MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1918.

EVERY MAN in Class 1, that is all unmarried men between the ages of 19 and 25 inclusive, must report to the Registrar at the Militia Building, St. John's, on forms provided, before the 24th day of May, 1918, or send an application for exemption.

Report and Application can be sent through the Post Office or may be made personally at the Militia Building to the Registrar.

Claims for exemption must be made on the following grounds:

- That it is expedient in the national interest that the applicant should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged otherwise.
- That he has one or two brothers and one of them is serving, or has served, in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces during the present war.
- That he has three or more brothers and two of them are serving, or have served in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces during the war.
- That he has persons mainly dependent upon him for support, such as parents, brothers or sisters and
- Ill health or infirmity.

EXEMPTION APPLICATIONS may be made to the Tribunal in St. John's through the Registrar and outside St. John's direct to the Commissioners (magistrates) appointed by the Tribunal. Commissioners have power to grant exemptions subject to confirmation by the Tribunal on grounds (b), (c), (d), and in cases where a man is so obviously infirm as to be unfit for military service. Applications for exemption may be made by the

MAN SEEKING EXEMPTION or on his behalf by his employer, or business partner or near relative. Application forms will be found at all Post Offices as soon as they can be printed and hurried there by mail.

REPORTS will also be found at all Post Offices. When Report is filled out hand to the Postmaster or Clerk and get a receipt. Any man in the class called up failing to report is subject to a penalty of five years

IMPRISONMENT.

All who have received

REJECTION BADGES must fill out Report for Service form and send same through Post Office or deliver at Militia Building to Registrar or make application to Tribunal in St. John's. Commissioners (magistrates) in outposts for exemption. The

TRIBUNAL sits daily in the Supreme Court Chambers, St. John's, and the Commissioners outside St. John's at the most convenient times.



Exemption Tribunal.

AN IMPORTANT CASE.

At Thursday's sitting of the Military Tribunal 63 applicants were dealt with. Of these, 17 exemptions were granted, as follows: Under B—Wm. Hanes, Herbert Howse, William Howell, Frederick Colles, L. Brophy, Jas. Roland, S. M. Cram, H. O. Whit, H. R. Luscombe, P. J. McCue and Eric Morris. Under C—Job Warren. Under D—Eli Moss, Stanley Noseworthy, P. Moore and Thos. Jackson. Under E—P. J. Elliott. Seven were disallowed; three were referred to the Military Authorities for investigation; four were sent to the Medical Board; one was not in Class 1; one was withdrawn; one was transferred to Class 2, and five were deferred. An interesting case where the applicant desires to serve his country is shown in the case of Mr. John R. Chafe, of the telephone staff. The applicant does not want to be exempted, but it is held by his employers that his services are of such national interest, he possessing an expert technical knowledge of the apparatus concerning the operation of the telephone system, that the telephone Co. are unable to replace him at the present. It appears that there is a conglomeration of old and new machinery, together with fire alarms and military secret telephones, with all of which Mr. Chafe has a thorough knowledge and in view of the importance of his position the Tribunal transferred him to Class 2, not yet called. Mr. Chafe had on seven different occasions handed his resignation to the Commandant, but he might be free to join the Regiment, but on each occasion it was not accepted on the grounds hereinafter stated. The Tribunal congratulated Mr. Chafe on his high motives.

Military Funeral.

The funeral of the late Sergeant Frank Troughton took place yesterday afternoon from his mother's residence, Hamilton Street and was one of the largest seen in the city for some time. The procession proceeded down Sudbury and Water Streets, up Queen St., Duckworth and Cochrane Streets and Military Road to the R. C. Cathedral. The procession consisted of: Firing Squad, C.C.C. Band, Regimental Bugle Band, the remains with Guard of Honor, Relatives, Citizens, and Volunteers and Foresters numbering 660. At the Cathedral the prayers for the dead were recited by Rev. D. Green. The interment was at Belvidere. As the remains were laid to rest the Last Post was sounded by Bugler Bailey and the firing party discharged the usual three volleys.

Household Notes.

