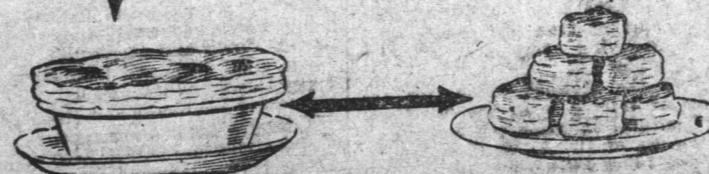



LONDON, April 11.—Rudyard Kipling has written his first play, but for some reason the matter is being kept a profound secret. Neither the title nor the plot is revealed, but the fact that all the characters are animals is known to Kipling's most intimate friends.

The characters are taken from the "Jungle Book," but the play cannot be called a dramatization of that work, as the stories are not followed, and the only animals capable of being costumed and acted are being selected.

The play is declared by those who have read it to be replete with Kipling humor and vitality. It is in no sense an imitation of "Chanticleer," although Kipling's animal characters like Rostand's, talk, understand and are endowed with human emotions. 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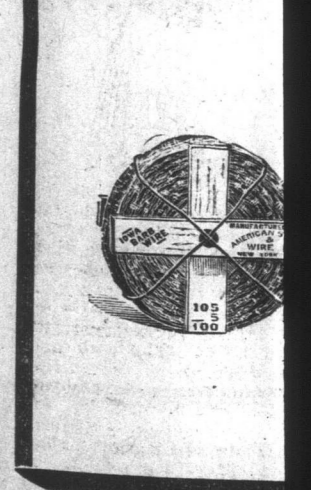

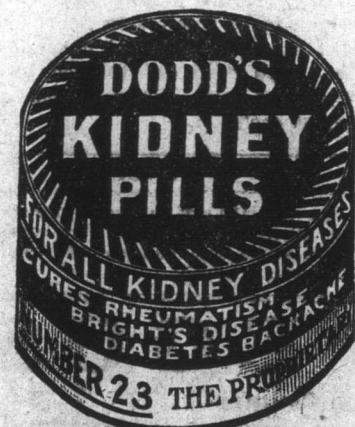

Imperial Trade and Industrial Committee

Important Action by the Royal Colonial Institute.

For some time past the Royal Colonial Institute has had under consideration the question of identifying itself in a more active manner with the furtherance of Empire trade and industrial interests, and at the last meeting of the Council it was agreed to form a representative Committee of men of affairs to carry out the Institute's work in this connection. This Committee will include amongst others Sir J. Bevan Edwards, K.C.M.G., Sir Godfrey Laiden, K. C. M. G., Sir Daniel Morris, K. C. M. G., The Hon. Sir Northwalle Rason, Mr. Henry Birchough, C. M. G., Mr. Richard Jebb, Mr. Ben. H. Morgan, Colonel John Denny, Major Archer Shee, M. P., Mr. Hugo Hirst (Chairman, Manufacturers' Association), Mr. Stanley Machin, Chairman, London Chamber of Commerce), Mr. Edward Manville (Chairman, Society of Motor Manufacturers and Trades), Sir W. Thomas and Mr. R. K. Morcom.

The work of this committee at the outset will include the arranging of industrial conferences with a view to regulating and co-ordinating Empire trade conditions, and by means of lectures at the Institute itself and before the Chambers of Commerce and other trade bodies and institutions throughout the country, to make more widely known the opportunities that exist in the Overseas Dominions for British trade and capital, and on the other hand, to place the British merchant and manufacturer in touch with the sources that are available within the Empire for the supply of raw materials and other products. It is hoped in this way to find an increased market for British goods in the Colonies, and, on the other hand, to increase the demand in Great Britain for Empire products. British Manufacturers, merchants, shippers, brokers and others interested in the work of this Committee are invited to communicate with the Secretary of the Institute at Northumberland Avenue, W. C.

