"POLITICAL CLERGYMEN"

Because of its characteristic court-ess, we do not complain of the spirit with which the Western Chronicle criticizes our article of last week, dealing with its patron Saint, Rev. Dr. J. A. MacDonald, but we most decidedly decline to accept its definition of any comparison as between a clergyman, who from the press gallery at Ottawa, sends a despatch to the Toronto Globe, of which paper he is Editor-in-Chief, when analysed by a reputable authority discovered in one column and a half, no less than "twenty seven separate and distinct falsehoods," and the noble body of Christian clergymen in this county, who at much personal inconvenience to themselves, went into political campaigns on behalf of the "Kings County" Temperance Alliance, and the principles of "Moral Reform."

We can understand how distasteful it will be to Sir Frederick Borden, ex-minister of militia and defense, and Mr. Harry Wickwire, the appointed and would have been Attorney General of Nova Scotia, that their personal mouth piece and political organ, should have sought to compare these Kings County ministers of the gospel, with that reverend editor of the Toronto Globe, who is about as completely severed from a Christian minister as is a sane Liberal citizen of Canada from those fanatical political Doukhobours at Ottawa, who crazed, and not in their right minds, go on pilgrimages of obstruction, knowing neither where they are going or what they are going for - MacDonald, D. D., and other hysterical blockers, together with the militant suffragettes, seem to be victims of the same wave of madness. Inverted mentally, topsy turvy, where lies hold good, as elsewhere truth holds good.

He uses, describing Mr. Borden, all the holy invectives found in the Book of Revelations, all the controversial religious literature of the days of John Knox - epithets, malicious, and coarse abuse, culled from a hysterical vocabulary, all aimed at the gentlemanly son of Kings County parents, a son that our country is proud of - with all his language, this Reverend minister seeks to express the air of a consecrated prophet rebuking sin, and with the sublime assurance of a spiritual and moral potentate.

The Western Chronicle will be wisely advised to drop a comparison between the rough coated, cloven footed MacDonald, and Christian reformers of this county.

The fire spread with terrific speed and in three hours had consumed two blocks, including thirteen of the largest business places in the town, among which were the Vendome Hotel, McCallum's drug store, the Slater building, J. W. Ingraham & Co., Robertson's and A. M. Ross's jewellery stores, Kirk and Whitman, Bent and Cohoon, Moore building, W. S. Rice, Freeman Rudd, rham drug store, Vooght Bros' warehouse, Fraser's restaurant, Robert Musgrave's building, Y. M. C. A. boat house and several smaller buildings. The fireman's heroic work saved the town from total destruction, Sydney and Sydney Mines were telephoned for assistance and rendered timely and valuable aid.



AN ELECTION LIST "SCANDAL" THAT BECAME A BOOMERANG

The House of Assembly took one day off last week, despite the fact that the legislature was in its eleventh week. This was not that the Murray Government were anxious to have a holiday, for they are not. The session is proving so severe an ordeal for them that the sooner it is over the better they will be pleased, and they look forward with longing eyes to the end of their tribulations for this year. The day they took had to be given, however, because the committee having the terrible tuberculosis scandal in hand desired to go to Truro for a personal inspection of the government farm. The evidence before the committee is not publicly known, but it is understood to be of a most incriminating nature and the visit to Truro will likely forget another link in the chain of disgraceful scandal. Friday was accordingly spent by the committee in Truro and the depleted house adjourned from Thursday till Monday of this week.

THE TABLETS TURNED

The tables were turned on the government by the opposition in connection with the mare's nest alleged to have been discovered by H. H. Wickwire, member for King's. That gentleman brought in a charge that conservative revisors in his county had improperly added twelve conservative names to the list, and struck off four liberal names and he proposed a bill to change this. Mr. Tanner showed by original documents that there was nothing in the charge but the government pressed for a committee of inquiry. Then came the foolish action of the government majority in refusing the other inquiry which showed the ridiculous character of their position.

"REVISION" IN VICTORIA COUNTY. J. C. Douglas and R. H. Butte, conservative members for Cape Breton, formulated charges that the lists in Victoria, Premier's own county had been padded and juggled with—that conservatives were refused an opportunity of giving evidence by the sheriff. What is more, one of the lists contained 140 names that should not have been there. The nefarious transaction was given away on the railway train between the Grand Narrows and the straits, some weeks ago, by a man named Lodge, who boasted of the "padding" of the English Town lists.

THE SHOE ON THE OTHER FOOT

What could be worse than this? And yet Premier Murray took the stand that still Mr. Wickwire should get an investigating committee but he could not agree that there should be an inquiry into the charges brought by Mr. Douglas regarding the wrongful revision of the lists in his own country of Victoria. "The shoe was on the other foot," he might have added, and he did say it in his action though not in words.

