May Hold Out Long Enough For Junction Of Allies and Serbians

Hope Revived in London By Latest Reports From the Balkans Relative To Situation at Monastir

London, Nov. 23.—The latest news from the Balkans have revived the hope in England that Monastir may hold out long enough to enable the French and British forces to effect a junction with the Serbians.

REPORT LIKELY DELAYED ONE

London, Nov. 23.—The following despatch was received today from Reuter's correspondent at Athens: "It is announced officially that Serbians soldiers have reoccupied the front on the Velez-Prilp line, and are advancing toward Belona to reinforce the troops defending the pass."

Newcastle, N. B., Nov. 23.—A wedding of interest took place in St. Mary's church at ten o'clock this morning, when Miss Nan Quinn, organist of that church, became the wife of William L. Durick, manager of Durick's drug store here, formerly of St. John. The church was beautifully decorated.

Paris, Nov. 23.—The loss in the fire yesterday in the annex of the Bon Marche, one of the largest department stores in Paris, is estimated at least \$6,000,000.

STEAMER FROM NEW YORK BLOWN UP AT CADIZ

Cadiz, Spain, Nov. 23.—The steamship Libra and the greater part of its cargo were destroyed by a fire which followed an explosion while inflammable goods were being discharged from the hold here yesterday. Several seamen were injured.

This Is Read As Meaning That Greece Is Brought To Terms

London, Nov. 23.—The foreign office states that no Greek ships are being seized or held up in the ports of the United Kingdom and that no blockade of Greek ports has been instituted, or is in force.

No amplification of the foreign office statement is obtainable in official quarters. The universal deduction is that the Greek government has satisfied the British demands submitted by Earl Kitchener. It is assumed that Greece has furnished guarantees of the safety of the Anglo-French expeditionary force.

PLOT TO DESTROY RAILROAD COMMUNICATION TO NEW YORK?

Washington Point of Attack According To Report to New York Herald—Effort To Stop Shipment of Munitions to Allies

New York, Nov. 23.—A Herald despatch from Washington says: In the fear that bomb plotters may try to destroy railroad communication through Washington from the south to New York city, apparently to stop shipments of munitions, a large force of guards is on duty in the tunnels leading into Union Station and under the city.

ALL FOR ONE AND ONE FOR ALL: ITALY'S STAND IN REGARD TO PEACE TALK

Rome, Nov. 23.—The speech of Minister of Grace and Justice Orlando, delivered yesterday morning in Palermo, is regarded as exceptionally important owing to the most significant declarations that were made regarding Italy's unity and solidarity and that "Italy is fighting with the allies in the same way and against the same enemies."

ITALIANS WIN FIERCE FIGHT

Rome, Nov. 23.—The official Italian statement of yesterday says: "The artillery on both sides has been engaged in different points along the Tyber, Trasimene and Castelli fronts."

STORMY SESSION CLOSES A. F. OF L. CONVENTION

San Francisco, Nov. 23.—Resolutions endorsing legislative methods in obtaining a universal eight hour law, was defeated by a vote of 6,686 to 6,290 at the final session of the American Federation of Labor convention, after a heated debate between President Rogers and John Fitzpatrick, president of the Illinois State Federation of Labor.

HUNDRED AND FIFTY GERMANS, TIRED OF IT, GIVE THEMSELVES UP

Montreal, Nov. 23.—A London cable to the Gazette says: "The 150 German prisoners of war, who were taken from the front in the Somme, have given themselves up and are being sent to the front."

WAR LOAN OFFERS OF BELOW \$10,000 ARE GIVEN FIRST CHANCE

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—There is a great response from all parts of Canada to the invitation for subscriptions to the Canadian \$50,000,000 loan. There is no doubt that the issue has been oversubscribed and offers are still pouring in.

AMERICANS MAKE STEEL EQUAL TO THE BEST OF GERMAN PRODUCT

New York, Nov. 23.—American steel manufacturers have succeeded in equaling the best product of the most famous German steel works, according to a report made by a committee of the Aero Club of America, after an investigation of motor factories in the east.

