DAMAGED BY FIRE

Charles R. Atkinson Suffers to the Extent of \$4,000.

had no Insurance—Spontaneous Com-bustion Supposed to Have Caused the Blaze.

At about 8.30 on Saturday night a fire broke out in the residence of Chas. fire broke out in the residence of Chas.

R. Atkinson, Q. C., Park avenue. The origin of the blaze has not been definitely determined but the family incline to the belief that it started near one of the radiators on the second floor. The fire had apparently gained but little headway when it was first noticed and Mr. Atkinson and family thought they could put it out themselves without calling the fire brigade out for a run through the mud.

For some minutes they worked and at last, a very few minutes to nice o'clock, the alarm was sent in by telephone and the department summoned to the score of what proved to be a serious blaze. Pending the arrival of the department the family continued as best they could to check the progress of the flames. But the slarm had been given late, the roads were almost too much for a single borse on the reel, and the fire had made considerable headway before the brigade could reach the spot and get a stream playing upon the burning building. Seeing what they had to contend with. Chief Jacques sent back to the hall two or three times for more hose, and four lines were brought to bear.

The fire was in the front upper portion of the building and by good-work against great odds the firemen managed to confine it to this part which was, however, completely guited. The upper part of the house was left a wreck though the walls and roof are practically whole, and all below was thoroughly denched with blackened water. The loss will be heavy.

A good deal of the furniture from the ground floor was taken out and the rain which during the fire was coming down in torrents damaged it considerably. Mr. Atkinson's magnificent conservatory escaped uninjured.

Thieves were evidently at work and made the best of their opportunities. A great deal of silverware had been taken out among the salvage and Mr. Atkinson reported to the police this morning that a large amount of it is missing.

How the fire started is not known. There was nothing up stairs to which it can be attributed and no other explanation than spontaneous combustion can be given.

The loss will run up to about \$4,000. No insurance.





London Letter: The street dogs of Constantinopie are a feature of that city. hey go about unowned and uncared for, and acquire a wonderful knack of looking after themselves. The instinct which enables these proritamps to tell the time is the most astonishing thing about them. Day after day, at regular hours, when the scraps are thrown out, they are never much too carly and never too late.

The superintendent of one of the great railway lines ending in Constantinopie records a most remarkable case. The Oriental express, the famous train from Paris to Constantinopie, ar avest three times a week at a certain hour in the afternoon. When the train comes in there are always several dogs ready to receive it. Before the passengers have had time to get out, the dogs jump into the carriages and search everywhere under the seats and in the corners for the scraps of luncheon left by the passengers, and when they have found all the pieces they go away. The remarkable thing is that they never ome at any time except when the Oriental express is due; that they never make a mistake in a day, and always remember that between Friday and Monday there are two days and not one. They pay no "attention to local trains, because little or no, food is left in them, owing to the short journeys the passengers tab. Exactly this same knowledge of the time table and of the difference between local and long distance trains has been noticed at the stations of the Asiatic railways in Scutari, across the Bosphorus.

WHICH ARE AGAINST THE NEWS-PAPERS—AN INTERESTING ADDRESS BY JOHN KING, Q. C.

(From The Globe)

At the meeting of the Canadian Press Association, John King, Q. C. Toronto, an honorary member of the association, read a paper on "The Newspapers and the Courts." It contained a comprehensive review of the libel legislation of 1894, now embodied in the consolidated act of 1897, and its wapaper public. The merits and dects of the act of 1294, which, it is un the complainant. This was a preventive of litigation, to a certain extent

The provisions for consolidating The provisions for consolidating separate actions for the same libel were a boon to the newspapers. They enabled the defendants to act on the defensive with their united strength, caused a great saving in costs, reduced the damages against individual defendants, and distributed them equilably in certain cases over a number of defendants. They also discouraged and discredited persons who made a trade of bringing libel actions against newspapers. The courts had given effect to these sections of the act in a liberal spirit. The publisher was also allowed a remedy against a libellous contributor, which he had not before, but the good intended by the act, as it was originally drawn, had been almost nullified by a clause added in the House, which prevented a publisher claiming compensation, under the first clause of the section, against an anonymous contributor. Anonymity in the press was defended, and it was shown that the mutilation of the original section by the Legislature was unreasonable and unnecessary, and really operated against instead of in favor of the public. The question, what is an "anonymous" communication under the statute? was also discussed.

Westminister Hall, and was temperateby but distinctly condemed. Blackmailing libel actions brought by worthless persons, without any real grievance, for the purpose of extorting
money from publishers, were also
severely commented on, and a remedy
suggested. Journalists, as the literary
police of the nation, should be amply
protected against such professional
brigands. Publishers were warned
against expecting too much from
legislation. Many of the grievances
against the libel law were due to the
illiberal spirit in which, in some casee,
it was administered in the courts, the
anomalies and absurdities which still
prevailed in the civil practice and procedure, and the toleration extended to
technicalities and sharp practice.
Many other points of interest of journalists were commented on. In conclusion, Mr. King strongly advocated
the immediate formation of a National
Press Association on federal lines and
principles, composed of representatives
from the Provincial associations, and
having, amongst other objects, the endeavor to make uniform, as far as possible, the civil law of libel and the
procedure in libel actions in the different Provinces. The benefits of such
an association, as a factor in Canadian
journalism, and as supervisors and
and guardians of the law of the press,
were described as incalculable. The
mission of associated newspaper effort
in this country was far from being accomplished. Canadian journalism
must develop; with the bation; its
march must be conward and upward; it
must follow, with commensurate and
