NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund, to aid in paying Missionaries to struggling Congregations.
2. A General Fund, to aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid Congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.
3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund, for the Clergy.
4. A Pension Fund, for aged and infirm Clergy.
5. A Fund, to provide higher education for the children of the Clergy.
6. To provide Bibles, Prayer Books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Church-Wardens, and others elected by the Society, being members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land and Investment, and the Education and Depository.

2. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the Synod.

This Board pays all the Missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessments of the Congregations served by the Missionaries, (d) the surplus revenue of the Clergy Trust Fund, (e) the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of Congregations should be addressed to the Rev. Canon Von Iffland, Bergerville, the Secretary, or to Mr. John Hamilton, the Honorary Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters should be addressed to the Secretary, the Rev. A. J. Balfour, St. Peter's Rectory, Quebec. Contributions on behalf of the Church Society must be sent to the Treasurer, Mr. Edwin Pope, 83 St. Peter street, Quebec.

Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec was held in the Cathedral Church Hall, on Wednesday, February 5th, 1896, at three P.M.

After Prayers, the minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Reports of the Central Board and Diocesan Board were read, adopted and ordered to be printed. The Report of the S. Francis District Association of the Church Society was read, received and ordered to be printed in the Society's Annual Report.

Statements of the accounts of the Church Society, Diocesan Board, Clergy Trust Fund, Bishopric Endowment Fund, and Local Endowment Funds were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

The Annual Report of the Church Helpers' Association was received, and, in compliance with a request, ordered to be printed in the Annual Report of the Society.

Thirty-one members of the Church were elected incorporated members of the Society, and three new Life Members elected, viz. :—the Very Reverend the Dean of Quebec, Miss M. C. Dunn and Mr. Armitage Rhodes.

The Vice-Presidents of the past year were all re-elected for the ensuing year.

The following were elected members of the Diocesan Board :—the Very Reverend the Dean of Quebec, the Rev. Canon Richardson, the Rev. I. M. Thompson, Dr. Robert Hamilton, W. H. Carter and J. C. More.

The gratuitous and very valuable services rendered the Society by the Honorary Counsel, the Auditors and the Honorary Treasurer of the Diocesan Board were gratefully recognized.

The amendments to Article XV *re*: Pensions, and to Article XIII, both adopted at the last meeting of the Society, on May 30th, 1895, were confirmed.

An affectionate tribute of respect was paid to the memory of Mr. Cornelius Judge, for thirty years one of the most active and efficient members of the Society, and a resolution placed on record expressive of the esteem in which he was held by all, and of the great loss which the Society had sustained by his death.

The meeting closed with the Benediction.

45 VICT., CHAP. 89.

An Act to authorize the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, to consolidate certain Endowment Funds.

[Assented to 27th May, 1882.]

Preamble. WHEREAS the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec has, by its petition, represented that it is in charge of certain endowment funds for the support of various Parishes and Missions within the Diocese of Quebec, and has prayed that the said Church Society should be authorized so to distribute any losses which may occur, through failure in investments, as to make them fall proportionately over the whole of such endowments held by the Society; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petitioners; Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:

Consolidation of endowment funds of society for certain purposes.

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec is authorized, so far, to consolidate the said endowment funds, so placed and hereafter to be placed in the hands of the said society, under deeds of trust for investment, as to enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur through failure in investments proportionately over the whole.

Consolidation limited.

2. The said consolidation of the said intrusted endowment funds shall extend, only so far as to enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur, through failure in investments proportionately over the whole, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

NOTE.—The following parishes or missions have agreed to the by-law on the consolidation of endowments, viz:—Barford and Hereford, Cape Cove and Percé, Cookshire, Duds-well, Gaspé Basin, Ireland and South Inverness, Levis, Malbaie, Inverness, Rivière-du-Loup, Bourg Louis, Kingsey, Magog and Georgeville, Stanstead, Durham, Leeds, Brompton and Windsor, Sandy Beach, Hatley, Coaticook, Melbourne and Richmond, Frampton East and West, Compton, St. Sylvester, Portneuf, Three Rivers,

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1895.

(Presented to the Church Society, February 5th, 1896.)

Your Board report with much thankfulness to God that the year under review has been one of development and encouragement.

The picture is not wholly devoid of shadows. Slight discouragements are here and there noted; but these are only of a temporary nature, and in most cases really the result of the Church's activity and progress. We are enabled to report a considerable widening of the mission field, an increase of labourers at work, an increase in the amount of money raised both for Parochial and Diocesan objects, and also an increase in expenditure. We feel that we should be thankful even for increased expenditure, since this implies more Church workers, more Church building, and more Church life.

Reference was made last year to the serious question which, the steadily decreasing revenue from invested capital, was compelling us to face, and which was coming at a time when the demands for Church extension were becoming more numerous and urgent; each re-investment does but add to the difficulty and seriousness of the problem. Attention was also called to the fact that there were unhappily many Parishes and Missions which had made no house-to-house collections in aid of the Society's *general work*. It is with much gratification that we are enabled this year to acknowledge subscriptions, in this behalf, from twenty Congregations that made no such returns in 1894; and to credit every Deanery in the Diocese with an increase in the amount sent into the common treasury. The revenue from voluntary sources, for the year 1895, is in fact the largest ever yet received by the Society.

It is true that the increase from the city of Quebec is due to the subscriptions, of \$50 each, received from the comparatively large number of Life Members, enrolled in 1895. May we not hope that, from amongst the many who are blest with a goodly share of this world's goods, an equally large number may be found ready, year by year, to join this honoured roll.

We feel grateful in being able to present a Report, on the whole so satisfactory as this will be found. And we thank those members of the Church, scattered throughout the Diocese, who, by gifts and labour, have contributed to this end.

But our mission is to "Go Forward." We may set it down as a general rule that *living work* will never stand still but will always extend; and ours is such a work.

We would therefore again earnestly appeal to Church people generally to take an ever deepening interest, and to claim an ever increasing share, in this our common work for Christ and His Church; and by so doing, not merely *impart* a blessing, but *secure* one;—for Love grows by loving, Hope by hoping, Faith by believing, and Life by living and working for others.

That so unusually large an amount as \$1826.68 should have been expended in grants alone is a matter not to be regretted, indicating as it does unusual activity in Church work; but it will be observed that this sum more than consumes the whole of the year's subscriptions in behalf of this Fund, although the Fund is designed to meet, as well, the general expenses of the management of the Society, printing, &c., &c.

As is well known these subscriptions come in late in the year. It is absolutely necessary therefore that the Society

should *begin* each year with a fair balance in hand. We began the year 1895 with \$1,600, but owing to the unusual amount disbursed in grants, as referred to, we are left with but \$400, to our credit, on entering upon 1896, an amount quite inadequate to our needs. Until the treasury is replenished, we shall consequently be unable to give a favourable response to any appeal for help however urgent and deserving it may be. We feel sure that we have only to make these facts known in order to secure for the General Fund a more generous support during the current year.

THE MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of Stipends of Missionaries ; — the Fund being supplemented by the annual Grant from the S. P. G., the Assessments of the Rural Congregations, a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, and the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund,—the whole administered by the Diocesan Board.)

We are pleased in being able to report that the appeal, made last year, for increased contributions in behalf of this important Fund has met with a very generous response, as will have been seen in the foregoing Table.

The expenditure of this money is entrusted to the Diocesan Board of Missions. In the Report of that Board, as also in the individual Reports of Missionaries, may be inferentially gathered the fruit of its wise administration.

PENSION FUND.

(For the support of aged and infirm Clergymen.)

Six Clergymen have been benefited by this Fund during the past year, the total amount paid being \$2,243.33. Through the death of the Rev. Peter Roe, one claim, but a brief time enjoyed, has lapsed.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

There were twelve annuitants on this Fund last year, seven widows and five children, the amount paid aggregating \$2,250. Mrs. Torrance, the widow of the late Rev. J. Torrance, for twenty-five years a recipient of the Fund's bounty, died during the year.

This Fund is one which naturally appeals to the sympathy of a generous public. The result is that in the course of long years, its capital has been brought to such a figure that the revenue therefrom suffices for all present demands. For this we feel profoundly grateful. Under these circumstances your Board would be pleased if, until further notice, the people would kindly make their offerings in aid of the General Fund or Mission Fund rather than the W. & O. Fund, the demands upon the two former being very great, and increasing year by year.

EDUCATION FUND.

Seventeen schools received assistance from this Fund in 1895. From Clergy and Trustees alike, warm expressions of gratitude have, from time to time, been received. It will readily be seen from the conditions governing these grants, that, while poor parents receive much needed help and their children a better education than otherwise would be theirs, the Church's teaching, influence and ways must of necessity grow in favour in every locality thus aided.

In furtherance of this good work we have again to express our great indebtedness to the Colonial and Continental Church Society for its generous and most helpful grant of £80 stg.

FUND FOR THE EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY.

Nine grants were made from this Fund last year. In accordance with long custom, Dr. Robert Hamilton generously doubled each grant made by the Society. The aid thus bestowed amounted to \$790.00. In every case the School attended was either Bishop's College School, Lennoxville, or Compton Ladies' College.

It is an undeniable fact that in no other calling, demanding the high attainments which Church people expect, and properly expect, to find possessed by their Clergy, is the average rate of remuneration so low. How to secure for their children a fitting education is consequently an oft anxious problem with them.

In an extensive Mission field with three or four stations and a widely scattered flock, *parochial visiting* claims and consumes so much of a Clergyman's time, that he cannot properly attend, himself, to the education of his children, nor can he by other labour eke out his small Stipend. This Fund therefore offers a suitable channel through

which deserving aid may be rendered and anxious minds relieved.

REGULATION.—“Grants from the Fund for the Education of the Children of the Clergy shall be made at the Society's meeting in the month of May for each succeeding Scholastic year. Any Clergyman desiring assistance from this Fund shall apply to the Secretary of the Church Society for an authorized form of application and shall see that it is returned, duly filled, not later than the first day of May, in order that it may be in time to receive the required consideration of the Finance Committee prior to coming before the Central Board.”

(For the Sale of Bibles, Prayer Books, Hymn Books, Sunday School Books, Books of Devotion, Almanacks, &c.)

The Depository Committee have received instructions from your Board to make better provision for the sale of books in the Depository; and, if possible, to place the local management under more efficient control, and in surroundings more attractive. This end, it is expected, will soon be accomplished.

It is the desire of your Board to enlarge the Depository's sphere of usefulness, and to make it a more helpful and vigorous missionary agency.

The Secretary of the Church Society will gladly receive suggestions from any of the Clergy as to ways and means of accomplishing this desirable end.

REGULATION, re: MANAGEMENT OF CHURCH DEPOSITORY.—“That the system governing the sale of books at the Church Depository be strictly a cash system; that a discount of 10 per cent. be allowed to the Clergy of the Diocese on all purchases, provided payments for such are made within thirty days; that the same rate of discount be allowed to the Laity on making a purchase, for Church purposes, to the amount of \$20.”

BISHOP WILLIAMS MEMORIAL MISSION FUND.

Of the \$1,826 remaining to be paid on account of this Fund a year ago, only \$400 have as yet been received. More however has been promised before we go to press. A Financial Statement will appear at the end of the Report. The Treasurer of the Church Society credits the account with \$41,209.66.

BISHOP G. J. MOUNTAIN MEMORIAL FUND.

A sum of \$200 has been given to the Church Society as the nucleus of a Fund in memory of the late Right Rev. G. J. Mountain, third Bishop of Quebec. And a further material contribution has been promised, the conditions being that so soon as the capital shall reach \$20,000, the revenue therefrom shall be available to supplement the Mission Fund of the Church Society. There must be many still living to whom the memory of that great and saintly Bishop is dear. If not by donation during life, at least by Legacy, some of these might like to give to this Fund a thankoffering for the noble work which God enabled him to perform in our land.

LEGACIES.

By the Will of the late Mrs. Porteous, a sum of \$3,000 was bequeathed to the late Lord Bishop of Quebec for the benefit of the Blind. The administration of this money, which with interest now amounts to \$3,505.65, has been entrusted to the Church Society. Its revenue may be used by the Bishop at his discretion, to assist needy cases as they arise.

Mrs. Williams, the widow of our late revered Bishop, left to the Mission Fund of the Church a bequest which has realized \$102.25.

CHURCH HELPERS' ASSOCIATION.

Last year again the task of soliciting subscriptions in behalf of the Funds of the Church Society, in the city and district of Quebec, was kindly undertaken by the Quebec Association of Church Helpers.

The work, no light one, was carried out with the same thoroughness and efficiency as in former years. The service, thus rendered the Church, is most highly appreciated by your Board.

CHURCH SOCIETY HELPERS.

Not in Quebec alone but throughout the Diocese, are earnest and zealous women found ready to help the good cause by active work, as well as holy influence. An Association was formed last Autumn, which already has a Branch in every Parish and Mission in the Diocese (excepting Labrador), called "the Church Society Helpers."

As through the "Woman's Auxiliary" loving help goes out to Missions abroad, so through this Association help will be extended to home Missions, through the Society's channels. The scope of their labours will not be so varied as that of the Quebec Association, but the object is a kindred one.

The advent of this new organization goes far to explain the fact that in 1895, subscriptions came in from almost every Mission in the Diocese, and in the aggregate exceeded the receipts of all previous years. The Church Society is very grateful for their help.

LOCAL ENDOWMENTS.

During the past year the Malbaie Local Endowment Fund was brought up to \$3,600, the figure at which its revenue becomes available. The Kingsey Endowment Fund will be in a like position within a few weeks.—We call attention to these facts by way of suggesting to those Missions having Endowments, as yet immature, one of the most effectual means by which they could contribute towards the support of their Clergy.

A little systematic and persevering effort on the part of the interested congregation, extending it may be over a few years, having for its object the augmentation of their Endowment Fund, would bring almost every such Fund in the Diocese up to the revenue-producing-point.

We can conceive of no other way whereby, at so comparatively small an outlay, so large a revenue could be secured for many of the Missions in the near future.

THE CLERGY TRUST COMMITTEE.

The Clergy Trust Committee, established in 1856 to assume the administration of the "Commutation Money," and who also took charge of the various Local Endowment

Funds of the Diocese, has been abolished,—the Church Society having found it advisable to place the management of all its Funds in the hands of the Central Board, and thus have one Finance Committee instead of two.

This step does not in reality involve any change in the *personnel*, since the same gentlemen, for the most part, acted on both Finance Committees. We cannot however expunge even the *name* of the "Clergy Trust Committee" from our books without bearing testimony, in the strongest language possible, to the good work which, through forty long years, that Committee did for the Church in this Diocese.

To their unwearied interest, their careful husbandry, and their wise administration, we owe it to-day that the several Funds managed by them are in so prosperous a condition as they are. Words inadequately express the Society's indebtedness to the gentlemen who have acted upon this Committee, and more particularly to its successive Treasurers.

IN MEMORIAM.

Your Board desire to offer a tribute of affectionate respect to the memory of the following members, who, having been zealous workers, were called hence during the past year:

The Rev. PETER ROE, after eighteen years of faithful service, and a brief retirement from active duty, died on the fourth of November last. Possessed of singular kindliness of heart, gentleness, and transparent goodness, he was greatly beloved by all who knew him.

Mr. W. H. TAPP was for many years a member of this Board, and took an especial interest in the cause of Education.

Mr. EDWARD CHAPMAN, at one time Master of Lennoxville Grammar School, and subsequently, for fifty years, intimately connected with the University of Bishop's College, was instrumental, through these agencies, as also by the powerful influence of his holy and lovable character, in promoting the Church's cause to an extent which it is impossible to estimate.

Miss FORSYTH, the daughter of the late Mr. J. Bell Forsyth, one of the original founders of the Church Society,

was herself one of its ever active and zealous supports. For a long period of years her name appears in our Reports as a collector in behalf of our Funds. In the good work of the "Church Helpers' Association" and of the "Woman's Auxiliary," and in our various Charitable Institutions she ever took the liveliest interest. Her life was devoted to her Church and the Church's manifold operations.

Mrs. C. E. MORGAN was another member of the Society who for a great many years had taken an unremitting interest in Diocesan, Domestic, and Foreign Missions. In her sphere she inspired and led others.

Mr. CORNELIUS JUDGE. In the death of Mr. Judge, the Church Society has had to deplore no ordinary loss. For thirty years he had been a member of the Central Board and its Committees, and throughout this long period he ever took the deepest interest in all the varied works of the Society. Few Churchmen were so thoroughly acquainted with the whole machinery of the Diocese. His practical knowledge on this head, and his qualifications as a man of business, made his counsel and service of great value. His cheerful readiness to undertake any duties that might be of service to the cause, together with his extreme kindness and courtesy at all times displayed, combine to make our loss keenly felt and his memory dear.

Mr. Balfour asked to resume charge of Depository *pro tem*. Pension voted to widow of Rev. P. Roe. Opinion of Hon. Counsel, *re* : sale of Church land in Lingwick, also in Danville. Depository Committee asked to make better provision for the sale of books at Depository. Death of Mr. Cornelius Judge. Resolution of condolence.

Williams, Hamilton and Balfour appointed a Committee to make arrangements for the Anniversary Meeting of the Church Society. REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD OF MISSIONS

TO THE

Diocesan Church Society for the year 1895.

The following is the abstract of the revenue account of the Diocesan Board for the year ended December 31st, 1895 :

The above statement must be regarded as very satisfactory, showing as it does that the resources of the Diocesan Board during 1895 have so far exceeded its expenditure, that the much needed balance with which to begin the current year is now at its disposal. This will obviate the necessity of drawing upon the Clergy Trust Fund for the whole of its surplus revenue, as was the case the past year, a measure which, in view of diminishing rates of interest, it is not advisable to adopt as a rule.

Whilst it is most gratifying to note this very considerable increase in income, your Board, without attempting any forecast of its financial position, is quite certain that no such favourable result can be reached at the close of 1896, owing to the fact that the S. P. G. grant will be \$1,000 less than in 1895, to say nothing of a possible increase of expenditure in the near future from the necessity of affording assistance to some of the Clergy whose Missions are too extensive to be worked with efficiency, single handed.

It must also be borne in mind that your Society adopted a resolution two years ago instructing the Diocesan Board to consider the question of raising the Stipends of the Clergy. This matter has not been overlooked, and this much desired improvement will certainly be carried out, if, on further examination of the financial position, it is seen to be probable that the permanent income of your Board will justify it.

Among the resources of the Diocesan Board there is none which it views with more anxious solicitude than the Mission Fund of the Church Society, regarding it as one of the chief means by which any expansion of missionary work may be made in the Diocese, or by which that work may be rendered more efficient. It is most gratifying then to note that the increase from that Fund, in 1894, has been nearly doubled in 1895. There has been, it is true, a small decrease in the city—amounting to less than \$50, which little fact, your Board does not doubt, will only act as an incentive to more generous efforts in the future—but in every Rural District the more efficient organization adopted seems to have brought about the very best results. Especially in the Districts of St. Francis and Gaspé has its success been most marked, each having more than doubled the contributions of the previous year.

With reference to the condition and prospects of the Missions aided by the Diocesan Board, there is every reason to believe that, making our allowance for the great difficulties of the work and the large extent of field covered by our Missionaries, substantial progress is being made, an earnest of still greater advancement in the future. Indeed this is not a matter of conjecture, but an absolute fact of which many proofs are to be found in the individual reports of the Clergy in every Rural Deanery in the Diocese. The statement made in the admirable synopsis of those reports for the Deanery of St. Francis, showing that nearly \$4,000 more had been raised for all Church purposes than in the previous year, of which \$759 had been contributed in excess of the amount given the year before towards extra parochial objects, is only one out of many proofs evidencing the practice of those Christian duties which betoken acceptance of the Church's teaching.

The yearly increasing regularity and promptitude with which the Church-Wardens observe the stipulated condi-

tions of their agreements with your Board, may be adduced as another fact indicative of progress and the value in which are held, by those most concerned, the blessings provided for them.

No material increase in the Assessments has been made in 1895.

The following changes in the staff of the Clergy have taken place:—

The Rev. Peter Roe, for seventeen years the faithful Missionary of Inverness, was obliged, from failing health, to accept his retiring allowance in the month of June, when the Rev. H. A. Dickson, formerly Missionary at Randborough, was appointed to succeed him. Mr. Roe, of whom an obituary notice appears in the Report of the Central Board, did not long enjoy his well earned repose on earth, but was called to his eternal rest on 7th November last.

In June the Rev. C. H. Brooks resigned the Mission of Way's Mills and Barnston, and the Rev. A. E. Whatham entered upon its charge in the month of September.

The Rev. E. A. Weary resigned the Mission of Dudswell and was succeeded by the Rev. Edmund Jackson in the month of July.

The Rev. A. H. Moore, who had previously served the Mission for some months as Lay Reader, was appointed to Randborough and Island Brook in the month of June.

The vacancies in the Diocese during the past year have been few and for short periods only. Every Mission on the list, now numbering thirty-four, exclusive of four self-supporting Parishes, has a resident Clergyman.

REPORT OF THE LORD BISHOP

FOR THE YEAR 1895,

With reference to Special Funds entrusted to him for Missionary Work in the Diocese.

In addition to the Missionary Work in the Diocese, undertaken and administered by the Diocesan Board of the Church Society, showing that \$13,924.02 were received during the year in Assessments, and that \$16,217.71 were received from other sources, and that \$27,468.61 were spent in Stipends of Missionary Clergy, &c., the Bishop has been enabled, by kind friends and supporters of the Diocese, to undertake further Missionary Work at Beebe Plain, Danville, Hereford, Lake Megantic, Leeds, Milby, Sandhill, Johnville, on the coast of Labrador, and on the Magdalen Islands. Towards this additional work \$915 were received in Assessments, \$1,651.51 were received from other sources, making the whole sum paid by the Bishop in Stipends, &c., up to \$2,566.51.

Hence we may say with thankfulness that the Assessments amounted altogether to \$14,839.02, while the contributions from the interest of invested funds, added to donations, subscriptions, &c., amounted to \$17,869.22, and the total amount spent on Stipends for Missionary Work within the Diocese to \$30,035.12.

Report of the St. Francis District Association of the Church Society, for the year 1895.

