An Adverriage reporter lately had an Interview with Mr. Phipps as to the state of Forestry in Ontario, and commenced by asking him what had been done in the master.

"As you know," Mr. Phipps replied, "the Ontario Government some years ago, wishing to arouse an interest in the prevervation of what bush land yet remained among our farms, commissioned me to do what I could in the matter. I was chosen, as I had for years back, at my own expease, endeavored to move in this direction, by the publication of letters and articles, advocating as best I could the preservation of some of our forests. Since then I have issued annual reports, giving all information I could secure on forestry. I have also sent numbers of letters to the Ontario press, some years publishing 500 of them in different papers; and I have addressed a great number of meetings on the subject."

"Most decidedly," answered the Forestry Commissioner. "Not only once, but I think I may say in hundreds of cases, people have said to me that the windbreaks or small plantations they were planting would not have been attempted but for the literature I had circulated, and which they had read. Moreover, the lectures have an appreciable effect.

The National Heart True to Liberalism.
LONDON, July 31.—Mr. Gladstone, speaking at the National Liberal Club last night, said there had never been more distinct proof that the national heart and mind are with the Liberals than had been afforded since the assembling of the present Parliament. The mission of Gen. Simmons to the Roman Court, he said, was a novelty in English history, and would require the attention of Parliament at the next session unless, as the expenses of the mission were not taken from money which the House of Commons had voted, Parliament might not have a chance to discuss the subject. 

A good deal has been said about the manin which the timber is sold. It is a proper policy, as necessity arises, to sell the growing timber to the highest bidder and ney to carry on the Governm Institutions, asylums and prisons; but, as Mr. Phipps ably points out, the duty of the Government has not ended there. The Adencouraged the planting of trees all over the Province, and many farmers and others have taken steps to earn the grant made. So far so good. But the enormous benefit ng the timber cut down is not generally understood. In the long run, the liberal planter of trees in the older settled portions of Canada will be a wealthy man, or he will leave his family a goodly heritage, equally as valuable as hard cash.

The time was when the settlers in the southwest portion of this Province cut up at 4:35 a.m. their black walnut trees and made the wood The stupi into fence rails or used it for firewood. Wild cherry trees, hickory and oak also grew in abundance in many places, and was not always believed to be very valuable. Indeed, the forest was often ruthlessly hewn down without regard to its value. In clearing the country, the people were too busy to think of the coming value of the wood they destroyed; but there is no reason why these splendid species of timber should not be replaced. Farmers who have any wild land, difficult of cultivation, or how sess ground too poor to turn up with the possess ground too poor to turn up with the plow, cannot do better than set it out with the eleven exchange offices now in operayoung trees, first ascertaining from Mr. Phipps or some equally good authority what description of tree will be best adapted

It is to be hoped, too, that the logic in favor of our position as a business Covernment will take most energetic center is simply irresistible. 

Prof. Sanborn: "We can make a pig with 35 per cent. of fat or with 55 per cent., according as we vary the nutritive ratio. We also vary every organ in the body, and affect even the weight of hair. Scarcity of Fruit.

Mr. Thomas Martindale, formerly of this city, now a member of the firm of Thomas Martindale & Co., importing grocers, Tenth and Market streets, Philadelphia, coatributes to the Philadelphia Ledger a lengthy article dealing with the scarcity of fruit, the cause of shortage and the probable effect on prices. "We will get about 12,000 baskets of peaches this year," said Mr. Martindale, "compared with nearly 6,000,000 baskets last year. The greatest of all crops, the apple, will be realized to about the extent of 24 per cent. in New York State, as compared with productions heretofore; in Michigan about 60 per cent. and in Maine about 90 per cent. The article goes on to say that "the scarcity, it is thought, will not astop at the peach crop in the fruit line, but will include apples, apricots, quinces, grapes, plums, strawberries, raspberries and nearly all other table fruits. Of the vegetable products corn, string beans, lima beans, to-inatoes, and nearly all other goods for canning will, if prices continue to advance as they have been and are now doing, be this winter nearer a luxury than a necessity."
