Mesers, Elliott and Chapman, who go Ottawa to sustain there the board's position on the question, have shouldered a big weight for two men to carry. Arrived the capital, they must feel themselves los', as it were, among the multitude of ralway delegates from all quarters of Oatario. W. may hope, however, that they will bea themselves bravely, and that what they lack in numbers on the spot may be more than made up by the justice of their caus and its popularity the whole country over. The opponents of railway reform are trying to frighten us with terrible pictures of way business which should follow, were Mr McCarthy's bill adopted as it stands. The reply to this is that nobody wants a great sweep of injustic, and wreck, and revolution in railway matters, but merely such a reasonable measure of public policy as shall give fair play to all. As for what the details of such a measure should be, Mr. Chapman rightly suggested that it was the duty of railway men, instead of opposing the general principle, to aid in its beneficial application by giving their valuable practical aid towards perfecting its details. But perhaps this would be expecting too much. If a railway commission bill is to be passed at all, probably the railway men would rather see very bad and defective bill than a good one; so that it might prove unworkable and

be discredited on trial.

Perhaps Mr. McCarthy's bill is far from being perfect; perhaps it may require much amendment to make it do for Canada. But place." the public eye must not be glamored with the sophistry that the existence of this or the other defect in the bill proves the case of those who are fighting tooth and nai against our getting any railway control bill at all. We would not too strongly press the example of England, where a government railway commission works under strictly insular conditions. But what have the objectors to say to a certain example over the border? There, without any law of state or congress to compel them, the great trunk lines have established a commission of their own in New York, for settling disputes among themselves. Now, should it be wholly im practicable to carry out, in the interest of the public, something like what American railway companies have felt compelled to establish "on their own hook," to save themselves from the needless waste of war If Mr. Albert Fink be not wholly a superfluous individual, the railwaymen's own commission in New York is an institution with a purpose. Suppose we were to try a tremendous flight of imagination, and to conjure up the possibility of a Ca nadian railway commission, which should do here such part of the government commission's work in England, and such part of Mr. Fink's works in the States, as may be found practicable in this country. That need not be a terribly dangerous affair, to begin with. We might, as they have done in England, give the commission small lowers at first, and extend these powers a its capacity to exercise them for the public good was proved by results. 