The total amount of money raised in the District during the past year for Church purposes of all kinds—not including \$1,125.92 raised for Bishop's College Chapel windows—is \$30,153.20. This is \$3,881.07 more than was reported last year, and, considering the continued financial depression, is certainly something to be thankful for.

And, if it be true, as it certainly is, that one of the best evidences of a Church's vitality and earnestness is its readiness to respond to claims for aid which come from outside its own limits, there is still greater cause for thankfulness in the fact that the amount contributed this year for extra parochial objects is \$757.69 more than that of last year, while the offerings for the Church Society exceed last year's, by \$260.62, being \$1,325.38.

Of the money raised for extra parochial purposes, \$2,984.27 were devoted to objects within the Diocese, and \$1,033.25 to objects beyond our Diocesan limits.

The following Parishes have specially distinguished themselves in this matter of outside giving:—Richmond contributing 14 p. c. of its total income; Cookshire 15 p. c.; Coaticook and Lennoxville 16 p. c.; Danville and Sherbrooke 20 p. c.; Barford 27 p. c., and Hatley nearly 33 p. c. Nor would it be fair to mention these Parishes without stating that there are certain others which have similarly distinguished themselves, although, because of unusual expenditure for special work, such as Church building, the results are not so apparent.

The year on the whole seems to have been one of quiet work and steady progress. The pressure of hard times has been felt, and in various places difficulties of no slight character have been encountered. But there has been no retrogression. The ground has been rather more than held. Several reports speak of the opening of new centres of work. The majority speak of congregations holding their own and even increasing in spite of the usual losses by removal. And in them all there is a spirit of hopefulness which must be very cheering to the hearts of loyal churchmen.

Two great problems of the present day are certainly "How to awaken *men* to a greater earnestness in religious things," and "How to secure the more thorough training of the young?" It is therefore a cause for deep thankfulness that our Clergy seem to be setting themselves to grapple with these problems. One Clergyman speaks in his report of "a large percentage of *men* attending the Services." Another says: "I have a number of energetic young men at work." There is an evidently increasing and a not wholly unsuccessful effort being made to draw men into the work of the Church. It is no longer so difficult as it used to be, to induce young laymen to help in the Services of the Church, or the people to accept their ministrations. One of our reports refers to such a layman as "our devoted Lay Reader." The St. Andrew's Brotherhood has reached us. The Lay Helpers' Association is now duly organized. And as to work among the young almost every report speaks encouragingly of Sunday Schools or Guilds for the young or other similar agencies. Sunday School Conferences too have been held in various centres and have awakened much interest. And catechising, long talked of, is now becoming a common feature of our parochial work.

The causes of this healthful and hopeful state of things are not far to seek.

First.—Our devoted Bishop has made himself felt throughout the District, visiting, preaching, lecturing, confirming and counselling. His visits have ever brought fresh vigour and encouragement, and the Clergy have been helped by them amid their discouragements.

Secondly.—The Clergy themselves realize the necessity of patient and persistent labour. They are used both to success and failure, and are neither unduly uplifted by the one nor cast down by the other.

Thirdly.—The women are active as ever, and in their Guilds and Auxiliaries have done quite as much as in former years to keep up the life and vigour of the Church.

And *fourthly.*—Bishop's College and School, which are still doing a good work on their own educational lines, are now a Missionary centre from whence Clergy and Students go forth, near and far, ministering to the needs not only of settled Parishes in time of necessity, but to scattered Congregations in School-Houses, and are exerting a real and powerful influence for good and strengthening the hands both of Clergy and people.

There are certain points of importance and interest in some of the reports which before closing it were well to emphasize. "Heartiness of responses," says one, "is a feature of the Services here." Would that this could be said of all our Churches.

The Rector of Cookshire reports St. Andrew's Chapel, at Eaton Corner, furnished, paid for, consecrated and used. The Parish of Danville suffered a grievous loss at the beginning of the year in the destruction by fire of its beautiful Church of St. Augustine. The congregation is reported as holding together, and making a brave effort to provide the means to build again. Stanstead reports the division of its field of labour, and a resident Clergyman established in Beebe Plain. Many reports speak of the advances made in Church music, through the aid of Mr. Dorey, the organist of St. Peter's, Sherbrooke.

Finally, the College for young women at Compton is still maintaining its existence and doing good work; and there is reasonable ground to hope that the debt, which has so long hindered its progress, will, by the end of this year, be entirely swept away.

On the whole, though the difficulties are evidently many and great, calling for zeal, tact and courage, yet, wherever these qualities are manifested, even in moderate degree, coupled with a belief in the divine origin and mission of the Church, and a readiness to endure hardship and sink self in loyal devotion to the Master, there, the Church will be certain, not only to root herself, but to grow, bear fruit and prosper!

ACTON.

The Rev. L. C. Wurtele reports:—

During the past year the usual Church Services have been faithfully and without interruption kept up. One noticeable and pleasing feature in the Services within this Mission, and it holds good at all three Stations, is the heartiness with which the congregation joins in the responses. In October last a Commercial traveller happened to come to Church; and after service his remark to me was, "This Church has life in it, so hearty are the responses. In the

course of my journey through the country, I am often pained by the coldness and dullness of the Service. Two or three voices only can be heard, and these in faltering tones, as if they were afraid to hear themselves." Once a month, in St. Mark's Church, Actonvale, the Evening Service and Sermon are given in French, and every Sunday morning about one-third of the Service is given in the same tongue. I have also a Service in French on a Wednesday evening twice a month in a private residence. The many to whom French is more familiar than English duly appreciate these privileges. As last year, so again this year, gladly can I testify to the regularity of, and the increase in, the attendance at the Holy Table.

It has been pleasing to notice the regularity of the meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and its Junior Branch. The members are few, and not wealthy, but they are earnest and sincere in their exertions in the cause of Missions. A bale has been made, worth about \$14.00, and it is the intention of the members to forward it to the Venerable Archdeacon Tims, of Calgary, Alberta.

As a means of bringing the young together with their parents for their mutual good, once a week alternately we have a meeting of our Shakespeare and Agassiz Clubs; these meetings are looked forward to with pleasure, and are found to be interesting and instructive.

On June 19th we all gladly welcomed the presence of our beloved Diocesan. Six Candidates received the Holy Rite of Confirmation.

We are sorry to announce the loss by death of one of our active members, the late Miss Eleanor H. Towle, who was called away last December; she was a regular contributor to our Church funds, and entered heartily in all our projects for the improvement of the congregation. Her departure is severely felt by us all.

Our aspirations for the future improvement in the condition of the town of Acton are still hopeful. Providence may still have in store a bright and prosperous future for this place. We pray that it may be so.

BARFORD.

The Rev. G. H. A. Murray reports:—

The regular round of Sunday and week-day Services and parochial visiting has been kept up during the year. Three hundred and one Services have been held. Increased interest in some branches of the Church's work is noticeable. The Bishop made two regular visits to the Mission, and very kindly gave me three hours on a third occasion, as he was *en route* to Lennoxville from Hall's Stream. During these visits, His Lordship baptized six adults, confirmed sixteen candidates, the majority of whom were between twenty and sixty-five years of age, gave two Church History Lectures, attended a Social, and made several calls.

The Missionary Meetings and Harvest Thanksgiving Services at Dixville, Stanhope, and Perryborough were well attended and much appreciated.

Rev. Dr. Allnatt, Rev. Canon Foster, and Revs. Messrs. Bell, Binnington, Brooks, King and Wilson, each favoured one or more of the congregations with a Sermon or an Address.

The attendance at Holy Communion, notwithstanding the losses caused by removals and death, is on the increase.

The number of adult baptisms, and the amount raised for the Church Society, beat the record of any year since I came to the Mission. Thirty per cent. of the whole income goes to extra-parochial objects.

St. Cuthbert's Church, Dixville.—An average of ten Services per month are held here. The Sunday morning attendance averages fifty-four; Sunday evening twelve; Friday evening ten. At the Friday evening Services, different phases of Church teaching are being explained. Of late there has been a larger attendance at the evening Services, and it would be larger still, were it not that the majority of the congregation live on farms some distance from the Church, and it is not always convenient for them to come out in the evening.

The number on the Sunday School roll has also increased, and a deeper interest has been aroused as a result of the special plea made at the Service of Intercession in October 20th. Mr. Gill continues to keep a sharp eye on the finances, and is always prepared for the end of the quarter. Miss Johnson, besides filling the position of organist satisfactorily, discharges the duties of Sunday School teacher

very efficiently. Miss B. and Miss E. Boright, who teach the Village School, also render valuable assistance in the Sunday School.

St. Lawrence's Church, Barford.—Fortnightly Sunday Services are held here. Average attendance eight. A happy event of the year was the marriage of Miss D. Ward to Mr. Gilmour, of Montreal. She is missed very much; for she had acted as organist, and had won the good-will of all who knew her. A newly painted Church, whitewashed fence, liberal special collections, and large subscriptions to the Church Society, bear witness to the generosity of this congregation, small though it be.

St. Paul's Church, Stanhope.—Eight Services are held here each month. The average attendance is, on Sundays, thirty-five; on Wednesdays fourteen. In some respects the Church's work here was retarded by a severe Scarlet Fever epidemic which raged during the month of May, and was not altogether checked till September; for, besides being the means of closing the Church for a month, it did much to diminish the attendance at the Services. There were three deaths in the families belonging to this congregation, and several among the French Canadians. One bright and promising young man was stricken down on a Friday and died the following Tuesday, leaving a wife and young child to mourn his loss. The scourge, however, was not an un-mixed evil; for, besides directing attention to the sanitary condition of the place, it was a means in God's hand of moving three adults to come forward for Baptism and Confirmation when the Bishop visited the Mission in June.

The interior of the Church has been tinted, the approaches gravelled and the horse-shed painted. Mr. S. A. Baldwin furnished the materials, and Mr. W. F. Johnston and Mr. Frank Young did their work gratis.

Mr. A. M. Stetson, who owns nearly all the real estate around Norton Mills, spends a few months of the year here and takes an interest in the prosperity of the Church.

Mr. Bishop and family combine the duties of Church-Warden and Sexton. The Church is always comfortable, and there are no fees to be paid. Miss E. Bishop, the organist, and the young ladies of the Choir, are very punctual and painstaking.

Miss Bishop and Mrs. Shattuck have done good work in the Sunday School.

Last Christmas, the members of this congregation shewed

their good-will by presenting to their pastor and his wife a beautiful rattan rocking chair.

Church of the Advent, Perryboro.—About thirty Sunday, and occasional week-day, Services were held during the year. The average attendance was forty. Mr. W. Melrose, during the few months he was here, was ready and willing to help in every good work, not forgetting the Sunday School. Miss K. Evans, teacher of the district school, Mr. E. Birch and Mrs. Perry, all rendered efficient services in the Sunday School; Miss Evans also took charge of the organ, and now that she has left the place, we miss her very much.

The members of the Guild still continue their good work. The congregation is indebted to them for a new furnace and three new seats in the Church, as well as to the men who gave work and helped to dig the furnace cellar. The removal of the stove and the addition of the seats improve the appearance of the interior of the Church and make it capable of seating twelve more persons.

Mr. A. Betts furnishes wood and oil, and keeps the Church ready for Services free of cost.

I regret to have to chronicle the death of Mr. H. F. Walker. He was warden for several years, a devout Christian, a kind father who lived to see a large family virtuously and christianly brought up; and, on the morning preceding his death, he had the consolation of joining with seven members of that family (including his two daughters-in-law) in partaking of "the most comfortable Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ." "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."

Mr. Perry and his family have moved from this neighborhood. They will be much missed, having been amongst the oldest settlers of the place, highly esteemed by their neighbours, and much interested in Church work; but Perryboro's loss will be Hatley's gain; and I am pleased to note that Mr. Hobson, who succeeds Mr. Perry, is a consistent churchman.

I cannot close this report without expressing my appreciation of the tokens of kindness and friendship shown by many individual members of the several congregations towards myself and family, and especially of their sympathy and help when we were passing through the ordeal of affliction and death.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. Principal Adams reports:—

Our prevailing feeling at the end of the Christian year is one of thankfulness. The Chapel Services are continued as before with the exception that now we have on the first Sunday of the month two Celebrations of the Holy Communion, one at 9.45 A.M., and one, as on every other Sunday, at 7.30 A.M. We have a Celebration on every Saint's

Day; Daily Prayer, morning and evening; Litany—Sundays, Wednesdays and Fridays. During Lent the special short Service of devotion and reading at 7.45 A.M., lasting fifteen minutes.

The number of Clergymen on the staff is the same as last year—four. The Rev. Professor Watkins, M.A., has become Provost of the Western University, London, Ont., and is succeeded in the Chair of Classics by the Rev. Professor Parrock, B.A., scholar of Pembroke College, Cambridge, who has already been in the Diocese two years. The Rev. Professor Wilkinson, one of the staff, has been responsible, in addition to College clerical duty, for the Mission of Sandhill, Johnville and Milby. In the coming year he will be responsible for Sunday work in assistance to Rev. A. H. Robertson in connexion with Sandhill and Johnville, as well as in other parts of Eaton, but will only retain the pastoral charge of Milby.

The Principal, in addition to College Chapel work, has taken charge of the work in the Belvidere Mission, supported by Bishop's College School, in which four School-house Services have been maintained throughout the year.

Two of our Students were ordained Deacons, by the Bishop of Quebec, on June 24th (S. John the Baptist). The Sermon on the occasion was preached by the Principal, Dr. Allnatt presenting the Candidates.

The Bishop's visits occur regularly once a Term; Lectures are given to the Students on various subjects connected with the work of the Church. Recently the Canons of the Church, ancient and modern, have been receiving attention; and the Bishop hears the Students read and preach.

The College Missionary Union has held meetings in each Term. The present Term shews an increase of interest in Foreign Missionary work. The offerings are sent to St. Paul's College, Madagascar Diocese. At the recent meeting on November 29th, the Sermon was preached by the Rev. Henry E. Wright, M.A., of Sherbrooke; papers were read by Rev. Professor Parrock, M.A., and Mr. T. Donnelly, B.A. Several Students were selected as speakers, and the meeting was very successful. At previous meetings, various missionary subjects have been brought forward by the Principal and by Professor Wilkinson, and Sermons preached by some members of the staff.

The annual Confirmation was held on the evening of S. John the Baptist's Day. Twelve boys received the Apos-

toxic Rite of the Laying on of hands, on the evening of the day on which two of the Students had been ordained. This is a happy coincidence which we should be glad to see repeated from year to year.

The Principal's work, as Chaplain, has been continued in three divisions: 1st. Communicants' Class—Church History; 2nd. Confirmation—throughout the year; 3rd. Junior Class—Gospel of St. Matthew—Epistles and Gospels for different days studied.

At the beginning of the fiftieth year we were able to report the largest entry of Students, the largest number of Students, and a large number of Students who are Candidates for Holy Orders. Now, a year later, at the beginning of our second half-century of existence, we are able to report a further increase in Students—exactly forty-two—being double the number of Students in June, 1885, at which time the whole number of Students was considerably less than the number of Candidates for Holy Orders at the present time. We see here great cause for thankfulness.

In the Chapel we have received a number of stained glass windows of admirable design from various donors. Of the thirty-one lights actually in the Chapel, sixteen are actually either in, or promised.

A three-light window—East—gift of Mrs. Nicolls, in memory of her father, Bishop Mountain, the Founder and First President.

A three-light window—West—gift of Dr. Mountain, in memory of Dr. Mountain's family.

A two-light window—given by the Ladies of Lennoxville, in memory of Dr. Nicolls, First Principal.

A one-light window, in memory of Rev. L. Doolittle, M.A., at one time Rector of Lennoxville, an ardent promoter of Bishop's College—given by overplus from the last named window, together with remainder from Bishop Dunn.

A two-light window, in memory of Dr. Lobley, Second Principal—given by the Bishop.

A two-light window, in memory of Bishop Williams, late Rector of School and Third President of the Corporation—given by the Chancellor.

A two-light window, in memory of Bishop Fulford, Second President of the Corporation—by private subscription, on which \$50.00 is still owing.

A one-light is promised, in memory of H. A. L. Young, a

student, and son of one of our earliest students, who died at the College in June, 1891.

The specimen light is still in the Chapel, and we propose to keep it there; so we hope some kind friend will give it to us. We thus have fifteen lights of the thirty-one to provide for. We consider ourselves remarkably fortunate in having received so much generous help. To the kind donors we offer our cordial thanks, and especially to the Bishop, whose kind advice and guidance has been invaluable. We report the sum of \$1,150, as contributed for windows since the last report.

We also report the starting of the Jubilee Fund. Bishop Dunn has offered \$500, Mr. E. J. Price \$500, the Principal \$250, the Chancellor (for the Chapel) \$100, Archdeacon Lindsay \$50; total thus far \$1,400. Other \$600 is reported, but the promise is not in writing. Since this start was made, we have received a munificent offer from Mr. Robert Hamilton of \$20,000 for a special Jubilee Fund, half to endow the Head Mastership of the School, the other half to go to the College for general purposes. This noble gift is to be received by us on condition that the Jubilee Fund should otherwise amount, in *bona fide* promised subscriptions, to \$10,000 before the 31st July, 1896. We hail the offer with grateful joy, and hopefully encounter the task so graciously set us.

The Choral Communion of June 27, our Jubilee Eucharist, was a Service to be remembered by all who took part in it. The Bishop of Quebec celebrated; the Bishop of Nova Scotia was the Preacher; the Dean of Ontario read the Epistle, and the Dean of Quebec the Gospel, the Principal acting as Deacon.

One of our number, the most beloved of the staff, the late Edward Chapman, an intimate friend and trusted servant of the Church and of its Educational Institution, has passed away during the year. From 1842, before the actual foundation of the College, he worked in the school which was the nucleus of our College School. His services have been always self-sacrificing. His life was a tribute of loving generosity.

Many beautiful additions to our Church fittings are gratefully chronicled:—from Quebec—Credence-Table and Pulpit, from the "Church Helpers"; Fair Linen and other gifts, from S. Matthew's Guild; a superb White Altar Frontal, from Mrs. J. Hamilton and her brother; a hand-

some Dossal, from Miss R. Hamilton; a beautiful Communion Set, the gift of the Rev. Lennox W. Williams (an old boy), in memory of his revered father; a Book Marker, from Professor Parrock; and a handsomely bound Volume, containing the Communion offices, from Professor Wilkinson, of Lennoxville.

Besides taking the Morning Service on Sundays once a fortnight and preaching once in five weeks in the evening in the College Chapel, the Principal has taken a Mission Service on an average of once every Sunday. He has preached in Toronto, Montreal (Cathedral, St. John's, Grace Church, Trinity, St. Mary's, Hochelaga); in Sherbrooke (St. Peter's and Church of the Advent); in the Waterville Mission, in Stanstead, Lennoxville, and at Island Pond, Vt.; in St. Stephen's and Lancast, Cornwall, and Kegworth, Leicestershire, England, and twice on the s.s. *Numidian*.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE SCHOOL MISSIONS.

The Rev. Principal Adams reports:—

Owing to a sprained knee which shewed chronic weakness, the Principal has to acknowledge that he has not personally visited the houses of the Mission so frequently as in the previous year. More actual visiting has been done however, as from June 30th to September 8th inclusive, a Student was resident in the Mission.

Services have been held but with very little success at Howard Mines and No 12 School-house: many had moved away from the neighbourhood of the former: and at the latter there never has been much environment of population. Though not sure that another attempt may not be made at No 12, it is true that any persons much in earnest could attend a Church Service at Eustis or Belvidere School-house.

A.—*Bullard School-House*.—The Services at the Bullard School-house are kept up heartily. The Sunday School has nearly thirty on the roll, of whom twenty-four were present last Sunday. The chief effort here, as in the next place named, is for the children, the great majority of whom have never before attended. Catechising is practised every Sunday after the Second Lesson at both A and B.

B.—*Haskill Hill*.—Mr. Moor, in his Summer visit, found a neighbourhood centring in the Haskill School-house, in which he thought work could be done. It is about three miles from Lennoxville and two from Capelton. We have an average of thirty attendants there, nearly all young people, and a promising Sunday School contributing more than half that total. Dr. Allnatt has been to this Mission and regards it as a promising field.

C.—*Moulton Hill*.—During the Summer Mr. Callis took this School-house every Sunday. The congregations are not so large as at A and B, but the Services are fairly hearty. Mr. Brockington, B.A., has taken most of the Services since September. In the former part of the year he was helped by Messrs. Auden and Barley.

During the last few weeks, Messrs. Wurtele and Balfour, (both names very favourably known in the Diocese), have started a Sunday School at Moulton Hill, this being held before the Service.

D.—*Belvidere*.—This School-house is occupied by a Methodist Sunday School from two o'clock to three, and our Service follows once a fortnight at three; the alternate Sunday there is a Methodist Service. The pupils and people all stay to our Service, which they appear to enjoy. In all the four School-houses we now have organs, and the services are decidedly hearty.

It is worthy of consideration as to whether some renewed effort should not be made at No. 12 School-house on the Upper Plateau.

Suggestions have been made to have a Sunday School at Huntingville, but if this is undertaken it should be by the Milby Mission. The "Green" School-house has also been mentioned as a possibility.

The Mission has been helped in various ways by Rev. Prof. Scarth and Prof. Allnatt, the three masters already named, amongst the Divinity Students who are Bachelors of Arts, by Messrs. Watson, Almond, Donnelly, Justin, Dickson, Vial, Barton and Dowdell; (non-Bachelors),

Dixon ; (Arts Students), Boyle, Wurtele, Balfour, Bates, Burns, Patterson, Johnson, Moor, Callis, Dutton, Watson, Taylor and Turner ; (Old Boys), J. H. C. Wilson ; (other friends), Mr. H. A. Elkins.

There would be no difficulty from the side of the College in working stations A and B in conjunction with Waterville and Lennoxville Parishes respectfully. And the College helpers would be glad to help the Rev. E. A. W. King in any way approved by him and endorsed by the Bishop.

It is proposed to have a resident Student especially for A and B, from December 21st to January 20th, inclusive.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE SCHOOL MISSIONS.

MILBY, JOHNVILLE AND SANDHILL.

