### DESTRUCTION NEAR THE SOO

Many Farmers Have Lost Their Home Owing to Forest Fires—Passengers in a Train Faint From Heat.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Aug. 4 .-Much damage is being done by forest fires in this vicinity. Yesterday Gladys a station eight miles from here on the Soo Shore-road, was wiped out and its residents had to flee for their lives. Brimly was threatened with destruction, and may have been wiped out by this time. Scores of farmers have lost their homes and barely escaped with their lives. The regular South Shore passenger train was compelled to retuin, owing to the intense heat and smoke. Several of the passengers fainted before the train got out of the fire belt. No rain has fallen for weeks, and everything on the ground is as dry as tinder. Unless it rains soon there will be a vast amount of timber destroyed.







Local receipts were 247 cars winter wheat and 19 cars spring, but the grading was miserable. We think the market should cobetter. Northwestern receipts were 400 cars, against 109 cars a year ago.

Corn—Market was surprisingly strong toders. Stocks, Bonds and Debentures Bought and sold. Money to Loan. better. Northwestern receipts were 220 cars, against 199 cars a year ago.
