policy has been agreed upon by the cabinet and that it will be announced upon Mr. Borden's return from London. That policy must be submitted to and passed upon by parliament, and in time by the people who will pay the bills.

The people of Canada are quite willing to contribute generously to the upkeep of the imperial navy, and we believe that the majority of them moreover look forward to seeing vessels built with Canadian material by Canadian labor in Canadian shipyards, manned and officered by Canadians, ready to protect our coasts, harbors and rivers from invasion or attack.

But whatever may be the policy announced by the government, it must be a home-made policy. Canada is a British state, but she is sovereign within her sphere. Her government must take the entire responsibility in this matter. Nothing would so prejudice the government or its policy as the belief that instead of declaring a policy upon this subject, our ministers had adopted one handed out to them in London.
