Vienna, Oct. 5.-As an outcome of the conference between the Czar and Emperor Francis Joseph at Muerzsteg, the Governments of Austria and Russia have sent the following identical telegram to the ambassadors of those countries in Constantinople. The telegrams were couched in the following

"You were recently instructed to declare that Austria-Hungary and Russia adhere to the task of pacification which they have undertaken and are resolved to persevere with the program drawn up at the beginning of the year, notwithstanding the difficulties hitherto opposed to its execution. For indeed, while on the one hand the redisturbances and deterred the Chrisvolutionary committees have provoked tain population of the three vilayets from co-operating in the execution of the reforms, on the other hand the representatives of the sublime Porte intrusted with their application have sary zeal, and have not been imbued with the idea which inquired these measures.



The British Columbia Elections

The British Columbia elections on Saturday leave provincial politics still The result is a defeat Liberal victory is apparently not decisive enough to insure a Liberal ad-The nominal Liberal leader, Hon. Joseph Martin, and two members of the McBride cabinet-Hon. A. E. Goodeve, in Rossland-have been defeated. The defeat of Mr. Martin after a somewhat prolonged residence ot a crushing blow to the Liberals. many of whom regard him as too erratic for the leadership.

For the first time, Socialists have elected representatives to a Canadian legislature. They get two seats, Nanaime and Newcastle. The Conservative member for Nelson is also a Socialist. The situation is further complicated by the election of one or two labor members on the straight party ticket. With such a tangle of parties and no single one of them having a majority over all the others. it is difficult to see how a government can be carried on.

This is the first provincial election in British Columbia on party lines, and it was hoped that a victory for one or the other would give the province a term of comparatively stable and toms. orderly administration. The result on Saturday has no federal significance, as personal and local considerations will not play as great a part when Dominion issues are placed before the

A Tariff Proposition.

The statisticians are working overtime on the preferential trade problem Turkish descent. and we propose to do a little figuring,

Mr. Chamberlain suggests that a tariff could be imposed on foreign foodentering the British market withadding to the burdens of the Britworking classes, simply by a transfer of taxation, say from tea to corn.

The British people in 1902 paid in customs duties on tea £5,792,966, or in round figures, \$28,000,000. Tea is an article of general consumption, in no country more so than in Great Britain. There are not many British workingmen's families that do not use tea, and a workingman uses as much as a duke, though probably a less expensive qual-

In average years Great Britain imports 130,000,000 bushels of wheat, of which 30,000,000 comes from the colonies -chiefly Canada. A tariff of 10 cents per bushel on foreign wheat, supposing 100,000,000 bushels of foreign wheat nued to be imported, would yield \$10,000,000 per year, as against \$28,000,which the British people now pay in taxes on tea.

Of course, if the tax on foreign wheat raised the price of home-grown wheat by the same amount, these calculations would have to be revised; but as the British wheat crop ranges from 50,000,-000 to 70,000,000 bushels, the British people could pay 10 cents more per bushel for all the wheat they consume, and still pay less than the amount of the tea tax. The advocates of preferential trade, however, argue that the price of wheat would not be raised by the amount of the tax, owing to the stimulus that would be given to colonial production, and the fact that the foreign exporters would have to pay a portion

of the tariff. New York, Oct. 5-Noon.—A reactionary tendency manifested itself in the market during the next bour end, half and during the past hour and a half, and substantial declines resulted from the higher prices of early morning. Weak-ness in the Steel stocks is somewhat of an influence toward easing off, but the whole list has succumbed to a change in sentiment. It is true that this ser 'mental change is not very much, but it is sufficient to be a weakening factor. All stocks show the same reactionary cendency, and there is a complete lack of buying power. The traders have been liquidating their holdings at the higher prices. This has inspired the decline also. The selling of various issues began to-wards the end of the first hour, and bearish operations were in evidence. The resisting power of the market does seem to be so great as usual. Such stocks as Baltimore and Ohio, Pennsylvania, St. Paul, Union Pacific. Missouri Pacific and Louisville and Nashville have declined from 1 to 1½ points. New York Central presented a fairly firm front. The Erie stocks were heavily sold, but generally well taken. Manhattan and Brooklyn Rapid Transit, together with Copper, sold down easily.
