



What Mayonnaise Is

VERYONE is aware that no set of terms in French or English is obscure as those connected with food. For generations men and chefs have argued about the word mayonnaise. Did it come from the French verb "manier" and refer to the movement required to produce it? Or is it named in honor of the

slege of Mahon as some writers insist? Have it whichever way you like-use its name as an adjective or noun; there is nothing in a name after all—but be sure not to be indifferent

Because its ingredients are simple and few is not a reason for thinking that anyone can make it. Epicures fate it as a high accomplishment to make it rightly, and always insist that you keep in mind the old Spanish proverb that says four persons are needed: a spendthrift for oil, a miser for vinegar, a counselor for salt and a madman to stir it.

A true mayonnaise is made with no ingredients but the yolk of eggs, oil, vinegar, salt, pepper and mustard. When anything else is added it is cessity of thoro mastication should be not mayonnaise, but a salad dressing, a sauce, or what you will. Lay out the named ingredients and beat the yolks of two eggs in deep bowl until they are smooth and free from big bubbles. Mix a salt-

spoon of pepper and two of salt together with a half a spoonful of best French mustard and add these to the beaten eggs. Some Answers to Anxious Queries.

PURPLE IRIS. We have at last come to the con-closion that the iris is a most diffiscult plant to kill. We have arrived at this conclusion from the manner in which our own supply will continue to educrease. Setting out our plants in the spring this year we decided to put in each root singly. So every clump was broken up. Each large fat bulb from the end of every "toe" (I do not know what else to cal. them), was cut off and planted in the row that was to be our "show row." Just for an experiment every single joint of the old root was cut off so that we had some fifty or more oblong bulb-like roots with no signs of a sprout anywhere to be seen (because the sprouted ends we had already disposed of you remember), and we placed everyone of these dead looking chunks about an inch deep in a very moist spot. This spot which our own supply will continue to deed looking chunks about an inch deep in a very moist spot. This spot was kept so wet as to be almost swampy in the hope that some green might show up. Well, you should see the great sturdy plants, some ready to send out buds, we feel sure by the look of them.

taking off all the choice ends, and then selecting the best and hardest of the unsprouted joints, there yet remained some doubtfur tooking pieces. We planted them. They sprouted weeks ago. Next year we know they will flower.

The only fair view is that this question must be settled by the women who ride; and we have noticed a distinct movement, not only in the United States and Canada, but in Great Britain also, toward women riding as men ride for reasons of convenience, of comfort, of safety. If this be so, no decree, royal or otherwise, can check the movement. It is the best way for young girls to learn to ride and it certainly is a convenient way for many grown-up women to ride, altho there are individual cases where the side saddle would be the proper thing! 





#### STOCK MARKET TAKES REST CURE

Holiday Dulness in Effect in Toronto Exchange—Speculation Almost Lacking.

#### UNDERTONE IS HEAVY

But Losses Are Small—Stocks Sag of Their Own Weight.

The Toronto stock exchange failed to develop any enthusiasm yesterday, the speculative movement being apathetic in the extreme. NEW YORK, June 27.—There were few occurrences during the progress of today's trading to distinguish the stock market from the narrow and professional affairs of the last few days. Stocks rose at the opening in a half-Stocks rose at the opening in a half-hearted way in response to higher prices in London and then slowly fell back. At the end of the session changes in the important issues were without significance. The volume of business fell off to the slight proportions of the dull period preceding the recent severe break. During the second hour of business only about 15,000 shares were traded in, the smallest amount for that period of any day of the year.

Room traders had the market to themselves must of the day. Outside buying, which under different conditions might be stimulated by the low level of prices, is held in check by the difficulty in obtaining funds except for short dates. Professional opinion again appeared to favor the short side of the market and stocks were offered on every rally, but beyond forcing back prices to around last night's close after the morning rise traders made little attempt to depress the list.

The distinguishing feature of the day's movements was the weakness of New York Central, which sold off 11-2 to 93 3-4. the lowest since 1908. Lacking definite explanation of the weakness of this stock traders spoke of possible new financing as a cause of the movement. Unconfirmed reports from Mexico City of a receivership for national railways of Mexico caused a drop of seven points in the first preferred and three in the second.

Known movements of currency during the week indicated that the banks had continued to pile up cash. A gain in cash for the week of \$6,000,000 or more was predicted.

Provisions finished unchanged to 12 1-2c decline.

Bullish figures on the Kansas crop were available before the opening and had a powerful effect from the start. It was estimated the yield in that state would not amount to more than 72,000,000 bushels, whereas speculators had been counting on about 90,000,000 bushels. Heavy selling checked the upturn, but the top prices of the day were current within fifteen minutes of the close. The late strength was influenced by assertions that rains northwest had failed to appear where most wanted in South Dakota. 
