### APPLE STORAGE TROUBLES

Trouble with apples spoiling in common storage many times is traced to faulty construction of the storage house that can be overcome by slight changes or better management, the United States Department of Agriculture has found. The first consideration, it is said, is the condition of the fruit when it is stored. Apples that are bruised or diseased, too green or overripe, or that are of a variety known to keep but a short time cannot be stored satisfactorily.

But, even with the apples carefully selected, the fruit may not keep because o certain conditions in the storage house particularly those relating to temperature The storage house must be like a thermout during the warm days and holding it during the very cold ones. This result can be obtained only if the building is properly ventilated ulated. Insulation is effected by filling the hollow walls with ground cork eral wool, shavings, or other material that will keep the heat from passing through. So that there will be no leak, the doors are insulated the same as the walls, and there should be as few windows

ventilation is provided by n Ventilation is provided by means of opening near the ground under the floor, for cool air to enter and air shafts leading upwards from the ceiling to carry off the warm air. These are kept open during the night or the cooler part of the day—in the fall—and are closed during the hot hours. The arrangement of the boxes in the storage house has much to do with proper-ventilation. The best arrangement is one that permits the air to circulate around each senerate box. This can late around each seperate box. This can be managed by leaving a space around each pile of boxes and by placing cleats between the boxes in the pile.—Canadian Horticulturist.

SOLDIER

Will be Brought From Western Battle front and Buried Beneath Victory Tower, Ottawa

OTTAWA, November 25.—The body of an unknown Canadian Soldier is to be brought from the Old Western Battlefront and buried beneath the Victory Tower of the new Parliament Buildings.

It is proposed that the body shall be placed in a vault excavated in the solid rock foundation under the great archway of the Victory Tower and between the two portals which give entrance to the buildings.

The grave will be set almost immediately below the altar in the memorial chamber overhead and will be marked by a marble slab raised above the grave level. This slab will be suitably inscribed. Thus, all who enter the Parliament Buildings, through the two portals under the arch-way of the tower, whether legislators on their way to their duties, or citizens on their way to memorial chamber above. vill pass by the last resting place of one who, representing many, was faithful in duty unto death, and whose dust will hallow the place dedicated ro his memory and that of all of his fellows

As the tower has not yet reached completion, and as the arrangements which would have to be made will rake some time, it is unlikely that the ceremony will take place before Armistice Day,

The action taken comes as the result of suggestions to the Government from various persons and organizations, and as the result of conferences between the Prime Minister, Sir James Lougheed and representatives of the Great War Veteran's Association. The final consulation took place on Wednesday, when the Prime Minister and Sir James Lougheed conferred with R. B. Maxwell, President of the G. W. V. A., and C. G. MacNeil, Secretary-Treasurer. Further conferences were held with John A. Pearson, the architect of the new House of Parliament, and elaborate plans are being prepared.

#### FEEDING TABLE SCRAPS

There is no better food for a flock of chickens than table scraps. Scraps of meat or left-over vegetables, vegetable tops and parings, outside leaves of cabbage, lettuce and such like, stale bread and cake, cereals, sour milk and so on have lost none of their feeding value because they are no longer desired by the human appetite. Fowls will eat them with the greatest relish.

It is a mistake, however, to regard such table scraps as garbage and to feed them as such to the chickens. Decomposed waste matter and sloppy materials, such as dishwater, should not be fed to the flock. Provide a special receptacle for the scraps which are suitable for the chickens, and feed these scraps in a fresh, sweet, wholesome anner. A good plan is to run the scraps through a grinder, then if the material

# Twenty Million Dollars to be Spent in Pictou County

NEW GLASGOW, Nov. 29.-It is learned here tonight that British capital to the extent of five million pounds sterling has been pledged to finance the develop-ment of the vast and rich Pictou County oil shale field, lying within the southern boundary of New Glasgow and east of Stellarton. One million pounds (upwards of five million dollars at normal exchange will, it is stated, be made immediately available to be spent during the coming year, work to begin when the season opens and weather permits. The balance of the capital to be provided "as and when

This good news comes following a conference in New York between a representative of the holding company and representatives of Great Oil Organizations of Great Britain and of the Petroleum Executive of the British Government, of which Sir John Cadman is the chairman, succeeding Sir Boverton Redwood, the world's greatest oil ex-pert, who died in 1918.

There will, it is stated, be behind the enterprise some of the foremost technol-ogists and executives in the Empire, the whole to be under the aegis of a world famed oil organization, acting in conform ity with the wishes of the Imperial author

It is understood that Colonel Thos Cantley, during his visits to Europe of late years, was in touch with the exe utives referred to, and during the past summe two scientific officers of the Anglo-Persian Co. visited this county, returned home and reported. 