Sealing Disaster at Magdalen Island

Six Men Were Frozen to Death on the Ice or Drowned—Four of the Victims Were Members of one Family—They Were Paddling Ashore When Overtaken by Disaster.

Grindstone, Magdalen Islands, via Pictou, April 7.—All hope for the finding alive of the six seal hunters who have been missing since Monday has been abandoned. The men were last seen at dusk on Monday afternoon and if they have not been drowned, have drifted too far away to be rescued, and have before now been frozen to death on the ice. Four of the missing men were married, and four belonged to the one family.

THE SEARCH FOR SEALS. Seals were seen to the north and northwest of West Point on Monday morning and all the hunters went north except two crews who went to the northwest, shifting to north with the ice running south very rapidly past West Point to the southward all day. Both crews that went northwest went to the seals but one took no seals considering it impossible to land them and got back to land after some trouble about 4 p.m.

STARTED FOR LAND. The other crew took three loads per man, about thirty-six old seals in all, and after hauling all day arrived at a glade of water about four miles to the leeward of the land. There they left the majority of the seals on the ice and took seven loads about fourteen seals, in tow of their skiff and started to paddle ashore. The shoremen considered that they were in no danger as they were still towing their seals at dark and making fair progress. When last seen they were half way ashore and near a strip of loose drift ice which they would have to cross and then paddle across about a mile of clear water to reach the shore.

FOUR OF ONE FAMILY. The names of the crew are Daniel Labelle, aged fifty-five years, married; Aristide Labelle, his son, aged thirty, married; Gregorie Vigneault, his son-in-law, aged thirty-five, married; Antoine Chaisson, his adopted son, aged twenty-four, single; Clivio Gallant, aged forty-four, married; and Phillip Boudreau, aged twenty-five, single.

The shore men expected them to arrive about nine p.m., but they were never seen after dark. The skiff either filled with water and sank or was broken in the ice which they were approaching at dark. In this case the men would go adrift on the ice and freeze to death. The wind was north all night and the next day and if the men were on the ice they would be too far from land to see or be rescued the next morning.

Newfoundland Poultry Association.

The regular meeting of the Newfoundland Poultry Association was held in the Department of Mines and Agriculture last night and was well attended. After the routine business was disposed of, a most interesting paper on "Artificial Incubators, ancient and modern," was read by Mr. W. Barker. He described the method of incubation in use by the Egyptians over two thousand years ago, where from 300,000 to 600,000 chickens were hatched in ovens by one incubator in a season of three months, and went on to describe the modern incubators, which hatch eggs varying in size from that of the Bantam to the eggs of the Ostrich, the machines varying in size from those with a capacity of a few dozen eggs to the mammoth machines having a capacity of from 20,000 to 80,000 eggs. A general discussion followed and the evening was heartily enjoyed by all.

Cost of Living.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day.

Copies of the report on the cost of living in American cities, based on enquiries made in 28 representative towns by officials of the British Board of Trade has been circulated in Parliament. The report covers questions of working class, rents, housing, retail prices of commodities, and wages in the States, which are compiled for the purpose of comparison with the conditions of workers in Britain and other countries. The conclusions reached are that the cost of food and rent combined are 52 per cent greater in the States than in England and Wales, but that these heavier relative charges on the working class income have been accompanied with weekly wages which are as 250 to 100. The report adds that the ratio of money earnings is more than 2 1/2 times as great as in England and Wales.

Negotiating Arbitration Treaty.

The Veto Bill.

