



Fighting 26th **Battalion Returns**

fax N. S. at 2.30 p. m. Friday after-noon, bearing New Brunswicks' Fighting 26th Battalion

Whistles blew, horns blasted, and great excitement; prevailed every where. Great throngs were crowded into one vast clamor of tension, and pressed forward towards the pier.

The 26th Batt. was the last unit to leave the vessel, being preceded by 22nd, 24th, 25th, 29th, Royal Mounted Police, 2nd Field Ambulance and 2nd Divisional Ammunition

At 10.15 p. m. the 26th Battalion left Halifax amid rousing cheers for St. John, N. B., arriving there at 2 p. m. Saturday.

St. John turned out "en masse" to greet the returned heroes. After parading to the Armory, they were served with a generous meal provided for them by the different societies and afterwards received their dis-

The Chief engagements in which the 26th took part, were: St. Eloi; Third Battle of Ypres; Courcellette; Vimy Ridge; Hill 70; Passchendaele; Amiens; Arras and Cambrai.

At the battle of Arras, the Canadians swept forward against strongly fortified positions, taking their objectives with clock work regularity in spite of all the force the Huns could oring to bear against them. Joy, over their victory and over the splendid achievements of the men of the 26th in this great battle, was dimmed by the loss of their brilliant commander, Lt. Col. A. E. G. McKenzie D. S. O. The battle had started on August 26th and it was on the third day, Aug-

ust 28th that Lt. Col. McKenzie fell was mourned wherever his me was known, for a gallant gentlemen and splendid soldier had passed away, after a career of great dison, just as victory was hovering over the banners of the Allies.

GUNS CAPTURED FROM GTRMANS Montreal, May 13—The steamer Vindelia brings an interesting and historic cargo into port, consisting of a score of captured guns which were wrested from the Germans by Canadian soldiers. Among the heavy artillery is abig gun which is labelled "2nd Canadian Division, 24 Batta-lion," and this is assigned to the Vic-toria Rifles, Montreal. No. 935 is the property of the 25th Battalion of Nova Scotia. There were others, but in Scotia. There were others, but in many cases they were illegibly markmany cases they were illegibly mark-ed. It seems particularly fitting that the Vindelia should bring over this cargo, for its commander, Captain Saunders, had the duty of taking over the Ivernia of the Cunard Line in the great Canadian armada that reached Plymouth in October, 1914, with the first division aboard.
