

C. OF C. OBJECT TO **NEW REGULATIONS**

Customs Law Requiring the Marking of Goods, Impracticable.

The committee of the chamber of commerce will shortly submit to the department of customs objections to the proposed new customs regulations regarding the marking of imported should go into effect on the 1st of October last but owing to protests lodged, postponement was authorized until Dec. 21, of this year. As some of the regulations are considered to be mpracticable it is hoped that there hiay be a further postponement, or at any rate considerable modification of

present requirements. The regulations provide that all goods imported into Canada, which are capable of being marked, stamped branded or labeled without injury, shall be marked in legible English or French words in a conspicuous place that shall not be covered or obscured by any subsequent attachments, so as to indicate with the marking to a bazaar, for which Mrs. G. L. Machanar, for which M be as nearly indelible and permanent as the nature of the goods will permit.

Where the goods are not so marked an additional 10 per cent ad valorem will be levied on the value for duty purposes, and the goods shall be held by the customs until the marking is done. Violation of the terms of the regulations is punishable by a fine of \$1,000 or a year's imprisonment, or

Importers interested in this matter are asked to communicate immediately with the Chamber of Commerce.



HALF WATERLOO'S VOTERS WILL BE DISFRANCHISED

KITCHENER Nov. 2 .- (By Canadian Press.)-In the town of Waterloo more than half the voters will be disfranchised if they do not register. The lists which are being used are the municipal lists of last year, and contain only the names of property owners and tenants. Thus the great majority of all women, married or single, as well as all men who are not assessed, will be unable to vote unless their names are added by the two registrars, to whom appli-cation must be made in person or by a relative or employer. In Kitchener the conditions are dif-

ferent, a supplementary list consist-ing of qualified women and manhood franchise voters having been prepared, to which comparatively few names need be added. But in Waterloo there will be a wholesale disfranchisement unless there is general registration.

The Murdock Charges.