SIR HENRY LUCY'S FORECAST.
The bill to curtail the powers of the House of Lords has now been in Committee of the House of Commons, according to a London cable despatch several days. Notices of many amendments have been given, and according to the intelligence mentioned, not even the first clause has been disposed of. Yesterday was set down for the adjournment of the House till the 18th inst., for the Easter holidays. Sir Henry Lucy, the well known parliamentary journalist, has made a forecast in the Tory Observer of the course which will be adopted by the Government. His statement is as follows:—

"If the House of Lords, content with making solemn protest, permit the Bill to pass on its presentation in May, there, of course, is an end on't. If they throw it out on the second reading, or finally emasculate it in Committee, Parliament will forthwith be prorogued. But only for a single day. Twenty-four hours after the opening Session of King George's first Parliament has met with sudden death the second will be at work again at Westminster. There will necessarily be all the formalities of a new Session, including a Speech from the Throne. But debate on the Address will be rigorously limited. The Parliament Bill will be reintroduced, hurried

Three Sealers Arrive.

Newfoundland, Viking and Florizel Arrive Here, With Over 70,000 Seals.
Sufferers From Smallpox on Newfoundland Taken to Hospital.

The S. S. Newfoundland, Captain Wesley Kean, arrived here at 12 last night with 15,000 seals and having smallpox on board, was placed on quarantine. When she arrived Dr. Brehm and Campbell boarded her and a flotilla of boats with police and specials on board kept about the ship to see that none of her crew were allowed ashore. The disease first made its appearance on March 20th on board, a man named Morgan, a relative of the resident of Seal Cove who was found ill of it on the train on March 16th, being affected. The man had fully developed it after a few days and then other of the crew became ill but could get about the ship and none knew the nature of the disease until Trinity was reached Monday, when a physician diagnosed it as smallpox and telegraphed here. Dr. Campbell remained on board the ship all night vaccinating those who had not been previously vaccinated. Sixteen of the crew are ill of the disease which is of the usual light type with most, though one, a fireman, named Shute, has a bad attack of the malady. After the men on the ship are disposed of she will be treated as the Harlaw was last year, i.e., fumigated and disinfected, within the next few days and allowed to discharge her fat. The tug Daisy has been commissioned to run to and from the ship and to-day is in service flying the yellow flag.

THE FLORIZEL'S VOYAGE.

The Florizel, Capt. A. Kean, arrived here at 5 a.m. to-day with 27,000 seals, 25,000 of which are young harps and 1,500 old hoods and harps. The ship's experience has already been published in the wireless messages received from her. She struck the fat with the other steel ships and the Bloodhound on the 16th March, and helped the others clean up the patch and then went after the hoods, going as far north as Greenly Island in the Straits, but found the ice so heavy that the ship could not penetrate it, and as no old seals were seen it was decided to return home. Monday and Monday night it was very stormy but the ship was in the ice and did not feel the effects of it. Some 400 old seals were shot Monday in the storm and the ship bore up at 10.15 a.m. yesterday 90 miles N.E., by N. of the Funks. (Capt. Kean has done well considering the experience of the fleet this spring. He has the weight of 30,000 seals.)

THE BLOODHOUND'S CRUISE.

Capt. Jacob Winsor, of the Bloodhound, arrived here by last night's train and from him the Telegram got the following particulars of his voyage: The ship, which has 22,000 seals with a few old harps and hoods struck the first patch with the Bloodhound on the 15th March, in the early morning north of the Funks. They took 5000 seals out of the first little patch, and next day in the large patch killed and packed down only herself and the Bonaventure there. She took 8,000 on the 17th. Then the Ranger, Diana and New Zealand came in. She was on the patch was cleaned up. The ship then went away north and has since been seeking the old fat, picking up scattered seals, and went down 80 miles east of Grovis Islands, and bore up Saturday at 11 a.m. She saw 7 ships steaming north Thursday last, evidently in quest of the hoods. She reached Westville at 2 p.m. Sunday, left at 5 p.m. and in the blizzard of Monday the ship had a terrible time of it. She steamed up the north side of Conception Bay and decided to get down to Bay de Verde, where all Monday night sea after sea swept her. Water ran down into the engine room in torrents, the pumps became choked with coal, and she dropped the port anchor with 65 fathoms of chain and the starboard with 45 fathoms. The ship kept at half speed to relieve the strain on the chains, and then the captain feared they would not hold. The sea ran mountains high and four hours the ship was in deadly peril. She lost half her sheathing, one boat was blown clean out of the davits and other damage was done. We congratulate Capt. Winsor on the success of his voyage.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND'S VOYAGE.

