





HARVESTING THE HAY CROP

(Experimental Farms Note)

There is no operation on the farm so dependent upon weather conditions as that of hay making, and the farmer who can always gather in a crop of juicy fodder, neither too young nor too ripe which will come out of the mow fragrant and palatable, needs to exercise his best weather wisdom with good judgment, and lots of snap when the work is rush-

All grasses and clovers make the best fodder if cut while the stalks. having obtained their largest growth, are yet full of sap. If a large area is to be cut, it will be necessary to cut some part before it is ready, to avoid having a large quantity grow too old and woody before it can be reached.

In the Maritime Provinces, where

many mornings are apt to be over cast and there may be some doubt up till eleven o'clock what the afternoon will bring forth, weather wisom is especially required and frequently use can be made of the meteorological service to advantage.
