Agricultural.

I wonder how many farmers and dairymen properly appreciate the importance of training young heifers to stand quietly while being milked. A great many milkers approach a young heifer that is to be milked for the first time as if they would an old one. The heifer that has never been milked, knows nothing about it, is sick and weak, and perhaps frightened with taints that lack the toughness of old cows...

On Butter Making.

No one should attempt to churn cream but the first one to stir the milk with a thermometer, 62 degrees is standard rule in winter, 60 in summer and this applies to the dash churn and patent churn alike. The buttermilk should be removed before the butter becomes a hard mass, so that the miller may penetrate and wash out the milk without too much handling of the butter...

Another dairyman draws the ladle over the butter after cutting it down thoroughly into the water, until it leaves a shining greasy layer, and this butter will not harden readily even in a low temperature; in summer it is oily in a warm room in a very few moments. It has lost its 'grain' as it is termed and lost it by injudicious handling.

Butter should be handled with regard to this fine quality of its composition, and while it is essential to work it thoroughly, it must be done by pressure, avoiding a sliding of the ladle over its surface. I have never seen a butter worker that I considered equal to the old fashioned ladle for this purpose, though the lighter women's work in the common dairy and hence are an appreciable innovation.—Cor. Dairy.