Greek Territory Open To Retreating Allies

That is Belief in London Today—Greek Minister of Justice Critical—French Cabinet Minister Again at Athens To See Constantine

London, Nov. 23.—It is now believed that allied forces that take refuge on Greek territory are hardly likely to be subjected to attack from the rear. The most significant indication as to the present attitude of Greece is contained in remarks made by M. Rallis, Greek minister of justice, who is quoted as having expressed views on the methods adopted by the Entente Allies.

THE UNITED STATES.

A great meeting held in Bangor on Friday evening last to hear addresses on the subject of national defence was remarkable for plain speaking about the United States and also about Germany.

The new Canadian loan of \$50,000,000 was practically all subscribed the first day. There is inspiration in that announcement. The people have shown their patriotism in a very substantial way.

The Allied forces have renewed vigorous operations at the Dardanelles. Today's cables indicate that more troops are being sent there. In the meantime the German plan to open and keep open a railway service to Constantinople is not yet fully successful.

The Standard seems a new danger to the Empire. In startling headlines it asks: "Will Grits force election on Monday?" Now how can the Grits force an election? They are busy fighting the Germans and the last thing they want is a controversy in Canada over domestic affairs.

It is even said that there is in existence a treaty between Constantinople and the Kaiser and that the King of Greece is merely playing for time in the present negotiations with the Entente Powers. WORKED ALL DAY FOR A PITTANCE Miss Laura Hughes Reports on Conditions Under Which Women Labor INVESTIGATED CHARGE Report on Toronto Factory—Labor Department Announces Minimum Wage of Dollar Will Be Paid (Toronto World)

During the last six months several charges as to the conditions under which women are working in local factories were laid at the meeting of the District Trades and Labor Council, and at a previous meeting of the council a committee was appointed to investigate the matter. Laura Hughes, daughter of Dr. James L. Hughes, and Gertrude Graydon, on request of the committee went and applied for work at factories and made out a report as to the conditions and presented it to the committee. The report of Miss Hughes, who worked for two weeks in the Simpson Knitting Factory, Berkeley street, was read by Secretary Stevenson at last night's meeting. In the report Miss Hughes states that on September 11 she applied at the above firm. "When I approached the forelady she was very curt, and told me it was no use because I was inexperienced. I gave my previous occupation as house work, and gave my name and address as that of our washwoman. "On Monday I was taken on as an inspector to inspect underwear at a rate of wages of five cents per every dozen inspected. I worked all day as hard as I could from 9 till 6 with fifteen minutes for lunch and only made seventy-one and one-half cents. The fastest girl in the place on this work made \$1.30, and she worked right through without taking time for lunch. "Miss Hughes says that the lights in the place hurt the eyes, and the only air that came into the rooms in which the girls worked came from the engine room full of gas. "On the Friday that she handed in her resignation the manager became suspicious of her and called her aside and asked her did she know Miss Hughes, and she replied no. He asked her reasons for quitting, and later said to the forelady, "Oh, let her go." "The committee reported the matter to the department of labor and received a notification that the charges had been investigated and that women working in factories would receive a minimum of one dollar a day.

FLOOD OF GERMAN GOLD TO CORRUPT ROUMANIA Milan, November 22.—The Corriere della Sera learns from the Russian frontier that the flood of German gold poured into Roumania for the corruption of the press and public is incalculable, and is daily increasing. In the propaganda in the newspapers and other publications alone nearly \$5,000,000 is known to have been spent by the German treasury. Besides newspapers, expressly founded or bought at Bucharest and in the provinces, an enormous number of reviews and so-called humorous papers are kept up by the Germans. Hundreds of thousands of tracts and pamphlets are continually being scattered throughout the country, reaching the remotest school teacher and village priest. Two new German dailies have just been founded, one at Bucharest, and one at Jassy.

