RECORD OF THE CARS

MOST RECENT NEW PLAN DEvised TO KEEP TRACK OF THEM

A Novel System by Which Railways are to Check-Impossible for Cars or Engines to Go Astray Except Through Gross Carelessness.

Ever since railroads were first organized it has been found necessary to keep a record of the movements and location of all classes of equipment. At first the methods employed for this purpose were crude and unsatisfactory, but as the years went by new methods were adopted; in fact a number of years ago the most recent method now in vogue are found to be inadequate to meet the demands. Recently, however, experiments have been made, and the new system of car records, invented by W. E. Booth, is being put into effect.

The new method is a very radical departure from all others because it abolishes the use of books, pens, inks, pencils, and signatures, and these articles are replaced by a series of typewriter machines fitted with an attachment for holding a roll of paper tape. This tape is an inch wide and is perforated into detachable tags exactly one inch square, having a hole punched through them at the upper end for the purpose of hanging them on pins. The back of all car records is the conductors' records, usually made at the end of each trip, which show, besides other necessary information, the number of each car, the number of the train, the number of the station from which car was taken and at which left, and the date of movement.