The report of the Newfoundland's voyage to the fishery is almost a duplicate of that of the Florizel, Beothic and other ships. She struck the patch on March 17th, but was handicapped by her reversing gear going out, but yet she managed to pick up out of the patch about 6000, and then went after the hoods and was the first to reach them. She hails for 18,000 old and young, and did well considering the unsatisfactory character of the spring.

VIKING HAS 17,500.

The S. S. Viking, Captain W. Bartlett, arrived from the Gulf at 1.45 a.m. to-day reporting for 17,500 prime young harps. She struck the seals on the 15th March, near the Bird Rocks, in company with the Southern Cross and Labrador. There was then no sign of the Kite or Harlaw and as

The Adventure Arrives

The s.s. Adventure, Capt. Jacob Kean, arrived from the sealeries at 2 p.m. to-day. The ship immediately went on quarantine until the crew are inspected by Dr. Campbell or Dr. Brehm. As far as can be known there is no sickness on the ship, and Mr. Harvey says there is no truth in the rumor as to two of her crew having died during the spring. The ship hails, as far as can be ascertained, for 27,000 seals, the weight of 30,000.

THE PORTIA SAILS WEST.—At 10 a.m. to-morrow and the Prospero will be locked Saturday for a general overhaul and clean up.

MORE BLACKLISTERS.—Yesterday a plater of Casey Street and a laborer of the same place were put on the black list. There are now 98 names on it.

BODY INTERRED.—The body of the child Clarke who died of diphtheria, Monday morning, was interred at the G. P. Cemetery yesterday.

THE BEOTHIC'S TURN-OUT.—Up to 6 o'clock yesterday evening the Beothic turned out 9,350 young harps, 20 old harps, 180 young hoods and 248 old hoods. The young harps average 35 lbs. The ship will finish discharging Saturday.

WOMAN BADLY TREATED.—To-day a woman came into the police station yesterday confirming the message received by Jas. Baird, Ltd., and published by us yesterday. The ship was seen steaming about in the ice off Sound Head picking up her flags yesterday, and the men of the Viking believe that she will have a good cargo, if not a full trip of seals.

COOLED THE EAGLE.—The report round yesterday that there was small pox on the Eagle is not true. Sunday the Florizel went alongside the ship and gave her 45 tons of coal, which she required, and the ship then had 2,500 old and young seals. She was then in the vicinity of the old seals, 90 miles N.E. of the Funks in loose ice. There is good prospect of the ship securing some old seals.

NEW SEAMAN'S HOME.—Mr. W. O'D. Kelly had a wire from Mayor W. I. Ellis to-day stating that he had been awarded the contract for building the new Seaman's Home on Water Street, near Harvey & Co's. The building will cost \$100,000, and Mr. Ellis will start the erection on its return here. The Mayor left Boston for Montreal to-day to go under treatment at the Royal Victoria Hospital.

THE ADVENTURE ARRIVES

The s.s. Adventure, Capt. Jacob Kean, arrived from the sealeries at 2 p.m. to-day. The ship immediately went on quarantine until the crew are inspected by Dr. Campbell or Dr. Brehm. As far as can be known there is no sickness on the ship, and Mr. Harvey says there is no truth in the rumor as to two of her crew having died during the spring. The ship hails, as far as can be ascertained, for 27,000 seals, the weight of 30,000.

BODY INTERRED.—The body of the child Clarke who died of diphtheria, Monday morning, was interred at the G. P. Cemetery yesterday.

