide in the correctness of these views,
and to say, that one or the other of the above
alternatives must be carried out, if the valu-
able Deep Sea Fisheries of this Province are,
in the opinion of this House worth preserv-
ing.
The Committee have, in accordance with
the foregoing views, prepared three Bills, in-
titled severally:—
A Bill for the protection and regulation of
the Sea and River Fisheries, of this Pro-
vince;
A Bill to provide for the Inspection of
Dried and Pickled Fish; and
A Bill for the encouragement of the Fish-
eries.
Which are herewith submitted, and they also
beg to refer this honorable house to sugges-
tions contained in the memorandum of Cap-
tain Robinson, R. N., a Member of this Com-
mittee, which is appended to this Report,
and which in the opinion of this Committee, are
worthy of most serious consideration.
The Committee cannot close this Report
without strongly urging upon this House, the
importance of so valuable a source of wealth
to this Province; they also think, that, if pos-
sible, Legislative encouragement should be
given to the establishment of Nautical Schools
in the Fishing Districts, thereby tending to
elevate the character of a most deserving
class of our countrymen, and to give them
those privileges and benefits which are en-
joyed by others, whose lot and destinies enable
them to obtain a livelihood on an element less
stormy, and from pursuits less dangerous.

Memorandum of J. J. Robinson, Commander,
Royal Navy, accompanying the forego-
ing Report.
The existing mode of protecting the Fish-
eries in this Province by two men of War,
viz, one on the North Shore, or Bay Char-
lotte, the other in the Bay of Fundy, for a few
Summer months, does not answer the pur-
poses contemplated, although the Officers so
employed are most zealous in performing
their duties while on the station, for the two
following most simple and evident reasons.
In the first place, they come too late and
go away too soon; arriving in May or June
and going away in October, the early Her-
ring Fishery, (as witness this year,) and late
line fishing, be thereby entirely neglected,
and their generally coming to the Province
as perfect strangers. By the time the Com-
mander and officers, have learned the differ-
ent localities and details, it is time, by the
orders from the Commander in Chief, to re-
turn to Halifax, and the same Vessel seldom
or ever returns a second time.
Secondly, The Vessels are too large, and
the risk too great for them to be daily moving
about among the different small Harbours, so
essential to the performance of the duty, and
coming, as those Vessels generally do, from
the West Indies, they are generally and
naturally more alarmed at our Fogs than

the Masters of Fishing Vessels and others
navigating our waters. To remedy this, it is
proposed that the Imperial Government be ad-
dressed, to send from England four or five
small Cutters, (such as are used in the in-
different stations there,) to be permanently
employed on our coasts, in lieu of the two
Men of war already referred to. The ex-
pense of these Vessels would not be more
than one of theirs, for a Sloop's Company of
the first class would Officer and Man the
wholes of them; and by distributing them
during the Winter at the different towns on
the coast, they would be ready to proceed
early in the Spring to their respective stations,
as well as to render during the Winter
Months, assistance in case of fire, or per-
form other services that might be required.
The Officers commanding these Vessels
should be clothed with power from the Lieut.
Governor of the Province for the time being,
to assist in carrying into effect the different
local laws relative to the Fisheries and Re-
venue, as well as the Treaties of the Imperial
Government.
The immense importance also this arran-
gement would be to the Trade and Naviga-
tion of the Province, must not be lost sight
of, in saving the crews and property of wreck-
ed Vessels, for it is a fact known to every in-
habitant of the Bay of Fundy, that the United
States Revenue Cutter has assisted every
British Vessel

The Accounts of the Overseers are all found correct, and show a balance of £30 12 0 due Abram Marks, and 40 0 0 due Z. Chipman, also 30 3 1 due J. Bowes; all which we recommend being paid them out of the first monies collected, and further recommending that the sum of £230 be assessed for the parish the present year.

W. Gimpmer, Collector of Rates, Accounts rather complicated, as he appears to have paid more than his charges.

George Hiltz, Collector of Rates, accounts are not satisfactory, as he does not credit amount paid to James Bowes, and also does not debit amount paid by him to J. H. Whitlock.

