Veronica had grown to love every inch of it; and now she was going to be mistress of a part of it; for the dower house and estate of Waynford was but ten miles from Lynne Court.



Rules for Automobileists.

Never start the engine when the car is standing over gasoline. Frequently when filling the gasoline tank some of the fuel finds its way to the ground, either from overflowing or because of

carelessness, in pouring into the filler hole or funnel. To start the engine above this overflow is to invite serious trouble, for it is often that sparks are discharged from the muffler when the engine races, and this is especially true if the muffler contains much soot. Occasionally a leak in the gasoline pipe or tank, or maybe a carburetor float chamber in which the seat of the needle valve needs grinding, will permit of the gasoline forming in a puddle when the car is standing on the street. It is important to stop such leaks and it is better to keep the car in motion than to stand over exposed gasoline, which a match, carelessly thrown in the street, may ignite.

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
Women Going on Treasure Hunt.

Off to Cocos Island to Find the Hundred Million Dollar Treasure Believed to be Hidden There.



Inducements

A BIG BONUS.

The Daily News still maintain silence as to the rate of commission paid to the underwriters of the Loan. Although the Premier put himself forward as the only authority who could give details and although he entered upon the publication of some facts, he immediately relapsed into silence as to the details when we asked him to give the exact rate of commission being paid to the underwriters. The pertinency of the question we asked has become more and more pointed every day from the silence of the Premier and his mouthpiece. The question itself was prompted by the forecast of the refusal of the general public to take up the 1912 loan, made by the correspondent of the New York Post. His forecast came true as the Government was advised by their financial agents that only £55,000 of the £400,000 debentures were taken up by the general public. In other words the public subscribed for but 13 1/2 per cent. of the Loan. His forecast turning out true, one naturally directed attention to the cause he assigned for his forecast of failure. That cause was the high rate of commission agreed to be paid to the underwriters. Naturally we asked the Prime Minister what rate of commission he agreed to pay. The Premier has refused to give that information. The public can only conclude that the Prime Minister's refusal is due to the expectation that its publication would create an unfavourable impression and that the correspondent of the N. Y. Post was as sound in assigning the cause as he was in his prediction. But the inducements offered by the Prime Minister were not confined to the rate of the underwriters' commission, nor was it limited to the drop of 4 1/2 points in the issue price between the 97 1/2 per cent. of the 1910 loan to the 93 of this loan. There was a bonus offered to subscribers in connection with the payment of interest next January. To appreciate this inducement it is necessary to take in certain features of the prospectus issued inviting the public to subscribe. These facts are:

- (1) Subscription List closed on July 12th.
- (2) The Issue Price was £93 per cent, which was payable:
 - £5 per cent on Application,
 - £10 per cent on Allotment,
 - £25 per cent on 13th Sept. 1912
 - £53 per cent on 15th Nov. 1912.
- (3) The first payment of a half year's interest is payable on January 1st, 1913, "and will represent a full six months interest on the stock." The words we have quoted and printed in black type are taken from the Prospectus as advertised in the London Daily Mail.

These inducements work out as follows:

- (1) The payment of interest at the rate of a little over 3 1/2 per cent.
- (2) The payment of interest for times before the money was paid in, and when the money was not earning interest.
- (3) This payment of interest not earned is a bonus pure and simple and comes out as follows:—

On every £25 instalment there

will be a payment of interest for a period extending from July 1st to Sept. 13th, 1912, the £25 being paid at the latter date.

On every £53 instalment there will be a payment of interest from July 1st to Nov. 15th, 1912, although the £53 instalment will be paid in only on Nov. 15th, 1912.

In brief on the £400,000 debentures out on the market, the Government offered a bonus of about \$18,000 to be paid on January 1st, next, although it had not been earned in the usual way, with the interest that had been earned.

Yet, in spite of this the public only took up £55,000 of the £400,000 debentures offered.

Burglar at Work.

About two o'clock yesterday morning some unknown burglar attempted to gain an entrance into the residence of Mr. T. J. Rolls, but without success. The marauder scaled a scaffold, which is being used for repairing the house, and tried to gain access through a window on the second flat. What his intentions were cannot be accounted for. On hearing the noise Mr. Rolls jumped out of bed but was too late to catch the culprit who was seen going over the ladder in front of the house but could not be described plainly. The nocturnal visitor will get a "warmer" reception if he visits the locality again.

DREDGE GETTING READY.—The new dredge Priestman is now at the dock premises and the work of fitting up the hoisting gear and getting the machinery ready is being rushed. She will start the work of dredging the upper part of the harbor next week.

H. M. S. SIRIUS COMING.—H.M.S. Sirius will arrive here from the West Coast on the 2nd August and we understand a crew from the ship's company will compete in the Naval Reserve-Fireman's race. There are some crack oarsmen on the ship.

City of Sydney.

HERE FROM MONTREAL.

