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EVERY MAN in Class 1, that is all EVERY MAN in Class 1, that is all unmarried men between the ages of 19 and 25 inclusive, must report to the Registrar at the Militia Building, St. John's, on forms provided, before the 24th day of May, 1918, or send an application for exemption.

Report and Application can be sent through the Post Office or may be made personally at the Militia Building to the Registrar.

Claims for exemption must be made on the following grounds:

(s) That it is expedient in the national interest that the applicant should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged otherwise.

(b) That he has one or two brothers and one of them is serving. or has served, in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces dur-ing the present war. (c) That he has three or more bro-

thers and two of them are serv-

ing or have served in His Ma-jesty's Naval or Military Forces during the war. (d) That he has persons mainly de-pendent upon him for support, such as parents, brothers or

(e) Ill health or infirmity. EXEMPTION APPLICATIONS may be made to the Tribunal in St John's through the Registrar and outside St. John's direct to the Commissioners (magistrates) appointed by the Tribunal. Commissioners have power to grant exemptions subject to confirmation by the Tribunal on grounds (b), (c), (d), and in cases where a man is so obviously infirm as to be unfit for military service. Applications for exemption may be made

MAN SEEKING EXEMPTION or on his behalf by his employer, or business partner or near relative. Application forms will be found at all Post Offices as soon as they can be printed and hurried there by mail. REPORTS

will also be found at all Post Offices. When Report is filled out hand to the Postmaster or Clerk and get a receipt. Any man in the class called up failing to report is subject to a penalty of
