

JANUARY SESSION.

Welland, Tuesday, January 22nd, 1884.

Owing to the very severe weather of the last few days a number of the Reeves and Deputy Reeves of the various municipalities composing the County of Welland, were unable to reach the Council Chamber as directed by the Municipal Act.

CHAPTER CCCCLXIX.

A BY-LAW for the Appointment of Board of Audit.

Whereas, in and by the Revised Statutes of Ontario, chapter sec. a Board of Audit is to be appointed for the purpose named therein, to be composed of the judge or junior acting judge of the county court and two other persons who shall be appointed annually for that purpose by the County Council of such County or union of Counties, at their first meeting in each year, not more than one of such persons being a member, for the time being of such Council.

Your Gaol Committee beg to submit this their first report:

That your committee have visited the different parts of the building, and find:

First. That the painting and repairs of the court room is rapidly progressing, and is nearly finished, to the satisfaction (so far) of your committee.

Second. That the contract for painting was let by the day, to Mr. Schumacher, at the rate of two dollars per day of 10 hours. The object of letting the contract by the day, was to utilize the prison labor for removing the old paint, etc.

Third.' That we found the Court House in a rather unsettled state, owing to the repairs going on in said building, it being impossible for the caretaker to do the necessary sweeping and dusting, on account of the painting which is in progress.

Fourth. That the room occupied by the Queen's Counsel is in need of a new carpet, and also that the table should be covered with oil cloth, and would recommend the covering of the same; and that the old carpet be removed, and the floor covered with oil cloth.

Firth. That the room used by the Judge, as a private examination room, should have the matting removed from the floor, and covered with oil cloth, and would respectfully recommend the same.

Sixth. That we have visited the gaol, and have found it very clean and neat, but considerably overcrowded with prisoners, and if the number of prisoners increase, it will be necessary to purchase a new stove for the upper story of the south wing of the gaol.

SPECIAL REPORT OF GAOL COMMITTEE FOR 1883, RE HEATING COUNTY BUILDINGS.

To the Warden and Councillors of the County of Welland, in Council Assembled:

Your Gaol Committee for 1883, to whom was referred the consideration of the advisability of heating the Court House and Gaol by either hot air, steam, or hot water, beg to submit this their report, after thoroughly investigating the different modes:

Messrs. Hooker and Ramsden, of your committee, visited Buffalo, and called at the St. Vincent Orphan Asylum, which is heated by hot water. The heat in this institution was very pleasant, and very uniform, but from inquiries made, the heating by hot water would not be practicable or advisable in a building such as the Court House and Gaol here. The system is only applicable when the heat is kept up all over the building, which would not be the case here, as, by this system, to shut off the heat in any particular room would endanger the pipes from frost.

Also, visited the Protestant Orphan Asylum. This institution is heated by steam, which also appeared to be a very pleasant heat. Also visited Dr. White's building, seven stories high, and extending from street to street, which is heated by steam; as also is the City Hall, Board of Trade and other places called at. The system of heating by steam seems to be much preferable to hot water or hot air. By steam, any room in the building can be heated or shut off at pleasure, which is a great consideration in the matter of expense. Hot air could also be shut off at pleasure, but from the experience of those with whom we consulted, the opinion was generally expressed that for a building the size of our Court House, or in fact any moderately large building, the steam would be preferable, as the heat is pleasanter, and can be more evenly distributed in a room than by the hot air system. In small buildings there does not seem to be as much objection to the hot air system.

Messrs. Gainer and Garner, of your committee, visited Toronto for the purpose of investigating the different systems of heating.

They called upon Messrs. Patterson & Son, who introduce the hot air system when required; also visited the Walker House, which is heated entirely by steam; also visited Messrs. Wright & Co.; also Keith & Co., and other places in the city, and upon their return stopped at St. Catharines, and called at the court house, which is heated by steam, put in by Keith & Co., costing \$3,325, which is very complete, and from the absence of stoves and their connections, gave the court house a very cleanly and comfortable appearance.