The Black Diamond Liner City of Sydney, Capt. Fraser, six days from Montreal via usual Gulf ports, arrived last midnight. Favourable weather was met until she left Sydney coming to this port when dense fog prevailed and the ship had to be carefully navigated; several icebergs were passed yesterday. She brought one-half cargo and over seventy passengers, most of whom are round-trippers.

Vessel Held Up.

SEAMEN ON STRIKE.

The schr. Helen Stewart, which is fish laden for Brazil, was ready for sea a week ago, but is detained owing to seamen refusing to go unless they get an increase of pay. The present rate of pay is \$21 per month, and they want \$30. The vessel will be further delayed as the owners are not prepared to accede to the seamen's demands, which are considered too high.

May Open New Areas.

Mr. D. H. McDougall, assistant general manager of the Dominion Iron & Steel Company, arrived home last evening from a fortnight's trip of inspection to the steel company's areas in Newfoundland.

Speaking to a Post reporter this morning, Mr. McDougall had very little to say.

"Things are moving along very smoothly and satisfactorily, with our plants there," said he. "At Warbana the splendid output of an average of 6,000 tons of iron ore per day is being turned out, and our steamers are kept busy handling it."

At Port au Port, Mr. McDougall informed the newspaper man, their large new plant is just in course of construction, and will likely be finished in a few months time.

The S. S. Morien sailed to-day for that port with a cargo of valuable machinery for the plant there.

NEW AREAS.

Upon being questioned as to whether the steel company intended opening any further new areas in the "Ancient Colony," Mr. McDougall replied that he could say nothing on this at present. The company was looking into the matter but nothing definite had yet been done.—Sydney Post, July 20.

A Visit to Palestine.

The Bishop of London gave an account of his recent journey in Palestine to a meeting of the Palestine Exploration Fund. He said a visit to the Temple area in Jerusalem was now considerably impeded by Mohammedan suspicion, and his own party was at one time in danger of injury at the hands of a Mohammedan fanatic.

Referring to his visit to Bethlehem, he said the site of the birth of Christ was one of the most certain in the whole of Palestine. He hoped that the remains of ancient Jericho would be disclosed as a result of excavation. Very useful excavations were being conducted at Samaria, and they could not be too grateful to the explorers for the light they were throwing on ancient history.





Dr. Wakefield on Public Health.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir—It is only since leaving St. John's on my way to Britain that I have had leisure to examine the recently issued Vital Statistics for 1911. I find that the deaths attributed to Tuberculosis in the lungs show a slight increase, both in St. John's and in the Colony, over the number of those recorded as being due to this cause in 1910. Fearing that these figures may discourage some of these taking part in the present campaign against "The White Plague," I venture to send you a consideration of these figures as they appear to me. I hope that this will cheer up any who are inclined to be discouraged. In the first place I am fully in agreement with prominent medical authorities in Newfoundland who maintain that statistics for so short a period as any one year are of no value in estimating the increase or decrease of so lingering a disease as Tuberculosis. The duration of an average fatal case of Tuberculosis is generally considered to be about 4 years. (falling health 1 year, partial disability 1½ years, total disability 1½ years. It is therefore reasonable to suppose a hard winter, as other common hardships, would carry off an unusual number of these near-lying a fatal issue. Secondly, public interest recently has been more and more focussed upon the terrible ravages of Tuberculosis in the Colony, and I believe that this has caused the recognition of many cases which would otherwise have been attributed to Pleurisy, Broncho-Pneumonia, or one of many other conditions. This has been the usual experience when interest has first been aroused in the disease according to the experience of Dr. Livingston Barrand, Secretary of the S. Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis. For he writes: "It is inevitable that an impatient public should demand results before definite results can be forthcoming. A drop in the mortality curve of a slowly developing and slow progressive disease, such as Tuberculosis, is not a matter of months but rather a matter of years. It would seem to me unjustifiable to expect results in an observable diminution in mortality for five years to come, I think, however, we should have in decades by that time, and ten years should afford indisputable proof. Also: "In spite of the fact that the first results of this concentrated activity and interest I greater accuracy in mortality and morbidity statistics and that an actual decrease might appear in official reports as an apparent increase in the disease, there is evidence in some quarters that a direct response to the organized movement is already forthcoming." Thirdly: "Although the number of deaths from Tuberculosis in the lungs has increased, the total number of deaths from all forms of Tuberculosis has decreased from 75 to 74. While on the subject may I add a few further remarks: While on the voyage I have been busy studying the eleventh annual report of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. I have been deeply impressed by the fact that nearly all the recorded speeches by the most celebrated doctors on the west of the Atlantic, together with many of the reports from the local associations dealing with the subject

