Mr. Howard brought up the report of the County Property Committee. They recommended that the petition of Mr. Webster, Registrar, be granted, and that the committee be authorised to expend a sum not exceeding \$150 in making the improvements. Certain accounts were certified as correct, amongst them one from Mr. John Anderson, Registrar, Arthur, of \$106, which included an item of meanly \$60 for office cleaning. The committee could not recommend the allowance of the accounts of Mrs. Nichols and the Master in Chancery, as they had been previously reported on, and no further evidence was furnished. The committee recommended that the Clerk of the Peace be paid any sum necessarily expended in providing proper office accommodation for documents, &c., in his charge, but they cannot recommend any payment on account of rent, as they are preparal to furnish a suitable office in the County Buildings. They tecommend that the articles asked for by the gaoler be purchased for the use of the prisoners. Mr. Peterson was allowed to address the Council in reference to his office accommodation as Clerk of the Peace. He said that the late Mr. Saunders occupied only one small room in the Registry Office, and that he (Mr. Peterson) had been requested to vacate this. Two rooms were absolutely necessary, with a fire-proof vault for the preservation of the important records in his possession. It had been suggested that the should have the room next the County Treasurer's office, he would not take it, for it was entirely unsuitable and inconvenient. If the Council could not find him proper office accommodation they ought to pay his reasonable demand for the cost of furnishing it himself.
