## **TO-DAY'S MESSAGES**

RATIFCATION OF LIQUOR TREA-TY CAUSES LIVELY DEBATE IN DAIL.

DUBLIN, April 4. A proposal to ratify the Anglo-American Liquor Treaty provoked a lively debate in Dail Erean to-day. Desmond Fitzgerald, Minister o Foreign Affairs, in moving the rati fication of the Treaty, said he had called the attention of the British authorities to the fact that the words. "King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland" no longer were descriptive of fact, but that he had not pressed upon the British Government that it take steps to amend this wording, pending settlement of the Irish Boundary Question. The Irish Government, the Minister added, would endeavour to put no hindrance in the way of the United States enforcing its own laws. The debate on the Treaty, was adjourned till Wednesday.

REPORT OF ABANDONMENT OF PRIORITY CLAIM DENIED.

BRUSSELS, April 4. A Belgian semi-official News Agency to-night published a denial of the reports which have appeared in portion of the French press to the effect that Belgium might abandon her right to priority of German payments under the Versailles Treaty.

#### ARGENTINE AVIATORS KILLED. BUENOS AIRES, April 4. Two Aregentine navy aviators met

## NOVA SCOTIAN ROAD MONEY.

HALIFAX, April 4. Over \$3,000,000 was spent on Nova Scotia highways last year, and over \$12,000,000 in the past four years, according to the Provincial Highway Board Report presented in the Legislature to-day by Hon. William Chisholm, Minister of Highways.

#### GOVERNMENT SECURE VOTE OF CONFIDENCE.

PARIS, April 4. Premier Poincare's choice of new colleagues for the Cabinet, apparently was vindicated to-day when the Government secured a vote of confidence in the Chamber over the most dangerous part of the Pensions Bill. To-day, Minister of Finance, Francois Marshall succeeded where the former Minister of Finance De Lasteyrie recently failed, resulting in the resignation of the Cabinet and the formation by M. Poincare of a new one.