SAINT DAVIDS.

Road Commissioners accounts with vouchers correct. Overseers of the Poor accounts with vouchers correct.

Recommended £60 to be assessed for this parish the present year.

Collector of Rates account correct—overpaid Treasurer £2 10 0.

SAINT JAMES.

Road commissioners accounts, not satisfactory, for want of two vouchers. No returns whatever from one half the Parish.

SAINT PATRICK.

The returns from the Commissioners of Roads are unsatisfactory, as neither account or vouchers for monies received and expended, accompany their return.

The account of the Collector of Rates is correct.

By the return of the Overseers of the Poor there appears to be an error of 18s. 6d. in Overseer Lowden's account, and that account, and that amount remains in his hands. The amount of 5s. 9d. is shown to be due Overseer Gillmore and 1s. due Overseer Wilson.

SAINT GEORGE.

The account of John McCool Overseer of the Poor is not satisfactory, and the Grand Jury recommend that he furnish an account of items, with prices accompanying the same.

The accounts of the other Overseers appear satisfactory. The return of John Gray

Collector of rates is not satisfactory as he returns £12 9 8 for delinquents, which is not approved by the Overseers, and charges 8 per cent for collecting, 7d. only being allowed by the Justices, and the charge of 16s. 8d. for drawing collectors bond considered wrong.

The returns of Daniel Lee collector, not satisfactory, he charges £1 6 2 for delinquents, not approved by the Overseers, and charges 8 per cent instead of 7d. and 5 per cent paid assessors instead of three. The charge 16s. 8d. for drawing bonds is also considered wrong.

The returns of the Commissioners of Roads appear to be correct.

The accounts of the Overseers are correct. The accounts of the Commissioners of Roads and collector of rates are also correct, but as the Assessor did not include the Commissioners in the amount assessed there is a deficiency of £1 9 3 and recommend an assessment on the Parish £50 for the Poor.

The accounts from this Parish are correct, but there is no return from the collector of rates.

There is no return from any parish Officer except the Commissioners of Roads which is very unsatisfactory.

The Grand Jury observe that there are several small Bills from Magistrates and Constables against the county accepted from cases when Parties have been convicted and fined for breaches of the Peace, infringement of the License Law &c., and the Grand Jury's opinion is that unless satisfactory reason is proved that every means has been used to recover the costs from the individual, such bills of costs should not be admitted a charge on the county.

The majority of the Grand Jury respectfully recommend that no Licenses for selling spirituous liquors be granted the present session.

The accounts of R. Shaw, W. Heaton, P. Doran, and W. Heaton, amounting to £14 15 0 for keeping a watch in the Town of Saint Andrews the past year, with amount charged in Bill against the county by A. W. Smith 9s. and also a part of J. McLachlan's Bill £2 4 8 being for parish accounts, we refer to the Justices, they being cognizant of the circumstances under which the respective services were performed.

In reference to the Municipal Corporations: The Grand Jury are not in possession of sufficient information of the new law to venture an opinion as to whether it would or would not be expedient for this County to adopt it, as the previous part of their Report goes to show that the affairs of this County are now well conducted, whether it would not be inexpedient to give up a certainty for an uncertainty. The Grand Jury would, therefore, suggest, that the rate-payers of the County examine and digest the Municipal Act thoroughly, before hastily adopting it.

The Grand Jury approve the Estimate made by the Justices for assessment for County rates for the present year, the amount being three hundred pounds. And also recommend an assessment on the Parish of Saint Andrews one hundred pounds for the support of the Poor.

The Grand Jury recommend that the foregoing Report be inserted once in the newspapers published in Saint Andrews.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

CALIFORNIA ITEMS.—A gang of thieves, detected in stealing horses at Foster's Bar, were fired at by the miners, and one of them was killed. Two others were taken prisoners, and immediately hung!

In front of the Union Hotel, San Francisco, are located a number of French boot blacks. One of these flourishes a diamond ring worth \$500, on his first finger! Where else but in California could this be seen?

