To Teach British to Eat "Wild Food."

Woman food experts have started a country-wide campaign to teach British housewives what food economy means and how to use neglected resources in England's "wild food."

The women have started a campaign after the fashion of an electrifying tour in this country. They are making speeches in theatres, public halls and from soap boxes on street corners.

The possibilities of wild food are declared by our expert to be so great that country people and the inhabitants of small towns can supply two-thirds of their needs for at least three-quarters of the year from the fields, woods and streams of their immediate neighborhood. This expert declares that there are more than 200 kinds of food in the British Isles which nature produces unassisted. They include birds and their eggs, edible frogs, fishes, molluscs, some insects and insect products, such as the honey of half a dozen species of wild bees, various crustaceans, more than thirty vegetables, salad plants and herbs, the same number of flowers and fruits, seven species of seaweed and nearly fifty esculent fungi.

The campaign is under the direction of Mrs. C. B. Peel and Mrs. Pemberton; directors of the Women's Service in the Ministry of Food. The speakers are picked volunteers and are given special instructions before starting on tour.

Canada's War Efforts.

Writing in 'World's Work,' Mr. Burton J. Hendrick, a noted American journalist, has this to say of Canada's effort in the war:

'But, properly to appreciate the magnitude of this effort, let us seek comparisons that will give it meaning. The total mental population of the United States—exclusive of dependences—is about thirteen times as large as that of Canada; if we

take the whole of the population of Canada's own capacity, measured in terms of our own capacity. That is, if we should do more than Canada has done, we should enlist roughly 5,000,000 men, and overseas 3,640,000 of whom 2,275,000 would have already seen service at the front. We should keep in the firing line fifty-two divisions, or about 1,000,000 soldiers. Our casualties would have reached, up to date, 910,000 and nearly 200,000 Americans would have sacrificed their lives. Certainly, if the United States could show any such record as this, we should probably think that we had made a solid contribution to represent precisely what Canada has done.'

"Buy-at-Home" Campaign Gains Momentum Since Inauguration Month Ago.

BUSINESS MEN EXCEEDINGLY GRATIFIED AT RESULTS OF MOVE BEGUN LAST MONTH—MERCHANTS WONDERING WHY IT WAS NOT BEGUN BEFORE.

Immense momentum was gained during last month by the "Buy-at-Home" Campaign, inaugurated by merchants of Wolfville and the movement has become the talk of the town.

A dry goods merchant is loud in his support of the movement. He finds a lot of people, he says, who had good intentions but had never thought of buying goods at home unless almost necessary.

"Many people have the idea that the attractive mail order catalogues are truthful and that they will get just what they order at the supposed price," he said.

Contrast these ideal conditions with those prevailing when you buy outside your own town, conditions which have been sketched above—you absolutely cannot get a guarantee any time in advance of how much goods will cost.

In the second place, you can buy cheaper at home than you can away from home. Listen! Ask any one of your friends who have been on a trip lately if they found prices higher or lower in the big cities.

And the reason is perfectly obvious. The merchants in the big cities do not buy as much goods, comparatively speaking, as do the merchants in the smaller cities and towns.

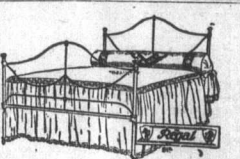