The Rev. Professor Wilkinson reports :—

During the past year I have, with the help chiefly of Mr. George Pye, B.A., regularly kept up the Services and visited the families in these three places. I do not, of course, know the people so well as I should if I were living in the midst of them, and may therefore leave untouched subjects which would ordinarily furnish matter for an annual report. There are in these places no families which could be called wealthy in this world's goods ; but, on the other hand, all have been blessed by God with sufficient to feed and clothe themselves—for which His Name be praised. In regard to spiritual goods it is more difficult to make an

estimate, but there are, I feel sure, some in each of the three places who are rich in this respect, whose quiet regular lives, unostentatious piety and sturdy honesty are of the greatest value to the Clergyman in his efforts to draw men to Christ and His Church. The beauty of these lives will only appear when the Lord Himself comes to judge. It may be suggested in, but cannot be transferred to, the pages of a report.

And now I will mention the few events which seem to stand out in the quiet picture of the past year in each place.

Milby.—On Sexagesima Sunday the Lord Bishop of Quebec confirmed nine young people. The Church was well filled and the Addresses very attentively listened to.

During Lent weekly Services with Addresses were held by Mr. Aveling, who has since left us for Oxford, England. These Services were very fairly attended.

On the 2nd October, the Rev. Professor Scarth was kind enough to preach at our Harvest Thanksgiving Service. We had a good congregation, and great pains had been taken in the decoration of the Church.

Perhaps it was the fact that the Church could be made to look so well inside that set us thinking that it needed improvements outside. At any rate we determined to make an effort to get sufficient money to re-shingle and, if possible, repaint it and to repair the furnace. We collected the sum of \$28 in Milby and Lennoxville, and upon application to the Association of Church Helpers of Quebec, received from them the generous gift of \$25, for which our very hearty thanks are due to them. We have re-shingled half the roof and hope to finish it in the Spring, when we hope also to do some other needed repairs. In this connection I must thank not only the Church Helpers, but all at Milby and Lennoxville who subscribed, and especially those who laboured with their hands and took no money.

Mrs. and Miss Tambs have volunteered to collect for the Funds of the Quebec Church Society, and have been enrolled in the new society of Church Society Helpers of the Diocese of Quebec.

Sandhill.—The Church here, which used to be an extremely cold one, has lately had a furnace put in it. For this we owe the Ladies' Guild our thanks, for, by their exertions, has the necessary money been collected. Many willing hands gave their work freely; we thank them heartily. The furnace is now working very satisfactorily.

On the Festival of S. Simon and S. Jude the Bishop preached at our Harvest Festival in the afternoon; the Service was a very hearty one, and we are much indebted to the Students who went with us and helped the Choir.

Johnville.—On the evening of the 10th January I took my Magic Lantern to Johnville. Messrs. Brockington and Mundy were kind enough to go with me. After a very rough drive we reached the hospitable doors of Mr. Eugene Smith, and Mrs. Smith gave us an excellent tea. Then we proceeded to the Hall, and gave an Entertainment, which lasted about an hour and a half; seats were free, and we had a large audience, not so large however as we should have had with better weather.

In October, on the same day as he had preached at Sandhill, the Bishop drove with me to Johnville, and preached a most interesting and instructive Sermon to a large congregation, assembled as at Sandhill, to thank God for His merciful supply of daily Bread. Both here and at Sandhill we had the pleasure of the Rev. A. H. Robertson's presence and aid.

During the past year, I have had 5 Baptisms and 2 Burials and have paid 75 visits.

During the Summer Vacation, Mr. George Pye, who had charge of the Mission, paid 125 visits; thus between us, during the year, we have paid 200 visits.

I must, before closing, state that since the 15th of November I have ceased to be responsible for Sandhill and Johnville, having found on trial that it was impossible for me to attend aright to all three places. Johnville and Sandhill have therefore reverted to the Rev. A. H. Robertson, who will have the help of a Student, at present Mr. Dowdell, to work them. And, as it will now be necessary for Mr. Robertson to be absent from Cookshire one Sunday a month, the Rev. Professor Parrock and myself have undertaken to fill his place in turn on that Sunday. I took the Services at Cookshire and Eaton Corner for the first time on the 17th November, and the Rev. Professor Parrock will take them on the 15th of this month (December).

I may state here that, besides the work above mentioned, I have, during the past year, occupied the position of Chaplain at Cacouna for the month of August and the first Sunday in September; and have also taken Services and preached at Windsor Mills, Brompton Falls, Island Pond, St. John's, Melbourne; Richmond; Waterville, North Hat-

ley and Eustis; at these last three places in connection with the Jubilee Celebration arranged by the Rev. E. A. W. King.

Three Sundays at Way's Mills, June 9th, 16th and 23rd. Two Sundays at Windsor Mills, September 15th and November 10th. Also took occasional Sunday duty in Bishop's College School Mission.

Mr. C. T. Mundy—Two Sundays at Milby on December 30th and June 9th. Two Sundays at Johnville, January 13th and April 7th. Two Sundays at Sandhill, January 20th and June 30th. On September 30th at Compton.

Mr. T. Dowdell—Assisted the Rev. J. Rothera in his Mission of Leeds during the Summer holidays. Took Services at Dixville on July 7th, on May 12th at Milby and on June 2nd at Johnville.

Mr. A. P. Aveling—From April 24th to June 9th in charge of Howard Mines. Two Sundays at Island Pond, June 16th and June 23rd.

Mr. E. N. R. Burns—From January 20th to May 19th, in charge of No. 12) School-house, in Bishop's College School Mission. On April 7th took Service at Howard Mines, and on June 30th at Bullard School-house.

Mr. J. W. Wayman—During the past year has assisted the Rev. T. Blaylock in his Mission of Danville.

Mr. W. E. Patterson—From July 21st to September 1st in charge of the Mission of Way's Mills. From October

13th to November 17th, took Sunday duty at Haskill Hill, in the Bishop's College School Mission.

Mr. W. H. Moor—During the past year has assisted at the Services at Bullard School-house. He has also assisted occasionally at the Services at Haskill Hill and at Eustis. On September 15th he took Services at Stanstead.

The Bishop held an Admission Service for receiving members into the Brotherhood on February 16th, 1895. The following were then admitted:—Messrs. Dixon, Mundy, Aveling, Burns, Wayman, Patterson and Moor.

At the regular fortnightly meetings held during Lent and Trinity Terms, aside from the discussion of subjects relating to the Mission work done by members, Papers were read on various subjects, followed by a short discussion on the points brought out.

BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports:—

Another year is now fast drawing to a close, and, I am thankful to be able to say, with a hopeful prospect. There has not been much expenditure in any improvements about the Church or Parsonage this year, but a great improvement has been made in contributions to Diocesan and other outside purposes. Besides our offerings on Sunday, collections were made for the Church Society from house to house. The amounts given may be considered small, but they are at any rate encouraging, for what may be called a first attempt.

We had another visit from His Lordship the Bishop in the Spring. I had nine Candidates for Confirmation. His Lordship, as usual, gave earnest and impressive Addresses.

An important event of the year was a series of Services conducted by the Rev. I. M. Thompson, Rural Dean. They commenced on the thirteenth of December and closed on the nineteenth. Day after day large congregations listened attentively to Mr. Thompson's earnest and instructive Addresses. The Lord Bishop came out to attend the last Service. This great kindness was highly appreciated. He too addressed the assembled people, and thus fitly brought the series of Services to an end. One immediate result of the Services was a large increase in the number of Communicants, one of the surest signs of a people hungering and thirsting after the Bread of Life.

We have had Sunday Schools in operation during the year. There is a new teacher in each of our three day schools. One school unfortunately has lost its grant from the Church Society, through failing to comply with the conditions governing these grants ; but they were kindly renewed to the other two.

BURY.

The Rev. C. W. Washer reports :—

I have nothing special to write. I have been here about six months, and have followed the routine of my predecessor, with but little change. There are five stations served ; three on Sundays and two on week-days. The congregations might be larger, but I am told they are good. Holy Communion once a month, and on greater Festivals. At St. Paul's it is at mid-day, at St. John's at nine A.M. No improvement or falling off can be reported at this date. There has been delay in re-organising Sunday Schools at outstations. The St. Paul's School is well attended, and is taught by an energetic and loyal band of teachers. Some willing workers have renewed the water-supply system, placing a new hydraulic ram, and leaving the Parsonage with a good supply of the best of water, much to the appreciation of the inmates.

What we propose in the direction of development and extension of Parish work had better not be stated till we can record some realisation. To say what you are going to do is the way not to do it.

CACOUNA.

The Church-Wardens report :—

The regular Services, viz., on Sunday, Holy Communion at 8 A.M., Matins with Sermon at 11 A.M., and Evensong and Sermon at 7 P.M.; and on week-days, Matins at 10 A.M., were duly maintained from the first Sunday in July to the second Sunday in September.

The Chaplains in charge were, for the month of July, the Rev. Canon Thorneloe, D.C.L., and for August, the Rev. Prof. Wilkinson, M.A. The Bishop of Niagara, and the Clergy in residence at the Clergy House of Rest, also gave much valued assistance.

The furnishing of the Church has been made more complete by the addition of a Baptismal Font, that had been for many years in use at S. Matthew's Church, Quebec, but no longer required there, its place having been taken by the handsome Memorial Font, erected in memory of the late Bishop Williams. In return the congregation of S. James' Church provided the Funds, \$75, for the purchase of a new Font for a Church in the Mission of New Carlisle and Paspebiac.

 CAPE COVE AND PERCÉ.

The Rev. Rural Dean Lyster reports :—

At the close of another year, I feel myself tempted to commence my report with the usual formula, that "there is nothing worth recording"; and, indeed, apart from a continuance of the happy conditions under which this Mission is preserved by God's goodness from year to year, I may safely declare there is little worth mentioning. For it is, I hope, unnecessary to state that the usual Services have been kept up and attended quite as well as ever they have been.

In July we were cheered by the visit of the Lord Bishop, who, to our great pleasure, was accompanied by Mrs. Dunn.

I was able to present only eight Candidates for Confirmation at Cape Cove, while at Percé the supply completely failed; all children of suitable age having been confirmed at the Bishop's previous visit.

I wish to record my gratitude to the Lay-Readers, Organists and Sunday School teachers whose self-denying labors, willingly and cheerfully given, have greatly conduced to the well-being of both congregations.

I must also mention my obligations to the newly-appointed "Church Society Helpers." These ladies entered upon their duties with so much zeal and spirit, and their visits were so highly appreciated, that they succeeded beyond my expectations, and in a few weeks handed me the sum of ninety dollars, which was at once forwarded to the Treasurer. I may here remark that the year has been almost disastrous to the fishing business, upon which the coast mainly depends. During the early part of the season, such heavy and frequent storms prevailed, that very few fish were taken; while a continuation of low prices in the established fish-markets of Europe and South America, proved very trying to the merchants.

It is to be hoped that this trade, upon which thousands upon the coast of Gaspé depend for a living, may soon revive. Its continued depression would mean want and privation to numbers.

It says a great deal for the people of this Mission, that in spite of these adverse circumstances, the usual contributions have been cheerfully paid; and, as will be seen from the enclosed statement, are actually in excess of those of former years.

I record, with regret, the deaths of six parishioners, an unusually large number for us. One of these was Mrs. Aubin, of Grand River, not long married, who was called home under very pathetic circumstances. Only last July it was the great pleasure of herself and her good husband to entertain the Bishop and Mrs. Dunn when they were passing through Grand River on their way to Cape Cove. Hers was a very gentle and loving spirit, and all who knew her, feel her loss.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. Canon Foster reports:—

The usual Sunday and Saints' day Services, together with diligent parochial visiting, have been regularly kept up during the year.

On the 12th and 13th of June last His Lordship, the Bishop of the Diocese, held a Confirmation at Christ's Church and St. Stephen's, when he confirmed eighteen Candidates. Of these six were aged respectively 30, 31, 35, 52, 61 and 62 years. All the Candidates partook of the Holy Communion on the morning after their Confirmation. The Churches were crowded on both occasions with earnest and devout worshippers, who listened attentively to His Lordship's stirring Sermons.

The balance of the hundred dollars guaranteed by this Parish towards the Bishop Williams M. M. Fund has been paid.

During the month of November five young ladies were appointed "Church Society Helpers." They succeeded far beyond my expectations in raising funds for the Mission and Pension Funds of the Society.

The Ladies' Guild of St. Stephen's Church have now in hand nearly \$300.00 towards building a Church Hall for Sunday Schools, and all kinds of parish gatherings. The Guild find it up-hill work to raise sufficient funds for this much needed object; but they are determined to persevere until they secure the required amount.

The Coaticook branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was organized in 1893, with six members, it now numbers twenty-eight. Last year the Auxiliary began working for the St. Barnabas (Boys') Home, Sarcee Reserve, N. W. T., and sent a large bale of clothing. This year a much larger bale was sent, containing, amongst other things, a complete outfit for an Indian boy, quite a number of the garments being given by kind friends, the whole costing about \$30.00. In addition to this \$6.50 has been paid to the Provincial Treasurer in aid of the Domestic and Foreign Mission Fund.

I wish to express my thanks to the Church Helpers of Quebec for the gift of a very beautiful Set of Fair Linen for the Altar at Christ's Church, North Coaticook.

My best thanks are also due to the Wardens and Choir-Masters of both Churches for their efficient and ready help in every good Church work.

COMPTON.

The Rev. G. H. Parker reports:—

Since last reporting, the Bishop has paid two visits to Compton, one in December for Confirmation, when six were confirmed, and again in June for Confirmation of Pupils of Compton Ladies' College, who were unable to be presented in December on account of the temporary closing of the Institution through sickness. The Bishop also presided at the Summer breaking up on the following day.

On the third of March last a fortnightly Service was commenced in the Union Church at Hillhurst, at the request of a number of the people in the vicinity, and has since been regularly held.

The Sunday Services are morning and evening in the Parish Church; one afternoon at Hillhurst and the following Sunday both at the Saunders and Carr School-houses, making three Services one Sunday and four on the alternate one. The two latter are discontinued for the present.

There are also shortened Matins and Evensong daily at the Ladies' College.

During the year there have been nine Baptisms, three Marriages and three Burials.

COOKSHIRE.

Rev. A. H. Robertson reports:—

St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.—The usual round of parish work has been carried on since last Report. All our parish organizations are in a flourishing condition.

At the Easter meeting the Wardens reported all assessments and debts paid and a handsome balance on hand. My thanks are due to Messrs. Wm. Wilford and Henry Osgoode, for their careful attention to their duties as Wardens.

The Sunday School is growing yearly, and this year shows an increased average attendance. Two of our teachers, Mrs. Hopkins and Miss Cook, have left the parish for a time, but I am glad to say that four ladies at once volunteered to fill the vacant places, enabling us to divide the classes. The Sunday Morning Service, on the second Sunday of each month, is now called Children's Sunday. All the children attend and sit in the front seats. The Sermon is especially addressed to them, and the Wardens give the offerings at that Service to the funds of the Sunday School, and the Children's Offerings are devoted wholly to Mission purposes.

The Guild and Woman's Auxiliary meet regularly, and the treasurer of the Guild reports a substantial balance in the bank, ready to be used for any parochial purpose.

The fourth annual Choir Festival for this district was held in St. Peter's Church, under the direction of Mr. Dorey. The Choirs from Bury, Angus and Randboro' joined with ours, and the Clergy of the District kindly assisted in the Service. The Lord Bishop held his annual Confirmation Service on October 3rd.

St. Andrew's Chapel, Eaton Corner.—I mentioned last year that a building had been purchased here to be fitted up for Church purposes. I am glad to say that we have been able to fit up a comely Mission Chapel with Parish Hall above. Service was begun in it on May 30th, and the Bishop

dedicated it on 3rd October by the name of St. Andrew's Chapel, and at the same time our first Confirmation Service was held. The cost of the whole was \$498.00, all paid for. Our thanks are due to the Ladies' Guild, particularly to Mrs. Tavlour and Mrs. Nutt, for their work and self-denial. Mr. Willis, of Montreal, presented the Rector with an organ, to place in the Chapel. Mrs. Anderson gave the Altar Linen, Mrs. Robertson the Altar Cloth, and the little Chapel looks most Church-like. The building is deeded to the Lord Bishop in trust.

Sandhill and Johnville.—I regret to say that the plan, whereby these two stations were set apart with Milby as a new Mission under the care of the Rev. Professor Wilkinson, has not proved workable; and these two stations have returned to my care. I have engaged Mr. T. Dowdell, B.A., as lay assistant, and hope to carry on the work until such time as a new Mission may be formed with a resident Clergyman for Milby, Sandhill and Johnville.

DANVILLE.

The Rev. Thos. Blaylock reports:—

During the past year our parochial life has been like the individual Christian life, a mixture of good and evil, misfortune and blessing. The year commenced with what was undoubtedly a great disaster, the total loss by fire, on the night of the Epiphany, of the beautiful and substantial Church of St. Augustine, Danville. For many years it had been a labour of love on the part of the ladies of the Guild to complete and add to the appointments and interior fittings of this Church (the late additions being made only on Christmas Day), until it had become well nigh perfect. We had come to look upon it as a spiritual home, not altogether unworthily of the great purpose for which it was built, the worship of the Almighty Father. Absolutely nothing was saved, and our little congregation (with the exception

of \$3,000 insurance, which was promptly paid us) must begin at the beginning again. Plans for a new solid brick Church, to seat about 220, with basement chapel and furnace room, to be built at an estimated cost of \$6,000, have been received, and tenders will be immediately asked for the work, so that materials can be got together during the Winter months, and ground broken as early in the Spring as the weather will permit. I trust and pray that God will put it into the hearts of His people here, few though they be in numbers, as He did in the days of David, to offer willingly for the building of the House of their God, knowing that all things come of Him, and of His own only can we give Him. Most certainly it will require great sacrifice on the part of all to replace in a worthily manner the Church we have lost. A new site has been purchased, at considerable outlay in money as well as the old lot given in exchange, close to the centre of the village, where the Church will be of easy access even in the worst of Winter weather. This was our greatest misfortune, and it called forth the warmest sympathy with us from the different denominations, all of which, with the exception of one, offered us the use of their Church buildings. We accepted the first offer, made in the kindest manner by the Presbyterians, and worshipped for four months in their Church. Since then we have rented a room in the Town Hall at a cost of \$60 a year, and have furnished it at considerable expense. It is inconvenient, and too small for our requirements, but we hope before the next report to be able to worship in our new building. Notwithstanding this the congregations have not fallen off—rather increased—nor has the liberality of our people lessened, as the Financial Statement annexed will show. I have to thank the ladies of the Guild for the gift of an Estey organ to replace the one burned, also for \$130 given towards the Church Building Fund, and for their ready help in all things connected with the Services of the Church. Amongst other marks of sympathy the Oddfellows gave the proceeds of an entertainment amounting to some \$60, and the Foresters granted us \$25 out of their funds.

The Sunday School has been more successful than ever during the past year, both in numbers and interest shown by both teachers and scholars.

On the whole, notwithstanding our misfortune, I think we may feel encouraged, and that we have made some progress.

Troutbrook.—The Services here have been kept up, with one or two exceptions during my absence, throughout the year, I am sorry to say with lessened congregations. We have to deplore the loss of several families, more particularly that of Mr. Jno. Wilson, who always took the warmest interest in the Church's work, and was ever a most liberal giver. We have also to regret the sudden death of Mr. Geo. Ewing, one of the oldest and most respected settlers in the neighbourhood. On the whole we have lost nearly \$50 in subscriptions during the past year in this congregation, and have been compelled to ask the indulgence of the Diocesan Board.

Lorne.—At Lorne the Services have also been held regularly each Sunday with a somewhat lessened attendance, owing perhaps to my being unable to do as much house to house visiting as formerly. I am glad to say, however, that all financial calls have been met.

Kingsey Falls.—Kingsey Falls, which is under the more immediate charge of Mr. Wayman, has had its regular Sunday Services with three exceptions. During the Summer, when there was a resident Baptist Minister, there was some falling off in the congregations, which however have now reached their old average. The Ladies' Guild here has done good service, assisting in many ways the work of the Mission.

Asbestos.—A very interesting Service has been started in the School-house at Asbestos, and regularly continued for the last five months, with an average attendance of about thirty. There is an organ in the School which Miss Gale plays, and the Services are very enjoyable and hearty. This place is growing fast, and it is more than probable that we shall soon have to build a small Church, in fact a site has already been procured on very generous terms from Mr. Noel, a Roman Catholic, who has also promised a liberal donation towards the building. Mr. M. Pharo has also collected a sufficient amount to justify us in hoping that we shall succeed in our effort.

Extensive repairs have had to be made on the Parsonage buildings, the work being voluntarily done by men from Lorne and Troutbrook, and the materials provided by the Danville congregation. There has been a large increase of baptisms throughout the Parish, and Holy Communion has been well attended.

The financial statement is on the whole most satisfactory, more especially the amount given to non-parochial objects, which amounts to \$265.53, and which is not complete, as I have received no returns from two Church Society collectors as yet. DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. F. G. Scott reports:—

The Services during the past year have been held regularly and the congregations have been good. There is a notable improvement in attendance at Evensong on Sundays, when we have nearly as many people as we do at Matins. The Services on Sunday are as follows: 8 A.M. Holy Communion (except on the first Sunday in the month, when it is at 10 A.M.); 10 A.M. Matins and Litany; 11.30 A.M. Sunday School; 3 P.M. Evensong at Mitchell Station; 7 P.M. Evensong here.

The Sunday School has been reorganized with Mrs. Scott as superintendent, and Mrs. Richard L. Mitchell, Mrs. Wilford Watkins and Miss S. Mitchell as teachers. The attendance of the children is as good as can be expected in so scattered a parish as this.

The Woman's Auxiliary has met regularly; and has sent off another box of goods to the North-West.

His Lordship, the Bishop, visited us on June the 18th, when four adults were confirmed.

The year closes, I am happy to say, with the promise of the completion of the interior of our Church. For nearly,

if not quite, thirty years, it has waited, and now the matter is being taken in hand in earnest, and we have already \$180 to begin with.

It is proposed to panel and ceil the whole interior of the Church with ash, and put in two hot air furnaces. The Church is stone and is well built, and quite worth all that can be spent upon it in the way of decoration. The present work however will have a practical value in making the Church warmer in Winter, and attendance at it in cold weather less dangerous to the health.