The marshes between Sacramento City and Marysville are covered with the finest duck and wild geese. The miner strips his rifle from his shoulder as he passes, and soon bags a sufficient number to make a hearty meal for his party.

The indebtedness of Sacramento is about \$400,000. The interest on which amounts to \$9,000 weekly.

They are amusing themselves with races at Sacramento city. On the 3rd of March, they had a pony race, a donkey race, and a trial of speed between two full-blinded California horses.

The Placer Times tells of three brothers who crossed the Plains in October, 1849—One went to the mines, the other two turned their attention to agriculture. The miner, at the end of January, 1851, had saved less than \$1,000, while the farmers had netted \$7,000 each.

A line of steamships is to be formed between San Francisco and the Sandwich Islands, stopping at the Farallones.

A ship which arrived at San Francisco on the 1st of March from Sydney, had on board a large number of Felons. The people were becoming alarmed at the frequent arrival of this class of emigrants.

The Sons of Temperance at San Francisco turned out in respectable numbers on the 22nd, to celebrate Washington's birthday, and marched in procession to the Baptist Church.

The pilot-boat Fanny, from Boston for San Francisco, made the run out in 103 days.

Messrs. Stillwell, Prentice & Evans, of Sacramento City, have in their possession a lump of pure gold, of unique shape, weighing upwards of 51 ounces. It was dug up in the town Sonora. One of the firm intends to visit England on the occasion of the World's Fair, and exhibit in the Crystal Palace.

A man who had just arrived at San Francisco from the mines, was robbed on the 4th of March of \$6,000.

A man was lately fined \$100 for being drunk and disorderly in the streets of San Francisco. The Courier says: "A good smart murder might have been committed last week for that money."

A beautiful California Lion was killed by Capt. Marlin, near Sancelmo. It is of whitish colour, over two feet in height, and measuring between seven and eight feet from tip to tip.

A man who was fined \$10 in the Recorder's Court at San Francisco, for a misdemeanor, very coolly offered to give his note for one month as payment of the fine. He was referred to the "lock up."

SEVERE GALE.—Great Destruction of Property, with loss of life.—A North East gale commenced at Boston on Monday night, and raged with fearful violence until Wednesday.

The wharves were over-flooded by the tide, cellars filled, and property to a large amount destroyed. At the North End the waves made a complete breach over Commercial Street. All the cellars in Ann-street were flooded. Simpson's hat store at the corner having at least three feet in it. Long Wharf was completely over-flooded to the depth of several feet. The goods in the public stores are badly damaged. The damage in the cellars on Long Wharf is very great, also upon Central and India Wharves.

The water was over a foot deep in Sea-street, and in one cellar a girl was taken out where the water was up to her armpits.

This tide made a complete breach over Charlestown and Chelsea bridges, so that passengers were unable to pass over them on Tuesday night.

At East Boston many of the cellars were flooded. The new Episcopal Church at the corner of Deane and Paris streets, just completed, was by the force of the gale, torn from its foundation.

In Charlestown the wharves were all covered with water, and much property was destroyed. The steeple of the new Baptist Meeting House on Bowler Hill, some eighty feet in height, fell across the street, burying a milk cart, which was passing at the time, in the ruins, killing the driver, Mr. Theodore Lock and the horse.

A schooner of about 60 tons, sunk in Boston harbor, off Rowe's wharf, the crew took to the boat, and landed in safety.

The House of Assembly was chiefly occupied the past week, in the discussion of Mr. Ritchie's resolutions. The debate, which began on Monday terminated on Friday, and resulted in the defeat of the Opposition, where-ever the resolutions affected the Government.

The Attorney General's amendments to the resolutions were to the effect, that despatches should be supplied so far as advantageous to the Public Service—Salaries reduced so far as consistent with a due regard to the Public Service and to Public faith. The late appointments were subjects of grave remonstrance with the Home Government—Thus the right of the Province to grant Bounties, prohibited in the Despatches, was also subject of grave remonstrance, and so of others.

