**GREAT BRITAIN.**—The frequent visits of Sir James Clark to Her Majesty indicate the approach of an event "in which the nation takes a deep interest."—  
The English Parliament occupying the attention of the House of Commons for two weeks now, has long been notorious as the opportunity of the metropolis; namely, the existence of Smithfield Cattle Market in the heart of the city, and the practice pursued by the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's, of turning that cathedral into a show-house, and extracting two pence from every person who comes to be remedied by a vote of 200 against 65, a Government Bill has been passed for the extinction of Smithfield, and for the establishment of a market or market, removed from the town; and with regard to St. Paul's, it was last night voted, that the principal area of the building will be for the public worship of God, and that, in the rear, there will be a suitable hall for the approaching exhibition, the Ecclesiastical dignitaries having been charmed out of their resistance by the position they would occupy in the eyes of the various foreigners who on their arrival were likely to be shocked by the prevalence of such a scene.

The English Parliament has given a decided demonstration in Edinburgh in the 22nd. The list of new acts, it is said, already numbers 250 noblemen and gentlemen. The Liverpool American Chamber of Commerce has been partially successful in getting an alteration in the constitution of the docks of that city. The Liverpool station is determined in the name of Mr. W. H. of Kinsale, County Cork.

The importation of ice upon a large scale, from Norway to London, is creating some commotion at home.

A grand Masonic ceremony took place at Glasgow on Wednesday, on the occasion of laying the foundation stone of the New York Bridge over the Hudson River, the stone being brought from New York.

No less than sixty-four lodges were present from various parts of the kingdom. The Duke of Atholl performed the ceremony of laying the first stone.

Several more sessions to the Church of Rome are called, and it is said that the Pope, in his desire to take steps to prevent the same, has issued a decree.

The "Omnibus Act Extension" Bill for the protection of inventions exhibited by foreigners, has passed the House of Lords, and a second reading in the Commons. It is judged to fully adequate to its purpose. Among other matters significant in the approaching session, is the proposed Colonization Bill, which has been announced that "Americans in London may be supplied with Indian corn bread incomparably superior to any ever before made in England, by applying at his establishment."

On the 25th of March, 1850, there were 2,051 vessels in the work-harbor of London and Wales, and 2,000 in the river, making 50,181.

An inmate of Steyning Union died from chloroform this week, administered to him, at his own request, previous to undergoing an operation.

Mr. Labouchere was returned in the House of Commons on Friday, that in London alone more than 10,000 tons of iron steamers had been built on foreign account during the past year.

The Colonization Bill, which had been agreed to in the House of Commons, was agreed to in the House of Lords.

Lord Russell would not object to the motion, believing it to be a step which some attempt to be made to settle the question.

Sir H. H. Innes is severely ill, and Mr. Bright supported the motion.

After a few words by Mr. B. Hope, Mr. Heyworth, and Mr. Leonard, the motion was agreed to.

Lord Ashby then moved for leave to bring in a Bill to encourage the construction of harbors, docks, &c., in Ireland, and to make the same available for the navigation of foreign ships.

The bill was introduced in the House of Commons on Friday, that in Ulster alone, it is estimated, 50,000 tons of iron steamers have been built, and every vessel is now ready for exportation.
