PETAIN ONCE MORE ROLLS BACK FOE'S LINE ALONG AISNE

With Single Sweeping Movement, 800 Yard s Wide, He Secures All First Objectives and Takes Prisoners.

Paris, Sept. 1 .- French troops on the Aisne front opened an offensive yesterday afternoon in the Hurtebise region. In one sweep they carried all their objecto a depth of more than three hundred yards.

The captured ground, says the official statement making this announcement, was held against three counter-attacks. Prisoners to the number of 150 were taken. The attack was opened after strong artillery

The French Report. The statement follows: "To southeast of Vauxaillon we pulsed an enemy surprise attack. "On the Aisne front, after brief artillery preparation, we attacked at 7 o'clock enemy positions north-west of Hurtebise. Our assault carried at a single bound all the objectives assigned on a front of nearly 1,500 metres, to a depth of about 300 metres. During the night hree violent counter-attacks were broken up by our fire. Very spirited artillery fighting continues in this region. The number of prisoners counted has reached 150, of whom half a dozen are officers. We aptured seven machine guns. "Reconnaissances of the con uered ground showed that a grea number of the enemy were killed, is much during the artillery prep aration as during the battle, which was very violent. 

HALDANE TELLS INNER HISTORY OF BERLIN TRIPS

Disposes of Charges Made Against Him As Secretary of War.

THE PACT WITH FRANCE

Realizing Menace, Bent His Energies To Improving Mobilization.

London, Sept. 1.-Important revelations which form a valuable chapter in the history of British and German nego the history of British and German negotiations during the eight years before the war are published by the Manchester Guardian today. 

Artillery Duels in Virtually Continuous Formation.

German Raid Below Lens Fails - Berlin Claims British Reverse.

LONDON, Aug. 31 .- On the front bew Lens General Haig reports the repulse of a German raid on the British lines five miles southeast of the city No mention is made of the activities on the British side, but London war office intimations are that the artillery battle is being carried on in virtually continuous form in preparation for the next forward thrust with every indication that the wearing down process is having its due effect on the Germans General Petain's report from French headquarters indicates the possibility of a speedy renewal of the infantry battle at Verdun. 

PRESENT ITALIAN OPERATION MAY PRESAGE BEGINNING OF END FOR AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

VERDUN IS INTERESTING Frank H. Simonds Expects Soon To See General Movement in Direction of Triest---Cadorna's Success Among Greatest of Year.

> VERDUN EMPHASIZES BREAKING UP OF MORALE IN GERMAN ARMY

Three Years Ago, Where Berlin Papers Were Shouting Victory, They Are Today Claiming Defensive Lines Cannot Be Broken - Those Lines Have Been Pushed Miles Back in Many Places.

Since I wrote my last weekly article two military events of very great importance have taken place—the Italian attack on the Isonzo front and the French operation before Verdun. Of these two operations, on the military side the Italian is by all odds the more important. It is, moreover, still going forward when these lines are written, and it is impossible to foresee its conseences on such evidence as we yet possess, although it is patent that it may

e one of the great successes of the war. Next week I hope to discuss the Italian operation in some detail, when our eports of the progress shall be more definite. At the moment it is perhaps sufficient to indicate the problem which confronted the Italians when they bened their attack. In August of last year the Italian army faced eastward om the Julien Alps to the Bay of Panzano, the northern end of the Adriatic Sea, in much the same posture that it stood after the first brief advance in the previous year had brought the Italian army to the first position in which Austria had elected to stand.