WAR SITUATION AS SHOWN BY THE CABLES LAST NIGHT London, Nov. 22.—No definite news has been received here of Greece's reply to the Entente Allies' demands for guarantees for the safety of the Anglo-French troops landing at Saloniki, or for that of the Serbians who might be forced over the Greek frontier. One dispatch from Athens, however, says the Greek cabinet is disposed to accept the Entente Powers' demand that condition requiring Greece to participate in the war, and that a solution of the whole difficulty may be expected immediately. Meaning the blockade of Greek commerce has commenced and Italy, it is reported, is participating in the measures of restraint decided upon. This, with the news that the Serbians have won a victory over the Bulgarians northeast of Pristina, that the Bulgarians have delayed their march on Monastir, and that the Austro-Germans are laboring under difficulties as a result of the wintry weather, has created a more hopeful feeling in the capitals of the Entente Allies. The British and French forces daily are being strengthened by men and guns landed at Saloniki, and part of the reinforcements are being sent to Monastir, where the Serbians also are reported to be concentrating and threatening the Bulgarians at Filip. Roumania finds herself in much the same position as Greece, with both the Entente Allies and the Central Powers bringing pressure to bear upon her. The Germans, it is said, are asking Roumania to give assurances of her continued neutrality, and also are offering her concession if she intervenes in the war on the side of the Teutonic allies. With a big Russian army in Bessarabia, however, it is believed in military circles here hardly likely that Roumania will accept the second alternative. On the whole, it is expected here that the firm attitude of the Entente Powers toward Greece will clear the Balkan situation before very long. There is little news of importance from any of the other fronts. The Italians, by their continued offensive, are strengthening their positions around Gorizia, which it is believed cannot hold out much longer. On the western front the British and French artillery has become more active in Flanders and Champagne, which on previous occasions has been the signal for offensive movements. The Russians, since they regained the ground they lost along the Sty river, have been inactive, except for minor attacks in the Drinsk region. The Petrograd correspondent, however, predicts that more important events are impending. Another still of British submarines is reported to have arrived in the Baltic. "The Work of Alms?" The plant of the Canadian Explosives Company, Ltd., at Nobel, near Parry Sound, Ont., was destroyed last evening by an explosion which is believed to have been caused by alien enemies. The plant employed 750 men, but they had quit work for the night and it is believed that no lives were lost. Five buildings, used for the storage of cordite, were obliterated. Prof. Harvey Worrall, a statistician, says 8 per cent of our laughter is due to amusement. The other 77 per cent is the result of attempts to be polite.

ARCTIC EXPLORERS BELIEVED TO BE SAFE Dayton, Ohio, November 22.—Judge Carroll Sprigg, of this city, who accompanied the McMillan Arctic exploring expedition while on a hunting trip several years ago, but who later returned home, has received a duplicate message from the Danish explorer, Knud Rasmussen, who is now in Greenland, as follows: "Mail from Crockerland explorers arrived and delivered to your embassy. Cluett arrived North Star Bay September 12, after thirty-five days ice hindrance and motor damage. Dared not go to Etah on account of autumn ice, but kept near our station while our missionary motor-boat left for Etah to fetch exploring members to Cluett. All are well." Judge Sprigg declared that he is absolutely without any direct word from the exploring party and that there was nothing in the message he received from New York to indicate that McMillan party was lost. From the last three weeks of the message that Sprigg received from Knud Rasmussen, it would indicate that no harm had befallen the Arctic party. Y. W. C. A. Plans. Miss Una Saunders, national secretary of the Y. W. C. A., Mrs. John A. McAvity and Mrs. James F. Robertson were guests at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday and Miss Saunders addressed the club on the Conservation of Girl Life. She told of the work of the Y. W. C. A. and reported that a provision committee, with Mrs. McAvity as convener, had been appointed during the morning to prepare the war for the enlargement of this work in St. John and the ultimate erection of a building.