confirm the well known statement of Dr. Newsholme and the other leaders in the fight with this monster disease in the Old Country, in fact I think I am not going too far if I say that all the prominent leaders in the west of the world, and all the leading medical practitioners in Newfoundland, and believe that in order rapidly to decrease the amount of suffering and the number of deaths from Tuberculosis in Newfoundland, two things are most necessary. These are: (1.) A law to stop spitting in public places for long will men allow the lives of themselves, their wives and above all their small children to be endangered by careless dirty persons indulging in his dangerous habit? (2.) The isolation of advanced cases who by their habits or conditions are a public danger, in that they are scattering the seeds of disease and death amongst all those about them. Persons with Smallpox, Cholera, or The Plague, are kept in isolation, by force if necessary. Why should not those with Tuberculosis, which causes far more suffering and death than Smallpox, Cholera and The Plague all put together. (This of course does not apply to those willing and able to take the necessary precautions, for it cannot be too deeply impressed that clean and careful consumptives are no danger to the community.) Sir, I have been deeply impressed by the unanimity with which the foregoing opinions are held by all authorities on the subject that I know of. I therefore feel that the only course for me to take is to lay them before the public through your valuable columns. Finally: The above mentioned report focuses the attention of readers on the consensus of opinion expressed by so many eminent authorities on the vital necessity for:— (1.) Efficient inspection of food-stuffs, particularly milk and meat. (2.) Especial attention to children. It shows that Tuberculosis is very frequently acquired in childhood, but does not develop until later years. Owing to the great recuperative powers of childhood very much may be done to counteract this evil by:— (a) Medical inspection of school children. (b) PREVENTORIA and open air schools. Attention is also directed to the unusual arguments against the erection of Sanatoria in any neighborhood by local residents. As this is likely to occur very shortly in Newfoundland, it may be well to explain this more fully. The usual arguments advanced by local residents against the erection of sanatoria in their neighborhoods are:— (1.) Danger to the community. (2.) Injury to business. (3.) Depreciation of surrounding property. The report claims that there is no truth whatever in these assertions, in fact all available

statistics prove: (1.) That there is no place in which fewer persons contract Tuberculosis than in a properly run sanatorium. (2.) That local business is increased. (3.) That surrounding property goes up in value. Dr. Newsholme, who is probably the greatest living authority on these matters, holds the same views. The above mentioned report published by Messrs. James Hope & Sons, Ottawa, is full of interest and information, and anyone who is interested in this all-important subject could not do better than obtain a copy and carefully study the contents. OTTAWA, July 23.

The Canadian Department of Fisheries is co-operating with Newfoundland and the United States Fisheries Authorities, in endeavoring to reach some joint agreement as to the abolition of steam trawling in Atlantic coast waters. The matter has been before the Government here for years, but the difficulty in the way of securing a joint international action has prevented any satisfactory arrangement to the present. It is admitted that the growing menace of steam trawling, in regard to destroying the gear of regular fishermen, and for the conservation of the fisheries, must be abolished. Now that the three governments have signified their readiness to co-operate in checking steam trawling as far as possible satisfactory results are hoped for. The Fisheries Departments here have placed two officers on board steam trawlers now operating off the Maritime Provinces, who will report as to the conditions. Similar action has been taken by the American and Newfoundland Governments, and it is hoped joint legislation in the matter may be secured during the course of the next year.

A short time ago the Union, through their solicitor, asked the owners and agents of coastal steamers for an increase of wages for the stokers engaged thereon. The request was refused and a number of members threatened a strike. Delegate Woods spoke on this important matter last evening, emphasizing that such a course would be inadvisable at the present juncture. The Delegate pointed out that the conduct of some firemen holding up ships was the cause of the owners not granting the increase.

A committee consisting of the President, Vice-President and Messrs. Kavanaugh and Squires were appointed to take up a collection for the Marine Disaster Fund.

Great Necessity.

The swimming pool for boys at Sandy Bottom, in Quidi Vidi Lake, has proved its usefulness, and the danger of drowning accidents there has been obviated. Sandy Beach, in Long Pond, should receive the same attention. It is frequented by large numbers of boys on holidays and Sundays, and almost every year drowning accidents occur at this place. There is an overfall not far off the beach which boys who cannot swim wade out too far, go over and with fatal results. If this place received the attention that Quidi Vidi has it would be a step in the right direction. Many parents in the city bless Mayor Ellis for his thoughtfulness in making Quidi Vidi secure for their sons who are anxious to learn the useful art of swimming, and their gratitude would be increased tenfold if he would now do something similar for the many boys who frequent Long Pond.

A Peculiar Theft.

There are certain light fingered people in this city who will steal anything, from a hot stove to a warm horse shoe provided that they can get away with it and escape prosecution. The most peculiar theft we have heard of for some time is the stealing of flags. This occurred shortly after the opening of the new Seamen's Institute, on Water Street. A deal of hunting was used for decorative purposes for the formal opening, and when this was being gathered up to be returned to the owners it was found that several flags were missing, including a large Union Jack and a flag belonging to the Calypso. Who the thief was is not known but the police are making enquiries.