I must here record my gratitude to friends for many acts of kindness and courtesy, particularly to several of the farmers for gifts of hay and oats for my horse, and to the Drummond County Railway Company, for an annual "Pass" and the use of a hand-car to Mitchell Station on Sundays.

DURHAM.

The Rev. D. Horner reports:—

Divine Service has been conducted with regularity on Sundays and the greater Festivals, except for the occasional interruption of a snow-blockade, and a Sunday Funeral.

The Sunday School at Kirkdale has revived. The hour of attendance has been changed to 2 P.M., and in consequence there has been an increase in the number of scholars, teachers, and also in the amount of interest. The Sunday Schools at the other stations, I am sorry to say, languish. I have endeavoured to keep them going single-handed, an hour before each Service, with poor success.

A Christmas Tree and Entertainment was held in the Church Hall at Kirkdale, for the Sunday School children and others, which was much appreciated. The attendance of the children was above the average, although the night was dark and stormy.

A Concert was held at L'Avenir on January 8th for the purpose of a Sunday School Library. The sum of \$18.50 was realized.

A Sunday School Conference was held at Kirkdale on October 1st. It was fairly attended and very successful.

The speakers present were the Ven. Archdeacon Roe, the Revs. J. Hepburn, J. Sykes, A. H. Robertson, R. C. Tambs and J. Curran, and the Addresses were most profitable. The Hall adjoining the Church had been arranged for the hospitality of the visitors, and an excellent dinner and tea were provided free of charge for all who came to the conference.

Special Addresses were given by the Incumbent in the Dowd Settlement during the present year. Missionary Meetings were held on the 29th and 30th days of January, the speakers at Kirkdale being the Rev. James Hepburn and the Incumbent, and at L'Avenir, the Rev. Edwin Weary, the Rev. J. Curran and the Incumbent. Unfortunately the nights were stormy and the attendance on both occasions small.

The Rev. Edwin Weary again helped me by preaching at the Annual Service of the Independent Order of Foresters in the Church of Holy Trinity, Kirkdale.

The Rev. J. S. Sykes, Incumbent of Kingsey, preached the Harvest Thanksgiving Sermon on November 21st, having driven through almost impassable snow-drifts for the purpose. The attendance was very small. The preceding night the Rev. James Hepburn preached at L'Avenir, but the violent rain-storm prevented all but a very few from attending. In the earlier part of the present year, the Rev. J. Curran kindly gave a lecture on Ireland, at South Durham, with the result that \$30.50 was added to the South Durham Building Fund.

The work on the stable and carriage-house, mentioned in my last report, has been paid for, as well as the cost of the painting of the outside of Kirkdale Church. I have been the recipient of no little kindness from the members of the several congregations, not only in the way of hospitality, but in gifts of oats for my horse and labour freely bestowed, for all of which I should like to record my thankfulness.

The Confirmation of six Candidates was the occasion of the presence of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, on June 15th, 16th and 21st. One of the Candidates received the Rite of Confirmation in her house in consequence of sickness, his Lordship kindly coming to the Mission for this special purpose.

A difficulty, relating to the burial of unbaptized persons, was brought under the notice of the Incumbent and the Parishioners, during the past year, which seems to warrant

an insertion in this report. The Incumbent felt himself obliged to refuse to use any Service whatever over the first case brought before him, because the Canon seemed to forbid him, and he could find nothing in the Order of the Church of England to warrant him making any exception. He was given to understand, however, that he had strained the meaning of the Canon, and that he was justified in using any Service he thought proper for the occasion.

Some time after, an aged person died unbaptized, and the Incumbent was asked and agreed to perform a religious ceremony at the funeral; but the special prayers, collects, and sermon on the duty of Baptism, in fact the whole nature of the Service created a painful impression which I fear will not soon be eradicated.

The Incumbent draws attention to this, hoping that some definite understanding may result as to the exact Rites and Ceremonies necessary for cases of this kind.

EAST ANGLUS.

The Rev. W. A. Adcock reports:—

During the ten months I have had charge of this Mission general interest has been awakened, and there are some signs of progress to record. The congregations are improving, the singing and responding much better; and of late I have noticed an increasing percentage of men at Church.

The work is interesting, and I believe the Church is making her influence felt. Financially, we are handicapped, and will be for some considerable time to come, while the Church, badly needing repairs, will have to remain as it is until prospects are brighter. We have endeavoured to do our best. Ten Candidates have been confirmed. The Sunday School continues to flourish and is doing good work with a staff of five teachers; the scholars are kept for the Morning Service, thereby being trained to become Church worshippers. I frequently visit the Day Schools, where I am always well received. The Church assessments have been promptly paid. The sum of one hundred dollars has been raised towards the Parsonage debt. Galvanized iron eaves-spouts have been adjusted to the building and a brick cistern built in the Parsonage yard, which we find very useful, as hitherto all water had to be carried from a great distance. A neat fence has been built enclosing the Church property. A beautiful Cedar Reredos, Retable and Credence Table have been designed, executed and presented by Mr. E. G. Charnock; a pair of Brass Flower Vases presented by scholars of the Sunday School; while a number of other Church furnishings and requisites have either been presented or promised.

At Ascot Corner the Church attendance is good and the Services hearty. A Stone Font has been presented by a few interested Church families, a much needed requisite. The young people have presented to the Church an Oak Chair for the Chancel. The men of the congregation have reshingled the roof of the Church, and enclosed the acre of Church property with a fence. There is much more needed to be done to the Church and its surroundings to make them bright and attractive. This we hope to do in the near future.

FITCH BAY AND GEORGEVILLE.

The Rev. R. W. E. Wright reports:—

I took charge of this Mission on March 31st last, and so can only report from that time.

Georgeville.—The Services at S. George's Church, Georgeville have been regularly kept up, Matins and Evensong every Sunday, Celebration of the Holy Communion twice a month, and Service with address every Wednesday evening. All these Services have been fairly attended ; of course, during the Summer months our congregations are excellent, owing to the influx of "Summer Visitors."

On September 8th, the Bishop visited Georgeville in the morning and administered the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation to seven Candidates, who have since become regular communicants. We are, I think, holding our own at Georgeville, though we have lost by removal to other parishes some of our workers.

The "Ladies' Guild" (who meet fortnightly during the Winter months) held a most successful Bazaar and Concert in August, the proceeds to be devoted, as occasion may require, to parochial objects.

Fitch Bay.—The condition of this part of my Mission is most healthy and flourishing. I am glad to say that we have a number of energetic young men among our workers.

The Services have been regularly kept up, Matins and Evensong every Sunday and celebration of the Holy Communion twice a month (one early and one late); Friday Evening Service and short address. All Services well attended.

Eight Candidates were confirmed on September 8th, three of them being first baptized by the Bishop. A "Ladies' Guild" is in operation and doing good work.

Outstations.—Services are regularly held (fortnightly) at the "Bachelor School-house," and the attendance and interest have been most encouraging; a majority of those attending being young men. Three of the Candidates confirmed at Fitch Bay came from this neighbourhood.

Services at "Boynton School-house" have also been held fortnightly on Sunday afternoons, but the attendance has been disappointing, owing to the very few Church people about there.

I wish here to tender my sincere thanks to Dr. H. R. Codd, my devoted Lay-Reader, by whose help only I have been able to keep up four regular Sunday Services. In July last a beautiful carved Altar was presented to the Church by Dr. Codd.

FRAMPTON.

The Rev. F. Boyle reports :—

I would be hard to please indeed if I did not sit down to write my report for this year, now just ending, with a grateful and thankful heart.

The Services in my three Churches have been duly maintained and well attended, wonderfully well considering the scattered positions of my people.

The leading event of the year was a visit from our beloved Bishop, in June, when he confirmed twenty-seven Candidates. I may here mention by the way, that the good stirring up which the Bishop always gives us when making his rounds, ever leaves both Pastor and flock more ready and better workers.

The next pleasing event to me was a visit from an old Lennoxville man and a fellow student of mine, viz., the Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A., Rector of the Church of the Redeemer, Toronto. Mr. Jones preached for me in two of my Churches on two successive Sundays, much to the delight of all who heard him. Speaking of help, I may here mention that the Bishop has licensed my son, Percy, to assist me. He laboured among my people during his vacation, and, I am pleased to know and feel, with much acceptance.

We have two Day Schools working admirably: one taught by Miss King, at Hemison, the other at Springbrook, by Miss Nora Hodgson; and here again let me thank the Church Society for their timely grants, without which it would be a hard uphill struggle to keep our Schools open.

The Woman's Auxiliary, I am pleased to record, is doing well under the supervision of Mrs. H. L. Hodgson.

In former reports, I have spoken of my people's kindness to myself and family. This past year has not been an exception. To mention one instance only: a few months since, the West Frampton congregation, with characteristic liberality and kindness, presented my daughter, Evelyn,

with a well filled purse and nice address, expressing their gratitude for the services my daughter had rendered them, by playing their organ and otherwise conducting their church music.

I cannot close without heartily thanking our Church Helpers, one and all, for their ever ready and helpful co-operation in all works affecting the Church's interest.

GASPÉ BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports:—

The Services in this Mission have been held without intermission during the past year, and the engagements of the Mission have been promptly met. The great undertaking, during the year, has been the building of the new Parsonage, towards which we have had very liberal assistance from friends of the Mission, both at home and abroad. The building now approaches completion, and we hope to occupy it at the end of January.

St. Paul's Church.—This congregation is not gaining ground numerically. The village proper is filling up with a French-Canadian population; and they will soon form the majority at the present rate of increase.

The Settlement at L'Anse-aux-Cousins forms part of the congregation, and owing to the distance from the Church, (three miles) and the North-West Settlement extending several miles further, Services have been held in the School-house, which have been well attended.

St. James' Church.—The congregation in this part of the Mission has been for the past two years in a more flourishing condition financially, owing to the work afforded by the Petroleum Oil Trust; this work has given the much wanted

Winter employment to the people. As long as this work goes on, the people will prosper; but should it fail, a great number of the people will be obliged, as in former years, to look for winter work elsewhere.

The new Church in York, which at present forms part of St. James' Parish, is nearing completion. It would have been finished on December 30th, had it not been for sickness in the family of the contractor. It will, I hope, be ready for Consecration in July. It will be the third Church built during my incumbency; and, with ordinary care, the work of building has been done for some years.

Baptisms, 26; Marriages, 4; Burials, 10; Confirmations, 12. These figures are for the whole Mission.

GROSSE ISLE.

No Report has been received touching ministerial work done at the Quarantine Station during the past season of Navigation. The Chaplaincy was filled by the Rev. Douglas Steele, of the Diocese of Huron, until the middle of August, when illness necessitated his resignation. The Rev. H. S. Fuller took the duty during September, and the Rev. Dr. Riopel during the month of October.

HATLEY.

The Rev. A. Stevens reports :—

For the country Missionary to have more than one centre of work, is not always a disadvantage. It often happens that while the work seems to make no progress in one place it is going on well in another. Seldom is there even growth in all parts. This evens up his work somewhat and prevents him from becoming either vain or despondent. For,

if he does succeed in one place, he may in a measure fail in another. So the alternate going from success to failure and *vice versa* ought to keep him in that enviable state of mind which is midway between pride and despair. If he is tempted to feel proud and vain of his success in one place, he can look upon another where failure stares him in the face; or, if he is discouraged in one field, he can look over into the next where prosperity reigns.

A year ago I felt sad about our work in what used to be called Charleston village, the head of this Mission. This year, I am made glad by larger congregations and an increased number of Communicants at our monthly celebration. This is partly due to the presence of some young persons who were confirmed last June, and partly, I hope, to an increased desire on the part of others, to live a more religious life.

At Ayer's Flat, we have also met with some slight encouragement. The congregations have been larger and steadier, the responding and singing somewhat improved. We have begun to talk about building a small Church here, and have found an excellent site which can be obtained. About sixty dollars have been subscribed towards its purchase, and a further canvass is being made.

These tokens of success are balanced by a decline of interest in, and attendance upon our Services at Massawippi. Owing to the departure of a number of young people to seek employment in other parts, and to a certain amount of either indisposition or indifference, or both, on the part of some who call themselves church people, our congregations have decreased about one-half.

At the request of the Rev. Mr. Tambs, and on the invitation of several people in the neighbourhood, I have begun a monthly Service at the McConnell School-house, taking one Sunday evening each month from Massawippi. When we get the settled winter roads, I may decide to go there fortnightly instead of monthly.

The hard times and the low prices obtained for all agricultural products have made it difficult to meet the increased assessment to the Diocesan Board, but the Wardens are greatly assisted by the generous help of the Ladies' Guild. Last year, a most successful sale of useful and fancy articles, for the most part their own work, was held in the Parsonage, and they are busily at work now preparing for another to be held this year, just before Christmas.

The Woman's Auxiliary have held a good many meetings during the year. They sent off a barrel of clothing to Miss Brown, the Auxiliary's Missionary on the Piegan Reserve, and sent twenty dollars towards the cost of maintaining a child in the Home. This money was nearly all raised by the girls of the Sunday School, who, with the help of some little friends who were spending the Summer here, organized a Sale and Afternoon Tea on the Parsonage lawn.

Twice during the year we have been cheered by a visit from our chief Diocesan. Once in December, when his Lordship lectured at Ayer's Flat and in St. James' Church, and again in June, when seven Candidates were confirmed.

Our old friend, Bishop Niles, of New Hampshire, spent a week in Hatley again this year, and preached to large congregations in the Parish Church.

My hearty thanks are due to the Rev. H. Lloyd, Incumbent of Vankleek Hill, in the Diocese of Ontario, for taking my Services on two Sundays, which allowed me to take a short vacation.

From the financial statement which I append, it will be seen that about one-third of the money raised in the Mission this year has been given to objects outside the Mission.

HEREFORD.

The Rev. E. K. Wilson reports :—

I have to report several changes during the past year.

At Hall's Stream, where I formerly held weekly, I now hold fortnightly Sunday Services. This change has enabled me to occupy one of our local centres, West Stewartstown, N. H., where, through the kindness of the members of Port Blake, G. A. R., in allowing us the use free of charge of their hall and organ, I now conduct weekly Services. My reason for this change is twofold : (1st). The want of appreciation for the Church's Services at Hall's Stream, owing

largely to our being completely overshadowed by Dissent. 2nd. I found that so long as our local capital was left unoccupied, that (as our people tend toward the centres) other bodies of Christians (more or less hostile) were entering too much into the fruits of our labors. If these changes require justification, I think the success which seems to attend our work in that centre is a sufficient one; the average of our congregation having increased from thirty-one, during the first two months, to thirty-nine during last two; and already an energetic Guild, with head-quarters at Canaan, has to its credit the nucleus of a fund for the purchase of a Church property.

At the other stations, viz, Leech Stream and Averill, the usual routine of Services has been kept up.

At these points, whilst we have no marked gains to report, yet on the other hand I find no loss either in numbers or prestige.

We are, without outside aid, slowly but surely improving the condition of the Leech Stream Church, and hope before the dawn of the New Year to improve its internal appearance by the addition of a Rood Screen.

His Lordship, Bishop Dunn, spent Sunday, May 19th, with us, baptizing one infant, administering the Rite of Confirmation to five persons, and preaching instructive Sermons at three stations.

INVERNESS.

The Rev. H. A. Dickson reports :—

On the retirement of the late Rev. Peter Roe from active service on the first of June, after seventeen years spent in this Mission, I was appointed to take up his work, together with that at Kinnear's Mills, which previously belonged to the Mission of Leeds. Since that time, the Services have been regularly held, and so arranged that each of the three congregations has a Morning Service with the celebration of Holy Communion once in three weeks. With a few exceptions, the members have shown a deep interest in the general work of the Mission, endeavouring to make our Services more hearty, and at the same time provide for the

temporalities. An effort, partially successful, has been made to free the Church at Campbell's Corner from the debt contracted for necessary repairs. Water has been brought to our Parsonage from a neighbouring spring, which has contributed much to our comfort; hitherto it had been supplied from a very inferior well and distant springs. Another improvement was the removal of an old shed, and the building of a very convenient stable, at the cost of about \$150, and considerable time on the part of the Wardens and other cheerful workers.

With the permission of the Church Society, we sold the standing lumber on the Mission Glebe for \$125, payable in two payments, which, with the exception of what is required for the improvement of the property, is to be added to the Endowment Fund of the Mission.

Kinnear's Mills.—By adding Kinnear's Mills to this Mission, the regular Sunday round has been increased by sixteen miles, and the distance between the Parsonage and the most distant parishioners has been more than proportionately increased. The congregation there, though not large, has shown steady growth; and during the Summer months an interesting Sunday School was kept up by the Messrs. Coxen. The men of the congregation have improved the external appearance of the Church and its surroundings. It would however be wasteful to expend money upon the building we now occupy, which shows its age in every part. The bell has not been used for some time through fear of the old timbers giving away and letting it down; and I cannot but fear that there will be a serious falling off in the number of the attendants during the Winter months, until we have a Church that can be made more comfortable.

Campbell's Corner.—At Campbell's Corner, the Services have been very well attended, and the interest in the Sunday School under the superintendence of Mr. James McNey was well sustained during the Summer and early Autumn months, but has since been closed for the Winter. Mr. W. J. Smyth presented to the Church two fine mammoth Pittsburg lamps, which have proved a very beneficial gift; he has also merited the thanks of the congregation in his capacity as Warden by his close attention to the interests of the Mission.

St. Stephen's.—At St. Stephen's Church the congregation lost, by the departure of Mr. Roe's family, their organist, two members of the choir, the Sunday School teachers, three

enthusiastic members of the W. A., and true friends in the hour of trouble. While their loss must be felt for some time, I appreciate the efforts made by the people to carry on their work; five offered their assistance in the Sunday School, and, though inexperienced, have done a good work. The choir practices have been well attended, and in the absence of an organist, Mrs. Dickson has filled that position and given instructions to three who were willing to fit themselves for the position. One of these has already shown her usefulness in that capacity. Credit is due to the Church-Wardens here too, for the active part they have taken in connection with the improvements made.

The W. A. has continued its good work, both here and at Campbell's Corner, and in July forwarded to the Thunderchild Reserve a barrel valued at \$53.85.

During our short sojourn in the Mission, we have received from the people many marks of kindness, for which I take this opportunity to express my thanks.

IRELAND AND SOUTH INVERNESS.

The Rev. W. G. Faulconer reports:—

Holy Trinity, Upper Ireland.—Owing to the death of old supporters, emigration to the States of the younger branches of the old families, and the depression in business, the Church, outwardly, is not making much progress. Our regular Services have generally been well attended, and I trust spiritual advancement has not slackened. Our Sunday Schools have done much good work under the superintendence of Mr. and Mrs. Penhale, of Black Lake, and Miss Lizzie and T. Dinning, of Upper Ireland. My Bible classes have been well attended, and I am sure have proved a blessing to many. The Women's Guild and Missionary Auxiliary have done good work, and I am glad to say, have increased in number. I have to thank my Lay-Reader, Mr. F. Wood, who is always ready to assist me. Our revered Bishop spent a few days in our midst, days to us of great pleasure and profit, and confirmed seven Candidates. His words, as they always are, were much appreciated. A full account of His Lordship's visit was published in the

"*Diocesan Gazette*," for September. During my six weeks' vacation at the beautiful Island of Orleans, my people greatly appreciated the ministrations of Mr. Vial, and were always glad of his kindly visits. I trust he may be much blessed in his studies for his future high vocation. One of our oldest supporters and staunchest Church members, Mr. Dan. Bennett, passed away last April, aged ninety-five. Such veterans' places are hard to fill up again. His steadfast faith in Christ was a lesson to us all.

Christ's Church, Lower Ireland.—There has been on the whole good progress here. The regular and occasional Services have been well attended; and our communicants have doubled in number during the last two years, and I trust will still increase, not only in number, but in spiritual attainment.

Our Bishop confirmed twenty-one Candidates in June last. Our Sunday School has further increased under the self-sacrificing efforts of its superintendent, Mrs. W. Johnson, who has been assisted by one of our rising and promising young men, James Ward. The Guild and Missionary Auxiliary are still working on and progressing in their good work. One of our oldest church supporters here too has passed from our midst, Mrs. Samuel Johnson, at the advanced age of eighty-seven years.

The deceased and her family have always been active and generous supporters of our Church from the beginning.

St. Luke's Church, Adderley.—The monthly Services have been held here as usual and things remain as they were, except the loss of some former supporters, by removal and death.

St. Peter's, Black Lake.—Owing to the great depression in mining business there are only five families belonging to our Church now left here. Several who used to help, have removed to other places to find employment, and consequently things are almost at a standstill, and likely, for some time to continue so. It is difficult under such fluctuating conditions to keep things floating.

The fortnightly Services have been well attended by the few that remain.

St. John's, Thetford Mines.—A regular monthly Service has been held here through the year. There are only three families belonging to our Church left in the place; though others, chiefly young men, who have no settled home, attend our Services.

Business, here too, is not what it was a few years ago; moreover the majority of the people are French, consequently our work progresses slowly.

KINGSEY.

The Rev. J. S. Sykes reports:—

With the exception of the coming of the Bishop for Confirmation at Denison's Mills in the month of June, there is nothing of special interest outside the ordinary routine of parochial work to be recorded; and, as a full account of His Lordship's visit has appeared already in the *Quebec Diocesan Gazette*, there is no need to repeat it here. The Services have been regularly held, and attended by attentive and devout congregations. The average attendance, too, has been larger than usual, owing, perhaps, partly to the fact that the past Summer was exceptionally fine. Fine weather and good roads encourage people to come to Church, while bad weather (if it is right to call anything of God's ordering bad) shows the stuff our Churchmen and Church-women are made off; for then, they have to decide between "enduring hardness as good soldiers," and sitting in an easy chair at home, and content themselves with singing "Onward Christian Soldiers."

Our people have responded well to the appeal of the Bishop for the funds of the Church Society. I endorsed that appeal by reading it at my three Services and making it the text of my own remarks.

We hope to be in possession of a new Organ at St. Paul's, Sydentam Place, by Christmas. This instrument, which is to be a Dominion Organ, Chapel model and recommended by the Bishop, has been paid for, partly by the Women's Guild, and the balance obtained by the earnest solicitations of Miss Alice Wadleigh. In this connection I may be allowed to state, that this year our organists remain "*in statu quo*."