THE FACTS IN KING'S

In regard to the Kings County affair Mr. Tanner brought original documents to prove that the twelve names now on complained of by Mr. Wickwire were entitled to be there and the four the bill proposed to put on were qualified voters in that district. It seems that these two names were agreed upon as eligible by the three revisors of Kings County, while the four were to be stricken off the list. The two conservative revisors trusting their liberal confere by signing his book in blank, trusting to his honesty to make a correct copy of the list: for his own district passed by the revisors on March 5th. This he did not do, but left off the twelve eligibles and added the four ineligible. Immediately after the filing of the list, the two other revisors, with a citizen of Kings County, went to the Municipal Clerks Office and straightened the list out making it correct. Yet the government proposed to give Mr. Wickwire "an investigating committee" though, when the charges of illegal revision were made regarding Victoria County, represented by Premier Murray, they said "no".



Wolfville Board of Trade Re-Organized

The Wolfville Board of Trade which has been dormant for some time was re-organized at a meeting held Friday evening, 18th inst.

Mr. J. F. Herbin, who was president of the Board when it last met, took the chair and Secretary Wheaton read the minutes of the last meeting, held on April 20th, 1910. It was decided that the Board should take on activity and the following officers were elected:

President—B. O. Davison
Vice-President—J. B. Tingley
Sec.-Treas.—A. M. Wheaton
Council—J. F. Herbin, S. M. Beardsley, J. D. Chambers, J. E. Hales, C. R. Bill, A. M. Young, D. B. Shaw, C. M. Gormley.

Auditors—R. E. Harris and W. M. Black. It was decided to remit all amount due the Board from its members and make a fresh start. The annual fee was placed at fifty cents, and the following members were enrolled, paid the fee and signed the constitution: W. H. Chase, J. D. Chambers, Rev. R. F. Dixon, J. F. Herbin, R. E. Harris, J. B. Tingley, C. M. Gormley, C. R. Bill, A. M. Young, S. M. Beardsley, J. E. Hales, B. O. Davidson, Rev. G. W. Miller, D. B. Shaw, A. M. Wheaton.

The following were appointed chairmen of the various standing committees, the other members to be added when the membership of the Board has been increased: Tourist Committee—J. F. Herbin; Streets and Public Property Committee—W. H. Chase; Publicity Committee—C. M. Gormley; A Membership Committee composed of Capt. Tingley, A. M. Young and R. E. Harris was appointed with the object of increasing the number of members as rapidly as possible.

It will be the policy of the Board to take whatever steps may be pedesible from time to time to advance interests of the town and the section surrounding it. With this in view it was decided to take immediate action in the direction of securing from the proper authorities a drop-letter box at the railway station. Messrs W. H. Chase and R. E. Harris were appointed as a committee to prepare a petition to be sent to the Post Office Department and the representative of the county. A number of other matters were discussed after which the meeting adjourned to meet again Friday evening.

The meetings will be held in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall, and the citizens generally are asked to manifest their interest by a large attendance and enthusiasm in the work of the Board.

New Life In The Annapolis Valley

Reconstruction of the Dominion Atlantic Railway

The Dominion Atlantic Railway is practically being reconstructed. Under Canadian Pacific ownership this valuable property is being brought up to a standard worthy of the parent road.

For two years, or more, a staff of engineers-specialists in bridge construction have been engaged in replacing some ten or twelve bridges with modern structure, and some of these, especially those over tidal rivers, are very difficult and expensive undertakings. The Avon River bridge, at Windsor, 1,100 feet long, has nine spans; Moose River bridge, 655 feet long, with 16 spans. The Allen's River Bridge, at Annapolis Royal, 714 feet long, including approaches, is the first to be completed. The new location of this bridge made it necessary to divert the main line for some distance on both sides of the stream. The long bridge over the Sissiboo River, at Weymouth, will probably be reconstructed this summer, and a new draw-span placed in the Shubenacadie River bridge on the Midland Division. The substructures of these bridges are concrete and the superstructures steel, designed to carry the heaviest locomotives and rolling stock. In addition to the above many small bridges and culverts of permanent character are replacing the existing types.

Many miles of 85 pound steel rails are being laid and the road ballasted.

A brick station and freight house, of attractive design, replaces the wooden building at Wolfville, and we understand the management have under consideration the erection of similar types of station buildings at two or three other points.

One journeying over this railway might imagine themselves on a giant trans-continental line just being completed, for everywhere along the right-of-way are encountered working trains, gang camps, strings of boarding and sleeping cars of the Permanent Way Department, steam shovels, steel derricks. The sharp staccato burring of rock drills is heard, and from the river beds far below lazily rise thin clouds of steam from pile drivers and float engines. Cement mixers grind and clank, and everywhere is the scene of activity and vigorous growth.

It must not be forgotten either that real new railway construction is going on in connection with the Dominion Atlantic subsidiary line—the North Mountain Railway. This branch will run west from Centreville Kings Co., for 14.5 miles, under the North Mountain, traversing a real forest of Apple Orchards for the entire length, and is to be ready for the fall traffic of 1913. Stations will be located at Billtown, Lakeville, Woodville, Grafton, Somerset and Weston.

It is a matter of current rumor that the improvement for 1913 will not be confined to the permanent way, but will show itself in improved passenger carrying equipment.—The Maritime Merchant.

—On Sunday last the Rev G. T. Bryant of Berwick, exchanged pulpits with Rev. W. M. Ryan of the Windsor Methodist Church. In the evening Mr. Bryant's discourse was on the loss of the S. S. Titanic.—Tribune.
