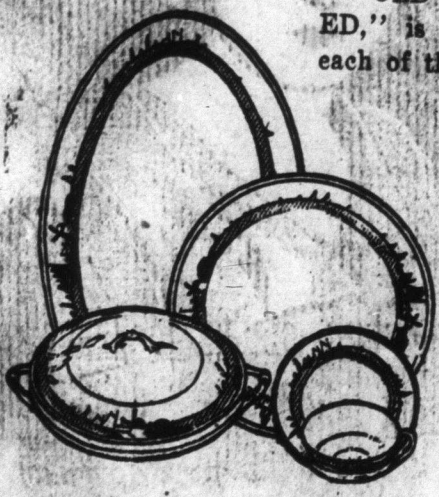

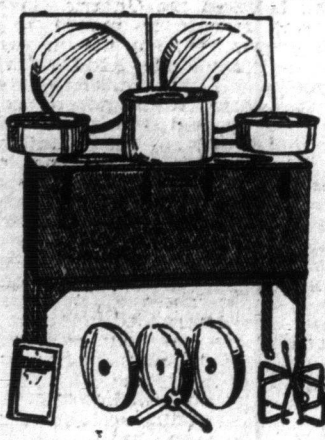

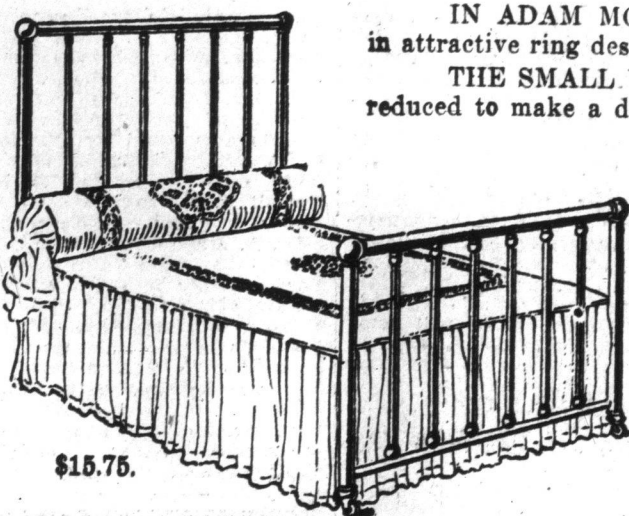

WEEK'S RECRUITING WAS SATISFACTORY

The Daily Average Higher Than for Some Time Past.

IS DEAD OF INJURIES

Pte. James Henderson Succumbs to Self-Inflicted Wounds.

Recruiting has maintained a higher daily average this week than for many weeks past. Even considering that Monday was a holiday the average for the first five days of the week is higher than usual, and this is an encouraging fact both to recruiting officers and commanding officers of battalions. It is also an indication that recruiting is not as dead as some would represent it, and when Monday is over a partial return of the spring's activity may be confidently looked for. Yesterday out of 40 who were examined by the doctor 27 were declared to be medically fit and were attached to the 28th Forestry Battalion. The 28th Forestry Battalion is still retaining its remarkable ability to secure recruits, eight joining yesterday. The other units gaining as follows: 20th Battery, 1; 21st, 1; 27th Battery, 2; 69th Battery, 4; and the C.A.S.C., 2.

Only Six Men Needed.

Capt. Joe Lawson of the 20th Battalion has about completed his work

of recruiting for his battalion, as that unit now has a strength of 1144 men, and when 1150 have been obtained the captain will cease recruiting. He is confident that before Monday he will have secured six men shall have been obtained and he will then be at liberty to devote his time to other duties.

Two meetings will be held at 2.30 on Sunday afternoon, one at the College street entrance of High Park and the other at Riverside Park. Capt. Lawson will speak at each meeting and other addresses will be delivered by returned soldiers. No difficulty is expected in getting the battalion up to full strength within the next two or three days.

Serbian Applies to Enlist.

An applicant for admission to the ranks of the 20th Irish-Canadian Battalion yesterday was a Serbian boy, 17 years of age. He has been in this country four months and prior to that had been on active service in Serbia. He carries the scars of three bullet wounds on his right leg and it was as a result of these wounds that he was taken to this country by some charitable individual.

He is anxious to get back to fight. His death comes as a result of being under age and also he is a citizen of an alien country. His mother is dead and he is a orphan.

Pte. Henderson Dead.