Your committee requested those with whom they consulted, and who would be likely to tender for the work, to measure the building and give their figures for doing the work, which has been done in three cases, and the lowest figures are very satisfactory. Your committee admit at once that the immediate cost to put in steam will appear large, but are satisfied that when it is done, and the necessity of keeping thirty or thirty-five stoves in one building going, with the accompanying danger of fire, removed, and the cause of complaint from cold and dirty rooms also removed, that your Council, the occupants of the Court House and the public generally, who have business in the building, will be highly pleased at the change.

Your committee made particular enquiry as to the amount of care that was necessary in managing the furnace, and was surprised with what little care and attention is devoted to them, and in one case, at the St. Vincent Orphan Asylum, in Buffalo, a lady attended to the whole heating apparatus.

Your committee would strongly recommend the introduction of steam in the County Buildings, if a change be made, as being, considering all things, the safest and most economical way of heating the Buildings.

Your committee would recommend the payment of Thos. Irwin & Son's account, amounting to \$8.00, as the gentlemen came nere at the Council's request at December session.

Your committee find that the expense of fuel thus far this season is upwards of \$725, and more will be required.

Your committee also are informed by practical men that 85 tons of coal would be sufficient to heat the building for a season; at a cost of, say, \$7.00 per ton, would be \$595, and if such be the case, there would be a saving of upwards of \$100 per year, besides relieving the buildings of the danger of fire from 35 stoves, and, as the building has been on fire eight or ten times in the last ten years, your committee are of the opinion that everything should be done that can reasonably be done to add to the security from fire, as in case of accident not only would there be loss to the County, but the chances are that some lives would be sacrificed.

I beg to call your attention to the fact that in January, 1881, I purchased from the Couniy of Welland the south halves of lots 27 and 28, in the 4th Con., Humberstone, amounting to 166 acres, more or less, and paid cash for the same, at the rate of six dollars (6) per acre, being the price put upon it by the County Valuators.

It has quite recently come to my knowledge that the north parts of the south halves of lots 29 and 30, in the 4th Con., Humberstone, adjoining my purchase, and higher land than mine, were sold by the County in March, 1881, for \$5.50 per acre, the value put upon it by the County Valuators.

I can only account for the difference in price by assuming that when the valuation of lots 29 and 30 was made, the opportunity for determining the value of the land was better than when lots 27 and 28 were valued, (the land then being covered with deep snow) and I have to request that you will be pleased to recommend to the County Council that a refund be made to me to the extent of fifty exats per acre, on 166 acres, which amounts to (83.00) eighty-three dollars.

Before adjournment of your Honorable Council last evening, I was present when the cleanliness of the County Buildings was under discussion, and as some remarks would apply to me, as your messenger, I beg to say a few words in reference to the matter.

Since my appointment, I have endeavored to keep everything as nearly correct as possible under the circumstances. I am aware that during the late jailor's incumbency, the remarks made by Mr. Fraser were applicable, but as the part of the building spoken of was then under the jailor's jurisdiction, I sincerely trust that your honorable body will not hold me responsible. I am not aware of any complaints being made lately. The duties of caretaker are divided between Mr. Botteril and myself. The reference to some particular rooms as being untidy, and yet these rooms not named, leaves me in doubt as to whether they belong to me or not. My portion of the buildings is at present torn up to a great extent, which causes certain rooms to appear uncleanly. I was in hopes when the heating was under discussion, you would favorably consider the matter this winter, which would have enabled us to have a general clean up, and by removing those unsightly wood and coal boxes, cord-wood, stoves and pipes, the appearance of the building would have been very much improved, and at June Session I would venture to say would be entirely satisfactory. After the work in hand, of painting, &c., is completed, I will endeavor to have all parts of the building, so far as I am responsible, put in proper shape, and hope there may no further cause of complaint.