Our lady collectors, I know, laboured for the Church at no little inconvenience to themselves, and are deserving of

I conclude with earnest thanks to the Church-Wardens, collectors, organists and Sunday School teachers, for how could the country clergyman ever get along without their hearty and cordial co-operation.

LABRADOR.

St. Clement's Mission.

The Rev. I. N. Kerr reports:—

This Mission, which formerly extended from Natashquan to Blanc Sablon, has this year been enlarged so as to include the additional coast line from Sheldrake to Esqui-maux Point; thus the whole mission is now about four hundred and fifty miles in length. In order to meet this extension and also to work the whole more efficiently, a second Missionary and Teacher have been sent by the Bishop. Our present staff therefore numbers two Clergymen

(Priest and Deacon,) two School-teachers (male and female,) and two Lay Readers.

During the first half of the past year, work went on much the same as in the former year. Mr. Willis taught Day and Sunday School at St. Paul's River, where he also read the Church Services regularly on Sundays.

At Red Bay, during the months of November and December, I taught school and had regular week-day and Sunday Services. About the middle of January, the inside bays being frozen over, I started to travel over land by dogs and "cometique." In this way I made the usual round of visits over the Mission, east and west, in good time, arriving at Mutton Bay for Easter Services.

During the months of June and July, when we are visited by a great number of fishing schooners from Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, I travelled up and down the coast in boat, between Harrington and Forteau, and had many interesting Services with the fishermen.

On August 7th I reached Natashquan, where I was rejoiced to meet our new Missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. Bishop, who had just arrived a few hours before me. On their way down they had visited all the Western divisions of the Mission, and also the Island of Anticosti.

During the months of August and September Mr. and Mrs. Bishop accompanied me in boat over the Mission, thus they were soon acquainted with all the people, and we were able to have many bright and cheerful Services together. Towards the end of September they took up their winter quarters at St Paul's River, where Mrs. Bishop is teaching school.

Mr. Willis, who during the Summer went up to visit his friends in Montreal, has returned again, and is at work at Mutton Bay.

My thanks are due to Mrs. D. Bobbitt, of Harrington, for her unflagging zeal in the Sunday School there; and to Mr. Organ, of Mutton Bay, who in my absence has acted as Lay Reader, much to the satisfaction of the people, who are thus never left without a Service on Sunday.

This Summer we have been able to carry out a long cherished hope of building a new Church at Mutton Bay, which is now complete, except for some internal furnishings.

The people of the place deserve credit for the zeal with which they have helped to forward the work, giving 185

LEEDS.

The Rev. J. Rothera reports :—

There have been a few changes made in this Mission. St. Sylvester, St. Patrick's and St. Giles have been added to the Mission of Leeds, in lieu of which St. Marks', Kinnear's Mill. has been taken from Leeds and added to Inverness.

The Mission of Leeds consists now of St. James', Leeds ; St. Matthew's, Beattie's Settlement ; Broughton ; St. Sylvester ; St. Patrick's and St. Giles.

St. James', Leeds.—With help I have been able to give here Morning and Evening Services every Sunday with few exceptions, and a monthly celebration of the Holy Communion. The Sunday School has been carried on from the 1st of May to the end of October, with the help of teachers.

The Sunday School held their Annual Pic-Nic at the Parsonage on the 13th of August, to the enjoyment of all.

The Ladies' Aid have worked quietly and steadily for the good of the Church. They gave \$4 to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society. At their last meeting they decided to join the W. A. and devote one meeting a month for the Society.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited this Mission on January 18th, when fifteen Candidates were presented for Confirmation from the Mission, (St. James', Leeds, 7 ; St. Matthew's, Beattie's Settlement, 6 ; St. Giles, 2.)

At *St. Marks', Kinnear's Mills*, which is now connected with the Mission of Inverness, Service was held once a fortnight, and a fortnightly week-day Service, up to July 1st.

St. Sylvester.—Services have been held here once a fortnight. During the months of July and August, Services were held every Sunday. The Holy Communion is celebrated once a month.

I am pleased to note that the W. A. have resumed their good work. They held their first meeting on December 26th. These meetings I hope will continue, though the members be but few.

St. Patrick's.—There are only three families here. They are within five miles of St. Sylvester, and could attend Church there if they wished so to do. During the months of July and August, when I had help, I gave them one Service every Sunday.

St. Matthew's, Beattie's Settlement.—Service has been held here three Sundays in each month, and the Holy Communion administered once a month. The interior of the Church has been oiled and varnished, and thereby much improved in appearance. And an Organ has been procured, which contributes not a little to the heartiness of the Service. On August 15th a Tea and Entertainment was held, which realized \$30. This was devoted to the Organ Fund, and, I am pleased to say, sufficed to remove all indebtedness thereon.

Broughton.—There are now only three families here belonging to the Church. I give them a Service on a weekday, as often as I can. The distance from the Parsonage is about twenty miles.

St. Giles.—Service has been held here once a month. St. Giles is about seventeen miles from Leeds. The people here, the few that are left of them, are much scattered; most of them live four and five miles away from the Church, consequently they do not attend as regularly as they might.

In conclusion I take this opportunity of acknowledging many kindnesses received, especially from the Rev. J. Kemp, who has given extra Services at St. James' Church, Leeds; from Mr. Dowdell, who helped us during the months of July and August; and from the many earnest workers who have aided us in various places and in various ways.

LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. A. C. Scarth reports :—

Ten of our number have departed this life during the past year; among these there were five whose united ages came to 387 years. One of these was our well beloved friend, Edward Chapman, who entered into the rest of Paradise on the morning of the Sunday after Ascension, having more than completed the Psalmist's four score years. His memory will long be cherished by the congregation of St. George's, as indeed it must be by all who had the privilege of knowing him. He was the type of a true Christian gentleman, a loyal Churchman, most regular and exemplary in the performance of his religious duties and a most generous contributor to every Church work. In him the poor have lost a kind and sympathizing friend, and all of us a wise counsellor and a noble example. He was identified with the history of our Church for upwards of fifty years, and was the last survivor of those whose names are found on the list of the first subscribers to the fund for its erection, and he was almost the sole remaining member of the congregation, as it was, when I was appointed to Lennoxville thirty-seven years ago.

I am glad to say that our subscriptions to the Church Society show an increase over those of last year notwithstanding the loss of old and generous subscribers. This is greatly owing to the efforts of the collectors, Miss Stuart, Miss Ready and Miss McFadden. Nearly all our contributions this year are, at the suggestion of the Bishop, appropriated to the Mission Fund of the Diocese.

Apart from the regular work of a Parish Priest, I have nothing of special interest to communicate. On Sundays and Holy Days Services have been held and the Holy Communion administered without interruption. Thanksgiving Day, the days of intercession for Missions and Sunday Schools have been duly observed; also our annual Harvest Home Service, when our Church was beautifully decorated with leaves and fruit and flowers, by loving hands, and an eloquent Sermon preached to a crowded Church, by our ever willing friend Canon Thorneloe.

The sick and dying have been ministered to, and the "well" visited as regularly as usual.

The "Woman's Auxiliary" continues its good work for Missions, both Foreign and Domestic, and meets regularly

once a month to pray for the missionary work of the Church.

Our "Guild" has, this year, given two new Surplices to the Church, and provided the funds for reshingling one half of the roof.

Looking back over the year, I think it has been one of quiet work and steady progres.

LEVIS AND NEW LIVERPOOL.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:—

Levis.—There is very little of interest to report from this Parish, things go on in the same quiet way from year to year. In common with all the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese, we have had losses by deaths and removals, which have left not only a painful sense of loneliness, which all must feel when they lose those with whom they have associated in the fellowship of Christ's religion; but there is also the loss of revenue, which makes one feel anxious for the future of the Parish. During the year Mr. Samuel Green, an old and faithful supporter of Holy Trinity, Mrs. F. B. Atkinson, a devoted Church worker, Roy Findlay, Catherine Compson and Charlie Macpherson, were taken away by death; and during the same period, we lost by removals, Mrs. Green and family, Mr. Alexander Russell, Mr. Macpherson and family, and Mrs. Shaw.

Up to the present, we have been able to meet all our own indebtedness, and to respond in some measure to all claims made upon us for objects outside of the Parish. There has been no material change in the order of Services for the past three years, at Levis. A Service every Sunday morning and evening, except on the first Sunday of the month, when an early Celebration of the Holy Communion takes the place of Morning Prayer, the Morning Service for that day being held at New Liverpool. There is also a

Celebration of the Holy Communion on the third Sunday in the month after Morning Service. With a few interruptions, there have been Services on Wednesday evenings, and on the principal Festivals of the Church's year. Cottage Services were held during the Winter months at Mr. Craig's School-house, at Mr. George Sample's, Hadlow, and at Mr. James King's, South Quebec. At most of these Services the attendance was very encouraging. The Sunday attendance at Holy Trinity has been, considering all things, fairly good, and the number of Communicants about the same as on previous years. The Ladies' Guild has worked on diligently another year, and has collected by the devoted labour of its members, quite a sum of money, which is to be expended on some object connected with the Church. Our Society of "Young Church Workers," organized two years ago, and which has since been under the management of Miss N. Piton and Miss E. Thompson, is actively at work. The object of the Society is to interest the young people of the congregation in the work of the Church. As a result of this past year's work, they have handed the Church-Wardens quite a nice sum of money to assist in paying Church expenses, and have given something for outside objects as well. The Women's Auxiliary has been very faithful and earnest in its labours, and from their devoted efforts \$26.45 in cash has been realized, besides other valuable offerings given for Missionary purposes.

Our Sunday School has moved quietly along under the superintendency of Mr. George Addie, who is assisted by five earnest and devoted teachers. I try to help them by holding a Service and addressing, or catechizing the children, on the first Sunday every month.

His Lordship the Bishop paid two visits to this Parish during the year, and cheered us by his presence and helpful words.

On the evening of the Epiphany a Christmas Tree Festival was held, which was very well attended. Refreshments were provided for all who wished to partake, and the well-laden tree furnished something for each of the little ones, whilst the older ones were delightfully entertained by the very nicely rendered programme provided by the children.

I cannot close this report without expressing my gratitude to the Organist and Choir, the Church-Wardens, and

all others who have kindly assisted to maintain the cause of Christ and His Church in this place.

New Liverpool.—The Mission of New Liverpool, like the Parish of Levis, has very little of change to report. We have lost one family by removal, and Mrs. Downes and Mrs. Pink, two old and devoted members of the Church, were taken away by death.

New Liverpool has had, without interruption, a regular Sunday Service, and a monthly Celebration of the Holy Communion, also Services on the principal Festivals of the Church's year, with lectures in private houses during Lenten season. In addition to these, there have been occasional Services at Chaudière Curve, Chaudière Mills, St. Henri and Belair. The attendance for the year, at New Liverpool, was very good, considering the distances many of our people live from the Church, and in Summer, when our friends from Quebec are with us, the Church is well filled. The New Liverpool congregation, though small in numbers, is nevertheless a devoted one, its members being always ready and willing to help in the Church's work, in every way open to them, for this I am very grateful. Through the generosity of Henry Atkinson, Esq., our zealous Church-Warden, the Church has been thoroughly repaired and painted inside and outside at a cost of \$389.

Also, through the kindness of Mr. Henry B. Sample, the other Church-Warden, new matting was furnished for the Church, and a book-stand for holding prayer and hymn books for the use of the congregation. We are, therefore, in a good and comfortable condition—with our Church not only in perfect repair—but clean, bright and cheerful. There is also a very comfortable shed for the protection of the horses, while the people are worshipping. For the past two Summers, we had quite an interesting Sunday School, under the superintendence of E. H. Wade, Esq., who was ably assisted by Miss Atkinson and Miss Mary Brown. The attendance was not quite so regular this year as last. This was partly owing to the sad affliction and bereavement which fell upon the family of our esteemed superintendent, who, under such painful circumstances, could not give as much attention to the School as he had previously done.

The sudden death of Miss Wade cast a gloom over the whole congregation, every heart was filled with the sincerest sorrow for the loss of one so kind and good, and with the truest sympathy for every member of the bereaved family.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

No Report, for our publication, has been received from the Magdalen Islands. The work there going on, however, is well known to be of an interesting and encouraging character, as evidenced by the account, which at the time appeared, of the Bishop's visit to those Islands in August last. Other events, moreover, have since occurred, closely touching the Church's prosperity there. It has therefore been thought well that the Secretary should compile a short account of the work, for insertion in the Society's Annual Report, from such sources as are available.

After visiting the several Missions along the Gaspé Coast, the Bishop, with the Rev. Lennox Williams as Chaplain, visited these Islands last August. Grindstone Island, where the Rev. J. N. Hunter, the Missionary, resides, and which may be regarded as the centre of the Mission, was the first visited. Here very hearty Services were held,

united in by a large and devout congregation, and ten Candidates received the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation. Thence the Bishop and his Clergy, with little delay, proceeded to Grosse Isle. Some of these Islands are linked together by long narrow banks of sand, visible only when the tide is low. A sand bar on this occasion served as a roadway, and a drive of twenty-seven miles brought the party to the little Church on Grosse Isle, where a very large congregation were in waiting. The Church was soon packed with very earnest and devout worshippers. The Service was particularly hearty and impressive: eighteen Candidates were confirmed. Early the following morning the Holy Eucharist was celebrated in the Church, and subsequently, privately administered to some sick person on the Island.

From Grosse Isle the Bishop, his Chaplain, and the Rev. Mr. Hunter, were conveyed by Steamer "La Canadienne," through the kindness of Captain Bélanger, to Byron Island, ten miles distant. There is no church edifice here, but the few earnest families, all kindly visited by the Bishop, expressed themselves as determined to have one at no distant day. Grand Island was the next touched; and thence on, still by Steamer, the Bishop proceeded to Entry Island. Here a little Church was in course of erection; and though it claimed only bare walls and a roof, it was decided, the weather being fine, to accept of its humble invitation. Rough boards served as seats, a little Sanctuary was soon tastefully arranged, a hearty Service held, and the Blessed Sacrament administered, one-half of the congregation devoutly and thankfully availing themselves of this coveted privilege.

Amherst was next visited. Here the Bishop confirmed the children of Mr. Savage. Thence the "Canadienne" returned to Grindstone, to allow the Rev. Mr. Hunter to disembark, and then, with the Bishop and his Chaplain, proceeded to Pictou.

In September Mr. Hunter came up to Quebec, and on the 29th of that month, the Festival of St. Michael and All Angels, was advanced to the Priesthood, in St. Peter's Church, Sherbrooke. Sherbrooke was selected for this pleasing and important event because it had been the scene of Mr. Hunter's zealous and much appreciated labours whilst still a Lay Reader. It is, we feel sure, agreed by all that the Missionary on the Magdalen Islands, as also on the Coast of Labrador, should be in Priest's Orders. Happily this is now so in both cases.

The Mission of the Magdalen Islands, as the reader will have inferred, is an extensive one; in Summer, difficult to serve without the aid of a boat, and in Winter, when intercourse between the Islands is in some cases an impossibility, without an assistant. We are pleased to learn that through the kind offices of the "Church Helpers' Association," funds are being collected wherewith to supply the Mission with a boat. And it is a further matter of especial thankfulness that, through the kindness and generosity of some true friends of the Church, the Bishop has been enabled to send a second Clergyman to these Islands. The Rev. Mr. Prout is already stationed on Entry Island, the little Church there, above referred to, having already been completed and paid for. Mr. Hunter gratefully acknowledges, in behalf of this and other kindred work, the receipt of \$203 from friends in Quebee, \$105.25 from friends in Sherbrooke, and \$24 from other sources, or a total of \$332.25 — which suffices to meet the balance of his building account.

MAGOG.

The Rev. R. C. Tambs reports :—

At the Church, improvements have been made in the appointments of the Altar, a new furnace has been put in at the cost of \$120.00, a broad cement walk has been laid from the gate to the porch, and a separate carriage drive opened to the horse-sheds. Our Ladies' Guild supplied largely the means for repairs and material improvements. This year, under the presidency of Mrs. James Oliver, it raised \$330.00, chiefly by an Easter Sale of Lenten work. Its operations serve also to bring the members of the congregation into social contact, a matter of particular importance in a changing community like this.

Through Miss Edith Jack, of St. Martin's Church, Montreal, a circle of the "King's Daughters" has been formed in connection with our Church. Miss Jack is an enthusiastic member of the Order, and in response to an invitation kindly came and spent a few days in our midst. The contagion of her sweet devotion soon made itself felt, and on Wednesday afternoon, October 16, seventeen were admitted to the Order at an impressive Service in the Church, and Mrs. La Frenaye was unanimously chosen as Leader. Subsequently another like Service was held

in the Guild Room, when seventeen more were admitted, making in all with two already in the Parish thirty-six. The introduction of this Order into a Parish does not interfere with existing organizations, but rather serves to strengthen them and increase their efficiency by infusing into them a religious spirit and lifting up their activities into a heavenly atmosphere. It is designed to lead its members to realize the dignity of their divine relationship in Christ Jesus, to inspire them with a sublime motive for service, and to group them encouragingly in their undertakings according to the affinities of their talents, recognising the fact, that though there is but one Spirit, there are diversities of gifts—good results are already apparent in the Parish, and I must say that there is hardly anything that gladdens me more than to detect the little glistening badge—the Maltese symbol of self-sacrificing love engraved with the motive letters I. H. N.—(In His Name)—for it gives me to understand that the wearer desires and is ready to be kindly helpful to the best of her ability without thought of laying any one under obligation, or looking even for thanks; and I am moved to say to myself, here, thank God, is one who, I have reason to believe, is above being touchy, and who is not likely to falter in her Christian service for lack of appreciation or be daunted in her efforts for good by reason of ingratitude.

In Dorcas work this Autumn the King's Daughters and the W. A. were as one, and the result was a case and barrel of clothing, &c., sent to the Indians of the Black River Mission, Manitoba, to gladden their Christmas.

The Sunday Services, morning and evening, at St. Luke's, have been encouragingly attended by attentive congregations with a gladdening proportion of young men. There has been Holy Communion twice a month, in Summer oftener, and on chief Festivals decorations and choral Eucharist. Miss Maggie Lindsay still presides faithfully at the organ, and if our gentlemen singers were only as loyal as our King's Daughters, we should be able to boast of one of the best Choirs in the Diocese.

At a Dorcas meeting of the King's Daughters, on October 29th, Miss Lindsay was made the recipient of a present from the congregation in the shape of a purse of \$46.00 in recognition of her services as organist for the past two years.

On the Sunday after Ascension we were favoured in hav-

ing as preacher in the morning the Rev. Dr. Willetts, Principal of King's College, Windsor. At this Service nine young people were baptized.

We were particularly honoured in having His Lordship, our Bishop, with us on Trinity Sunday. The congregations were large and keenly interested. There were early Communion and morning and evening Services at St. Luke's, and afternoon Service at Cherry River. Eight Candidates were confirmed in the morning (among them an old man of eighty-three years from a distance of five miles) and four in the afternoon. The Bishop was the guest of Mrs. E. R. Johnson, where after the evening Service the officers of the Church were invited to meet His Lordship. On the following morning we went to the McConnell neighbourhood, His Lordship being driven by Mr. A. H. Moore. Here we had Service in the School-house, the Rev. A. Stevens being with us and assisting in the prayers. The congregation were of course greatly interested in the Bishop and his discourse. After the Service we were entertained at the Spendlove homestead, and in the afternoon His Lordship confirmed the aged and infirm mother of the family, after which he left for Stantead.

In July and August I had for four weeks the assistance, at Church and Cottage Services, of the Rev. Edmund Jackson, M.A., prior to his taking charge of the Mission of Marbleton, and for a like number of Sundays the pulpit help of the Rev. C. M. Cox, M.A. This afforded needed rest to myself and an agreeable and edifying change to the congregation. Mr. Cox was on vacation from his duties at Tewkesbury Abbey, Gloucestershire, England. He is a nephew of Bishop Bompas, an excellent preacher and a man of charming sociability. His visit was all too short, but we mutually made the most of it. He for his part, among other things, made the acquaintance of a bear in an evening descent from the summit of Mount Orford, and a capsized into the lake while out yachting.

On Sunday, August 25th, we had four Clergymen in the Chancel, one was the Rev. Mr. Larivière, M.A., Principal of Sabrevois College, Montreal, who kindly assisted, and another was the Rev. George Ward, of the Diocese of Huron, who kindly preached in the evening. A couple of Sundays later we had a Sermon in the morning from the Rev. Mr. Gomery, M.A., agent of the Bible Society, and in the evening from the Rev. Prof. Worrell, of the Military College, Kingston.

On September 24th we had for the first time here a Sunday School Conference. There were present, besides the Incumbent, the following Clergymen:—The Ven. Archdeacon Roe, D.D., the Rev. Canons Foster and Thorneloe, and the Revs. A. Stevens, W. T. Forsythe, A. H. Robertson, H. E. Wright, H. S. Harte, J. W. Garland and A. C. Wilson—the two latter from the adjoining Missions in the Montreal Diocese. The Morning Session was preceded by Holy Communion and an able Address by the Ven. Archdeacon. In the afternoon the attendance increased to seventy-five. Our people found the discussions most interesting and profitable, and hope to be able to attend another such gathering before very long. In the evening excellent Addresses were delivered to a full Church by the Rev. Mr. Harte to children, by the Rev. Mr. Robertson to teachers and by the Rev. Canon Thorneloe to parents. The visitors to the Conference were entertained by the Ladies' Guild in the Guild Room.

On the evening of November 4th, at a Service in the Church, the Ven. Archdeacon Roe, D.D., delivered his charge to the Clergy of this district—dealing ably with the important subject of the religious training of the young. On the following day a Sub-Deanery Meeting was held at the Parsonage, but the Sessions were saddened by the Archdeacon being suddenly called away by the tidings of his brother's death, the Rev. Peter Roe. The Clergy, on this occasion, seemed to appreciate the prandial ministrations of our King's Daughters in the Guild Room.

From the above account of the varied pulpit ministrations it will be seen how favoured our people have been, and I must express my own deep gratitude for having received so much help, which I appreciated so much the more on account of my health being in such a lowly state.

The Sunday School Conference and the observance of Sunday School Sunday, I am sure, were not without their effect, certainly we can boast of a lovely Sunday School. We hold it now before Church in the morning instead of in the afternoon, an arrangement better for all concerned. The attendance is seldom less than sixty.