A great portion of the original resolutions the Attorney General proposed to adopt, altering them by omitting portions, and inserting others, to the above effect.

The following are the divisions on the resolutions, as received by telegraph at St. John:—

On the first resolution,—for the amendment, Messrs. Street, Partelow, Rankin, Williston, Montgomery, McPhelim, Porter, Robinson, Thomson, and Sules. On the second resolution,—for the amendment—Messrs. Street, Rankin, Partelow, Reed, Gordon, Earle, Williston, Bostford, Rice, Stiles, Taylor, Beardsley, McPhelim, Robinson, Thomson, Porter, Montgomery, Hayward, Barbic, Gilbert, Crane—21. On the third resolution no amendment was offered. Against this resolution were—Messrs. Partelow, Rankin, Street, Montgomery, Thomson, Porter, Robinson, Taylor. On the fourth resolution—for the amendment—the same as on the second. This amendment states it to be the duty of Government, after receiving the report of the Committee, to bring down a bill for the reduction of such Salaries as may be consistent with the Public Service, and that the Despatches were an undue interference and infringement on the rights of the people of this Province. On the fifth resolution, the division for the amendment was the same. On the sixth—the same. Mr. Fitzgerald did not vote—Mr. Squelcher was in the chair.

FARMING IN NEW-BRUNSWICK.—As one fact worth a thousand theories, we gave below a statement of the sales made in this market last season by a Farmer living on a rented farm in Sussex Vale, about forty miles from this City. We vouch for its accuracy.

4500 lbs. Cheese, at 6d. per lb. — £112 10 0
Calves, — — — — — 21 0 0
Pork, — — — — — 46 14 0
Poultry, — — — — — 5 0 0

As this Farmer keeps sixteen Cows, the above shows the produce of cheese from each to have been 292 lbs., and the value from each cow, in cheese and calves, to have been eight pounds seven shillings. By the returns furnished to Professor Johnston, the average produce of cheese in New Brunswick for each cow is 140 lbs.—Our farmers, therefore, had better stir up. What one man can do, another can and there is no good reason why every cow in the country should not be made "to do her duty."—[Courier.]

The River Navigation opened on Wednesday last, on which day the Steamer Reindeer arrived at Fredericton from this City.—[Courier.]

THE INTER-COLONIAL BILL.—The trade between this Province and the neighbouring Colonies has been for some years past, placed on the footing of a free trade, by the passage of an annual Bill for that purpose.

At the present Session, however, instead of re-enacting the former Bill, the Protectionist party in the Assembly introduced a provision which rendered Canada flour, coming through the United States, subject to the same duty as American flour. In consequence, the Bill was rejected by the Legislative Council, and a new Bill was then introduced in the Assembly, precisely similar to that of last year.

The passage of this Bill has only been delayed by the great political debate of the past week; it will, no doubt, be passed in a few days, but in order to prevent the inconvenience now so seriously felt from duties being levied on Nova-Scotia cattle and produce, the Government has taken the responsibility of authorizing the Treasurer to admit those articles duty free, until the Act receives the Lieutenant Governor's assent. The whole difficulty has arisen from the attempt to impose foreign duty on Canada flour coming through the United States.—[Id.]

Sir John Harvey has issued a Proclamation authorising inter-Colonial trade with Canada, New Brunswick, P. E. Island, and Newfoundland, in certain articles, free of duty, including Wheat Flour, whether imported direct or through warehouse in the United States, in the latter case to be certified to be the production of Canada.

The ship Oulla, which left Liverpool for New Orleans on the 2d of February with 410 emigrants, did not arrive at the latter port until the 2d inst. Mutiny among the crew obliged the Captain to put into Jamaica, where several of them were tried and sentenced to three months imprisonment at hard labor. Having been remanded, the Oulla again set sail, but the ship never soon broke out, and five persons died, who were buried at sea. On her arrival at the Balise, she had forty cases of ship fever on board besides other diseases, and her decks and hold were so filthy, that the wonder was that all her passengers were not the victims of disease.