The end of the rib roast can be sawed off and corned. If boiled with cabbage it will make a good lunch dish.
To insure the creamy sauce being smooth, always rub the butter and flour together until smooth, and add to the hot milk.
If hard-boiled eggs are plunged into cold water as soon as they are taken from the fire there will be no dark ring around the yolk.
Boiled linseed oil is good for cleaning furniture. Rub the furniture with waste dipped in the oil then rub dry with a clean flannel cloth.
Raisins will stone much more easily if they are placed in the oven until they are heated through. They can then be easily split and the stones removed.
When the chimney does not draw well, try opening the windows in the room for a few minutes before starting the fire, and see if that will not help the draught.

A few drops of camphor on the toothbrush will give the mouth a fresh, clean feeling, and it will harden the gums and prevent anything like cold sores or affections of the tongue, may turn sour.

Now is the Time.

The homely and unaesthetic looking potato might yet become a great factor in winning the war, and so important has its extra production become that in all the allied countries, Agricultural Boards and Committees never tire in impressing upon the people the necessity of growing more and more potatoes. Our own Agricultural Society in Bulletin No. 1 considers that the Board would be lacking in its duty if it failed to warn (people) of the more serious conditions that now threaten to develop. . . . that will affect our food supply. . . . Potatoes in plenty can save us from the worst effects of a flour shortage and a generous supply of other vegetables will add largely to their value. . . . Again in Bulletin No. 5 the Society gives warning that "it is now but too apparent that we shall be compelled to make a supreme effort to provide, so far as is humanly possible, every pound of edible matter that our soil can furnish."

"Therefore the duty of every person is, so far as they possibly can, to cultivate the soil and produce potatoes. . . . Some time ago it was publicly announced that only one grade of flour would be shipped from the Canadian Mills to Newfoundland hereafter. Next to Flour, Potatoes can be made our chief article of food, and with the agricultural possibilities of the soil of this Dominion, there is no reason why we should not raise sufficient for home consumption, and thereby conserve other foods to the use of the armies in the field. Newfoundlanders are as well farmers as fishermen. As a matter of fact our people have been styled Fishermen-farmers, for the reason that nearly every person owns a small bit of land and cultivates it to the best advantage. It is now the time for planting and if everybody with a plot of ground, large or small, will make an effort to improve on and increase their output, the threatened shortage of our usual supply of Flour need not alarm us. With our cellars well stocked with potatoes and other vegetables, no fear of the future will worry us, and in making the land yield its increase, we shall be helping win the war and bringing the blessings of peace upon a battle torn world.

Committee on Care of Returned Soldiers.

On Thursday night the Committee to enquire into and formulate plans for the best way to educate, train and otherwise look after the returned soldiers met at the office of the Minister of Militia. Present were the Hon. Mr. T. H. O'Neill, Sir P. T. McGrath, Lt.-Col. Rendell for the Minister of Militia, Dr. Blackall, Dr. Burke, Mr. R. B. Job, Mr. H. E. Cowan, Major Macpherson and Major Montgomerie.
Major Buchanan, a returned veteran of the Canadian Army, who spent seven months on the Western front was present and addressed the meeting. Major Buchanan is attached to the Soldiers' Pensions and Disabilities Board of Canada, and is visiting Newfoundland for the purpose of securing information concerning the dependent children, etc., of Newfoundlanders, who have served with the Canadian forces. After hearing the visitor the committee thought it advisable that the whole Patriotic Association should be given a chance to hear how the Canadians proposed to go about the business of caring for the boys who have returned disabled, etc. Consequently it was resolved to hold a meeting on Monday night next at which the Men's Patriotic Association, the W. P. A. and the Returned Soldiers' Association will be asked to attend. Messrs. Cowan and Blackall were appointed a committee to engage a hall and otherwise arrange for the meeting at which His Excellency the Governor will be asked to preside. A committee to draw up rules and regulations for the governing of the proposed association consisting of Hon. Sir P. T. McGrath, Dr. Blackall, Major Montgomerie and Major Macpherson was appointed, after which the meeting closed.

NO WARNING GIVEN.

LONDON, To-day. The Moldavia was sunk without warning, it was reported, and although a good look-out was kept, the attacking submarine was not seen before the torpedo struck. Most of the men aboard were in their hammocks, and when the explosion occurred amidships, soldiers and sailors alike showed no panic. They fell into line and waited orders when it was seen the ship was settling. All were taken off by rescuing ships. The men lost all their belongings but were supplied with new clothing at the different naval ports to which they were taken.