We have secured this year an excellent S. P. C. K. Library of two hundred and fifty volumes, which is appreciated by parents as well as children. The children's Lenten Missionary Boxes yielded \$10.00, which was devoted to the Piegan Indian Home, in behalf of which Miss

Brown had interested us. The children had of course their Christmas Tree Festival and their Lake Excursion, which were as usual on a grand scale, taking in the English of the town and vicinity generally, and eminently successful.

An interesting item to record is the enrolment of a company of the Boys' Brigade under the Captaincy of Ira C. Johnson, with Mr. Geo. Aldridge as drill instructor; Mr. Aldridge wears two medals for service in Egyptian campaign under Gen. Sir Garnet Wolseley. The boys are provided with caps, haversacks, belts and B. B. rifles, and present a very neat appearance. They have had Church parade on several occasions. A fine Lake Excursion and an excellent Entertainment have been given under their auspices. On the excursion we had Bishop Niles with us, and Dr. Bloomfield, the British Chaplain of Munich. Captain Johnson is indefatigable in behalf of his company's interests.

At Cherry River, we have Service now every Sunday afternoon and an M. C. L., meeting once a month. We have started a library with sixty S. P. C. K. volumes. But here, at Cherry River, where such growing success has attended the efforts of the Church for the past few years, and where the people themselves have been wont to express their surprise at the wonderful change for good observable throughout the whole neighbourhood, here the Methodist body has recently seen fit to place a resident minister free of cost. The people have fallen readily in with the movement regarding it no doubt as an additional agency to be welcomed as calculated to effect a still further advancement in the interests of the locality.

In the McDermott neighbourhood, we have a united little community, and our week evening Services and "Leagues," are joined in most heartily.

It is a matter of great comfort to me, that the Rev. A. Stevens, of East Hatley, is now able to hold a Sunday evening Service once a month in the McConnell district. I feel sure he will meet with success.



I desire in conclusion to express my warm thanks to the Wardens and the many Lay-helpers throughout the Mission for their willing co-operation.

MALBAIE.

The Rev. G. R. Walters reports:—

I am pleased to report the completion of St. Paul's Church, at Barachois. The Lord Bishop consecrated the Grave-yard and the Church, when here in July last. I have been very much interested in establishing this little Church at Barachois, and am glad to find the congregation beginning to take quite an interest themselves. Since opened for Service, the attendance has been regular and very good. I try to give a Service every Sunday afternoon, except when Holy Communion is celebrated, then I give morning Service. All are supplied with Prayer and Hymn Books, and I can notice a marked improvement in singing and responding, and reverence is shown for God's House. When I compare this with the Services which I conducted so long in the miserable old School-house near by, I feel I may take courage for the future. Twenty Candidates were confirmed in this Church, whose ages varied from twelve to seventy-five years. The Services were well attended at both the Consecration of the Church on the Saturday, and the Confirmation on the Sunday afternoon. At both Services the Bishop preached very interesting and earnest Sermons, making quite an impression for good upon all present. Thus we have now a neat, well built Church, standing on its own consecrated and enclosed ground, insured and free of all debt. This completes the third new Church I have built in this Mission, all of which have been consecrated within the past five years. As I look into the future and see much yet to be done in the Mission, I cannot but feel thankful for all the mercies showered upon me in the past, and trust that the same overruling Hand will be with us in the future for good. I would tender my best thanks to all who in any way helped me in this work at Barachois, and especially the families of Robertson, and John McCallum, who have helped in many ways by their generosity in giving lumber free of cost.

Our efforts at Barachois are now centered in raising funds for a Bell, and stain and varnish, for the interior of our Church. I would thank here Mr. Collas, of Malbaie, for kindly presenting a pretty three-light chancel window of stained glass to this Church, and the ladies of the congregation for their trouble in getting up a capital Tea, whereby the sum of \$91.00 has been raised.

At the Corner of the Beach we have been enabled, since my last report, to stain and varnish the interior of St. Luke's Church, which adds much to its appearance. We have purchased also a very fine new Organ, costing \$160.00, which is not only in appearance a thing of beauty, but is really a powerful and sweet toned instrument. This, unfortunately, I have to play myself for want of a better organist. For the money for this work, I am indebted to the ladies of St. Luke's congregation, who formed a Guild, and sold, after a Tea Party, the results of their sewing class. They were greatly rewarded for their painstaking, as they realized \$140.00. Thus, with \$60.00 presented by Mrs. Collas, collected by her from friends in Jersey, we were enabled to pay all indebtedness. Our Services are always well attended by the eleven families here, who take a pride and deep interest in their Church, and extend to me kindness and consideration. To Mr. Mabe and Mr. Vibert, my Church-Wardens, I am much indebted. I trust they will long continue to exercise for good, their influence as Church-Wardens, of our good old Church of England.

I may say we have just completed a very capital Church Hall, or Parish Room, here in Malbaie, in connection with St. Peter's Church. I have long felt the need of such a place. In appearance it is severely plain externally, it is fifty-two feet long, thirty feet wide, two stories high, the basement used as a horse-shelter; the upper hall answers for any purpose in connection with our Mission work. I am most eager to fit up this room in a simple way, suitable for entertaining our young people (men) especially, say as a reading room, by placing all the picture and other papers, magazines, games, &c., I can procure, on the table, and opening the Hall two or three evenings a week. Our young people live far scattered, but I am inclined to think, once they learn interest is taken in them, they will take interest in it. However the work is a venture of faith, and I have really laboured hard personally at this undertaking. I have borrowed the funds for the work, making myself responsible for the amount. I trust next month we shall hold a Tea and Fancy Sale in the Hall; on it my hopes and fears are concentrated, as I am depending on its financial success.

Mrs. Walters has had a Sewing Guild held in our house, composed of a few interested ladies of the congregation, who have worked away patiently for a year, with the

praise worthy aim, "of helping to pay for the Church Hall." I have secured by will, to the Mission, the gift of another small strip of land adjoining our Church Glebe, which in the future will enable the Clergyman to pasture a cow. The present glebe is very small.

I am glad I have been enabled to keep all my appointments for the year, Sunday and others, though it involves constant driving, as this Mission extends into three Townships.

Church Services in Malbaie have been attended by the usual congregation, which does not grow larger. Many of the young have gone elsewhere in quest of work. Our summer fishing was a very disastrous one: had not the fall season brightened, I know not what many would have done. My Church-Wardens felt anxious for the Church Assessment. Death has caused a break in our ranks, and several have fallen. I trust the Services of the Church they attended, and the worship offered there, have, through the merits of their Redeemer, fitted them for the service of the Redeemed.

I am sincerely glad to find in each of our three Churches a goodly proportion of men coming forward with some degree of regularity, to receive the Sacrament of the Holy Communion.

In looking over my Parish Register, I find I have, during my incumbency of this Mission, baptized three hundred and eighty-one, married seventy-eight couples and buried one hundred and sixty-eight.

I have taken up the offerings for outside purposes. Some funds show an increase and others a decrease compared with last year. Giving fully and freely, to the service of God, and the spread of His Name and work, is a subject, I fear, all here do not lay to heart.

His Lordship the Bishop confirmed thirteen Candidates in St. Peter's Church, when here in July, preaching at Corner Beach, consecrating, confirming and preaching at Barachois twice, besides giving a most interesting lecture in Malbaie, on the Early History of the Church, to quite a large audience. We were all much cheered by this visit, and happy to welcome Mrs. Dunn, who was good enough to play our organ at both Services, in the absence of our organist, which act was much appreciated by us all.

My thanks are due Mr. LeGros and Mr. LeMarquand, for their services as Church-Wardens, and especially to Mr.

MARBLETON.

The Rev. Edmund Jackson reports :—

As I have only been in charge of this Mission since August last, a lengthy and detailed statement will not be expected from me:

I found, on coming into residence, that my predecessor had worked the Mission with vigour and resource. Unfortunately, however, I found a legacy of parochial unsettlement and ill-feeling. The task of striving to promote peace has been indeed difficult and at times harassing, but I have met with not a little kindness.

In *St. Paul's Church, Marbleton*, the congregations have been fairly good. The Davidic declaration, "My voice shalt thou hear in the morning, O Lord," can, however, hardly be applied, and the supreme importance of the Holy Communion would appear not to have been sufficiently inculcated. I am thankful to say we have now Holy Day Celebrations. The Sunday School has been reorganized, and in a small way is prospering and promising. I am grateful to the teachers for their help.

At *Dudswell* I can report most favourably. The congregations at the Church of the Good Shepherd are good, the people are zealous and loyal, and the Ladies' Guild is well organized and flourishing. It has provided a set of chairs for the use of the choir.

The School-house Services at East Dudswell and Earle are well attended, especially at the former. Dissent is strong in both these hamlets.

The Lord Bishop kindly visited us on October 25th, *en route* to East Angus. His Lordship lectured on "English Church History"; the weather was unfortunately inclement.

The Harvest Thanksgiving Services were duly held. At Marbleton, though the Church was not so ingeniously transformed as in some former years, the decorations were tasteful and pleasing. The Rev. D. Horner preached a thoughtful Sermon.

In December the Clergy of the Sub-Deanery of Cookshire met at Marbleton for study and discussion, and a very pleasant and helpful gathering took place. At a special public Service, an inspiring Sermon was preached by the Rev. A. H. Robertson, of Cookshire.

I thank the Wardens of both Churches for their aid and counsel, also the two Organists, Mr. Hunt and Miss Embury, and Miss Hart and Mrs. Jenkerson, for their cheerfully rendered assistance in the musical part of our Services.

I am happy in having the first incumbent, the Rev. T. S. Chapman, to give me the benefit of his experience and encyclopædic learning. From him I have received invariable and gratifying kindness.

To sum up, while there are discouragements here as everywhere, I have hope that the Church will make progress, if we work and wait.

MELBOURNE.

The Rev. W. J. Curran reports :—

St. John's Church.—It is with much pleasure and satisfaction that I present the report of the work done in this Mission for the past year. A great deal, thank God, has been accomplished by the people, yet a great deal remains to be done in order to bring the Mission up to what it ought to be.

About eighteen months ago, the Mission was separated from St. Anne's, Richmond. At that time, many of the people were much discouraged and some prophesied that the Church would soon be closed, as they were not able to keep it open. Now, after eighteen months, we are beginning to walk, and I trust will continue to grow in strength and vigour.

Last year, I was able to report that we had the contract given out for the building of a Parsonage. To-day, I am happy to say that the Parsonage has been built at a cost of \$1,360.00, and is paid for, duly deeded and insured. Water has been procured at a cost of \$60.00; \$76.00 has been paid for a furnace, and \$21.50 has been paid for insurance on Parsonage, making a total of \$1,517.50.

The Services in St. John's have been regularly carried on through the year. The congregations have been larger this year than last, the Sunday offerings larger also. This, I consider, is a good sign of the spiritual condition of the people. I believe strongly in getting to the hearts of the people, and the people will get to the bottom of their pockets.

The Sunday School at St. John's has been under my care every Sunday morning before Divine Service since the Spring.

The Ladies' Guild has done a noble work under the able management of three ladies, viz.: Miss Gallup, president, Mrs. Mathias, vice-president, and Mrs. E. Gallup, treasurer and secretary. They have presented the Church with a beautiful oak chair, at the cost of \$14.00, and have paid for the furnace in the Parsonage, which cost \$76.00. At present they have on hand \$44.00, wherewith to put a fence round the Church property.

St. John's people have been honoured by three visits this past year from the Lord Bishop. The first was for a Confirmation Service, when seven Candidates received, we hope, the seven fold gift of the Spirit by the laying on of hands. The second visit was for the Dedication of a beautiful marble Font presented to the Church by Mr. John McKee, in memory of his three daughters, who have been called to their rest. This Service was very impressive. After the dedication Service, the grand-child of Mr. McKee was baptized. The third visit was for the Harvest Thanksgiving, the Church on this occasion was very full; many came ten miles to hear His Lordship. These visits to St. John's have helped me very much in my work. His Lordship has met, I think, every member of the congregation, and has given each a good shake of the hand. The people have left his presence feeling that the Chief Shepherd of the Diocese cares for them and wishes to know them. The Assessment for St. John's has been fully paid.

Rockland Quarry.—The Services here are well attended, but the responding not good; this is partially accounted

for by the fact that many who attend are not members of the Church. I have frequently endeavoured to explain our Services, and not, I believe, without profit. Five different Services are held in the one School-house, each Sunday, and often am I obliged to wait outside, until another Service is concluded. This is not pleasant at any time, particularly at this season of the year. However, I am thankful to think that some good work is being accomplished in this part of my Mission. I have a Sunday School after Service each Sunday, with twenty children on the roll. The Assessment from this station has been paid.

Melbourne Ridge.—The Services here are well attended ; two-thirds of the congregation are young men. It is always a hopeful and encouraging sign, when young men are found ready to attend our public Services and to take an active interest in them. We have a Sunday School here. Miss Emily Holland kindly started it, and has already the names of thirty children on the roll. A Woman's Guild, too, has been inaugurated.

As I look back over the year, I cannot but feel very grateful to God for the good which he has enabled us to perform, and to be hopeful as I contemplate the future of the Mission.

MONTMORENCY, STONEHAM AND LAKE BEAUPORT.

The Rev. G. F. Hibbard reports :—

Montmorency.—There seem to be very good prospects of this Mission increasing in importance from year to year. While a large portion of the congregation is continually fluctuating, as is usually the case in a manufacturing village, yet there remains a permanent and active body of

Churchmen who are warm supporters of the Church. During the months of July, August and September weekly Services are held here, but for the remainder of the year the Services are only fortnightly. Several free congregational entertainments have been held during the year, which, besides being exceedingly enjoyable, resulted most satisfactorily in increasing the feeling of mutual regard and friendship among the people. A really good house to house collection was made last Autumn, its success being largely due to the efforts of Mr. Mills, who, with Mr. Nixon, undertook to make the collection.

Stoneham.—Shortly after the commencement of the year Services were resumed in the Church, having been suspended while the whole fabric was undergoing extensive repairs. During the time our own Church was uninhabitable the Presbyterians very kindly gave us the use of theirs. With a little more outlay the old Church would have a very pretty and comfortable interior, the chief needs being a carpet for the Chancel, a new porch and some plastering.

A Harvest Thanksgiving Service was held in the Fall and was well attended, the Church having been very prettily decorated by the members of the congregation.

Lake Beauport.—Twice during the year the Bishop has visited the pretty Mission Church of S. James the Apostle, each time being an occasion of the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation. Needless to say the Services were very impressive, and the Bishop's Sermons and kindly words of encouragement have evidently borne fruit. The average attendance at the Services is increasing, the people respond well to any special appeal for a good purpose, and the young people take a lively interest in the Church work, and have already done much to improve the musical part of the Services.

In the Autumn the people expressed their thankfulness to God for a good harvest in a most practical way by making large contributions towards filling the cellar of the incumbent with vegetables of various kinds. Nor was the faithful steed forgotten, who during the year has travelled several thousand miles, done chiefly while on Mission work. Harmony and good-will prevail everywhere in the Mission, and while this remains the case there can be no doubt that the work will be blessed for each ensuing year.

NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. E. B. Husband reports:—

During the year past, the Services throughout this Mission have been regularly held and well attended, especially the evening ones. I am glad to notice an increase in Communicants, and also in the Sunday Schools. In New Carlisle I have held weekly instructions for the teachers, with I trust satisfactory results. In Paspébiac, too, there has been a good attendance of scholars. In Hopetown, during the summer months, I gave instructions on the Church Catechism during the Service.

It is very gratifying to notice more heartiness in the responding and greater reverence. All these I trust are signs of spiritual growth, and greater interest in spiritual matters.

Towards building and maintenance of Church property much has been done.

In New Carlisle, the new Church has made much progress. The outside has been well painted, and the roof inside ceiled. A new Font, kindly given by S. Matthew's, Quebec, is now ready to be placed, and will, I am sure, add much to the beauty of the Church. I hope a united effort will be made during the year 1896 to complete the Church and thus secure the grant of £60, kindly extended for two years by the S. P. C. K.

In Paspébiac, a strong new fence has been placed around the whole property, including the shed and Church-yard, and the Church Hall fitted up, by the proceeds of a Concert held last Spring.

In Hopetown, through a sale of work, we have been enabled to finish the inside of the Church, to stain and varnish the walls and seats, and procure some necessary articles. Our thanks are due to the Church Helpers in Quebec for giving us a surplice and set of Altar Linen.

Looking back, I cannot but feel grateful for what has been done, and I am indeed grateful to those whom God has moved to help me in this great work; but still our great want is more Church helpers. There is much work, new work, which I feel ought to be done, but will have to be left undone, because I cannot undertake it single handed. I feel there is more than enough, as things are, to occupy my time in New Carlisle. I hope the day is not far distant when New Carlisle will have its own resident Clergyman.

NEWPORT.

The Rev. A. H. Moore reports :—

I was licensed to work in this Missionary District in June last, and entered upon my work at once. I had served here as Lay Reader during the college year previous, and with the occasional assistance of a fellow student, had kept up the regular Sunday Services. The commendable willingness of the people to raise their full Assessments for the services of a Lay Reader is not the least encouraging feature of the work here during the past year.

The account of the work which has been done during six short months of residence is soon told.

I took up my residence in Sawyerville, boarding at Mr. H. H. Hunt's, to whom I am indebted for many kindness. The usual order of Services has been followed without interruption, consisting of morning and afternoon Service at the Churches, and evening Service at Clifton and Learned Plain School-houses on alternate Sundays.

At *St. Matthew's Church, Randboro'*, the attendance has considerably improved, and the Sunday School, which was opened in July, has been appreciated. Miss Eva Planche and Miss Hodge have each helped willingly in the teaching. Through the energy of Mr. Geo. Hurd and Mr. C. Loveland, a safe and commodious platform with steps has been erected in front of this Church.

The Harvest Thanksgiving Service was well attended, and we were greatly favoured in having the Lord Bishop

of the Diocese as preacher. The Ladies' Guild is working towards augmenting the Parsonage Fund.

At *Christ's Church, Island Brook*, the outlook is less promising. This congregation has been under a financial cloud in the shape of overdue assessments during the greater part of the time, but a special effort is being made to get things into a healthy condition.

The Assessment, considering the scattered condition of the congregation, is rather heavy.

Here too, the Ladies' Guild has worked most faithfully, and at the time of writing, the interior of the Church is being ceiled in ash at a cost of nearly \$200. The whole credit of this repairing falls to the Guild. The Sunday School, which was started here, has been kept up by Mr. Maurice Bowen and Mrs. Geo. French, and has done good and painstaking work.

The Lord Bishop held a Confirmation in this Church in October, when seven Candidates were presented. The Service was, for many reasons, one long to be remembered. The Rev. A. H. Robertson was the preacher at the Harvest Thanksgiving Service here.

Learned Plain School-house has been improved by the addition of an Organ, and the Service has improved in attendance and warmth. Mrs. Bowen continues her Sunday School here with the usual care and diligence.

The Service at Clifton is rather depressing just now, both singing and responding being at a low ebb. There are only a few Church people here, but the general appreciation of the Service makes one hope for improvement.

I intend beginning the new year by opening a Service at Sawyerville in a Hall which has been kindly offered for the purpose. This will give me four Services every other Sunday. The Parsonage question referred to in last year's report has been decided; and it is proposed to build at Sawyerville early next Summer. The undertaking is a large one for such a scattered Mission, but all seem to recognize the need of a Parsonage and will doubtless do all they can towards its erection. The site was selected by the Bishop after his visit to the Mission.

There are in all parts of this Mission people who came here before the Church Services were opened, and who, though themselves reared in the Church, have brought up their children in dissenting chapels, and have in the great majority of cases identified themselves with other religious

bodies for want of the ministrations of the Church. It is gratifying to hear such people speak affectionately of "our mother the Church," and one cannot help wishing to see them return to her fold.

I cannot close this report without expressing my gratitude for the universal kindness and hospitality with which I have been received by the people of the whole Mission. I should like also to refer to the great blessing and privilege which it has been to me to be so near and to profit by the counsel of my Rector, the Rev. A. H. Robertson, of Cookshire. Through his kind supervision, I have felt that I have not been working single handed, and he has given the people of the Mission several opportunities of attending the Holy Communion by exchanging with me. As I stated in my report of work here, which appeared in the *Diocesan Gazette*, there are many hindrances to the work of the Church in a new and scattered Mission like this, yet there are many hopeful signs, and the presence of a few willing hearty workers in all parts of the Mission earnestly suggests that much will eventually be done by the Church for the honour and glory of God.

PENINSULA AND LITTLE GASPÉ.

The Rev. N. M. Bayne reports :—

Although this Mission is the most remote of the Diocese to the North-East and inconveniently situated on a coast that appears uninviting save in the Summer months, yet we have encouragements and bright days. As instances of these there stand forth distinctly the 24th and 25th of July, when the Lord Bishop was with us, and also the last days of November, when we moved into the Parsonage.

His Lordship spent a busy time in the Mission. The first day of his visit was in Peninsula, where he preached, lectured and confirmed an infirm young man. The next he visited Little Gaspé, where he preached and confirmed six young people, who made up the number of those who received the Holy Communion to forty-two. These young members of the Church now admitted to all her privileges, I am thankful to say, continue regular communicants.

On this side of the Bay, the population is distinctly divided into Church people, Methodists and Roman Catholics. Almost every family has its spiritual home, so that my work is to a great extent regular and ordinary. The attendance at both Churches has been equal to that of last year. The average number of Communicants since the month of June last is thirty-five, and nineteen respectively for Peninsula and Little Gaspé. The Services on the whole have been hearty, and to a cheering degree their praise and prayer "common," with music faithfully attended to by organists and choirs. During the Winter a parish Bible Class and week-day evening Service (the latter always on a Saint's day when possible), were alternated each week in Peninsula. Special Lenten Services were also held in both parts of the Mission and well attended considering the state of the roads and weather. Sunday School work has gone on uninterruptedly, thanks to the teachers' faithfulness. At Little Gaspé we have now a small library, through the help of the S. P. C. K., which is a real blessing to the whole congregation.

