That such appointment will impose a direct expense on the people of Toronto of a large yearly outlay, which will be merely the beginning of a much larger expense. "4. 

We "further recalled the fact that the doctrine of no state terference in trade matters (railways includtaught tury or more ago, was really she founda tion upon which Cobden and the Free Trade League worked in the course of their success-ful agitation for the repeal of the Corn Laws. But it may be asked: What have these remin-iscences of a past time in Eugland to do with Canadian events and Canadian needs of the present time?

We answer: Much every way, chiefly beause the practical politics of to-day are largely influenced by the speculative optimions of the times when ourselves, our fathers, or our grandfathers were young men. When in 1858 Str John Macdunald and his Government ventured upon Canada's first attempt at National Policy, it was a pretty bold venture for the time. The civilized world was still ringing with the story of the triumph of Cob len and Free Trade in England; and the man would have had a wearisome search who ooked through the libraries to find a book in favor of protection. In the magazines, and by the writers of books generally, protection was looked upon as a lost cause, and free trade was hailed as destined to be the system of the nd doubt.
