Mrs. Perley, wife of Hon. W. E. Perley, M. P., for Sanbury, died at her home at Blawieville, last Wednesday evening. Mrs. Perley had been an invalid for some time, but her death was quite unexpected. Mrs. Perley has the sympathy of many friends in her bereavement.

Robert Moore of Frederick, formerly of the County Registry Office, and employed in Messrs. Clarke, Kerr & Thomas's hardware store, last night, had a miraculous escape from being crushed to death last Thursday evening. He was engaged hoisting resin barrels from the ground floor to the fourth floor. The elevator, which was being used, had two doors to it, one suspended about eight feet below the other. When the accident occurred, there were three barrels of resin on the elevator, two on the upper floor and one on the lower. For some unexplained reason, Moore allowed the elevator to run up until the floor having the one barrel on it, was level with the fourth floor of the building. He then proceeded to roll the barrel from the elevator. In so doing he caused the upper part of the elevator to cant, and one of the barrels, weighing five hundred pounds, rolled over the back of his head, and he was killed.

He was found to be in a terrible state, blood flowing in torrents from the top of his head, his mouth and his feet. How he escaped being completely crushed is only known by a merciful Providence. His skull was badly fractured; nearly all the teeth in the front of his mouth were broken and pieces of them sticking in his cheeks. One arm was fractured, and one foot almost crushed into jelly, the sole of the foot being torn completely off. He was sent to the Hospital, and is recovering.