The Parsonage, to which I referred in two former reports, is now completed, insured, and free of debt. It is a neat comfortable home and makes my Sunday duties much lighter, being situated close to the Church. In little more than a year and a half this good work has been done. The usual grant of the Church Society was given

us as well as a certain amount of assistance from kind friends; but very much the greater part of the burden has been willingly borne by the congregation. Untiring efforts were made to carry the undertaking to completion, and praise is especially due to the St. Matthew's Ladies' Guild for having done noble work. The Mission is on the whole made up of poor people; yet, besides shewing a slight increase in offertories, there has been raised within twelve months, by a bazaar and a concert, more than \$160.00 for the Parsonage building, besides \$115.00 by the bee-like work of the Guild for the same purpose. Genuine sacrifices have been made; and in so far as this has been done truly for God's glory, His blessing will follow. Further efforts however are needed. An attached kitchen has been covered in, and needs considerable labor and money expended, before it can be habitable. A barn, &c., is also needed as well as improvements upon one of the Churches, which in fact was never quite completed. Still we shall labor on, "confident of this very thing that he which," hath begun a good work, will perform it to the end.

RICHMOND.

The Rev. J. Hepburn reports:—

This is my seventh report from Richmond, and I am happy to be able to report progress. I am able also to make the report with more certainty than on some former occasions. Harmony and good-will prevail throughout the Parish, and there is an evident awakening of interest on the part of some in the outskirts of the field. A new station was opened shortly before last Easter at St. Cyr's Siding, near the borders of the Danville Parish, where quite a few scattered families are living, and so far from any Church, that there is a fear of them sinking into carelessness. The interest taken in these Services, which are held fortnightly on Thursday evenings, is very encouraging, and it is pleasant to notice the constant attendance of many not connected with the Church.

The Parish Church of St. Anne's has been greatly benefited by the division of the Parish, leaving me free from many outside cares to give myself to her wants and wishes.

The attendance at Church gains steadily, though we have lost by removal. The evening attendance has improved, though there is room for more. And while I am in this strain I ought to express a wish that the observance of Saints' Days, and of the daily worship in Summer, may commend themselves to the people. In this respect there is very grave remissness.

Shortly after the New Year Archdeacon Roe held a most interesting and profitable Conference for this section of the Diocese. His charge on the duties of parents to their children was weighty and most impressive. The audience, I am sorry to say, was small; and several Clergy also were absent. However it was a good day for the Parish, and will be remembered. The Missionary meeting in the evening was favoured with Addresses by the Revds. Wurtele and Scott, in addition to the main Address by the Archdeacon. And we have been most highly favoured by the presence of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. He has held two Confirmations, one in December with thirteen Candidates, and one in May with five. In addition to this he spent the Parish day with us—observed for the first time; and from a long and extensive experience in Parish work, he was able to teach us many things, and help us much. He also gave us a lecture on Church History very highly appreciated by

a good house, and he was kind enough to consent to come from Quebec, for our special benefit, to preach the Thanksgiving Sermon. His Sermon on "Paradise," where God's grain is being garnered, has left a very deep impression upon the Parish for good. It was peculiarly well suited to us after so many visitations of death. We have just secured him for a night as he was passing through the town, for business of another kind. All this, not to mention the pleasant peeps, as he is waiting for the coming train. Such oversight of the field is a striking illustration of zeal and devotion; and all value it highly.

Last year we had a very interesting "Harvest Supper," collecting our people from all parts of the Parish, and bringing in \$60.00 to be applied on the Church debt. It was repeated this year, and on a larger scale, contributions of handwork being sold in the afternoon, and the result was \$141.00. This result may perhaps be counted a little thing; but the expression of interest and happiness is not a small thing; nor was the presence of so many citizens of the town from every Church in it, we never before had such a token of good-will, and all were pleased with the evening. Incidentally this Harvest Supper was a great assistance to me in my endeavour to raise \$1,000.00 to reduce the debt. One of our old parishioners, a farmer, most regular in his attendance at Church, though living four miles away, submitted a proposal to the Easter Vestry, that he would give \$50.00 for this object if the rest of the congregation would make it \$1,000. He intended to give a corresponding amount until all was paid, and the building made free for Consecration. Dr. Howe rose at once and expressed his pleasure at hearing the proposal, and then said he would be glad to give \$50.00 also in the same way. Canvassing for this was deferred until the Wardens had covered the ground. Little progress was made until the Ladies began to stir about the Supper, then I found the way open. We have not yet completed the list, but it exceeds \$800.00 already, with a good many yet to call upon, so that it is clear we will go beyond the limit of \$1,000.00. The more the better. This is a matter of great moment to the Parish, for it has felt the burden of the debt for several years past; and we now rejoice at the prospect coming nearer to us of a day when all liabilities being met, we may dedicate the building, of which we are justly proud, to the worship and honour of God.

All parochial organizations are in a healthy state.

My officers and coadjutors in all departments of work are deserving of the highest praise, and my most hearty thanks. And the kindness of the Parish to my family at Christmas and Easter most gratifying.

I cannot close without a reference to those who have been called away, seventeen in the year, a large proportion of them pioneers of the place: Mairs, Davis, Cull, Pepler, Speer, Jeffery, Fowler, Brooke, Journeaux, Lloyd. Many will be long remembered for their good examples and for their many good works. And this is especially true of Mr. E. Journeaux, who filled every post of honour and usefulness in the Church many times over. Such Saints of God are a priceless heritage.

RIVIÈRE DU LOUP.

The Rev. G. G. Nicolls reports :—

The Sunday Services, with week-day ones in Lent and Advent, and occasionally at other times, have been regularly maintained. These include, it will be remembered, Services in two Churches every Sunday, and, during the months of July and August, in three. Help in preaching was most kindly given several times during the Summer by the Lord Bishop of Huron, who endeared himself to all with whom he came in contact during his stay amongst us. Similar assistance was also given by the Rev. A. W. Mackay, of Ottawa, and the Rev. G. Abbott Smith, of Montreal, whose kindness is duly acknowledged.

Three or four visits have been paid to Father Point, St. Pacôme and St. Thomas in the course of the year ; and two to the families belonging to the Church of England at the various places in the Saguenay, Chicoutimi, Grand Bay and St. Etienne. Services of course being always held and the Holy Communion celebrated. A winter visit to Chicoutimi was also made this year in the month of February

—a privilege which it is believed the people in that place have never before enjoyed; but it is not expected that this will be repeated during this present Winter. In order to get there last February it was necessary to make a journey of 700 miles (350 each way), viâ Quebec; though the distance is barely 90 miles "as the crow flies." The one Church family living at Grand Bay has now left it, and the same is true of L'Anse au Foin; while all the English families have gone from St. Etienne, and should they not return next Summer, there will be only Chicoutimi left to visit in the Saguenay, unless further changes take place in an opposite direction, which does not seem likely. No visit has been made to Sault au Cochon I regret to say. It takes a whole week to go there and back; and in the Spring, what with the meeting of Synod, &c., it was impossible to arrange it. I wrote to Mr. Forrest, offering to go in September, but he replied that there was no use in my doing so, as he and his family would be leaving there in that month to return no more. I have since learned that they are still there, but will probably leave in the Spring, as the establishment is closed. In that case Sault au Cochon also drops off the list of places to be visited, unless work should be taken up again there in the future.

The Bishop of the Diocese visited the Mission on August 15th, and confirmed three Candidates, all young women; one from Chicoutimi, the others from this place. Later in the day a gathering of the congregation, to meet His Lordship, took place at the Parsonage, and a very pleasant evening was spent by all.

We were all very much surprised—and needless to say amazed—at receiving early in the Spring a request for payment of \$68.00, for shingles furnished for the Parsonage when it was built in 1885! Nobody here seems to have been aware of the debt; but enquiries showed that it was a just one, and we were burdened with this heavy addition to our obligations. Further enquiry revealed, however, that no grant had been made by the Church Society, in accordance with its usual custom, towards the building of the Parsonage in 1885; none having been applied for. Application was accordingly made, and the Society has lately voted a grant covering the amount of the indebtedness, thus helping and relieving us very appreciably.

Our kind friends the Summer visitors have this year again rallied to our assistance as usual, both in meeting our

assessment, and in raising money for the payment of the debt on the Mission Church at the Station, which is now reduced from \$850.00 (in 1893) to \$430.00; and moreover we can see our way to \$55.00 more, so that \$375.00 will clear us, and we hope to pay the last of it in 1897, or possibly next year, which is a very welcome and cheering prospect.

Our numbers are slowly lessening as regards residents; and with great regret I have to chronicle the loss, this last Autumn, of four out of our little handful, including two of our very best workers.

ST. GEORGE, BEAUCE.

The Rev. T. Rudd reports:—

The work in this Mission has been carried on as usual during the past year. The usual number of Services has been held, and the attendance at these Services has been as good or a little better than last year. During my absence from the Mission, my work was carried on by Mr. Stanley Dickson, of Bishop's College. I have to report the removal of four families from the Mission, three to the United States and one to Lake Megantic.

The Church in Cranbourne, which is very old, and was very much out of repair, has been restored. A new porch and belfry have been added. The roof and foundation have been renewed, besides many other improvements. We hope to complete the work of restoration in the Spring: when it is furnished it will look almost like a new Church. I have to thank the Bishop and other friends in Quebec for the help that they have given us towards this work, without whose generous assistance it could not have been done. Already a hundred dollars have been spent upon it, and another forty is needed. I have also to thank the ladies of the Church Helpers' Association for their assistance in buying new Vessels for the Holy Communion, and Altar Linen for the Church in Cranbourne.

At Cumberland Mills, I am happy to report improvement in the Sunday Services. Miss Stevens, our Organist, taught the children to sing and respond during the early part of the year; and now the work is being carried on by Miss McKee. A Christmas Tree and Entertainment was held here last January and much appreciated, as it was the first Christmas Tree which any of the young people had ever seen. This year, we are preparing for another like entertainment, the proceeds of which are to be given towards procuring maps for the School. I have to thank the ladies of Quebec, and also friends in St. George, for their boxes of presents and their assistance in the entertainment.

I hold occasional Services at Marlow, where there are a few Church families, and I am glad to report good attendance and a deepening interest in things spiritual.

I take this opportunity of thanking my Church-Wardens, and other Church helpers, for their ready support and co-operation.

SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. G. T. Harding reports:—

Our work in general has been going on as usual. The ordinary Services, Sunday and Holy Day, at the Church and at Barachois School-house, have been regularly held, together with special Services at the Church in Lent and Advent, and a regular week-night Service at the School-house, Douglastown. The results as regards attendance, &c., have been satisfactory. The number of communicants has greatly increased. At my first Christmas Communion here, I had forty, and thought that number good; this last Christmas there were eighty-one, with several regular Communicants absent. This is the largest number I have ever had at one time, although at the three Easter-tide Communion last Spring, ninety-six altogether received the Sacrament. Some special features and incidents of the work have been already alluded to through the columns of the *Diocesan Gazette*. One or two things in addition may here be noticed.

Our Winter Bible Classes were opened at the beginning of the year and continued till Easter, one at Barachois School-house, and another at the Parsonage, Sandy Beach. The same encouraging results attended the former as I have

before called attention to: that is, the attendance of adults was very good, and the interest manifested serious and earnest. The class at the Parsonage was, I am sorry to say, not so successful, the attendance being spasmodic and uncertain.

A Singing Class at Barachois, to which allusion was made in the *Diocesan Gazette*, was kept up during the Winter. But, unfortunately, soon after it was begun, many of those able and anxious to learn, were kept away for a time, by family and other accidental circumstances, which greatly weakened the class, and I did not feel that the result, on the whole, was satisfactory. But another class for instruction in vocal music was started by me, in connection with the Sandy Beach Model School, and has been kept up during the whole of the past term with considerable success. The people seem to be greatly interested in the singing. As an evidence of this, and of their good-will to me personally, I must mention that, on closing day, they made me a present of a very pretty china cup and saucer, towards the purchase of which each pupil gave something. I beg to acknowledge this with many thanks for their kindness.

Some notice of our School-work should here be made. The two Church Schools of the Mission have been visited by me, speaking generally with regularity once a week, and the religious instruction given has, to my mind, been of considerable importance in the interests of the Church. In my opinion, no other agency (Sunday School by no means excepted) can do the work which may here be done; and, certainly, no house to house visitation will give the clergyman the opportunity for contact with the children of the Parish, and for getting to know them, which this gives. Indeed, generally speaking, the school is the only place where the clergyman can see the children. For myself, I spend an hour in each school once a week, appoint the lessons to be learned, hear one of the three (Calvary and two St. Paul series) Catechism classes myself, or have a Bible class of the older pupils; then have a reading of the Gospel for the next Sunday by the whole school, asking easy questions upon it; or question the pupils on the Church Catechism (which is done in each school once a month); or, as in the Model School, have a continued verbal study of the Prayer Book, catechetically conducted; and finally, in both schools, closing with a short churchly service, consisting of "Nunc Dimittis," Creed, Lord's Prayer, the three evening

collects, a Post-Communion collect and the blessing. And it seems to me that work of this kind, carried on with regularity for a number of years, added to the fact that the Clergyman is all the time gradually coming to know each pupil well, and getting a personal influence, must be a great benefit to the Church. It is much to be wished, therefore, that the Church could extend her work in this direction, and could, in some cases at least, make larger grants, so as to strengthen the influence of the Clergyman in school matters.

The same teachers we had last year are still in charge of the schools, viz. : Miss Wood at the Model School, and Miss McGie at Barachois, and I sincerely thank them both for the helpful way in which they have co-operated with me, in the work to which I have alluded.

I am glad to be able to report an increase in the amount collected here for the Church Society, and to again call the attention of our people to the fact that, notwithstanding this, and an increase of assessment by the Diocesan Board, (which has been promptly paid), our Sunday collections have also increased, the total (not counting special collections) being \$116.90, as against \$109.11 last year.

The amounts collected by Missionary cards were: Miss Minnie Harbour, \$11.30, and Miss Lizzie Thompson, \$7.00. I think, however, that we could still do better for outside objects, and without detriment to ourselves.

The people here, as usual, have all been kind to myself and family, and in many material ways helpful. In particular, I have to thank them for getting out our year's firewood, and supplying us liberally with fish and vegetables; also, on behalf of Mrs. Harding, to specially thank the young men of the Parish, who, on Christmas Day, gave her a handsome china cup, which is highly prized on account of the good-will of which it is a token.

SCOTSTOWN AND LAKE MEGANTIC.

The Rev. H. A. Brooke reports :—

On looking over the past year's work in this Mission, we have much to be thankful for to Almighty God, for having so abundantly blessed our labours. A little over two years ago I came to this Mission, and during this time we have provided ourselves with a Parsonage, and have built a new Church at Lingwick; sixty-six children and adults have been baptized, and thirty-two persons confirmed. These are merely the outward signs, from which, to a certain degree, the spiritual growth may be gathered.

Scotstown.—Things have gone on much the same here as last year; but if anything our congregations are larger, owing to the fact that the Presbyterians have no minister, and many of their people come to us. The Assessments have been punctually paid. Service is held here once every Sunday, also a Sunday School; at the latter, the attendance is increasing rapidly, having now the names of about thirty-five children on the list.

Lingwick.—In my last year's report, I ventured to express the hope, that during the next year we should have a new Church in Lingwick; now, I am happy to say, it is an accomplished fact. We have a beautiful little Church, forty feet by twenty, with a seating capacity of one hundred and twenty-five, all furnished and paid for at a cost of about \$950.00. The people, though few in number, worked hard, and with the generous assistance of Church people outside the Mission, especially those in Quebec, we are enabled to present our Church to the Bishop for Consecration on the 13th of December.

In former years there was always a Union Sunday School existing in this place; but, owing to causes too numerous to mention, it was not at all satisfactory to any party. A delegation waited on me in September last, principally composed of Presbyterians, and asked me to start a Church of England Sunday School, which I did, and the result is that with few exceptions we have all the children attending our school, and thus brought under distinctive Church teaching.

Canterbury.—Services are still being held every Sunday afternoon in the old School-house; but the people have at last made up their minds that they must have a Church, and already upwards of \$500.00 have been promised in the

place: so by this time next year I trust I may be able to refer to it as an accomplished fact. Mr. Ebenezer Sharman, our old Church-Warden, has given a very nice site, one hundred feet square, on which to build the Church.

Agnes.—I have now assisting me at Lake Megantic Mr. H. M. Lake, B.A., Cambridge, and a very able assistant he has proved himself to be. On Sunday, December 8th, I exchanged with him in order to administer the Holy Communion at Agnes; the Church was full at both Services, and in the afternoon again the Church was crowded to witness ten children being brought into the Fold of Christ's Church through the waters of Holy Baptism. The people are very anxious to have a resident Clergyman, and the day is evidently not far distant, when it will be absolutely necessary to set Lake Megantic off as a separate Mission. During the past year the Church has been neatly fenced about, the funds being supplied by the Ladies' Guild, who are doing excellent work. The Hon. Alex Gunn, of Kingston, has also presented our Church with half an acre of land situated close to the village of Agnes, to be used as a Cemetery. This will be the first Protestant Cemetery near Megantic.

I feel most grateful for the able assistance which has been rendered by the Ladies' Guild, the Choirs and Sunday School Teachers, and last, but not least, the Church-Wardens, who all have displayed much energy and zeal in furthering the interests of our Church; we must one and all however remember that whatever success is achieved it is for God's glory, and not for man's praise.

SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Canon Thorneloe reports:—

The Services in this Parish continue very much as in former years, viz.: in St. Peter's, Holy Communion every

Sunday and Holy Day; on Christmas Day two, and on Easter Day three celebrations; Morning and Evening Prayer daily throughout the year, and the usual special Services during Lent; in the Church of the Advent Holy Communion twice each month and on the chief Holy Days; Morning and Evening Prayer every Sunday, and Evening Prayer every Thursday. In addition to these Services at the two Churches, we have now regularly established fortnightly Services in three Out-missions. There is no great change in the character of our Services. The music during the past year has been very good. Our practice in St. Peter's now is to sing "Anthems" and "Services" on alternate Sundays—one Sunday an Anthem with plain chants, the next Sunday a Set Service with Hymns. We always sing the Psalms on Sunday evening. Once a month we have music at the Celebration of Holy Communion. At St. Peter's the record of attendance shows a slight increase over last year. We still however, in common perhaps with most other Parishes, have room to hope for better things in this direction.

The Clergy have made efforts to bring out the children in larger numbers both to Sunday School and Church. So far their efforts have had but partial success. The Sunday Schools certainly have improved. We have now on the roll at St. Peter's some 245 children, and at the Church of the Advent, 46. At the latter Church, on the suggestion of Mr. Wright, the Sunday School has of late been held immediately before the afternoon Service, so that the children may go, with a few minutes' break, from School to Church. The plan has been attended with good results. The children are brought to the front seats in the Church—which is free-seat—and once a fortnight are catechised after the 2nd Lesson. It is understood that any children who find it necessary may leave Church before the Sermon.

With the two chief centres of work in the city and the three Out-missions already alluded to, there is abundant work in the Parish for three men instead of two. Our hope and ambition are to find ways and means, in the comparatively near future, to make East Sherbrooke and the Out-missions a quasi-independent charge, and to secure a Curate, more especially for the work at St. Peter's.

Several of our Parochial agencies have felt the quickening influence of the Lay Helpers' Conference, which took place, as in former years, on St. Luke's Day. The Guild of St.

Peter's, the Sunday School, the Visiting Society and the Girls' Friendly may be mentioned as having been so benefited. A Branch of the Lay Helpers' Association now exists in the Parish, and the future conferences of workers will be held under the auspices of this Association. A careful count, for the whole Parish, showed one hundred and twenty-one persons, thirty-six males and eighty-five females, regularly employed in Church work of some kind, no one being counted twice.

The Parish had the great pleasure and benefit of a visit from the Bishop on the 20th May, when His Lordship confirmed thirty-one persons, eleven males and twenty females, in St. Peter's. The Bishop also gave Sherbrooke the great privilege of having in St. Peter's Church, the Ordination of the Rev. John N. Hunter, B.A., formerly Curate of this Parish, who, on the 29th September—S. Michael and All Angels—was advanced to the Priesthood.

Lent was a time of true spiritual refreshing. The Services were well attended. In Holy Week the daily Evening Prayer with address at 7.30 was continued and seemed to be appreciated. On Good Friday the Three Hours Service of Commemoration of Our Blessed Lord's sufferings on the Cross was held, as in the previous year, with marked success as to attendance and interest. The Choir in the evening of Good Friday rendered in a very effective manner "Stainer's Crucifixion."

At St. Peter's the Rector has started a Day School for girls on Church lines. The school is held in the Church Hall, and is opened daily by one of the Clergy with a short form of service. Religious instruction occupies the first half hour each morning, and is given twice a week by the Rector himself. There are now seventeen pupils.

A small amount—\$110—has been gathered to form the nucleus of an Endowment Fund for this Church. In the coming year we hope to add to it.

The "New Church Building Committee," appointed by the Vestry to further the project of a new St. Peter's Church, is still at work. The scheme covering ten years and providing for periodical payments is being quietly presented to our people. The times are hard and no undue pressure is being put upon any one. So far subscriptions, amounting in the aggregate to about \$11,000, have been secured, of which amount some \$6,000 have been paid.

At the Church of the Advent a kind friend has provided

electric light in memory of his mother, a faithful member of the congregation, called to her rest during the year.

A very pretty Altar rail with standards of brass, designed by Mr. A. T. Winter, one of the Wardens, has been recently erected in this Church. The money for this rail was raised by the efforts of Mrs. Johnston, Mrs. Rawlins and others.

Through the exertions of the Ladies' Guild, work has been begun upon the Vestry and Guild Room, which, when finished, will be of great use both to Clergy and people.

The Parish has suffered very seriously during the year by death and removals.

The Rev. H. E. Wright, M.A., continues to fill acceptably the position of Curate. He lives in the Gibbs Home, East Sherbrooke, of which he is taking temporary charge.

The Rector and Parish are indebted, and are duly grateful to various Clergymen who, during the year, have kindly assisted in the work of the Parish.

The Rector begs also to express his sense of indebtedness to the various officers of the Parish and to the many lay workers for their kind and efficient co-operation in many good works.