The death occurred at the base hospital yesterday of Pte. James Henderson, a member of the 20th Buff. Enriched by being brought to the hospital at Camp Bordeau on Thursday suffering from self-inflicted wounds in the throat. His death comes as a result of the loss of blood and shock sustained.

He was born in Toronto 23 years ago and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Henderson, 31 Shaw street. He had not been well for some time and had spent several weeks in the Exhibition Camp Hospital. He often complained of his head and early Wednesday morning he went to the woods at the rear of the camp and was later found with his throat cut in

two places. His condition was so serious that no hope was entertained for his recovery.

Commander F. S. Armstrong, R.N. V.R., states that recruiting for the Royal Navy Auxiliary Patrol has been completed in Canada, and the lists are now closed, with the exception of a few cases in British Columbia which will be dealt with next week.

Qualified as Aviator.

The latest graduate from the Curtiss Aviator School at Long Branch is Flight Lieut. J. H. Loft, who has made a record of having spent less time in the air than any other graduate of this school. Two new instructors are expected, and when these have been put into use 20 students who are on the waiting list will begin to train. This school has been particularly fortunate in the matter of accidents, only two slight falls having been experienced since June, 1915.

All classes and kinds of men today make up the local unit of the 28th Forestry Battalion, the latest interesting character of these being H. Mitchell, a late soldier in the National Guard. Mitchell was returned from the Mexican border recently, and with the use for further adventure in the North West Territories, he came to Canada and joined the Foresters. Lieut. H. S. Price, in charge of the local unit, last week opened a depot at Hamilton, from which good results are being obtained, particularly among the Russians and kindred foreign population.

ITALIANS CAPTURE DOBERDO PLATEAU

Ally Occupies Rubbia and San Martino del Carso.

REACH VALLONE LINE

Austrians Beat Retreat to East of Town of Vallone.

A squadron of Voisin machines yesterday renewed the bombardment of the Prevacina railway station, where material from last positions was being removed. The aviators eluded the fire of aircraft artillery and returned safely after dropping 40 bombs in the station which was completely destroyed."

EIGHT AIR RAID VICTIMS

LONDON, Aug. 11.—The deaths resulting from Wednesday's zeppelin raid now total eight, the war office announced today. The damage is now officially said to be greater than was first reported.

CANADIAN PATROLS IN LIVELY CLASHES

Number of Close Range Encounters With Germans in Past Week.

WEATHER HAS CLEARED

Artillery Carries on Systematic Firing With Excellent Results.

CANADIAN FIELD HEADQUARTERS, Aug. 10, via London, Aug. 11.

During the past week the weather was particularly fine. Good progress was made in the improvement and consolidation of our defenses.

Numerous enemy working parties were dispersed by our field and machine guns. Indirect fire by our machine guns was also constantly employed upon points in rear of the German position.

An aerial scout took place over the lines. The British plane drove the German to the ground behind the German trenches, following it down to within 400 feet of the ground.

Several patrol enterprises were carried out by our battalions. A patrol of a Winnipeg battalion under Lieut. Power encountered two Germans about 20 yards in front of our wire and opened fire upon them.

A party of one sergeant and three men of a Montreal battalion while on patrol duty discovered a large crater, which they proceeded to examine. Having entered the crater they were suddenly attacked by two Germans.

Dashing forward, our men entered the German trench. Lieut. Scott, Sgt. Mackie and Pte. Burrell were the first to climb over the enemy's parapet.

Not a Man Lost. In the meantime another party of three men under Sgt. Scott had entered the trench and bombed their way down it.

Under cover of darkness a patrol of a New Brunswick battalion under Capt. Russell and Lieut. Carling approached the German trenches.

QUESTION USE OF FUMIGATING FLUID

At Inquest Into Death of John English Last Night.

HE WAS ASPHYXIATED

Died From Inhaling Chemical Fumes Used for Exterminating Vermin.

Whether the use of such a dangerous chemical to exterminate vermin constitutes a violation of the law is the question which Acting Crown-Attorney Snyder is seeking to have answered during the inquiry into the cause which led to the death of John English.

The inquest was opened last night at the morgue by Coroner D. R. R. Hopkins, and after the testimony of four witnesses and after the death was pronounced on Monday night for further hearing.

The characteristics of the chemical cyanide of potassium and sulphuric acid, which it forms such a deadly poison, according to the witnesses, had all precautions must be taken to keep persons from inhaling the fumes.