Latest.

SPANISH LOSSES.
 MADRID, To-day. Seventy-eight Spanish ships have been sunk by German submarines according to a list printed by the Epoca, in a discussion of what Spain has lost since the beginning of the U-boat campaign. The newspapers says the Taya Company of Barcelona have been the heaviest losers.

NOT USING THE HARBOR.

LONDON, To-day. The Germans have succeeded in shifting the concrete laden cruiser Vendictive, up in the harbor of Ostend, on May 10th, by British raiding forces. According to the Times, the Vendictive is now lying close alongside the eastern pier leaving a passage about thirty feet wide. This is enough to allow destroyers to go in and out, but nevertheless the Germans are not using the harbor. Unsuccessful attempts have been made by the Germans to dredge a passage way between the concrete cruisers sunk in the harbor of Zeebrugge. A German destroyer which was sunk this week, by bombs dropped from the British naval aircraft, lies close to the cruisers. The Basin at Bruges, which is connected with both Ostend and Zeebrugge, is full of German mines, but the Canal is not being used.

NOT YET SEVERED.

HAVANA, To-day. The report that the Mexicans had severed diplomatic relations with Cuba, could not be confirmed here early to-day. In official circles last night it is stated there were about two foundations for such a report. The Mexican Charge d' Affaires left Havana yesterday for Mexico City, but visited President Menocal before leaving.

REDMOND'S DAUGHTER FOR UNIT.

LONDON, To-day. Mrs. Max Green, who was formerly Miss Johanna Redmond, daughter of the late John E. Redmond, makes a strong appeal for unity between Ireland and Great Britain against the common enemy, Germany, in a letter printed in the Manchester Guardian. Mrs. Green blames Germany for widening the gulf between Great Britain and Ireland, and calls upon her countrymen to supplant the religion of hate, which Germany is spreading in Ireland, with a league of goodwill.

JOHN H. NOONAN.
 We record with deep regret the passing of Mr. John H. Noonan, Cashier of the Royal Scots, which occurred at 11.30 a.m. on Tuesday, May 21st, at an early hour this morning. Deceased entered into rest after a brief illness of ten days having been confined to his bed since the 14th inst. Of a quiet disposition and admired by all whose privilege it was to know him, his almost passing will be deeply regretted. Deceased who was in his 43rd year, entered the Customs service in 1873, as junior clerk. In 1881 he was promoted to first clerk, 1894 to second landing waiter, 1898 to first landing waiter and in 1907 to the position of second clerk and cashier which office he held at the time of his death. The late Mr. Noonan held, up to his demise the longest official record in the Customs having 45 years faithful services to his country. The late Robert Noonan, killed in action while fighting in France, was a son of Mr. Noonan and a brother, Mr. J. L. Noonan and several children including Mrs. Henry Parsons and Miss L. Parsons, to whom the Telegram offers deep sympathy. The funeral takes place at 2.30 p.m. on Monday.



EARLY ME

ON THE EVE OF BIG ATTACK. LONDON, May 24. We are on the eve of a great German attack, said Lord Lloyd George in an address to-day at Edinburgh. Those who know best what prospects are feel most confident about the result.

ARMED MERCHANT CRUISER SUNK. LONDON, May 24. (Official).—The armed merchant cruiser *Moldavia* was torpedoed and sunk yesterday morning. There were 25 casualties among the crew, but the American troops aboard it to the present have not been accounted for. It is feared they were killed in one compartment by the explosion.

WORK OF AIRMEN. FRENCH HEADQUARTERS, May 24. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—The past few days have illustrated the extraordinary development of air warfare and the skill with which our airmen have solved the problem of maneuvering in large numbers. On May 18th and the following day our machines bombed the German airfield at Cappy, setting on fire the air-drome sheds and causing widespread damage. The Germans were powerless to protect themselves. On May 19th, Italian and American machines co-operated in a number of these expeditions, with remarkable success.

NORWAY INDIGNANT. CHRISTIANIA, May 24. A renewal of operations by German submarines against Norwegian fishing vessels, a number of which have been sunk recently was brought up for discussion in Parliament to-day. Foreign Minister said in reply to a question that he had asked the German Minister, replied that the danger zone in the Arctic still existed. When it was pointed out that submarines had been fired on in the Barents Sea, the German representative said he knew nothing about it and promised to telegraph to Berlin a request that this practice be stopped. He asked for official reports regarding these cases. Marine tribunals will make investigations and findings will be sent to Berlin. Several members of Parliament expressed indignation at the sinkings. They asked how long Norway would continue to sell fish to the Germans while they were sinking fishing vessels.