MORNING WAR NEWS. A despatch to the London Daily Mail from Rotterdam says that one of Germany's newest dreadnoughts struck a mine in the Baltic Sea on Friday and went to the bottom. Only thirty-three lives were reported lost. A tremendous offensive has been begun by the Allies at the Dardanelles, according to a Constantinople despatch to a German newspaper yesterday. The Turkish war office also reports that artillery duels are in progress on the Dardanelles front and violent fighting with bombs is taking place near Seddul Bahr on the tip of the Gallipoli peninsula. Official announcement was made yesterday of the capture by French and British forces of the city of Tibati in the German colony of Kamerun, West Africa, as the result of a surprise attack. CANADA TO ERECT LIFE-SIZED STATUE OF SIR CHARLES TUPPER. Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Parliament, at its next session, will be asked to make an appropriation for a life-sized statue of the late Sir Charles Tupper, to be erected on Parliament Hill, beside the other fathers of Confederation. 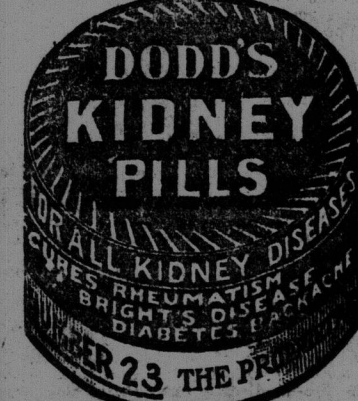

AUTOISTS NOW HAVE THEIR PATRON SAINT
New York, Nov. 23--Automobilists now have their patron saint. They have adopted St. Christopher as their friend and protector, according to a despatch from Rome, which appears in the current number of the Catholic News of this city. As St. Christopher is regarded as being especially benign to travelers, many owners in Europe who are Catholics have already placed themselves in his care. Curran of Paradise row tomorrow will be attended by a demonstration and reception in his honor now being arranged by fellow members of St. Peter's Y. M. C. A. Pte. Curran was about the youngest of the St. John boys to leave here with the first contingent, but proved his pluck in several battles and in many trying situations along the frontier in the early part of the war. He was quite painfully injured and was in hospital for some time in England, finally being registered as unfit to return to action at the front. Pte. Curran left St. John with the Divisional Signalling Corps and was one of the first members of that body to sustain wounds in carrying on the work of the section. He wrote home telling of his wounds but said that the doctors in charge of the hospital held out hopes that he would completely recover, so that he fully expected to go back with his "pal". Later he wrote that his injuries prevented his going back, and the authorities were ordering his return to Canada to convalesce. Many friends will welcome the lad tomorrow upon his arrival. He is expected on the 9.30 p. m. train and the City Cornet Band will turn out.

EDWARD SPEIGHT ON GERMAN FARM

Mother of North End Man Receives Postal From Prisoner of War

Private Edward Speight, who went overseas with the 14th battalion and who is now a prisoner in Giessen, Germany, has sent a post card to his mother, Mrs. Ellen Speight, Main street. He says he was well and having a good time although the weather was cold. Evidently the Germans are making the prisoners pay for their keep for Private Speight says: "I am working on a farm, quite a farm, too, you bet." He sends his regards to his family and friends. Strange to say, the official card on which he writes has its directions and instructions printed in French. Private Speight was a member of the 14th Battalion.

FINED FOR SUPPLYING LIQUOR TO SOLDIER

Winslow Currie arrested a few days ago on a charge of being caught in the act of conveying liquor to a soldier in uniform, was fined \$20 or two months in jail by Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning.

The preliminary hearing against Oscar Johnson, suspected of stealing a gold-filled watch from Charles Anderson of Little River, was commenced. The plaintiff told of missing the watch and learning that the defendant visited his house he subsequently had him arrested. Policeman Hogg testified about meeting the two men at the head of Waterloo street, and about arresting the defendant. At the plaintiff's wife will have to give testimony the prisoner was remanded. Sergeant Hastings said he was in Coburg street this morning when he noticed Han sweeping dirt and paper to the sidewalk and told him he could not do so. The Chinese, he said, refused to stop and so he reported him.

