

DRILLS OR ON HILLS

(Experimental Farms Note.) Experiment at Cape Rouge.-From years, all the corn grown on 57.3 acres was weighed, every load of it. Each season a lot was planted in rows forty-eight inches apart, with about eight inches between the plants, another lot in rows forty-two inches apart with about eight inches between the plants, another lot in hills forty-two inches apart, and still another lot in hills thirty-six inches apart. The Longfellow variety was used, and the land, both before and after putitive in the corn was treated alike. ting in the corn, was treated alike.

More tonnage from the drills—The results show conclusively that more ton-nage can be had by sowing in drills, the

figures being as follows:

Drills forty-eight inches apart, 20,819 pounds per acre.
Drills forty-two inches apart, 19,867

bounds per acre.
Hills thirty-six inches apart, 12,402 ounds per acre. Hills forty-two inches apart, 12,356 ounds per acre.

During the five years of the experimen there were dry, wet, warm and cool sea-sons, so that the average can be taken as

a fair one, as far as temperature and precipitation go. In four years out of five the drills gave the highest tonnage, and in the other, there was a difference of only about 4 per cent in favor of the Much more nutrients from the drills.

To find out the nutrients in corn grown at each distance, samples were taken-from every lot and sent to Dominion Chemist for analysis. The average of five years shows that the drills gave the







Not since the war began has the Empire been out of danger. All these adverse conditions have been changed so as to show a balance in our favor. Happily for the Empire, the British navy was ready when the war began, and under its cover we have been enalled to turn against the enemy odds that in several respects were fearfully against us when we were called to our defence.

If the Entente nations continue to be well fed, the doom of the enemy is certain, no matter what the military effect of Russia's revolution.