The testimony was corroborated in the main by the employer but Mr. Webb's and the testimony given by Mrs. English. She said that she received a telegram that morning which read that "something serious had happened at a place in another town."

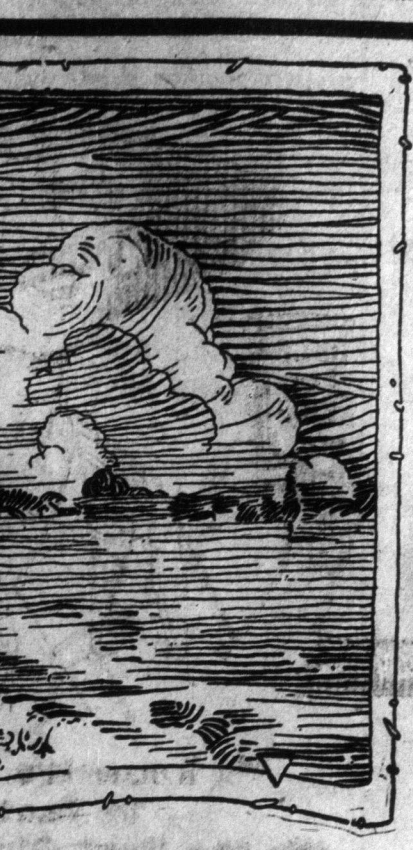

There are other parts to be looked to as well. I have seen hands and fingers that were the embodiment of eloquence. One of the best death scenes I ever witnessed on the legitimate stage was just the hand of a drowning man slipping above the edge of the bath. Anyone who has seen Pickens' must remember this particular scene. Much may sometimes be told thru the droop of the shoulder or the tilt of the chin.

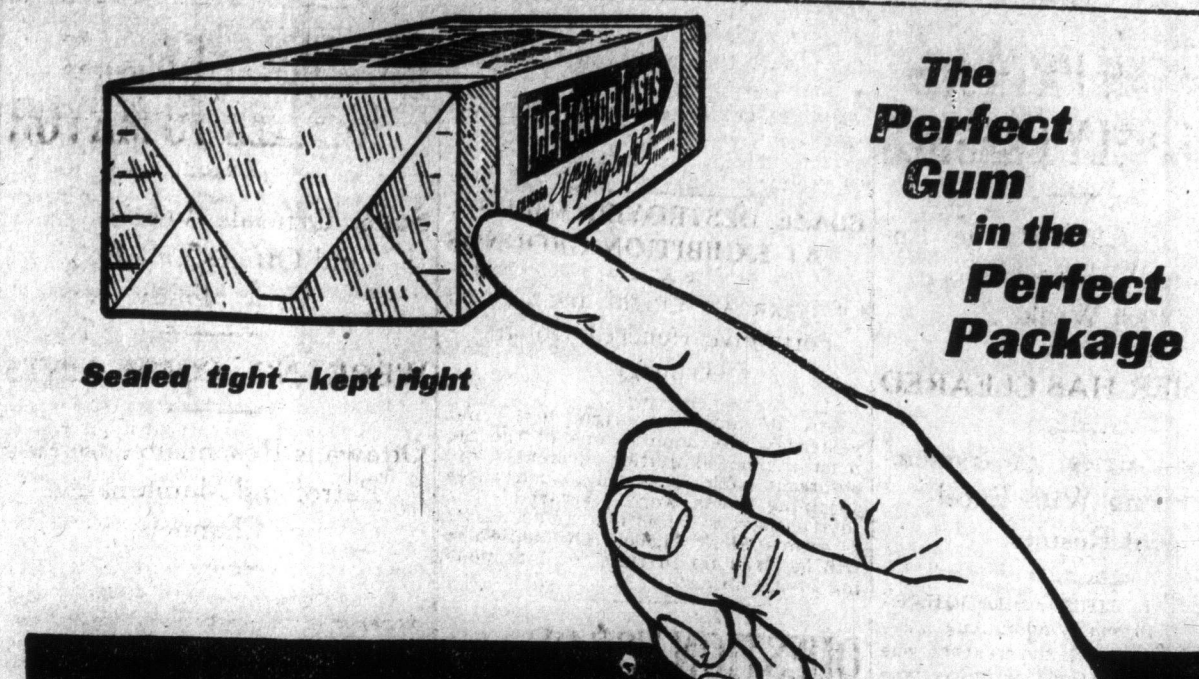
