Here in Canada, any newspaper that cares to pay for their despatches can get them, but in the United States only certain papers have the right to use The Associated Press is made them. up of four of the morning and three of the evening New York papers. No other paper in that city can get their news and in all the other cities throughout the union there is one or more papers in each city barred out. The new agency is called the United Press association and its headquarters are in New York. 





service. Herein lies the chief value of our military reforms. The army reserve con-sists of about 27,000 men, and the milita-reserve of about the same number. 