The Austrian front presented three distinct obstacles, which may be covered in a description of the three divisions of an army—the flanks and the centre. On the north, from Tolmino right down to the neighbor ood of Gorizia, the Austrians occupied very high ground on the east bank of the Isonzo River. which was, in fact, a moat. This high ground, known as the Bainsizzi plateau, culminated a few miles north of Gorizia in several heights approaching two thousand feet in elevation, of which Mounts Kuk and Santo were the more important peaks. This was a position that well might have been deemed impregnable, and it did, in fact, resist all efforts last year. South of the Bainsizzi plateau the Austrian centre occupied some hills just across the Isonzo River covering Gorizia. Southward again between the Winnach River and the see covering Gorizia. The arrival of the first of the Ameran troops coincided with the beginning of the reassertion of French deterdination and French confidence. Genetain, who succeeded to the command the French army, is one of the few freat men the war has produced. Within a very brief period of time his spirit, which was the spirit which defended Verdun, has been infused in the French armies, with results that are now mani-

Chemin-des-Dames, which was one of the really impressive operations of the whole year on the western front, was designed to take advantage of French designed to take advantage of French depression and of suspected breaking down in the morale of the French army. As such it was one of the bloodiest defeats in the whole struggle and one of the least successful offensives. Hitherto, in almost every instance, the concentration of a huge park of artillery and the lavish use of men have enabled the attacker to gain one, two or three and the lavish use of men have enabled the attacker to gain one, two or three miles of territory. Yet, on the Chemindes-Dames, on ground which had only recently been captured and was not yet fully organized, the French halted the German attack in its tracks lost only a few minor trenches along the plateau of Californie and retook these trenches without delay. The Chemindes-Dames battle will yet rank among the important engagements of the war, because it was another instance of the splendid capacity of the French to rally in the face of momentary depression and to hold against odds and in condiand to hold against odds and in condi-

tions fully unfavorable.

A Moral Verdun. The Chemin-des-Dames battle was moral Verdun. It was intended first moral Verdun. It was intended first of all to break the spirit of France, and, even if it failed in its major purpose, to use up French effectives and prevent them from being employed elsewhere, either in Flanders or in Lorraine. The French answer was threefold. First, a terrific defeat of the Germans on the Chemin-des-Dames; second, participation, and effective participation, with the British in the successful advance the British in the successful advance about Ypres; and third, in the superi offensive at Verdun, which not only retook considerable ground, but wrote trook considerable ground, but wrote "finis" to the whole Verdun chapter. The Germans had denied, and still deny, that there was a battle of the Marne, but no denial of the battle and defeat of Verdun could be seen to the second sec er each of the positions ter each of the positions whose values had been appraised by the kaiser at the moment they were taken by German troops, have been retaken by French soldiers. Dead Man's Hill, Hill 304, Forts Douaumont and Vaux—these are the four symbols of Verdun. When the kaiser's troops took Douaumont he announced that the key of Verdun had fallen. LORD ROBERT CECIL SAYS WILSON HAS GIVEN RIGHT REPLY

Further Answer to Pope May Not Be Needed.

FITS ECONOMIC POLICY

Few More Months May See Whole World Against Central Powers.

LONDON, Aug. 31.-Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, today indorsed President Wilson's reply to the peace proposals of Pope Benedict, and said he wan not certain any further response wild be necessary.

"The president's note is a very magnificent occurrence," said the minister in his weekly interview with the Associated Press. "It thrilled us all over here, and the opinions which I heard expressed by representatives of Allied countries were equally warm and appreciative. I am certain that none of the Aliies would be able to improve upon it, and I am not certain that any further reply will be necessary.

"There does not appear to me to be anything inconsistent as between the president's note and the economic policy of the Allies as declared at the Paris conference. The resolutions of the Allies were purely defensive measures, and in no way aggressive." dorsed President Wilson's reply to the the Allies were purely defensive measures, and in no way aggressive."

Must Foster Economic Strength.

"They had in view the necessity for restoring the economic life of the Allies after the war, and protecting ourselves against any aggressive and militarist commercial policy which might be pursued by our enemies after the war, and German schemes for driving their allies into a central European commercial bloc show that such a policy is a real danger. We do, indeed, hold that in this struggle economic considerations are as vital as purely military and naval measures. We have to maintain and foster the economic strength of those who are fighting the central powers quite as much as we
