SOURCES OF THE NUTRITIOUS PROPERTY OF VEGETABLES. The nearishing property of cora, wheat and other grains, is glu-ten contained in them. And this gluten consists, in great part, of mitrogen. It is of course an important object with the farmer, to increase the proportion of gluten, and that is done by supplying ad-ditional sitrogen is the aliment of the plant. Carbonic acid and water are the chief sources of grouts. Nitrogen is the principal sement constituting the nutritive quality. The atmosphere con-tains a large quantity of nitrogen. WEEDS.—The cost of a crop of sturdy weeds is often much greater to the farmer than that of an equal bulk of the most valua-ble grains. All weeds exhaust the soil without yielding any return; therefore, the aliment extracted from the corn, or out-field, by a weed, is a 'clear loss.' Berides this it produces a numerous pro-geny, if it matures—sends its germs, broudcast, upon the besom of the restless winds over the fields, and thus perpetuates an evil which when it has once been suffered to develope, it is difficult if not im-nosible to aveccome. when it has once been suffered to develope, it is difficult if not im-possible to overcome. 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THE VOLTAIC LEMON.— The celebrated Professor Bakoffner has been making some experiments lately at the London Poly-technic Institution with a new magnetic or electric vegetable pile, discovered by Dr. Le Molt, a surgeon. 