The Rev. H. E. Wright reports:—

There are now, in the Parish of Sherbrooke, four centres of missionary work—East Sherbrooke, Brompton Line Mission, Magog River Mission, and the Page School-house.

East Sherbrooke.—The work here has been continued on the same plan as in former years. Morning Service at 10.30, Sunday School at 3.15, Evensong at 4 p.m., and Holy Communion the second Sunday in each month at 8 a.m. We have lost, through death, one zealous and indefatigable

worker, and also three families by removal to other places. On the other hand, five Church families have come to make their home with us. The Ladies' Guild, though not numbering many members, did much good work during the past year, and have aided very materially in contributing our share in support of regular Church work. Beyond this, the Guild has been working and steadily accumulating a fund to build a Guild Room and Vestry between the Church and School Hall. There are in all about fifty families in East Sherbrooke who look to the Church for its ministrations, and who more or less support it.

Magog River Mission.—Here, too, the work of the Church has been carried on regularly as in the past. There is a fortnightly afternoon Service with an average attendance of thirty-two. The Services are hearty, and well liked by the people, and with a little more time many young people might be prepared for Confirmation and made lasting members of the Church of Christ. I have started a Sunday School here. We have twelve children who attend regularly, and as school is fortnightly the children always prepare two lessons. They are under the tuition of Mr. Crawford and Miss Mills, who have done excellent work. It is a pleasure to catechise them (as I regularly do), and hear the bright, ringing answers which come instantly in response to the question. We have here about twenty families who attend our Services.

Page School-house Mission.—This is a new centre of work which has been opened up during the past year. It is situated about nine miles from Sherbrooke on the road leading to Brompton Lake. We have here about twelve families, the majority of whom are Church people, and all the others attend our Services, including one French family, who declare their intention of joining us, and have asked for Prayer Books in their own language. Beside these there are twenty to thirty men employed in the Lovell mills, a couple of miles beyond the school-house. A considerable part of these are English. I held my first Service there on the 17th February with an attendance of forty-four, more than thirty being men. Since then Services have been continued regularly every fortnight on the same Sunday that I go to Magog, and the average attendance has been about thirty-three, and I expect more to attend during the Winter when the lumbermen are working in the woods. I hope soon to open a Sun-

day School here as at Magog, and there are several young people who are eligible for Confirmation.

Mr. J. A. Wilson has given us much assistance in continuing these Services during the Summer months, and his assistance has been much appreciated.

The Mission at Brompton School-house, about four miles distant, has been continued during the year, as in former years, once a fortnight, the average attendance being about thirty-five.

We have in all then about fifty square miles to cover in this missionary work; about one hundred families to whom we minister, and two Sunday Schools in operation. These figures are larger than many Missions now under the Diocesan Board, and more than sufficient to employ the full time and energy of one Clergyman.

I would like to impress upon the Church people of Sherbrooke the importance of continuing and even extending this work. The city is the centre of attraction to the people of the surrounding country, and the Church will be either much weakened or strengthened in the future according as we neglect or fulfil our duty to these our brethren now.

SHIGAWAKE.

The Rev. R. J. Fothergill reports :—

The work during the past year has been uneventful. During the Winter we had a succession of stormy Sundays, which seriously affected the congregations, especially at Port Daniel, where most of the people live at a distance from the Church. Nevertheless, the Services have been maintained with few interruptions. The Holy Eucharist has been celebrated forty-seven times, and the other Services held as in past years.

The Bishop made his annual visit to the Mission in July last, accompanied by Mrs. Dunn. This year His Lordship was able to spend a Sunday in Shigawake and Port Daniel, which was greatly appreciated by the people. Confirmation Services were held in Shigawake and Port Daniel; but the great event of the visit was the Consecration of St. Peter's Church and Burying-ground at Newport Point.

Three Sunday Schools are now at work in the Mission: at Shigawake, the No. 2 School-house, Port Daniel, and one lately started at Anse aux Gascons.

At Shigawake a treat was held on the Parsonage grounds in August ; and on Christmas eve the teachers provided a Christmas Tree, together with a very enjoyable Entertainment by the Sunday School Scholars.

In November last a Sale of Work was held by the Shigawake Guild, followed by a very successful Concert. The ladies, I am very glad to say, after voting \$10.00 towards the payment of insurance on the Church and Parsonage, have set apart the money realized towards the completion of the interior of the Parish Hall. Already a double floor has been laid, and the work has been given out for the ceiling of the Hall.

We were again glad to welcome the Archdeacon last Summer ; and Anse aux Gascons greatly benefited by the more frequent Services held during his visit. The Archdeacon also held a Service and preached at Shigawake.

STANSTEAD AND BEEBE PLAIN.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe reports:—

The work of the Church in this parish has gone on quietly and yet we may believe surely during the past year.

At Christ Church, Stanstead Plain, the usual routine of Church life has been carried out. Matins and Evensong have been said and the Holy Communion celebrated nearly every Sunday. There have also been frequent week-day Services, including daily Matins during the summer months, and Evensong every Wednesday. The various Fasts and Festivals have been observed, with special Services during Lent and Holy Week. A class of eight Candidates were

confirmed by the Bishop last December. The Sunday congregations shew a slight increase, especially in the evening. Special thanks are due to the Organists and members of the Choir for the pains and trouble taken in the preparation and rendering of the Church music, which has maintained a high level of efficiency during the past year. Our gratitude is also due to Mr. A. Dorey, for help so kindly given on several occasions. The Woman's Auxiliary has carried on its useful work of clothing an Indian child. The Ladies' Guild has been reorganized to help in the work of the Church. This congregation is, for the present year, entirely self-supporting, having agreed to raise the amount formerly subscribed by all Saints' Church towards the Rector's stipend, thus setting that amount free to be applied towards a resident Clergyman for that Church. We hope this may be continued, although taxing to the utmost the resources of a small congregation. The Library of the Sunday School has been increased through means of money raised by the Children's Sewing Guild and by a generous gift of books from S. James' Church, Morrisburg. I cannot help expressing my thankfulness for the cordial relations existing between myself and the parishioners, evinced by the fact that the Easter Offering this last year was the largest recorded in the history of the Parish, and by the presentation of a ticket for a trip to and from England, when I signified my wish to take a holiday in the old country.

We were favored with a visit from Bishop Hall, of Vermont, during the past Summer, who preached in both our Churches.

All Saints' Church, Beebe Plain.—The congregation attached to this Church has, through the kindness of the Bishop, had, during this year, the privilege of a resident Clergyman. The Bishop promised if the congregation would agree to raise half the amount required for a Clergyman's stipend, to guarantee the other half. This the Vestry agreed to for one year, as an act of faith. Rev. H. S. Harte, who had been labouring in the Parish for several months as Lay Reader, was ordained to the Diaconate on S. Barnabas Day, at a Service so dignified and impressive as to leave a permanent impression upon the minds of the large Congregation present. Mr. Harte, although working in co-operation with the Rector in the work of the united Parish, has been virtually in charge of this Church. Efficient

work has been done. In addition to Matins and Evensong every Sunday, and monthly Celebration, Service has been held every Wednesday evening, as well as special Services during Lent and the Chief Festivals. Daily Services were held during Holy Week. A special Service was held on All Saints' Day, the anniversary of the consecration of the Church. A class of seven Candidates was confirmed by the Bishop last December. A Guild, under the name of the "Guild of the Holy Childhood," has been organized and has done good work in raising money for Church purposes.

The Library has had an addition made to it of a large number of volumes, chiefly through the exertions of the members of the Guild, and the Sunday School greatly improved in efficiency. A new furnace has been put into the Church and several improvements made in the fabric. The experiment of having a resident Clergyman in Beebe Plain, has certainly proved a success; although marks of success and progress must, from the peculiar circumstances of the country, be slow. It is earnestly to be hoped that the depression in the business concerns of the village will not make the members of this congregation unable to raise the required amount.

Service has been held on Tuesday evenings in alternate weeks, in the Moulton neighbourhood and Judd's Mills School-room, with fair average congregations. The congregation of the latter place has made an offering in token of appreciation of the Services.

The Services at Libbey's Mills have, owing to peculiar local circumstances, been discontinued for the present.

Service has been held in Marlow School-house every alternate Sunday afternoon, and the congregations have been good during the whole year. The outlook for the Church's future in this district is very hopeful. The congregation here has made an offering, as a token of appreciation of the Services, which has been given to the General Fund of All Saints' Church.

By the work of the two Clergy of this Parish the ground is well covered; and the various families within its borders, whether composed of Church people or belonging to no religious body, can be visited with regularity, and thus the Church's Missionary work can be more effectually carried on amongst those sheep for whom the Shepherd lived and died.

There is little to record this year concerning the Mission, that is of general interest.

VALCARTIER.

The Rev. Dr. Riopel reports :—

In spite of some changes and certain efforts, both within and without the Church, to interfere with our work, we have made more than usual progress in our spiritual relationships. The Services are well attended, the worship is remarkably devout, and the number and frequency of Communicants increased. In no other year have I received so many marks of good-will and kindness. WATERVILLE.

The Rev. Ernest A. Willoughby King reports :—

Sunday Services always three, often four, also on Chief Festivals and as a rule on Friday evening in Waterville. Holy Communion monthly at each station and oftener in Summer at North Hatley. For numbers see tabulated statement, near end of report. Parishioners, almost all of small means, have made contributions to all funds of the Church Society, and to other usual objects. The aggregate for all purposes is \$1,287.35, being \$46 more than last year's total, and showing an increase in three years of about \$550. The rental of a house as Parsonage is collected mainly through the Guilds, and chiefly in Waterville. Numerous removals have taken place. Amongst these Mr. and Miss Parkin, Mr. and Mrs. A. True, Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Somerville, who were all willing and faithful church workers. Mrs. True and Mrs. Somerville were devoted officers of the Guild. Mr. and Mrs. Edw. Springs and family, for many years warm supporters of the Church at Waterville, have gone to North Hatley, where their help and influence in the Choir and Sunday School are already of great value. Misses Ethel and Lucy Moy, president and treasurer of the Guild at North Hatley, will be absent for the whole Winter. Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Cull and family are much missed. Mr. Cull, of honourable name, has been for many years a warden. From Eustis have gone Mr. Vance, Mr. D. Little, Mrs. Bean and others. But, as if providentially to fill some of these vacancies, we now have amongst us Rev. T. L. Ball, M.A., and Mrs. Ball, Mrs. W. H. Ball and daughters, W. H. Wiggett, J. C. Grant and their families, also Mrs. Riddell and her daughter's family.

Schools are visited and classes taught. For Church Society \$55, and for other Diocesan objects \$75, is not a bad showing for a poor Mission having many special local claims.

Sunday School maintained at head-quarters, Classes of instruction begun at Eustis and North Hatley. The annual Festival on the Queen's Birth Day was very successfully observed. The Jubilee of the Church of St. John the Evangelist at Waterville was made memorable by the presence, help and encouragement of the Lord Bishop, and many of the Clergy and laity from neighbouring Parishes. The objects very naturally suggested for special support, as thankful memorials of a half century's mercies, are the repairing of the good old Church and the building of a Parsonage. The Lord Bishop, Rev T. L. Ball, Wm. Wiggett, senior, W. H. Wiggett and Adelbert Gale are generous contributors to these objects. Further aid is greatly needed.

North Hatley.—The Rt. Rev. Dr. Paret, Lord Bishop of Maryland, spent about two months at North Hatley, and although needing all possible rest, yet he most kindly preached and assisted in the Services on several Sundays. His ministrations will long be remembered with profitable pleasure. As heretofore the Summer visitors rendered liberal and hearty assistance to the local Guild in raising funds for Church purposes, and largely through the encouragement of the envelope system.

Mrs. Daves, of Baltimore, has borne the entire expense of placing a fine-toned new bell in the tower of the Church of St. Barnabas, having had the names and date cast in the metal. Miss Daves most thoughtfully had the Vestry litted with receptacles for vestments, &c. The whole family indeed are warm and constant supporters of all good works.

Rev. T. S. Chapman, M.A., brought all the way from Dudswell and placed in the Church a beautiful Lectern of his own design and skilful workmanship, and recalled a visit to that picturesque spot some fifty years before, when he was a student of Bishop's College.

We hope ere long to claim the grants to be made in connection with the *completion* of this Church.

Eustis.—Rev. J. Prout was Deacon-Assistant for about two months, with head-quarters at Eustis. From the good hearted people of this locality, he received tokens of the appreciation in which his services were held. Ten dollars have been contributed towards the new Altar Vessels. Be-

fore they left Waterville in the Spring, Mr. George and Miss Tilly Parkin presented a beautiful set of Altar-Linen, exquisitely embroidered, to the congregation at Eustis, as a memorial of their revered father, who ended a long laborious missionary life in this Parish. This gift, very valuable in itself, is all the more so in its connection with the prospect of a much needed new Church in Eustis. The afternoon service on Sundays in the Bullard School-house continues to lessen the average attendance and revenues at Waterville and Eustis. The missionary and his wife are always generously remembered in the bestowal of valuable gifts and attentions by the kind people of Eustis and Capelton. It is a matter of very deep regret that much of the usual mining work is to be suspended here for an indefinite time, but not for long, let us hope.

WAY'S MILLS AND BARNSTON.

The Rev. A. E. Whatham reports:—

I have not much of a report to tabulate, but what I have is, I think, exceedingly encouraging.

The work now seems most hopeful in comparison with my estimation of it shortly after I had taken up my residence here. This is indeed "a Church Mission," since in a locality manifesting very little desire for the Gospel, the Church has the least number of the few who desire to hear it. On all sides we are surrounded by queer "isms." Holy Rollers, Herald Advents, Seventh-day Advents, Ordinary Advents, Universalists, besides the ordinary Protestant denominations, Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, it is truly frightful to find the handful of religious people here split into so many different bodies. In spite of this the Services at Way's Mills have been well attended, and the interest in the Church is growing steadily, though of course it will take years of hard labour to establish anything like loyal and deep-seated feelings of love towards her. Upon my arrival I commenced with a weekly Sunday morning

Service at Way's Mills, and a weekly evening Service at Barnston, with a monthly Communion at both places. This order I still follow, but I have added to it an alternate Sunday evening Service at Libbytown, with the intervening Service (evening) at Way's Mills; while I now hold a Wednesday fortnightly lecture (evening) at Way's Mills, and a Friday fortnightly Service at Kingscroft. All these are well attended, and bid fair to grow. The one exception, however, is Barnston, which continues its small congregation, ranging from six to twenty. The most satisfactory work is the new Sunday School I have started at Libbytown. This is the most vital feature of the Mission. For several years, as I have been informed, this Mission has had no Sunday School. I have, by God's grace, been enabled to evoke a great enthusiasm over the new Sunday School, and as there are hosts of children at Libbytown, I look forward with great hope to the laying of a foundation of love for and interest in the Church, which is not here at present except in a few isolated instances. With regard to my Parish visiting, an important feature in the building up of the Mission, I may say that it is gratifying to experience so much pleasure on the part of all at my visits. I am constantly asked by others as well as my own people, to call and have dinner with them, &c., which I do not fail to do. Touching the financial aspect, we have collected at Way's Mills by open collections, subscriptions and envelopes, \$49.52, and at Barnston \$17.54. Besides this, Way's Mills and Barnston have sent to the Church Society, direct through the Bishop, \$13.10 (I think this is correct). This does not include what both Guilds have raised for Parsonage and Church repairs, insurance, &c. I have not given these amounts, as the "Guild money" is a semi-private method which may fluctuate in its success, and is not to be reckoned a permanent system for raising Church funds, though while it lasts it is very useful. I may say, however, that our Guild at Way's Mills is on a better footing than ever, and better attended, and is raising more money than formerly. We have had no Marriages or Burials, and but one Baptism. I have six actual candidates for Confirmation, and three possible ones.

Next year I hope to send in a still better report than this, though I thank God devoutly for His blessings so far; which are indeed more than I had dared to hope in the beginning.

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

The Venerable Archdeacon Roe reports:—

The regular course of Religious Services outlined in last year's Report, has been carried out during the year now closing with satisfactory results. These Services are three every Sunday, together with two Sunday Schools; two Services on all the other Holy Days; the Holy Eucharist celebrated on every alternate Sunday and on all other Festivals, and week-day Services on Wednesday and Friday evenings with courses of lectures. These Services form the main feature of the spiritual husbandry, from which we look to reap fruit in due time to the glory of God. I hope we are growing to appreciate the Services of the Church as having their value in themselves, apart from whatever comfort or enjoyment they may bring to us as acts of worship paid to Almighty God. Until we get back to this foundation principle, it seems to me we need not look for much new progress.

The attendance on all the Services has improved. The finances of the Church also are gradually growing into a more healthy condition.

On the eve of St. John the Baptist's Day, the Lord Bishop visited the Mission, when twelve Candidates were presented to him for Confirmation, seven in Windsor and five in Brompton. Of these twelve, all the five in Brompton and two of the seven in Windsor, were adults, married persons, and were all persons from whom we have every reason to expect such fruits of good living as may bring strength to the Church and glory of God. On the Saturday before the Confirmation, the Bishop gave an address of deep interest in St. George's Church, Windsor, on the early planting of the Church in Britain and England. Altogether, the visit was a time of refreshing to us all and a strengthening of the hands of all Church workers.

BISHOP-WILLIAMS MEMORIAL MISSION FUND.

The three years over which subscriptions in behalf of this Fund were, in most cases, made to extend, expired in 1895. The hearty and liberal way in which the Diocese at large has responded to this appeal, evidences, in a striking manner, the deep reverence in which the memory of our late dear Bishop is universally held. The Summary at the end of the Report will show what has been done. It was but to be expected that in the course of three years, death, removals, and unforeseen reversal of circumstances, might, in some cases, interfere with well-meant promises. Yet, out of fifty parishes, thirty have already fulfilled their obligations *completely*, and fifteen others are, each, within a few dollars of this end ; while the whole balance yet due, on account of subscription, amounts to \$1,223.15. With a little extra time this, doubtless, will be forthcoming. When it is borne in mind that this work has gone on side by side with the Church's ordinary work, and with Church-extension, and in the majority of Missions with special demands of a local nature, the Church has indeed good reason to be devoutly grateful to God for His Holy Spirit's promptings, and thankful to her children for their faithful and generous response to the same. The name by which the Fund is designated implies at least a two-fold object. The offering cannot fail to bring a two-fold blessing.

\$100.00 towards the education of Adelaide Willemar, and

\$150.00 towards salary of our Lady Missionary to Japan.

Money has been sent in varying sums to Algoma, Athabaska, Calgary, Mackenzie River, Moosonie, Qu'Appelle, Rupert's Land, Saskatchewan and Selkirk.

A Life Membership of the Provincial Board was presented, through the Diocesan Branch, to Miss Montizambert, who was for many years the most able and energetic Secretary of this Branch.

The Provincial Board of Management met in Quebec in October 1894, and on the evening of the 11th instant, the members of the Quebec Branch had the pleasure of hearing most helpful and interesting addresses from some prominent members of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and the Woman's Auxiliary.

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT, ASSOCIATION OF CHURCH HELPERS,
JANUARY, 1896.

Once more we are called upon to render an account of what our Association has done during the past year, and we now beg to submit to you our fifth annual report.

Our Committee meetings have been held regularly every month, with the exception of July and August. There have been also two general meetings in May and October. Our membership for the last year is 186, 68 of whom hold mite-boxes.

The work of collecting for the Church Society in the city and neighborhood was again undertaken by members of our Association. Previous to the lists being given out, a meeting of those who were willing to collect was called, which was addressed by His Lordship the Bishop of Quebec. He strongly urged the cause of all the different objects for which subscriptions are solicited, and gave much good advice to the collectors as to the best means of approaching Church people, and urging them to contribute. Circulars, prepared by His Lordship, were supplied to the collectors, to be left at the different houses, before the work of collecting was begun. The result of this year's collection is \$2,256.00.

Our annual sale was held on the 25th of September, and the proceeds amounted to \$247.49, including some small amounts, not yet paid in to the Treasurer.

In September a letter was received from His Lordship, the Bishop, asking the Association to give their assistance to raise \$60 to buy a boat for the use of the missionary at the Magdalen Islands. Several members of the Executive Committee undertook to collect something towards this sum, and in this way \$44.50 were raised. At a general meeting in October, \$10 were voted towards this object, making the total \$54.50.

Once more death has visited our ranks, and we deeply deplore the loss of two of our members, Miss Forsyth, a warm friend and willing Helper, and Mrs. Morgan, one of our Vice-Presidents, and representative of St. Peter's Church on our Executive Committee. Miss Montizambert, also a member of our Committee, sent in her resignation this autumn, on account of absence from town, and it was with much regret that it was accepted. Mrs. Elliott kindly consented to act in Mrs. Morgan's place until the annual meeting,—the other vacancy was not filled.

We desire to convey our grateful thanks to all kind friends who have furthered the work of the Association, and we also wish to acknowledge the kind co-operation of St. Matthew's Guild, in giving their needlework, free of charge. Donations of money, prayer-books, clothing, etc., have been received, and we have also had most grateful letters from all the clergy of the different missions, which we have been privileged to assist.

Article V.

OF THE CORPORATION.

"All members of the Church of England subscribing \$2 per annum shall be capable of being elected members of the Corporation; but no person shall enjoy any of the privileges of membership whose subscription is more than one year in arrear; and if it is in arrear more than two years, such person shall cease to be a member of the Corporation. A single subscription of \$50. from any member of the Church of England, renders such member eligible to Life Membership. For List of Life Members see page 171.




FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

I. *A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.*

I give and bequeath to "The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, the sum (or Shares of Stocks in the Bank of standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation and none other.

II. *A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures, for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.*

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Mission Fund.

Or,—Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund for endowing the Church in the Mission of (or at) held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society and the Incumbent and Church-Wardens of the Church in the said Mission (or at.....)

Or,—As the commencement of an endowment for the Church of St.....in the Mission of.....(or at :.) and to provide for the future maintenance of divine worship in conformity with the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday-Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of Churches according to the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage-houses,—the setting apart of burial-grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. *A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.*

I give and devise unto “the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec,” incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., (describe the real estate clearly) to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof *to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.*

IV. *A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.*

Same as in No. 3—only instead of the words in Italics insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

V. *A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.*

Same as in No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say:—upon the trusts to hold the same for ever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the place adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.
