GO BETWEEN IN THE CHEVY CUP. PERSISTENCE. ALSO RAN

Chevy Chase for Imperialist and Handicap Steeplechase for King Carter.

WILLIAM WILFRED CAMPBELL.

Speaks to the Empire Club on Some Phases of Imperialism.

The author of "The Mother" and "Hildebrand," the bard of the black lake sketches of Huron, the assistant of log-collars and aboriginals of the good Canadian poet, William Wilfred Campbell, came from Ottawa, but not as a member of the convention, as Col. Mason explained, to address the Empire Club yesterday on the subject of imperialism.

He felt himself at an advantage in addressing a club of that kind. The practical side of imperialism was what he wished to dwell on, since the patriotic side of it was secure in his hearts. He was an imperialist, however, not merely because his heart told him so, but because his head also told him so. The only chance Canada had of ever becoming a great people was for her to remain long as possible in the empire. The time was coming when men must take more interest in public affairs. The terrible danger of being in connection with the ballot was so serious that if they were to keep the freedom of the ballot every man must do his duty as an individual.

In a sense they had become Americanized, having filled to lake advantage of the great medium of education, the press, the platform and houses of parliament, to spread imperial sentiment. He wished to see the press written in London, whereby editorials in any part of the empire could be read in all others. If the people could be got to read the same papers nothing could separate them. American papers coming into Canada disturbed this unanimity and boiler-plate was faintly visible in the United States news man. The constructive movements of democracy looked for by men like Goldwin Smith had been misled by these observers. As the
