Mr. James L. Williams, of Horton Street, Passed Away on Sunday.

LIVED HERE 71 YEARS

Wife Died Two Weeks Ago - Was Father of Col. Williams, Formerly of the Seventh Regiment.

Mr. James L. Williams, the oldest Methodist in London, and for 71 years a resident of this city, died at his home, 218 Horton street, yesterday after an illness extending over some weeks. His wife died exactly four weeks ago yesterday, and it is a some-

Mr. Williams came to London when he was 23 years old from Ireland, and was one of the city's first merchants, having a china and drygoods store on Dundas street. He conducted this for some time, but after the store was destroyed by fire he took a position as traveller for a Montreal firm. Later he was appointed to the inland revenue department and held that position un-til he was superannuated in 1899.Since then he had been living retired.

## TO CO-OPERATE IN **MISSION FIELDS**

Joint Committee of Three Denominations Agree On Plan.

**TO** STOP OVERLAPPING

Unnecessary Multiplication of

Toronto, March 18-A comprehensis plan of co-operation in the home mis-sion field for the adjustment of over-lapping in existing fields, the arranging of religious work in new district and work among the foreign nationali-ties has just been announced by th ties has just been announced by the joint committee on co-operation in home mission work, representing the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Churches. The committee recommends the immediate appointment, by the local authorities of the various c urches, of the committees necessar, to render the plan effective.

The movement for inter-denominational co-operation in home mission work was initiated by the Presbyterian Church in March 1908, and at once enlisted the sympathy of the Methodist and Congregational Churches. The work of each diocese being entirely under the control of the bishop of the diocese, the Church of England was unable to take up the proposal in a general way. But the joint committee has decided to send each bishop a copy of the plan of co-operation, and to extend to him a very cordial invitation to co-operate with the joint committee in his diocese. The Baptist Church stated frankly that it could not, consistently with its principles, enter into any scheme of co-operation except among the non-English-speaking settlers.

The investigation of the joint committee has shown that while there is not as much overlapping in the home mission field on the part of their respective churches as many people supposed, there are more than the chorus girls.