THE BEOTHIC'S TURN-OUT.—Up to 6 o'clock yesterday evening the Beothic turned out 9,350 young harps, 20 old harps, 180 young hoods and 248 old hoods. The young harps average 35 lbs. The ship will finish discharging Saturday.

WOMAN BADLY TREATED.—To-day a woman came into the police station yesterday confirming the message received by Jas. Baird, Ltd., and published by us yesterday. The ship was seen steaming about in the ice off Sound Head picking up her flags yesterday, and the men of the Viking believe that she will have a good cargo, if not a full trip of seals.

COOLED THE EAGLE.—The report round yesterday that there was small pox on the Eagle is not true. Sunday the Florizel went alongside the ship and gave her 45 tons of coal, which she required, and the ship then had 2,500 old and young seals. She was then in the vicinity of the old seals, 90 miles N.E. of the Funks in loose ice. There is good prospect of the ship securing some old seals.

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LATEST CABLE NEWS.

Special Evening Telegram.
NEW YORK, April 11.
A cable to the Tribune from London says: "The Secretary of the Treasury, representing the Chancellor of the Exchequer, is getting into a most embarrassing tangle in the House of Commons on the subject of the non-collection of the income tax. Mr. Hobhouse, who was asked questions by Lord Claude Hamilton, Sir Fred Bambery and other Unionists, created a feeling of profound dissatisfaction among the members of all shades of politics. It was considered impossible that the Chairman of the Inland Revenue Board (Sir Robert Chalmers) could have acted as he appears to have done, without the knowledge of somebody higher in authority, and that it was useless for Secretary Hobhouse to disclaim responsibility. All the truth is certainly not yet known, but gross irregularities have been committed. As a result it is concluded that three-quarters of a million pounds sterling has been lost to the Sinking Fund, in order that the amount may help to swell the Exchequer receipts for the current financial year."

Special Evening Telegram.
MELBOURNE, April 11.
The greatest industrial strike in Victoria since the maritime strike of 18 years ago is about to be witnessed. This time it affects all implement workers and allied trades, numbering many thousands of employees. The employers propose to raise a defence fund of a quarter of a million sterling, and to organize a free labor force to take the place of the Union strikers. The Trades Council has issued an edict, enforcing a compulsory levy on every unionist in aid of the strike. The facts point to a serious situation, and politicians here take the gravest view of the outlook.

KINGSVILLE, N.S., April 11.
The fishing tug Eagle, of Lorain, Ohio, was captured as a poacher in Canadian waters to-day. The vessel had a crew of six men and was brought here. She had on board 3,000 lbs. of fish and 30 boxes of net twine. All have been confiscated and held pending a settlement of the affair in court.

LONDON, April 11.
Although many proposed amendments have been passed over, and the Government has adopted the closure in debate on others, slow progress is being made with the Veto Bill. The stage has been going on for three days, and the first clause has not yet passed.

the journey will begin at the latter end of November, and Bombay will be reached in about sixteen or seventeen days.

Delhi, where the Coronation Durbar will be held, is 957 miles by rail from Bombay; the train journey occupying twenty-eight and a half hours, and it is expected that their Majesties will remain there ten or twelve days.

Those present at the launch of the Medina did not know they were taking part in an historic ceremony, for the chartering of the ship for the King's use was then an Admiralty secret.—Daily Mirror, March 16, 11.

P. & O. Liner as Royal Yacht.

Their Majesties to Visit India in the Medina—Launch on the Clyde.

Greenock, Wednesday.—The steamer in which his Majesty the King, accompanied by the Queen, will make his journey from England to India to hold his Coronation Durbar was this morning berthed at Scottish shipbuilding yard on the Clyde.

She is the twin-screw steamer Medina, and is the newest boat belonging to the Peninsular and Oriental Steamship Company, one of the oldest and most famous foundations of the British mercantile marine.

It was only yesterday that she was launched from the yard of her builders, Messrs. Caird and Co., Limited, Greenock, and she has been towed to Scott's yard to receive her boilers and engines and internal fittings.

