Accomps of the anniversary passage to London, of a few of them gone though for which do honor to the patriotism of the British nation, have reached us. They do not exhibit any falling off in the force of their present efforts.

The nation of the British and French, who made for the last year, amounted to 500,000, and the total sum of British Troops by it, to 600,000.

The Wesleyan Missionary Society, at present employs 270 Missionaries, assisted by 200 Converts, who have under their charge about 50,000 Church Members. In the Mission Schools there are 42,750 scholars, children and adults. The contribution to the anniversary was above \$2000 one gentleman gave \$2000, and another \$1000.

The efforts of the Church Missionary Society were equally grand. The total sum for the year was \$26,500, and fifty two new Associations had been formed.

There is one fault we have to find with the Kickerbocker, which the generally interesting name of its contents only aggravates, and that is, the irregularity of its appearance.
