The Premier of Korea, the Chief of the Russian Secret Police, and a British-Indian Magistrate Murdered by Enemies of the Regimes.

A remarkable series of political assassinations of personages high in office is reported today from widely separated points throughout the world. In Seoul, Korea, the prime minis ter of the Korean cabinet was stabbed to death with a dagger, as an apparent result of the intense feeling in Korea

against Japanese influence. In St. Petersburg the chief of the secret police, Col. Karpoff, was blown to pieces by the explosion of a bomb, supposedly thrown by anarchists.

At Bembay, British India, the chi ef magistrate of Nasik, Arthur M. T Jackson, was assassinated by a native for revenge, and presumably as a part of the seditious movement against British official authority.

50.000 FROM U.S. FOR PASSION PLAY

Board and Room Already Being Engaged in Ober-

ammergau.

Berlin, Dec. 22. - Fifty thousand Americans are expected to visit the Passion Play at Oberammergau next summer. The management counts on a grand total of 200,000 guests from all quarters, and believes that fully 25 per cent of them will come from the United States.

Dr. C. L. Babcock, the director of the Berlin branch of the American Bureau of University Travel, has just returned from Oberammergau, where he went to arrange for the accommo dation of the several hundred Americans who have had the foresight t engage places in which to sleep and eat eight or ten months ahead.

"Long hair and tourist agents are the outward sign of coming events at Oberammergau," said Babcock, "By order of the burgomaster all the resilents, numbering altogether 1,500 or 2.000, must let their hair grow without cutting until after the Passion Play is over. There are about 4,500 available beds the town. ENGLISH DREYFUS DIES IN POVERTY

Imprisoned for Space of Five Years.

London, Dec. 21.-Adolf Beck, the victim of one of the most remarkable miscarriages of justice in modern times, is dead in the Middlesex Hospital, from bronchitis and pneumonia. He was titute.

The story of Beck's wrongful imprison ment stirred so much public comment and indigation five years ago that it earned him the name of the "English Dreyfus."

He was born in Norway, but spent a considerable part of his life in England on business connected with the mining industry. In 1895 he was arrested on a charge of defrauding women, and was sentenced at the Old Bailey in the following year to seven years' penal servi-

He served five years and a half, pro testing his innocence all the while, and was released; then, however, he was arested again in 1904 on a similar charge Again he was convicted; but, providen tially for him, Mr. Justice Grantham de ferred his sentence, and while he was in custody awaiting his second committal to prison, another man was arrested on similar charge, and happened to pas in front of him.