Few people are aware that the Medina has been selected to convey the King and Queen on their historic journey to India at the end of this year.

P. and O. officials, whom I have seen in London, declared that they were ignorant of the arrangements made for the royal trip, and Mr. Patrick Caird, the managing director and chairman of Messrs. Caird & Co., assured me that he knew nothing about them, and that his firm would complete the boat in accordance with the owners' specifications.

Nevertheless, it is an unimpeachable fact that the Admiralty has specially chartered the Medina for the King's service; that in due time she will be fitted up in accordance with designs approved by the King; and that her working crew to India will consist of about 300 British Naval officers and men.

An official announcement to this effect will be made in a few weeks' time.

READY IN ABOUT THREE MONTHS

The Medina is the seventieth and largest vessel built by Messrs. Caird for the P. and O. Company. Her dimensions are as follows:—

Length, 570 feet.
Beam, 63 feet.
Displacement, 18,700 tons.
Height from bridge to water-line, 60 feet.
Passenger accommodation, 460 first and 220 second class.

The engines are quadruple expansion of 14,000 horse-power, which will give the vessel a speed of eight-een knots an hour.

It is intended to install on board the Medina a powerful wireless telegraph apparatus, so that the King will be able to maintain constant and direct communication with London during the whole time he is at sea.

I am informed that the Medina will be ready for her builders' trial trips in about three months' time, and that she will be taken over by the Admiralty, who will be solely responsible for the entire work of suitably preparing her.

All the royal state-rooms will be amidships, so that in case of rough weather the royal travellers will be spared the full effects of the rolling and pitching of the vessel.

The dining saloon is on the spar deck, which is just below the hurricane deck, and extends the full width of the ship. In it 300 people can sit down at table at the same time.

There will be a music-room above the dining saloon, and adjoining it will be a handsomely furnished divan.

During the voyage the Medina will fly the Royal Standard at the mainmast, the King's flag as Admiral of the Fleet at the foremast, and the white ensign—the British naval flag—at the stern.

CRUISER ESCORT.

In all probability the King and Queen will embark on the Medina at Portsmouth, and an escort of cruisers will be furnished throughout the trip. It is not likely, however, that the same cruisers will act as escort the whole way, but that there will be relays of cruiser squadrons.

The route to be taken will be by way of Gibraltar, Port Said, Suez, Aden and Bombay, a voyage of some 6,000 miles.

Will Entertain Overseas Premiers.

London, England, April 1.—The Pilgrim's Society by arrangement with the Colonial Office on May 25th three days after the opening of the imperial conference, will entertain the colonial premiers.

There will be a coronation dinner on June 28th. This will be the day for the departure of the royal guests and the visit of the King and Queen to the Norwich show.

Ladies Quarantined on Shipboard.

Three ladies came up in the Newfoundland to this port, viz. Mrs. Capt. Kean, Miss E. Kean and Mrs. Saint, wife of the Rev. Mr. Saint. They are from Wesleyville, and Mrs. Saint was a passenger by the Stella Maris, joined the ship at Wesleyville believing she could reach the city quicker by that conveyance. As none of the ladies have been vaccinated it is likely they will have to remain the whole time on the ship while she is on quarantine.

The Spika Here.

The S. S. Spika, Capt. Eomark, arrived here at 9 o'clock last night from Ghent, Belgium, after a run of 12 days. She met with splendid weather all through and made a far better run than was expected at this season of the year. The ship brought a large quantity of cement and general cargo to A. H. Murray.

Clearing the Road.

During the storm of Sunday night and Monday the Signal Hill Road became blocked with snow, and to get the sick men of the Newfoundland up there gangs of men were put to work to shovel it clear. They continued their labours last night until the task was completed after which the seafarers ill of smallpox were taken up to the hospital in the ambulance.

Trapper's Fate.