FURTHER DISORDERS. AMSTERDAM, May 24. Further reports of disorders in Bohemia are published in the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin. It appears that recently there were extensive demonstrations in Prague which the police found difficulty in quelling. Thirty arrests were made.

WANTS INTERVENTION. TOKIO, May 17. (By Associated Press).—The military agreement between Japan and China has caused increased attention to be given to the question of intervention in Siberia. It is understood that both Great Britain and France are actively favoring intervention, the former because of danger to the spread of German influence and both because they are convinced it would hasten the winning of the war.

WOMEN IN THE WAR. LONDON, May 17. Speaking to-day at the London Exhibition of women's work in munition plants, Frederick George Kelloway, Secretary to the Minister of Munitions, said that in every one of the defendant measures taken when a raid on London is carried out the women have taken their part excepting in the aerial flying air craft. Grow Potatoes and Help Win the War.

Some of us are planted here at home, and perhaps wondering what we can do to help win the war. It may not seem a way in which to win much glory (and if one is elderly, he may risk getting rheumatism) but it may be that the spuds you set, may help win the war. For this war in the long run, is going to be a question of Man Supply or Food Supply, or both combined, and the humble spud is the next best thing to King Wheat. A hungry stomach is a strong persuasion for peace! Are our Armies or those of our Allies to be forced to a German Peace by empty stomachs? So now I say to you if you are planted here at home, perhaps planting potatoes may be what is up to you to do, as your bit. If you haven't got a bit of land of your own, buy a bit, and if you can't buy a bit, beg, borrow or pinch a bit, and set it out with potatoes, root crops or other vegetables.

In one of the city papers the other day, there was a sketch of a young chap going to get his bag of Golf Clubs to take to, and start the season at the golf course, and finds that an older relative had filled it with hoses, rakes and spades, etc., as more to the point. With the Daylight Bill now in force, there is more time in the evening, and outside of the plutocrats edging off on golf and taking up digging the land with a spade instead, as an exercise, there are others amongst us, democrats, who might perhaps ease off on the strenuous exercise of playing cards, or going to the nickels every evening.

Later on you will be taking a pride in saying,—Yes, my boy, all the vegetables you see on the table came out of our own garden. Now the first thing somebody will be asking, I know, is what price will potatoes be this year, and saying perhaps we are not going to set potatoes, if we don't get a good price for them. Now don't worry about the price. In this case price does not count; it is a matter of helping the Empire, and our Allies, win the war.

There are lots of men who have given up the chance of making \$5.00 to \$10.00 a day for the privilege of doing their bit in the Army at \$1.10 per day, and they will be followed by others.

Now are you going to consider how much money you want, to do a patriotic duty?

HOW ABOUT FORMING A POTATO LEAGUE?

Later on some of the potatoes you grow and the potatoes your friends grow, and the potatoes your friends friends grow, etc., might be sent to the Old Country. We might get a special rate from Major Montgomery, of the Furness Witty S. S. Co. here, for a good sized shipment, or the Government might arrange the space.


Anyhow the world can't have too many potatoes at this time. Food is scarce in the Old Country. Saturday, I changed a cheque for a naval reservist home on leave, and he said he would not have had so much money, only he was not able to spend when ashore, as there at the hotels and restaurants, everybody was on short allowance, and you were only allowed to buy so much; all the money in the world could not buy more, and in fact it was much better faring aboard one's ship.

At the moment there is no country in the world better supplied with food than Newfoundland, but this might change any time. Therefore, it is up to us all, if only for selfish reasons, to plant all the potatoes, turnips, carrots, etc., that we can. Time you were starting! What?

I accompany this article with an extract from the Montreal Daily Star, and which is sung to the tune of "Over There," which you often hear the Brigade Bands playing. You can sing it if you are musical when you are digging, and if you are not musical it may grate upon the ears of those beastly yellow butterflies, which I understand are responsible for grubs on the cabbages, and it may steer them to a neighbour's garden.


