The Garafraxa Council met at Fleming's Inn, on Monday last. Tenders for the offices of Clerk, Treasurer, Assessor, Collector, and Tavern Inspector were opened and read. Mr. P. Rennie was appointed Clerk, Mr. W. Michie, Treasurer, Mr. P. Couse, Collector, Mr. T. McGladdery, Tavern Inspector, and Mr. J. Molloy, surveyor; to receive \$4 a day while engaged by the Municipality. Mr. Lightbody was appointed Auditor for West Garafraxa to meet an Auditor to be appointed by East Garafraxa, for the settlement of the financial business. A petition was presented praying that the Council grant ald in defraying expense of keeping the man Richard Nolan, who cut his throat while in a state of temporary insanity, some time ago. By-and-bye another smaller Gordon press was added to our stock, and since that day to the present they have been kept constantly at work. The style and quality of the work done at the MERCURY office may be said to have revolutionized job printing in Guelph-Other offices copied our styles and founts as we brought them out, but the work done at this office still keeps ahead of all turned out by competitors, and nearly all of the finer, fancy kinds of printing, which in fermer days was sent to Toronto and Hamil-