GREAT CONFERENCE OF JEWS IN CANADA IS HELD IN MONTREAL

B. L. Andur, St. John Representative, Speaks of It

ALL FOR ALLIES' VICTORY

Resolutions of Loyalty to British Sovereign and For Success of Arms—Claims of Race in Making of Peace Terms

Bernard L. Andur, former rabbi of St. John, has returned from Montreal, where he has been attending the first Canadian Jewish conference, which took place there beginning on Nov. 14, and continuing for several days. It was attended by hundreds of delegates of practically all Jewish organizations in Canada, religious, secular, and benevolent, from the Atlantic to the Pacific and thousands from Montreal and neighboring cities. Many prominent Gentiles also were present. Mr. Andur was the delegate to represent St. John's Jewish community, consisting of two congregations, The Hebrew Sheltering and Immigration Aid Society, The Daughters of Israel, (Benevolent), and The Hebrew Ladies Aid Society.

The conference was the most brilliant affair of its nature ever held in the city of Montreal. The Canadian government was represented by Hon. J. McEwen, the solicitor general. He was accorded a magnificent and cordial reception. The city of Montreal also was represented.

The following resolutions were passed: (1) That this conference of representatives of the Jews of Canada desires as its first act to place on record an expression of its devotion to the sovereignty of the British Empire and its unwavering loyalty to the crown.

(2) Resolved that "this conference gives expression to the earnest hope that in the gigantic struggle in which the British Empire and its allies are now engaged the champions of civilization, they will emerge victorious and will thus triumphantly vindicate the great principles of justice, liberty and equality."

(3) Resolved that this conference, recognizing the benefits of the full rights of citizenship enjoyed by our brethren together with all the people under the flag of the British Empire, voices the prayer that the time may not be far distant when our (religionists) in every land wherever they may be shall be accorded those same rights of equality and justice which are the prerogative of all mankind.

Several other resolutions were passed. Reasons for calling the conference were explained by the chairman, Clarence J. DeSola. This world, he said, was at present living in a time that had carried disaster and ruin to some of the fairest countries of Europe. It had been the wildest of times and six million Jews to live in the countries in which the bloodiest conflicts of the war had taken place and the horrors they had suffered in consequence were indescribable. A time would come when the war would terminate and the belligerents would meet to arrange conditions of peace. They had been assured by the British government that one of the essential conditions of peace would be the safeguarding of the interests of all small nations and the guarantee of even the weakest nation against any act of aggression or injustice in the future.

Such a time as the past as the Jews should have a special claim to be heard at the peace conference, and provision should be made that Jews should be given the privileges in all lands that other nations were given. "We can ask no more," said the speaker. "We should ask no less."

They were confident that those who would dominate would be the representatives of Britain—(Gentiles)—and her allies, who were fighting for justice and right, on which the whole fabric of society rested. Britain must win, for her fight was for right, and right was right.

Mr. Andur said that an executive committee of the most prominent Jews in Canada was elected to give effect to the resolutions passed and to be intrusted with all work affecting Canadian Jews and that it have power to organize form committees and appoint more executives when deemed advisable. Mr. Andur was elected on the executive for St. John.

A mass meeting was held on Sunday evening in the Hasen Avenue Synagogue where Mr. Andur gave a full report of the proceedings of the conference. Among the statistics brought before the conference by prominent authorities besides those of the enormous amount of Jews killed and wounded on the battlefield, it was said there were one million and a quarter Jewish refugees being driven, starving, it was said, through snow and rain, and fire and sword. The meeting concluded with a hope for a speedy victory for the allies.

NOBLE WORK DONE

By the sale of chances and the proceeds of a dance and social held on November 13, about \$175 was realized for the relief of the Russian Jewish war sufferers. This noble work is to the credit of the following young ladies, who spared no efforts to make it a success: Misses Bessie Marcus, Emily Green, Anna Gilbert, Alice Green, Rena Isaacs, Silvia Isaacs and Bessie Gilbert. The money was forwarded to the president of the relief committee in Montreal.
